Two Die In Area Crashes

Two separate accidents claimed the lives of an eight-year-old girl and a Snover man this week. A 26-year-old Snover man died early Sunday when he was thrown from a car and pinned under the rear wheel after the vehicle hit an electric power pole in the center of Snover.

Killed was Richard K. Stauffer, father of three. Donald M. Anglebrandt, 32, Deckerville, driver of the car, and Gerald A. Porter, 22, Snover, an occupant in the car, received minor injuries.

Sanilac county deputies reported that the Anglebrandt car was going west on Snover road, just past the intersection with Wheeler Road when he lost control.

The car reportedly skidded 78 feet into the power pole sideways then slid past the pole and into a shallow ditch. Stauffer was apparently thrown from the car after it hit the pole.

Funeral services for Stauffer were to be held Wednesday morning at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Argyle, with Fr. Joseph D. Ryan officiating. Interment was to be in the church cemetery.

He was born Sept. 23, 1939, in Elkton and moved to Argyle in 1953. He and the former Miss Genelda Langenburg were married June 4, 1960, at St. Joseph's church.

Surviving, besides his widow, are: three sons, Daniel, Randy and Michael, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Keith Stauffer, Snover; his grandmother, Mrs. Frances Stauffer, Elkton; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Divo, Snover, and two sisters, Mrs. Rodney Krueger, Cass City, and Miss Sandra Stauffer, Snover.

Rosary was recited Tuesday evening at the Zinger Funeral Home, Uby.

Steinhebel Accident
Margaret Steinhebel, 9, of Brown City, was fatally injured in an accident on M-53, about a half mile south of Marlette Saturday when the car driven by her mother, Mrs. Francis Steinhebel, left the road and turned over.

The girl was thrown through the rear window when Mrs. Steinhebel left the road to avoid a head-on collision.

According to a report by Trooper David Cobb of the Sandusky State Police Post, Mrs. Steinhebel pulled out of the northbound lane of traffic to pass slower moving vehicles. She apparently failed to see traffic approaching in the opposite direction.

Two of the other five children are recovering from injuries suffered in the crash.

The injured were Lynne, 8, and Dana, 5. The daughters who were uninjured were Eugeni, 14, Janice, 7, and Mary, 3.

Mrs. Steinhebel suffered severe hand injuries and was transferred to Hills and Dales General Hospital from Marlette Hospital.

Mrs. Steinhebel is an employee at Hills and Dales.

Margaret attended the fifth grade at Bea McDonald School in Marlette.

