Council Mulls New Lights

Representatives from the Detroit Edison Co. met with members of the Cass City Village Council Wednesday morning to try to sell the village on new, more powerful lights for the community.

It is a project that has been discussed previously and tabled because of the cost involved. At Wednesday's meeting about 10 or 15 businessmen were on hand to hear the discussion.

The proposed change would replace the present lights in the business district with 20,000 watt mercury vapor lights that would provide about twice the amount of lighting that is presently used. The new lights have reflectors that are able to guide the light in any direction.

In addition to the new lights on Main Street, there would also be new lights installed in the residential district.

At the present time this area is served by 1,000 or 2,500-watt lights. The new lights would furnish 6,000 watts.

The initial cost to the village

for this work would be \$1,200 to pay for the undepreciated portion of the lights already in use.

In addition, the monthly light bill would jump about \$163 from its present cost of approximately \$380 per month.

The increase amounts to about 30 per cent in operating costs, not counting the original installation charge. For its money the village would be receiving about two and a half times as much light as they are now using, Herbert Ludlow, local Edison manager, said.

Other Business

In other business, trustees voted to buy a new police car. The present car has some 65,000 miles on it. Police cars are purchased on a rotating basis with the three local dealers taking turns in furnishing the unit at a reduced rate.

President Lee Rabideau said that the slip by the board of health and consultant engineers cost the village \$500 as reported in the Chronicle last week, but that only half of the amount was an extra cost to the village. If it had been included in the original plans, he explained, we would have been assessed for half of the cost anyway.

Name Centennial Division Heads

Appointment of chairmen of six Cass City Area Centennial divisions were announced this week by centennial cochairmen Clint House and James Ware.

The chairmen will meet soon with their respective committee chairmen to set up committees and outline projects in preparation for a consulting meeting with John B. Rogers Co., Fostoria, Ohio, in January. The firm is staging the centennial pageant.

Named were Ken Eisinger, revenue division; Tom Proctor, spectacular ticket sales; Dave Kraft, publicity; Willis Campbell, hospitality; Dick Erla, special events and Mrs. Thomas Jackson and Dick Wallace, participation division.

Still to be named is a spectacular division chairman. Ware stated that they have a candidate in mind for the post, but have not contacted him yet.

The consultation meeting will be for all division and committee chairmen and will be the first of a number of such meetings held before the centennial next July.

For Circuit Judge

Primary Election Sure

With the announcement of George D. Lutz, 41, of Lapeer of his candidacy for Circuit Judge of Lapeer and Tuscola counties, a primary election is now assured in the county.

The law states that a primary election must be held when three or more candidates seek the post. Lutz is the third to announce his candidacy.

Already seeking the post to be vacated by Judge T. C. Quinn, who moves up to the Court of Appeals in January, are James Churchill of Vassar and Robert L. Taylor of Lapeer.

Gov. George Romney has announced that the primary will be held Feb. 15. Candidates have until Dec. 28 to file for the office.

The date of the general election will be April 5. The two counties will be served by visiting judges from other circuits from January until after the election.

Chronicle Quickly Locates Missing Church Sign

The Chronicle found a missing St. Pancratius Church sign shortly after the paper hit the streets last week, the Rev. Father Arnold Messing reported.

The sign had mysteriously vanished from a roadside location west of Cass City on the Ed Karr farm this fall.

When the paper publicized the loss, a farmer in the area called Father Messing and said that they saw an orange truck cart it off.

It was quickly determined that the sign had been removed by the Tuscola County Road Commission and was resting in a Vassar garage.

It was removed because a portion of the sign was on the M-81 right of way. Father Messing said that if he had called him he could have saved the highway crew a job by removing the sign himself.

He said that the highway commission will return the sign to the church this week and that it will be erected west of Cass City on a site still to be determined, this spring.

New Chief Takes Post Office Reins

Grant Glaspie, 35, of Cass City became the 19th postmaster of Cass City Saturday when he assumed the head job at the department from Lewis Bishop, 67, who is retiring.

