Hawks Improve Despite Third Straight Defeat

A hot shooting Mariette five handed the Cass City Red Hawks their third straight defeat of the season despite the fact that Coach John Oswald says that the team showed marked improvement again Tuesday night. Cass City dropped a 97-81 decision as Paul Chappel burned the nets for 43 points including a phenomenal 17 of 20 from the free throw lane.

As a team the Red Raiders hit 56 per cent from the field and 73 per cent from the charity lane. . . . both outstanding percentages. Cass City hit 40 per cent from the field and 67 per cent from the free throw line. Jim Knoblet led both teams in rebounding with 18 and was top Hawk scorer with 24 points.

That would be needed on land currently part of county right of way. **Deford Problems** Cass City Public Schools' recently acquired Deford system dominated much of the meeting with lunchroom and use of the school facilities problems. Regulations for use of Deford school facilities were formulated on a pattern similar to Cass City High School's rules. School activities can be held without charge; however, non-school youth groups will have to pay \$1.50 an hour for extra custodial fees on weekdays and \$2.00 an hour on week ends. Non-school youth groups will not be required to pay a building fee. Civic groups will pay a \$3.00 fee for use of the building plus custodial fees. Private individuals or parties will pay a flat \$35.00 which was the same under the old regulations. No official action was taken on Supt. Donald Crouse's report that the Deford cafeteria has operated the past two months in the red. The board did, however, discuss possible raising of lunch fees there or transfer of funds from Cass City cafeteria profits to the Deford cafeteria. No action will be taken until next fall. **Peanut Butter** Discussion of Deford's lunchroom resulted in a suggestion that peanut butter sandwiches be served at Cass City as an alternative for students not wishing to eat the main course offered for any particular day. Crouse stated he would investigate the possibility and try it if feasible. An insurance policy covering non-school vehicles on school business was purchased from Harris-Hampshire Insurance agency.

Retired Teachers Meet in Caro The Tuscola County Retired Teachers' Club met Wednesday, Dec. 2, with Mrs. Clara Korte of Caro. To be of service, members have undertaken some helpful projects. One teaches reading to children and adults at Caro State Hospital, another teaches a Bible Class for busy mothers, meeting in the homes of members. Others are to report on their projects later. The main purpose of the club is to secure better retirement checks for all retired teachers whose pay is below the minimum of \$1800 per year. Michigan has 1300 retired teachers, many of whom receive less than this amount and no social security. Members are asked to contact their senators and representatives to get their reaction to such a bill. After adjournment a Christmas tea was served by Mrs. Korte and her committee.

BOOK REVIEW This Is an Unusual Reading Experience

THE EXACT AND VERY STRANGE TRUTH by Ben Piazza is a very unusual reading experience. The Gallanti family is headed by Carlo, an Italian immigrant, who is, as were all his ancestors, a shoe repair man. He met his wife in Little Rock, and was determined to marry her—despite the disparity in ages (Carlo was 20 years older than his wife) and despite the critical difference in religious faith (Carlo was a Roman Catholic and his wife had always been a Baptist). They had to run away to be married, and early in their life together built the "Rock House" in which they raised their family; Alexander (who tells most of the story), Quentin (the baby of the family), Veronica (the youngest sister), Rosalie (whose marriage forced her parents to face the fact that they could not rule the lives of their children as their lives had been subjected to the wishes of their parents).

Tony, Rudolph and Carlo, the older boys, each of whom had worked in the shoe repair shop, seized on the circumstances of World War II to marry and locate someplace else, away from parental control. The cast of characters includes Jesse, a helper in the shoe shop, Mary, who cleaned house for the Gallantis, and her son, Jesus Elizabeth Jones. The reason for such a name is worth reading the book to learn.

Through the eyes of Alexander we are taken on the daily routine and adventures of a youngster. The father has a stroke just before Christmas one year and the children learn that, among other things, death means separation. The older brothers are brought back home for the funeral from their bases of World War II, and one of them is released from his service obligations to return and take over the shoe repair-business and to act in some measure as the head of the family, assisting his mother. But his marriage demands his loyalty and he finds happiness only in moving to a home of his own.

In this same span, Alexander is chosen from the entire Junior

High School to take part as a pilgrim in a Thanksgiving program. He hopes that this will prove to gain him friends which he needs desperately. The tragedy of his young life comes when the program is ended without his part. He is disappointed, too, when his mother breaks her word and fails to attend the program. As a symbol of what he had hoped to gain by his part in the program, he continues to wear his Pilgrim costume.