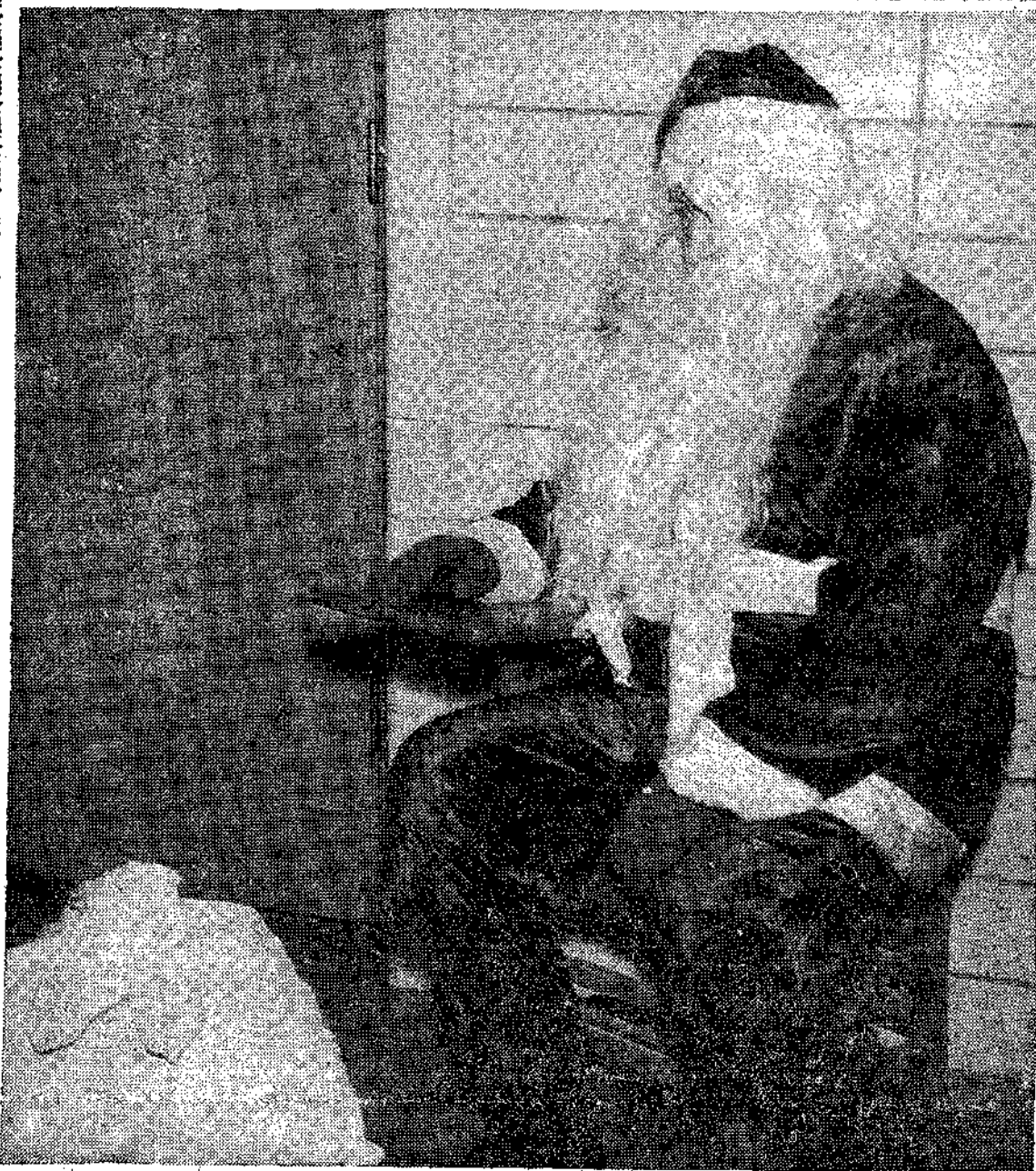
Funeral services will be held at the St. Elizabeth Catholic Church in Marlette Wednesday. Rev. Father Robert J. Duggan will officiate.

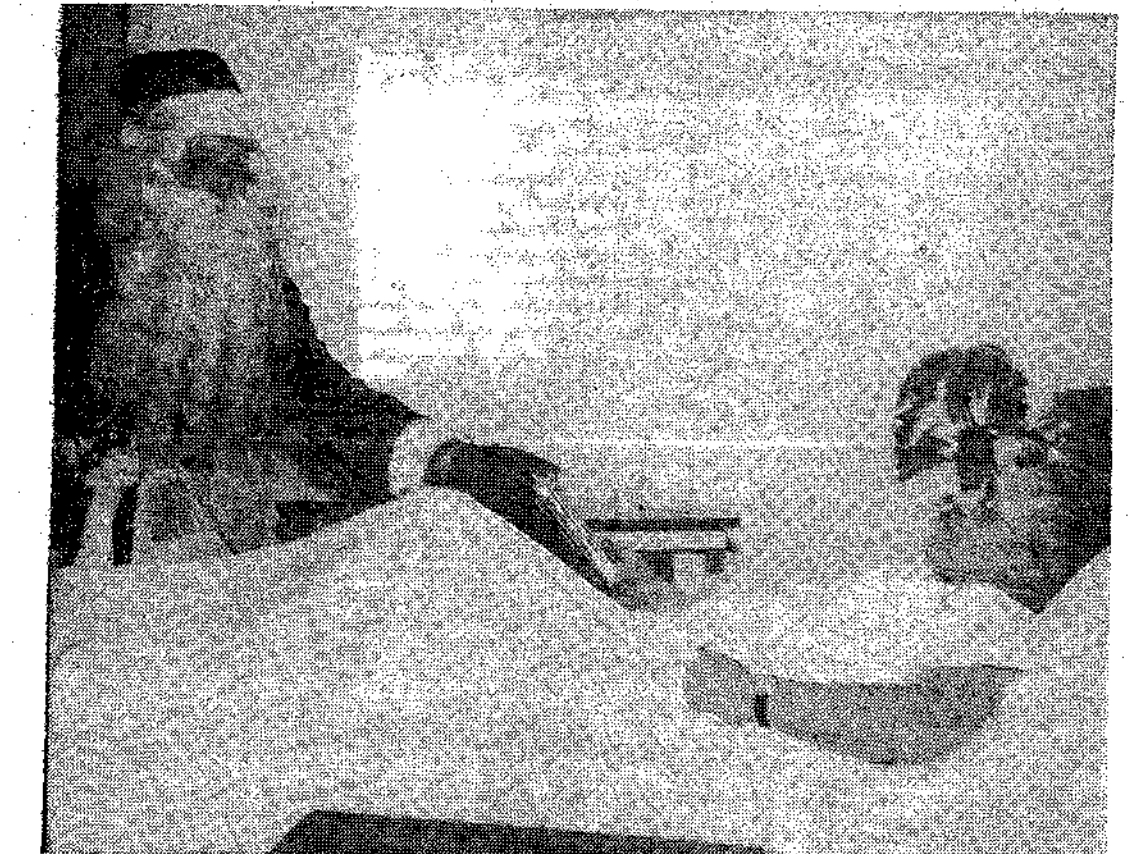
As sort of a pre-Christmas warm-up, he passed out candy to Cub Scouts at a Pack meeting Monday night in the elementary school, bottom picture, left.