Glaspie will be acting postmaster as permanent appointments are not made until competitive written exams are completed.

Bishop has served as postmaster for six years and has been a resident of the community since 1948. He ran a hardware store for 10 1/2 years.

Bishop cited health and personal reasons for his retirement that he instigated at his own option. Mandatory retirement age in the postal service is 70.

Before coming to Cass City, Bishop was a plant manager at Chesley Industries in Detroit. Bishop and his wife, Janet, have a son, Jim, 31, of Milwaukee.

Plans Move Forward

Community College Feasible in Thumb

Dr. Ferris N. Crawford, assistant Superintendent for General Education, told a meeting of Thumb superintendents Tuesday night that a community college for the Tri-county was entirely feasible.

Speaking at Cass City High School, he pointed out that several other areas with an equal valuation (about \$380 million) are running very successful programs.

Judging by the number of graduates in Thumb schools, he estimated that a community college would serve from 900-1,000 students.

A community college would receive both Federal and State aid. Students attending would be required to pay tuition. With this financial help, past experience has shown that a tax levy of 3/4 - 1 1/2 mills is sufficient for both construction and operation. Dr. Crawford said he felt about a mill would handle the requirements here.

A community college would serve four basic functions. It would serve as a center for adult education and as the first two years of a college course. It would also serve for vocational guidance courses and as a cultural center for the entire area.

The Procedure Within a week the committee of superintendents are expected to report to the intermediate school districts whether or not they feel a college is feasible for the area. If they do, (and qualified observers say that a favorable vote is almost certain) the next move will be up to the heads of the intermediate districts. If they agree a citizens advisory group should be formed, according to the information presented by Dr. Crawford. This group would include representatives from the entire area to be serviced by the college.

It would be the duty of this group to come up with figures on operating costs, construction costs and perhaps possible site locations that could be presented to the people before the project was submitted for a vote.

\$500 Raise for Elective Officers

Supervisors Approve Pay Hikes for County Personnel

Tuscola county elective officers were given a \$500-a-year pay hike Monday by county supervisors along with raises for all county employees.

The move came during the board's regular December session and put an end to a pay hassle which resulted last month in the resignation of some county employees and caused grumblings among others.

The elective officers which include sheriff, prosecuting attorney, clerk, treasurer, register of deeds and drain commissioner,

were raised from \$5,700 a year to \$6,200.

The hike was some \$300 less than the \$6,500 proposed by the committee on salaries. The reduction may have played a part in the 15-yes, 9-no vote on the salaries.

Deputy clerks were raised from a peak of \$4,200 to a peak of \$4,600 with a starting salary of \$4,000.

Deputies Each full-time deputy sheriff will receive \$5,500. The civil defense director and the county

health nurse salaries were also set at \$5,500.

Secretaries and other office staff salaries were raised from \$3,350 to \$3,800 with beginning salaries at \$3,000. Beginning salaries will increase \$150 each six months to \$3,600 after two years' employment and then \$200 after five years to the \$3,800 figure.

Reductions Other salary changes included a reduction from the suggested \$6,000 salary of the friend of the court to \$5,700 and a cutback of \$400 in the register of probate salary from \$5,000 to \$4,600.

Other Raises The supervisors raised four other salaries. Assistant nurse will receive \$5,200 with a starting salary of \$4,800 or if an R.N., \$4,800 peak with a beginning salary of \$4,200.

Maintenance superintendent was raised from a suggested salary of \$4,200 to \$4,500 and custodian was hiked from a \$3,900 suggested salary to \$4,000. The caretaker was also raised \$100 from a suggested \$3,500 to \$3,600.

Vacations Revamped Vacation schedules were also revamped. Six-month employees will receive one-week vacations. Concluded on page three.

Set Work Plans For Cultural Center

Authorities of the Elkland Township Cultural Center, Inc., the nonprofit corporation in charge of renovating the Elkland Township Hall said that work will start on the ancient structure right after the first of the year.

