Petition Deadline Nears

Changes Due In Council

It looks as if there will be a sweeping change in village officers next spring when the annual village election will be held.

As the Dec. 28 (4 p.m.) deadline for filing petitions draws closer two incumbent councilmen have indicated that they will not try to regain their seats and President Lee Rabideau has flatly declared that he will not be a candidate for president again in 1965. Also Bill Bridges, the incumbent clerk and treasurhas indicated that he is interested in running next

This leaves only Bernard Freiburger as an incumbent who will try to retain his seat in village government.

However, it is possible that several of the veterans of village public service, will still be connected with village government. Lambert Althaver, one of the

trustees whose term expires, has indicated that he will run for village president. Rabideau is debating running for

Petitions for the offices are available from the village clerk's Jim Seals. office at the Municipal Building.

According to authorities, the most logical site for a school would be within a few miles of Cass City as a central location in the tri-county area. It is probable that other areas might object to an in-village location, but we could see nothing wrong with a site in the vicinity of M-81 and

When the project receives the official sanction of the intermediate school district boards, it is the opinion of the Chronicle that local clubs could band together and option a suitable site to be given to the tri-county community college.

Paying for such a location relatively easy task for a community which has erected two fine hospitals with voluntary contributions.

It is the Chronicle's opinion that a community college would be at least as beneficial to the area as our modern nospitals. A tax of \$1.00 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation would return to the area many-fold in addition to the obvious additional opportunity for advanced education for the area's youth.

Any person connected with industrial development will tell you that educational facilities rank with other top considerations such as labor supply, location and housing when industrialists are considering plant loca-

A community college for the area is not a new idea. It has been kicked around in Cass City for two decades. Now we are about to be able to do something to help it along. Let's do it.

While calling area churches for special Christmas programs, we ran across one that undoubtedly is the earliest of the season. It's the Novesta Baptist Church which held its Christmas "party" in September. At this time instead of the usual recitations and gifts for children, members of the church bought gifts to be sent to missionaries abroad.

Recount Vote Tie Opens Door for 2nd Liquor Vote

A recount in Almer Township on liquor by the glass ended in a tie vote, 413 yes and 413 no, Archie Hicks, county clerk, an-

Although the vote recount will leave the county "dry," it opens the door for another election whenever the proponents of liquor by the glass submit the necessary petition. If the original vote had remained, the measure could not have been reopened for four years.

There were no changes in precinct one in the recount, but in precinct two the original tally was 265 yes to 235 no, while the recount showed 266 yes and 226 no.

Recounts were also held for Arbela and Juniata townships. In Arbela township, recounts for the offices of treasurer and clerk failed to alter the vote count. The recount was called by

Extra Vigilance Helps Curb Shoplifting, Survey Reveals

community will tell you that received only one complaint in Panel. shoplifting is a major problem in the last several months. today's retailing from many open displays. Merchants have found that attractive in-store displays lead to greatly increased impulse buying. The easy access to goods not only tempts the buyer but thieves as well.

Shoplifting is broken down into two categories - looting by professionals and thefts by amateurs. In Cass City a survey has revealed that the amateur is by far the bigger hazard.

The problem is complicated by the fact that some of the children (ranging from 16 down) are from prominent families and have no apparent reason to steal. A typical instance was re-

ported by Bill Ruhl at Mac and Scotty Drug Store who said that last summer a youngster was caught whose parents were valued and important customers of the store. "This child had been caught in

another store and the theft reported to the parents who refused to believe that their child could be guilty. We, therefore, warned the person involved and took no further action," he said. Bud Schneeberger, at Schnee-

berger's TV & Appliance Sales & Service, said that just recently he knew of three children in his store who took records but ran away before he could catch them. "Last summer I missed a transistor radio," he reported. Gerald Prieskorn said that he

caught a shoplifter last week at his store but a system of close scrutiny by employees and himself during off-school hours has helved to curb the problem.

Prieskorn says that another phase of the problem is training employees to watch and report thefts when they see them occur.