When he arrives home again, it is to learn that his mother has suffered a stroke and is in the hospital. Their married sister, Rosalie, takes charge of the smaller children, and soon they are allowed to visit their mother in the hospital. She is quite paralyzed as a result of the stroke, and is unable to regain the power of speech. Gradually the children learn what she is trying to say, although their mother does not improve.

With the coming of summer a letter from Rudolph suggests that his mother and the three youngest children spend the summer in his home in Savannah. They fly there, but the hoped-for improvement in their mother's condition fails to come, and the children are to leave home and their mother put in a nursing home.

The climax comes when, on Alexander's thirteenth birthday, they all attend a movie to celebrate. When the movie is over the children try to waken their mother only to discover that sometime during the picture she had died.

Written in a simple manner, this book does not demand much of the reader; yet, upon the completion of it, I realized that the writer had brought me into the Gallanti family—sharing their good times, and trying to help when troubles come. I recommend that you read this small 325 page book and that you watch with me for this new author's new book.

No New Medical Schools in Michigan Slated Immediately

Michigan will wait at least another year before a new medical facility is started.

John A. Hammah, president of Michigan State University, recently announced that an institution would not begin a two year medical science program next fall as originally planned. The opening date is not definitely set.

The MSU decision will meet with approval of the Michigan Coordinating Council for Higher Education. Council members, including MSU, agree that the state's existing medical schools should be raised to planned size before a third is established.

Although MSU's present plans are for an Institute of Biology and Medicine, within which the College of Human Medicine will offer two years of training, it could easily be developed into a full-fledged college of medicine.

There were three reasons for the MSU delay. First, the building program dropped substantially behind, mostly due to union-management differences beyond the control of the university.

Secondly, the administration does not at this point have the top notch instructors they want to teach the technical courses. Teaching staff is a problem for the medical profession, and it was recently stated that there are 800 openings in the nation for medical instructors.

A third problem which was not completely solved involves the relationship between the Institute

and local hospitals. The medical accrediting committee recommended that this understanding be well formulated before students were enrolled for courses.

It will be difficult for U-M to increase enrollment of its medical school without losing much of the training that is important to doctors, according to Dear William N. Hubbard Jr. Wayne University shows promise of enrolling perhaps 70 more students per year.

If, as anticipated, the need for doctors grows more rapidly than this supply, the people of Michigan have an investment in MSU's Institute of Biology and Medicine that can quickly be developed into a first class source of fully trained M.D.'s.

16 Per Cent Unsafe
A big push can be expected in the 1965 legislative session to require periodic safety checks of all Michigan motor vehicles.

Safety check bills have been introduced for several years in succession without success, but next year may be the exception. The continually mounting highway traffic death toll will certainly be one factor in this consideration but another major factor may be the latest national survey on the matter.

One vehicle in six in use today is unsafe to some degree, a study by the Auto Industry Highway Safety Committee indicates.

Of nearly three million vehicles checked on a voluntary basis in the study, more than 440,000 had "rejectable items" such as rear or front lights or signals, brakes, tires, steering or exhaust system.

Projecting this to the more than 84 million registered vehicles on the nation's highways, the study means more than 14 million unsafe cars and trucks are in use. Some Michigan officials feel the figure would be even higher since this study was a voluntary one rather than a true sample test.

Nineteen states now require periodic motor safety inspections.

The war Heustis speaks of has no relation to international affairs, however. It is a limited war on the home front against carbon monoxide poisoning.

"An intensive educational campaign with constant repetition is the only way to prevent the annual toll of utterly needless deaths from carbon monoxide poisoning," he said.

Already this year several persons have been found dead in cars parked with the windows closed, the ignition on, gas tank empty and battery dead. The scene will unfortunately be repeated several more times during the cold season.

Carbon monoxide deaths, in cars and homes, occur at all times of the year but the majority happen in the winter, Heustis said.

Because carbon monoxide has no odor, it is known as the "silent killer."

"If everyone recognized that carbon monoxide is present whenever there is combustion, whether it's canned heat, gas refrigerator, furnace or automobile engine, and that to protect against it merely requires adequate ventilation, we could eliminate most of the accidental exposures," said the commissioner.

Burial was in Novesta Cemetery.