The project received a boost last week from the Cass City Rotary Club which voted to donate \$1,000 towards the cost of creating a cultural center from a building that is currently used very little.

President Lucile Bauer said that the total cost of the project would be in the neighborhood of \$8,000 and \$3,500 has already been pledged for the work.

Remodeling Plans The exterior of the building will be remodeled so that the front looks like it did when it was originally built. The building will be painted inside and out and all new lighting will be installed to conform with government regulations.

In an effort to make the building more usable, extensive interior remodeling is planned. The building will be rewired. On the second floor, a small modern kitchen will be installed.

A new floor and new bathroom facilities are also slated. New inside walls upstairs and down will help to make the building attractive to local residents.

The remodeling is expected to be completed early this summer in time for use in Cass City's

Centennial celebration. A display of arts and crafts created locally is planned for the building.

Previously the building had been used only for township meetings.

In the future it will be open for any local civic organization that cares to use it. Included in Concluded on page three.

Besides the week end visits, Santa will be at his house from 3 to 5 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Dec. 21-22-23.

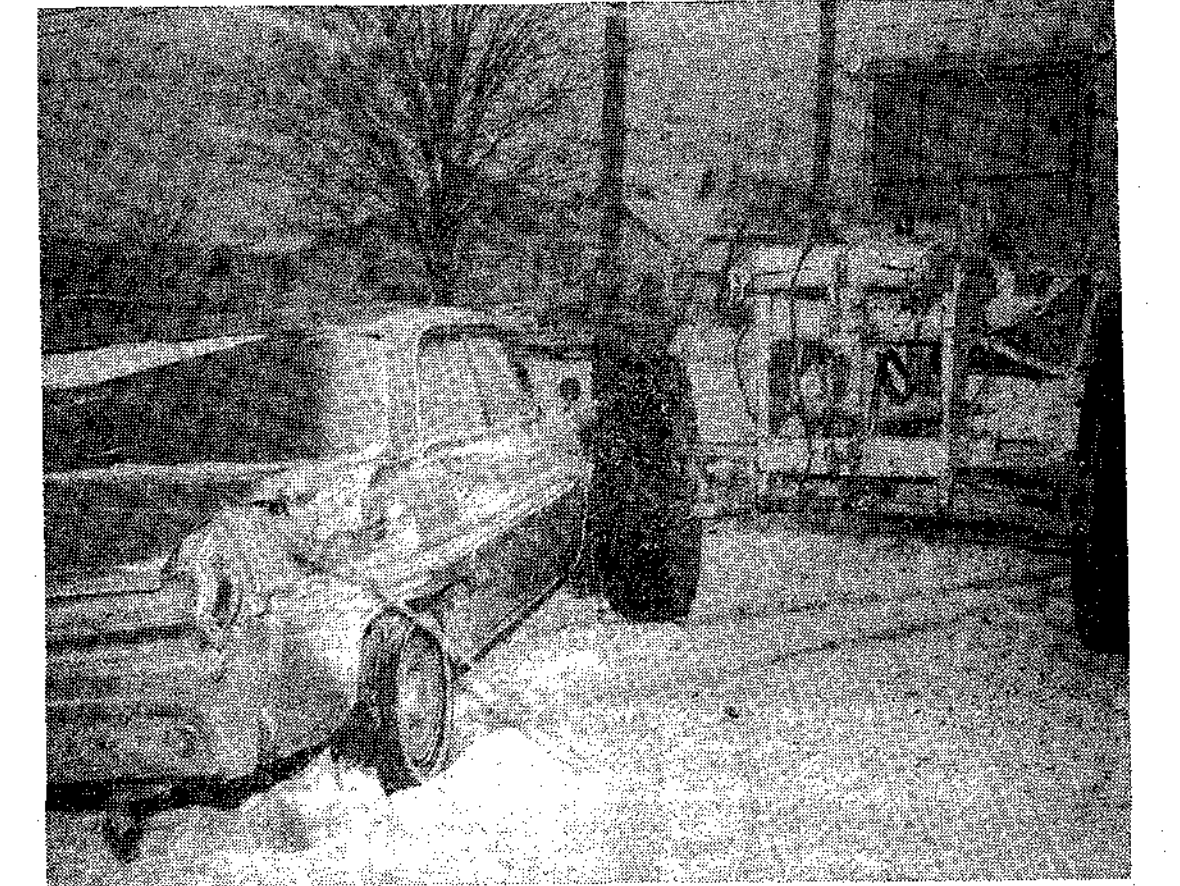
Gypsy Salesmen Writing Checks On Local Accounts