The picture is brighter at two other stores. Harold Asher at Thumb Appliance Center, says that "as far as we know we haven't missed a thing." Lloyd Bryant reports that he has gone a long way towards solving his problem by nutting all of the favorite shoplifting items, radios, razors and other easilycarted goods, under glass.

A check with Cass City Police Chief Carl Palmateer indicates that the problem may not be quite as severe as it has been be-

Set Target Date For School Merger

intendents and principals of Owengage-Unionville schools set a target date of late spring for the proposed vote for a merger of the two districts. According to law, the vote

must be held at least 30 days before a general election and school authorities are aiming for a date in April.

Discussing the time for a vote was one of two important subiects discussed at the meeting. The second was the curriculum that could be offered with an enlarged district. Contingent on a new high

school facility for the merged district. D. A. Crawford, Unionville superintendent, said that a total of 15 courses, not offered at either school now, could be instigated.

Presently each school has 45 different courses which vary in each school. The new curriculum would offer 60 courses for all students. Projected classes would have about 25 students each, about the same as presently taught.

The new courses, not presently available, are: third and fourth year Spanish, Latin I and II,

second year practice and business machines, second year mechanical drawing and motor mechanics.

Concluding the list of new courses are: first and second year art, girls' physical education, boys' chorus and mixed chorus, journalism, speech, sociology, refresher math and development mental reading.

Appoint Committee A committee was appointed to survey the building needs of all of the two districts. It includes superintendents from each district and two board members from each district.

Tom Laurie, a member of the Owengage board, called attention to a paragraph regarding a proposed vote of the districts in the last issue of the Chronicle.

It said that Owengage voters would be asked to take over the debt of the Unionville district. He explained that the boards have the option of asking the districts to assume each other's debts or of having each district assume responsibility for debts con-

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D. Lukasavitz Herd Leads **DHIA** Testing

The grade Holstein herd of Dan Lukasavitz of Cass City produced an average of 58 pounds butterfat and 1,514 pounds milk, topping the list of 44 herds which produced 30 pounds or over for the month.

In second place was the grade Holstein herd of Harland Lounsbury of Cass City with a 53pound butterfat average; placing third was the registered Brown Swiss herd of Lawrence Bublitz of Fairgrove with 50 pounds. Other herds which had an average production of 42 pounds or more were those owned by Ronald Hampshire. Deford: Henry Hohman, Vassar; Blaylock and Rupprecht, Vassar; Dolan Sweeney, Ubly; Clarence Merchant. Cass City; Carl Bauer, Reese; Werner List, Vassar; Wilfred Leix, Fostoria; Ronald Opperman, Vassar; Howard Loomis and Sons, Gagetown; John Graham and Sons, Caro; William Parrott, of Cass City.

In the 305-day records class, a grade Holstein cow, Q, owned by Clinton K. Blackmore of Vassar placed first with the production of 738 pounds butterfat and 18,672 pounds milk. This Is an Unusual Reading Experience

THE EXACT AND VERY STRANGE TRUTH by Ben Piazza is a very unusual reading experience. The Gallanti family is headed by Carlo, an Italian immigrant, who is, as were all his ancestors, a shoe repair man. He met his wife in Little Rock, and

was determined to marry her despite the disparity in ages (Carlo was 20 years older than his wife) and despite the critical difference in religious faith (Carlo was a Roman Catholic and his wife had always been a Baptist). They had to run away to be married, and early in their life together built the "Rock House" in which they raised their family; Alexander (who tells most of the story), Quentin (the baby of the family), Veronica (the youngest sister), Rosalie (whose marriage forced her parents to face the fact that they could not rule the lives of their

Tony, Rudolph and Carlo, the older boys, each of whom had worked in the shoe repair shop, seized on the circumstances of World War II to marry and locate someplace else, away from parental control. The cast of characters includes Jesse, a helper in the shoe shop, Mary, who cleaned house for the Gallantis, and her son, Jesus Elizabeth Jones. The reason for such a name is worth reading the book to

children as their lives had been

subjected to the wishes of their

parents).