You may not know it, but a machine is watching you.

The machine is a computer used by Detroit Edison. We found out about it the other day after moving to the home formerly occupied by the Jim Kings.

With our three kids and the more careless use of the lights, we are using much more electricity than the former owners did.

So much more that Herb Ludlow came over to check our meter. He explained why he was over checking. Each electric card is coded so that when it goes zipping along the billing machine and lowers or jumps the amount used a greater than normal amount the card kicks out and someone hot foots it over to check. We'd guess that it wouldn't pay to tamper with an Edison meter.

By coincidence, we learned of another use for a computer this week. We don't suppose that anyone ever stops to think how resident physicians are selected for various hospitals.

Well, it's true that the doctors apply after they have completed their internships... but they apply at several hospitals and take the bid they consider the best.

The hospitals also set up a program of the type residents they require and the type individual they want.

All of the information from the hospitals and from the doctors are programmed into a computer in Chicago and the cards of the doctors and the hospitals matched... for instance, an open residency in surgery is matched with a doctor wanting a residency in this branch of medicine.

The better the reputation of the hospital the quicker they fill their quota. At Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit it took 40 choices of the hospital to fill 27 vacancies.

There were a total of 140 applicants at the institution for the 27 vacancies... of course most doctors apply at several places so the odds aren't quite as bad as they seem at first.

Three Accidents

Request College Petitions

The steering committee for the proposed Thumb Tri-county Community College voted to ask every high school district in the three counties to petition its Intermediate District, asking for a study of the new facility.

The action was taken at a meeting of the committee at Bad Axe Monday afternoon. The members urged the petition to stress two major points:

That the study examine the vocational and academic needs of the Thumb.

That each school pay its proportionate share of the study cost.

According to the committee, it will cost between \$6,000 and \$8,000 for the study and the group recommends that each district pay its share based on the enrollment in the school in grades nine through 12.

It'll be turkey with all the trimmings, he said. We always have an extra special dinner on Thanksgiving and Christmas.

"The way some of the boys eat you'd think that they would be full for three days... but they never are."

Usually around this time of the year the prison population falls, but seldom does it hit the low mark that was reached last Christmas when the sheriff prepared the traditional holiday treat for just one prisoner.

It doesn't look like we'll be able to send any of these boys home for the holiday, Marr said, and I just hope we don't pick up any more between now and Friday.

Evergreen Sells School Bonds

The Evergreen Township Unit School sold \$39,000 worth of general obligation bonds Friday to the Pinney State Bank at an interest cost of 3.21 per cent.

The bid was one of four received before the advertised deadline.

Other bidders were the Citizens Bank of Flint (3.42) and the Cass City State Bank (3.4266).