No Player Shake Up for Hawks In Home Cage Opener

It was a disappointing debut for Coach John Oswald, the Cass City Red Hawks and their fans Friday as the Tigers notched a 72-60 decision in a Thumb B Conference tilt on Caro's spacious basketball floor.

Although Oswald is not going around making excuses about the team's performance, there were several bad breaks that made it easy for Caro to win.

Jim Knoblet, who is expected to carry the brunt of the load in the rebounding department, showed his old weakness. In less than four minutes of the first quarter he collected three fouls and left the game. Inserted back in the game in the second half, he lasted just a few moments before he was sent to an early shower with five personals.

Al Wallace was hampered with a back ailment and was not as effective as he should have been in the rebounding department.

In addition to the lack of rebounding, Cass City looked ragged handling the ball and repeatedly lost the ball via errors.

One bright spot for Cass City in a dismal evening was the play of Wayne Copeland, the only member of the starting five with no previous varsity experience. Copeland led all Cass City scorers with 19 points.

The Hawks' strong point this year was expected to be its shooting. Against Caro, Cass City was able to hit only 25 per cent of its shots from the floor. The Hawks connected on 17 of 68 attempts while Caro was converting 24 of 79 for about 29 per cent.

The Tigers moved into a lead in the first period and were never behind although the Hawks made a determined bid to get back into the game in the last half. They moved to within four points in the last quarter, but the Tigers withstood the onslaught and moved back into a comfortable lead.

In the first half, it looked as if the game was going to be a real runaway. At the end of the first period, Caro was in front 21-14 and at the half had extended their lead to 16 points, 44-28.

Caro was playing the game with just one veteran from last year's team, Jim Wyrick. The tall center was Caro's best man last year and he took over from where he left off in the season's opener Friday.

He was the big scorer and big rebounder for the Tigers. He hit 10 field goals and 10 of 12 charity tosses for 30 points.

Oswald used his bench frequently and the reserves, most of whom are juniors, turned in some

of the best ball of the evening for Cass City.

Cass City turned in a one point advantage in the third quarter, 15-14, and outscored the winners 17-14 in the last quarter. Ed Retherford rebounded well and picked up 16 points in the losing effort.

Even with all of its troubles the team might have pulled the game out of the fire with a little better accuracy from the foul line.

Caro converted 22 of 31 tries while the best Cass City could do was 24 of 44 attempts.

The Junior Varsity also lost to the Caro JV squad, but the score was much closer, 50-47.

Friday, Dec. 11, Cass City will open its home season against a rangy Frankenthum squad.