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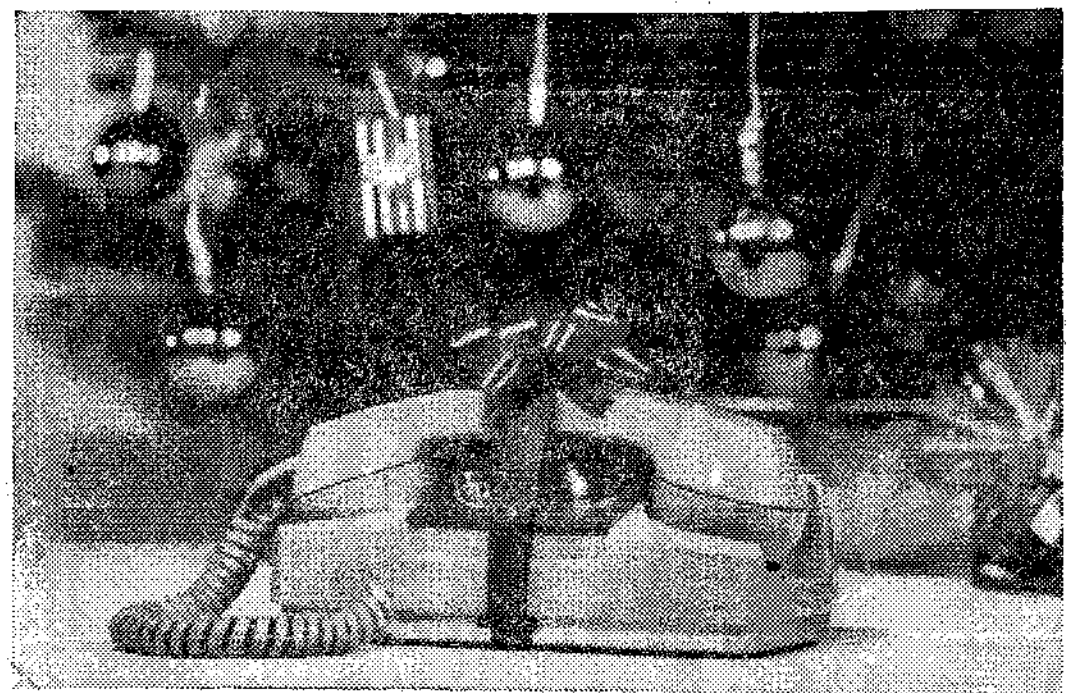
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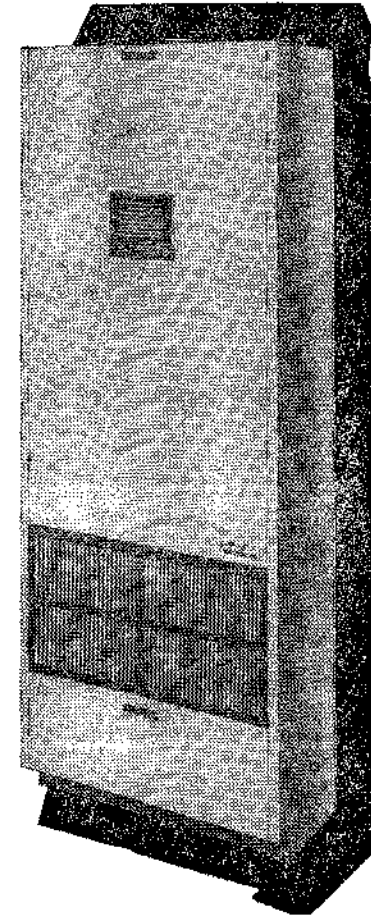
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
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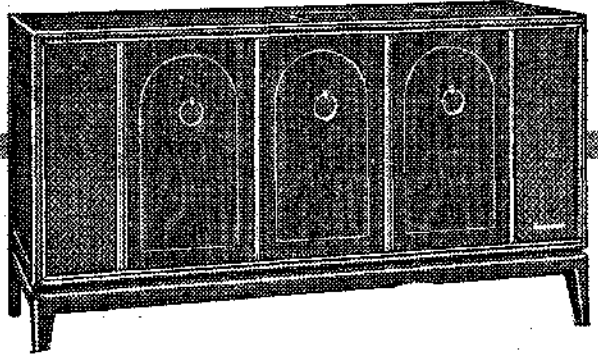
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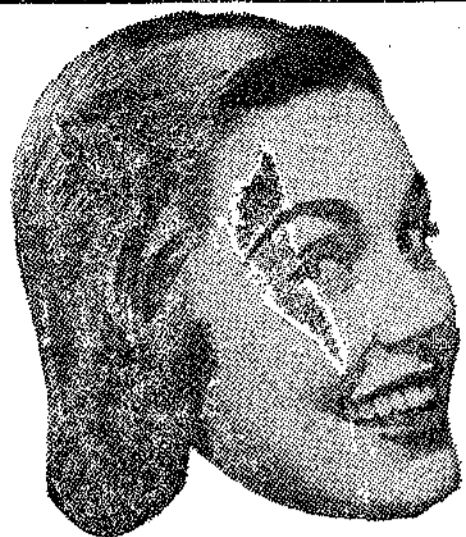
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