Two more bids from Detroit firms were received after the Friday deadline. Fortunately, board members said, both bids were higher than the low bid accepted.

The bonds were sold for a 10-year period.

Authorities said that plans for the new building are expected to be submitted shortly after the first of the year and that present plans call for the two-room addition to the school to be completed in time for use when school starts next fall.

The project has been in the planning stage for several years and the school board won public acceptance of its plan by a thorough explanation of the necessity for the expansion.

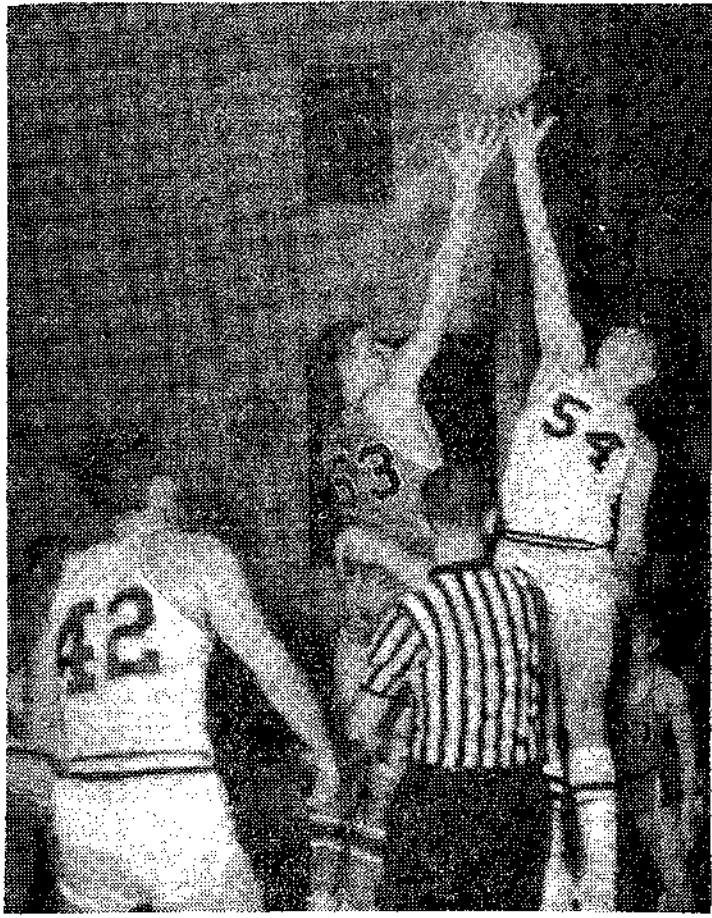

Hawks in Upset Win Over Vassar

Cass City registered its first victory in four starts with an upset over Vassar Friday at Cass City High School, 98-76.

Actually the game was much closer than the final score indicated, even though the Hawks led all the way. At the end of the first quarter it was 26-26 and at the half Cass City was in front 46-34.

The Vulcans cut the margin a point in the third quarter and staged a rally early in the fourth quarter to pull within four points.

But the Hawks beat off the challenge and won going away at the final whistle.

Three veterans paced Cass City's victory. Coach John Oswald said that Jim Champion, Jim Knoblet and Ed Retherford played an outstanding game.

For one of the first times this year, Cass City out-rebounded their opponents. They posted a 21-11 edge on the offensive boards and a 48-20 margin on the defensive boards.

By comparison, against Frankenthuth, when the Hawks lost, 90-73, the Eagles out-rebounded Cass City 17-10 offensively and 31-20 defensively.

Knoblet was the big rebounder again for Cass City and netted 21 points. Champion scored 31 points and Oswald said that he was very pleased with his work on defense. The coach also said that Retherford played his best game of the season, netting 15 points and rebounding very well.

Not All Roses
Not everything about the game was roses. Oswald pointed out that the team was guilty of way too many errors. As a team, he reported, we committed 29 errors. This kind of play will lose you many close ball games, the coach contends.

Both teams shot well from the field. Vassar hit 31 of 69 for 49 per cent, while Cass City hit 41 of 80 for 51 per cent.

From the free throw line, the marks were not nearly as im-

pressive. Vassar hit 46 per cent and Cass City 59 per cent.