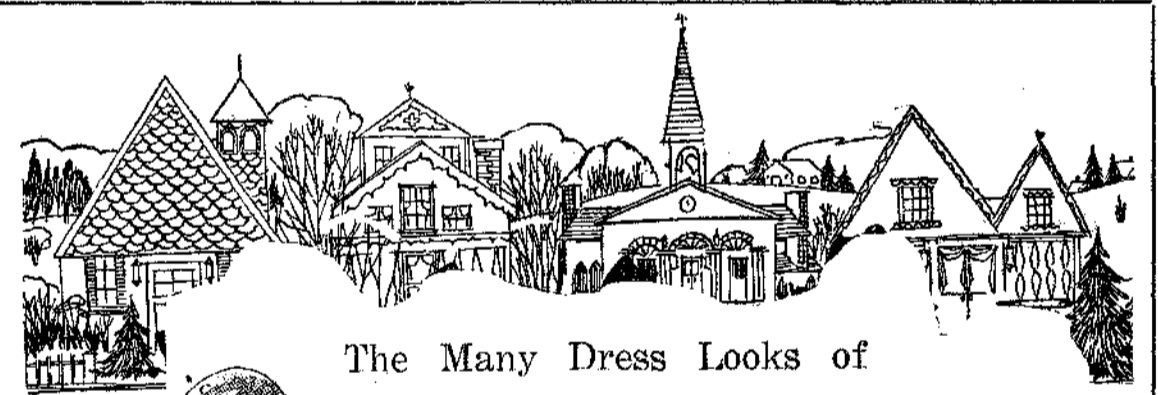

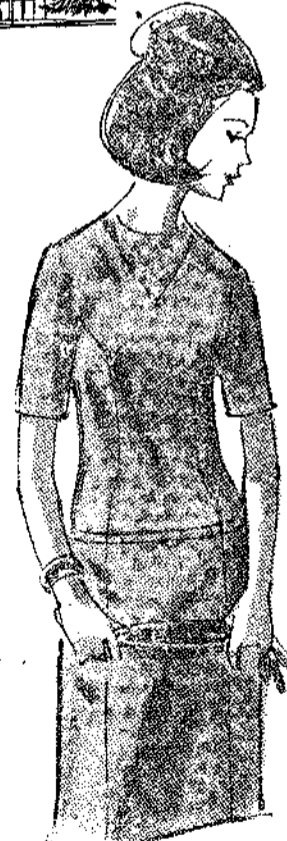

Tell More Details Of Merger Plan

Authorities at Unionville and Owen-Gage High Schools are not sure when plans for a merger of the districts will be complete enough to present the proposition to the voters in the two districts for decision.

The combined districts would have a valuation of \$28,000,000, equalling about \$18,000 in valuation behind each of the 1200 pupils in the district.

New School

Although the taxpayers will not be asked to vote on the proposition at the time a merger is presented for action, school authorities are planning for a new school for grades 7-12 for the enlarged district.

As a result of a University of Michigan Bureau of School Services survey, a location for a central school in an area situated along the Bay City-Forrestville Road in the Ashmore area has been accepted by both boards. The joint boards decided that the combined district should be a part of the Tuscola County Intermediate School District rather than the Huron County School District where some of the proposed new district is located.

PROGRESS

The fellow who succeeds finds he can't buck the future, so he becomes a part of it.

But another step forward is expected to be taken when a list of the enriched curriculum offerings that a merger could offer will be presented at a meeting slated Monday.

When the merger proposition is presented to the voters, it will be necessary for the Owen-Gage district to accept the balance of a \$250,000 bond issue floated by the Unionville district for a new elementary school now under construction.

At the present time Owen-Gage has no debt. The new 14-room elementary school at Unionville costs \$360,000, but the district had raised \$110,000 in a sinking fund before construction started. The district plans to repay the debt in 11 years at an average cost of 2.5 mills per year (\$2.50 per thousand of the state's equalized valuation.)

South Branch River Project Near Finish

Despite the recent change in weather, construction is continuing on the South Branch of Cass River Watershed Project located in Sanilac and Lapeer counties. Co-sponsored by the South Branch of the Cass River Drainage District and the Sanilac and Lapeer Soil Conservation Districts, this \$700,000.00 Drainage Improvement and Flood Protection Project is being installed with the assistance of the USDA - Soil Conservation Service under Public Law 566. Started in June 1963 and now nearing completion, the contract has three months yet to run.

According to the contractor, Blue Water Excavating Company of Port Huron, all excavating work should be completed around the first of the year. Other work such as soil leveling, structure installation, seeding and mulching will be completed early next year.