Through the eyes of Alexander we are taken on the laily routine and adventures of a youngster. The father has a stroke just before Christmas one year and the children learn that, among other things, death means separation. The older brothers are brought back home for the funeral from their bases of World War II, and one of them is released from his service obligations to return and take over the shoe repair business and to act in some measure as the head of the family, assisting his mother. But his marriage demands his loyalty and he finds happiness only in moving to a home of his

In this same span, Alexander is chosen from the entire Junior

High School to take part as a pilgrim in a Thanksgiving program. He hopes that this will prove to gain him friends which he needs desperately. The tragedy of his young life comes when the program is ended without his part. He is disappointed, too, when his mother breaks her word and fails to attend the program. As a symbol of what he had hoped to gain by his part in the program, he continues to wear

When he arrives home again, it is to learn that his mother has suffered a stroke and is in the hospital. Their married sister, Rosalie, takes charge of the smaller children, and soon they are allowed to visit their mother in the hospital. She is quite paralyzed as a result of the stroke, and is unable to regain the power of speech. Gradually the children learn what she is trying to say, although their mother does not improve.

With the coming of summer a letter from Rudolph suggests that his mother and the three youngest children spend the summer in his home in Savannah. They fly there, but the hoped-for improvement in their mother's condition fails to come, and the children are to leave home and their mother put in a nursing home.

The climax comes when, on Alexander's thirteenth birthday, they all attend a movie to celebrate. When the movie is over the children try to waken their mother only to discover that sometime during the picture she had died.

Written in a simple manner, this book does not demand much of the reader; yet, upon the completion of it, I realized that the writer had brought me into the Gallanti family - sharing their good times, and trying to help when troubles come. I recommend that you read this small 325 page book and that you watch with me for this new author's new book.

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
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

No New Medical Schools in Michigan Slated Immediately

By Elmer E. White Michigan Press Association Planned Delay

Michigan will wait at least another year before a new medical facility is started.

John A. Hannah, president of Michigan State University, recently announced that that instiwould not begin a two year medical science program next fall as originally planned. The opening date is not definite-

The MSU decision will meet with approval of the Michigan Coordinating Council for Higher Education. Council members, including MSU, agree that the state's existing medical schools should be raised to planned size before a third is established.

Although MSU's present plans are for an Institute of Biology and Medicine, within which the College of Human Medicine will offer two years of training, it could easily be developed into a full-fledged college of medicine.

There were three reasons for the MSU delay. First, the building program dropped substantially behind, mostly due to unionmanagement differences beyond the control of the university.

Secondly, the administration does not at this point have the top notch instructors they want to teach the technical courses. Teaching staff is a problem for the medical profession, and it was recently stated that there are 800 openings in the nation for medical instructors.

A third problem which was not completely solved involves the relationship between the Institute

One vehicle in six in use today is unsafe to some degree, a study by the Auto Industry Highway Safety Committee indicates.

Of nearly three million vehicles checked on a voluntary basis in the study, more than 440,000 had "rejectable items" such as rear or front lights or signals, brakes, tires, steering or exhaust system.

Projecting this to the more than 84 million registered vehicles on the nation's highways, the study means more than 14 million unsafe cars and trucks are in use. Some Michigan officials feel the figure would be even higher since this study was a voluntary one rather than a true sample test.

The war Heustis speaks of has no relation to international affairs, however. It is a limited war on the home front against carbon monoxide poisoning.

"An intensive educational campaign with constant repetition is the only way to prevent the annual toll of utterly needless deaths from carbon monoxide poisoning," he said.

Already this year several persons have been found dead in cars parked with the windows closed, the ignition on, gas tank empty and battery dead. The scene will unfortunately be repeated several more times during the cold season.

Carbon monoxide deaths, in cars and homes, occur at all times of the year but the majority happen in the winter, Heustis said. Because carbon monoxide has

odor, it is known as the "silent killer."

"If everyone recognized that carbon monoxide is present whenever there is combustion, whether it's canned heat, gas refrigerator, furnace or automobile engine, and that to protect against it merely requires adequate ventilation, we could eliminate most of the accidental exposures," said the commissioner.

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