The Vassar game was the last before the holidays for the Hawks. They will be idle until Jan. 5 when they entertain Bad Axe.

The Junior Varsity made it a clean sweep for the night by posting an 80-74 decision.

Democrats Plan Legislative Changes in State for '65

Change appears to be the theme for the New Year in state government.

In addition to the face-lifting being given the State Capitol building, new construction of government offices and high turnover and change of majority control in the Legislature, Democrats now say they propose another major shift.

To provide additional secretarial help and four-man office units for state lawmakers. The proposal will be a welcome change from several standpoints.

Visitors to the legislative chambers, particularly school children, expect a certain businesslike decor and decorum. Many have been heard to ask tour guides if the lawmakers really paid attention to what they were doing, or whether the desks were "always so cluttered."

In the past, committee chairmen generally were the only members who had facilities, other than their desks, to store mail or other material essential to conscientious fulfillment of their jobs.

Sometimes members attempted to use session time to answer mail by hand or dictate letters, because this was the only time they could get a secretary. This was caused by an approximate 7-to-1 ratio of members to secretarial staff for each party.

Democratic House Speaker-elect Joseph J. Kowalski of Detroit said he hopes to have provisions for legislative office space within the Capitol ready by mid-January, shortly after the 1965 session starts.

"For 16 years I have been coming up here and have had to interview constituents and conduct business at my desk on the House floor," he noted.

A legislative office building is in the planning stage for future construction, but Kowalski said he does not want to wait any longer. Presumably he also means

he wants something done while he is in control of House organization.

Once accomplished, it is assumed a return to Republican legislative control would not mean a reduction in the added clerical staff and office facilities since both parties would benefit by it.

Needed Replacement

Strong popularity of new license plates, especially after three years, is evidenced daily on roads throughout the state.

The best evidence, however, is seen in the records of the Secretary of State's office, which is responsible for distribution and sale of license plates.

In the first month of sales, license offices throughout the state had sold more than a half-million plates to set down a sharp hike in the previous record.

The two lines required for "Water-Winter Wonderland" is resented by some. It has been suggested that only one line be used for this ad plug. Or that some plates list "Water Wonderland" and others "Winter Wonderland." Perhaps the words could be alternated on plates for front and back of each car.

With 10 years in his present position, Secretary of State James M. Hare said he "never saw anything like it before." The same sales mark was not hit last year, when only tabs were sold, until five weeks later.

At the first-month sales rate, the traditional long lines in late February could be avoided barring a January sag, Hare said.

The strong sales appeared to be attributed once again, as in 1959 and 1962, to the fact that new plates were available to replace the bent, rusted and sometimes just plain worn out old ones which had been tagged in the intervening years.

Minimum Wage

Most of Michigan's new laws enacted by the 1964 Legislature took effect Aug. 28, some 90 days after the session ended.

Perhaps one of the most important laws, in terms of long-range impact, does not become effective until Jan. 1, 1965. This is the state's minimum wage law.

In making Michigan the 34th state with some kind of minimum wage standard, legislators set the 1965 rate at \$1 an hour to cover an estimated 100,000 not previously covered under Federal regulation.

In the two successive years, however, the state minimum hourly rate will be hiked to \$1.15 and \$1.25, respectively. Greatest impact will be the so-called service industries: hotels, motels, dry cleaners, laundries, gas stations and retail stores.

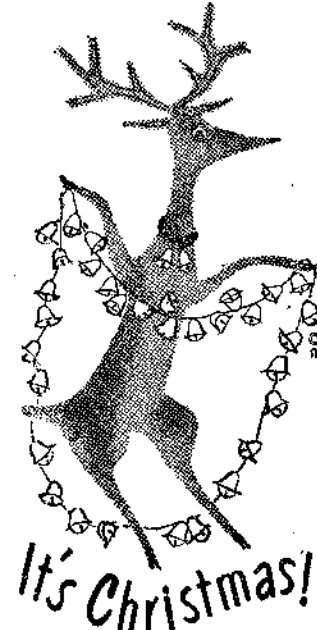
Back in 1831, when Cass City boasted of plank sidewalks, ten

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
**IT SEEMS TO ME