The large four cubic yard dragline has finished channel excavation near the M-46 bridge west of Sandusky and was moved to the upper end of the project. It has joined two smaller two cubic yard machines at the Gosline Road crossing in Lapeer County. An additional 2 cubic yard dragline is excavating near Peck Road just east of M-53.

Of the 27.4 miles of channel to be improved, 25 miles have now been completed. This represents 90 per cent of the 2,800,000 cubic yards to be excavated and leveled in the project. The remaining 2.4 miles is located in the upper portion of the drain in Lapeer County.

Approximately 185 of the planned 215 metal pipe erosion control structures have been installed by the contractor. All land clearing and bridge protection work was finished earlier this year. Accelerated land treatment within the watershed continues with assistance to land-owners being given by local Soil Conservation Service technicians. Some of the more important conservation practices being planned and put to use on the land are: tile drainage, open ditches, erosion control structures, winter cover crops, wildlife habitat

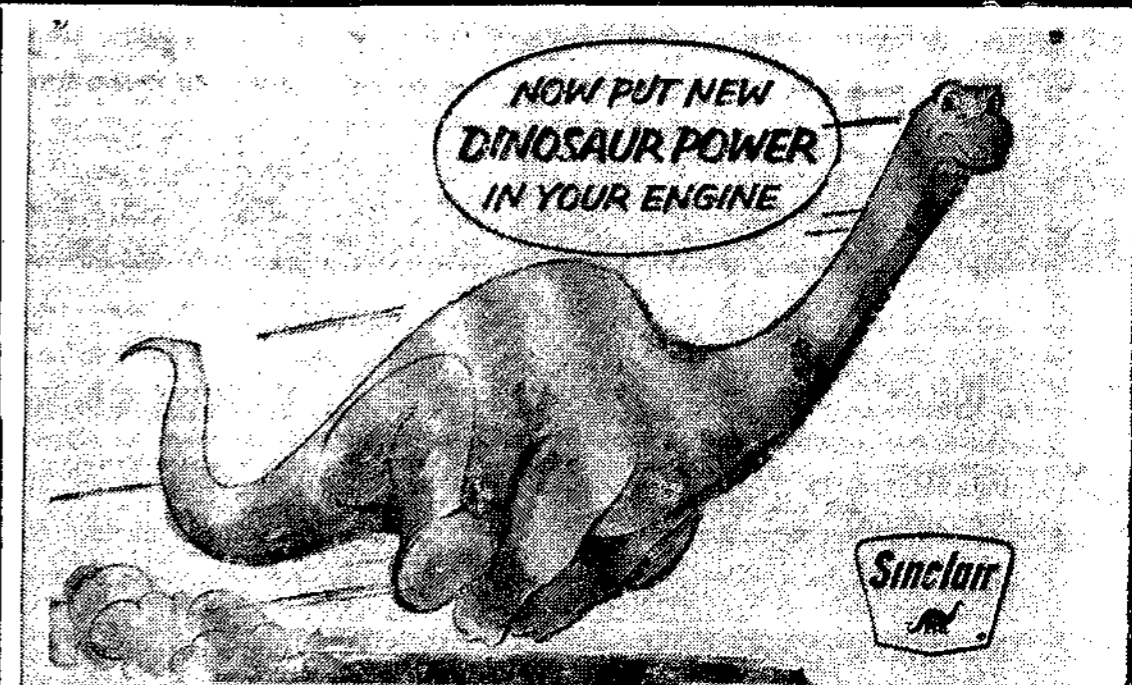

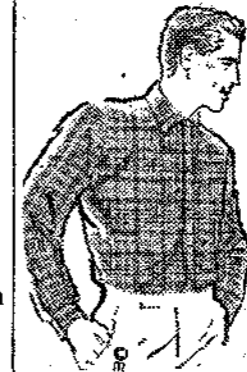

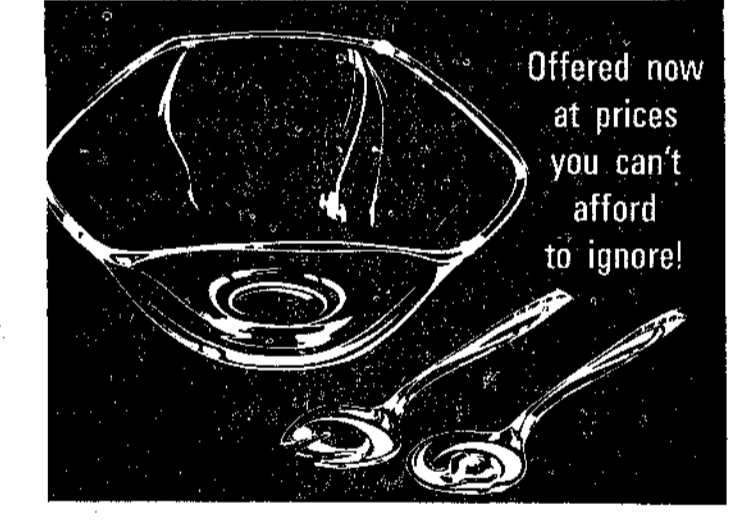

Lengthy Session Due for State Legislature in 1965

A long, long session of the 1965 Legislature is almost assured by several factors, not the least of which is the impending state government reorganization.

Odd-year sessions are traditionally longer than those in election years, but the Democratic majority-Republican administration situation makes for an even more intensive fight over reorganization than was previously anticipated.

The 1963 Constitution gave the Legislature until 1966 to set down new government divisions, sharply lessening the number of independent agencies. If this is not done by the lawmakers, it then becomes an executive responsibility of the Governor.

Democratic leaders in the two houses would like nothing more than to draw their own plan for the administration of state government.

To turn this job over to Republican Gov. George Romney could be disastrous to many of the Democratic appointees still holding top-level jobs in various departments to which they were named in the Williams and Swainson administrations.

Considerable time will be needed to accomplish reorganization, however, because the initial recommendations made to the Legislature next year may not meet with Democratic approval.

Joint House-Senate committees have been working on implementation of the new constitution the past two years, including the interim period between sessions.

Because the Republicans controlled the 1963-64 legislative session, the top men on these committees were not Democrats and there were more GOP members on these working units.

Thus, the original recommendations to be made next session likely will be the result from these GOP-controlled committees.

which have been in consultation with Romney's office during their deliberations.

Some agencies with Democratic-named chiefs likely would be made sub-divisions of other units if Romney and GOP legislators had their way, but Democratic lawmakers will be out to preserve the high rank of those administrators who share their political persuasion.

Drunk Drivers

Attention must be given to an underlying problem if a major cause of traffic accidents is to be reduced, according to Secretary of State James M. Hare.

Hare notes that it has been estimated that the drinking driver causes up to 75 per cent of all fatalities and personal injury accidents. This includes both the alcoholic and so-called "social drinker."

"In many cases, the real problem of alcoholism and its underlying psychological causes are completely ignored," said Hare. "Perhaps what is necessary is a law which would provide for automatic referral of such a person to an alcoholic treatment center and a suspension of his license until he is given a clean bill of health."

Tougher laws dealing with drinking drivers are definitely needed in any event, said the Secretary of State.

Hare emphasizes punitive action without treatment of the real problem would be valueless, however. Under present law, a person's license is taken if he is convicted of drunk driving twice in a year, but many get a lesser penalty if they prove a need for the license.

A considerable number of Michigan citizens are affected annually by the drunken driving law. In the first nine months of this year, Hare's department revoked or suspended 4,635 licenses under this law, and 5,487 persons lost their licenses during all of 1963.

Help Helps

School dropouts and other reluctant learners are not an invention of the 20th Century, but communications and other factors have made it seem so.

State School Superintendent Lynn M. Bartlett says citizens just hear more about these youngsters now because today's world no longer provides a place for the person who fails to get an education.

Cooperative programs designed to teach reluctant learners desirable skills for available jobs are beginning to provide a bridge between the gap opened by changing times and technological advances.

National studies have shown that reluctant learners often make remarkable progress toward the normal level when placed, at an early age, in a favorable environment for mental, emotional and social development, said Bartlett.

Thus, encouraging a positive attitude toward education among so-called culturally deprived youngsters can help produce beneficial results as they progress through the grades.

Start Dairy Club In Winter Months

The best time to get a 4-H Dairy Club started is in the winter months, says Ed Schrader, County Extension Agent in 4-H club work.

Members of 4-H clubs are concerned with acquiring information about dairying, developing skills essential to the successful operation of a dairy enterprise and practicing the methods learned. Many youth today are vitally concerned with the "whys" as well as the "how to do it" aspects of the 4-H Dairy project. Schrader says the leader's role is to help the members reach these objectives.

He advises 4-H Club leaders to follow the lesson plans in the new 4-H Dairy Leader's Guide. Interesting lesson outlines are available on all phases of dairy production.

It is important that 4-H members learn some of the factors involving selection, feeding and management of dairy animals, he says. If winter meetings are conducted to teach about dairying, then the members can be much farther ahead in the spring.

Individual 4-H dairy members can carry on a dairy science project during the winter months, too. The new publication, 4-H Dairy Science, points out the scientific principles involved in the functioning of the cow's body. It also contains many questions to answer and simple experiments to conduct.

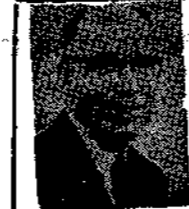

IT SEEMS TO ME Remember - - It's His Birthday We Celebrate

Cass City, like countless other communities, is all dressed up for Christmas. The Chamber of Commerce, with much additional help, has again transformed the downtown section and has stimulated many home displays. Many persons, with myself numbered in their midst, have often decried the commercialism with which we celebrate the most important birth in all of human history. It is well to raise the question each year. But do not lose sight of the fact that, as the Chamber of Commerce has transformed the appearance of downtown Cass City, there is much more standing in the need of transforming. We know this because He, whose birthday we celebrate with Christmas, showed us not only the truth about how we live, but went beyond that to teach us how to live in love and peace. Or, so it seems to me!

Two things are happening in California that I find interesting and challenging. Seven theological seminaries in the bay area of San Francisco are banded together, sharing income and teachers together, using a plan roughly like that of seminaries working under combined faculties at the University of Chicago, with this notable exception: One of the cooperating schools in the California experiment is St. Albert's Dominican College, a Roman Catholic school!

In Fresno the residents started their own "war on poverty." Focus of the effort to date has been on Three Rocks, described as a farm labor slum, now named El Porvenir. "Hope for the Future." A farmer gave a 20-acre tract as a site for new homes for 54 families with 140 children who have been living in tar paper shacks, condemned 12 years ago as unfit. Lawyers, surveyors and architects have rallied to give their services. Area churchmen have donated funds for tools, a cement mixer and a truck. This project is applied Christianity, or, so it seems to me.

Word has come to my attention that an English service in St. Pancratius Roman Catholic Church was held on a November Sunday. In its enthusiasm, this column announced such an event prematurely. This is an auspicious occasion and is being hailed by Christians around the world! Or, so it seems to me.

We noted with sadness that Archbishop Rummel has left the earthly scene. You may remember that this courageous Roman Catholic prelate went about his area desegregating all schools for which he had responsibility. He promptly excommunicated some prominent people who opposed him. All this, you recall, took place in 1962 before today's more favorable climate of opinion. We hereby salute this brave dedicated man of the church.

A few years back it was difficult to adopt a child; now that has changed and the supply of children for adoption is, sadly, on the increase once more. Responsible married couples who want to have and love a child need not deprive themselves and some
