From the Lditor's Corner

Perhaps most of you read last week's article telling of Mrs. Arthur Little's work as justice of the peace in Cass City.

You don't have to go far afield to find one of the reasons why the system is to be abolished under the new constitution. I was talking with Prosecutor James Epskamp the other day and he pointed out what he considered one of the worst abuses of the fee system.

We have a justice (not in Cass City), he said, that time after time will fine a person from Detroit or some other distant point \$15 or more, plus costs of \$4.20, while the same offense by a local person brings a fine of maybe 70c, plus costs of \$4.20.

Members of the village council will be anxiously watching to see what kind of system will replace the JP court. Presently the village collects up to \$1500 annually from fines issued by Mrs. Little. These funds could conceivably be lost forever under a new system.

If this money disappears, the speed traps that have been established all over the state to support small communities will go with it. This is a big point in its

Fr. Arnold Messing, St. Pan-cratius Catholic Church, Cass City, suggested to school board members Monday night that they consider working religious instruction, to be conducted off school grounds, into "the framework of a school day."

He based his suggestion on the "Released Time Law" passed by the State Legislature last May, perhaps jointly by the area The law allows public school chil-

Despite the Supreme Court's dren to be excused from class to receive religious instruction, off school property, during school

> The religious period is not to exceed two hours a week and is contingent on written request of the parents to the public school superintendent.

Messing stated he had discussed the matter with the members of the Church Council and that most agreed that the instruction would be beneficial.

He suggested Monday night that a parcel of land be purchased, churches, near the site of the proposed new high school so that students would have easy and immediate access to the building. He stated that the building

erected for the classes could be used on a week long basis, both day and night. Daytime classes and nighttime activities. Messing remarked that he

The general fund jumped a on hand as compared to \$74,569 .-21 at the start of 1964.

Total funds from all sources available to the county was \$9,076,799.29 and the total spent was \$8,150,156.02. Major investments of the county include \$96,875 for the Tuscola County Nursing Home and \$54,735.94 in the county jail sinking fund.

County spending for all purposes zoomed in the county as total general fund charges were listed at \$911,126.19 as compared to \$684,789.40 in 1963.

Expenses for most of the county's operations increased sharply. A comparative report of salaries and other expenses of county offices can be seen in the clerk's report in this issue.

Register of Deeds

Register of Deeds William Profit presented his report to the supervisors Tuesday. It showed that a total of \$18,977.85 had been collected in fees for services performed.

Again this year the office was able to show a profit. Total ex-Port Huron home and Hiser penses as listed in the clerk's report were \$15,965.68.

The two largest revenue producers from the office was for financing statements (\$6,252.50) and recording of deeds (\$5,257). The handling of real estate mortgages netted \$2,764.00.

Collection Attempt

Possibly the hottest question before the supervisors has not been officially approached by the board. This is whether or not to try to collect back some \$8,000 in salary paid to Henderson Graham. The question is whether or not the county can make the Supreme Court ruling retroactive to collect the money. And if it is worthwhile for the board to make the attempt.

Board President Horace Bulen reported that two of the three affected land owners had agreed to voluntary rezoning from farming to residential.

It was suggested at a previous meeting that Elkland township be asked to rezone all or at least the affected portion of the town-

Supervisor Ed Golding re portedly explained to Bulen that total rezoning of the township would be too expensive and that the township board was hesitant to commit three land owners to zoning that they may not desire.



Lack of experienced Senators in the majority party may mean trouble for progress of legislation this year in that chamber of the

Presumably the seven veteran Democratic Senators will be placed strategically on these committees to assist the new chairmen in maintaining smooth operation of the all-important consideration required in the chamber's working units.

The two were Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie, elected in the new 7th Congressional District, and Auditor General Billie S. Farnum, winner in the 19th

> In Mackie's seven years as Highway Commissioner, Michigan saw completion of more than 1,100 miles of freeways and modernization of another 6,000 miles of other state roads.

> This performance put Michigan in No. 1 rank in the amount of interstate freeways open, with 75 per cent of the state's planned system. The national average for completion at year's end was 40 per cent.

> Both Democrats, Mackie and Farnum were not primarily known for their party affiliation during their respective terms of office. This is to their credit as both jobs require objective treat-

Farnum was appointed to his post late in 1961 while serving as Deputy State Chairman of the Democratic Party. Prior to that time he held several appointive positions.

He was elected to a full term as Auditor General the following year and forthwith began a series of routine audits of state departments and agencies which drew criticism to him.

Agencies which were not complying to the letter of the law where state funds were concerned were publicly chastised and told to correct the errant practices.

These included major departments, colleges and universities and, most recently, the Michigan National Guard.

The criticism fired at Farnum for these public disclosures of alleged improprieties generally was based on the idea that he was trying to bring discredit to the agencies and glory to him-

Despite this criticism, it was generally agreed the Auditor General's reports were based on law and sound business practices and that he was wholly within his jurisdiction in seeking cor-

Replacements for Mackie and Farnum are recognized men of proven ability. Howard E. Hill, named acting director for the Highway Department, has been with the operation since 1958 and has a reputation as a fine administrator.

Allison Green, Tuscola County Republican, replaces Billie Farnum as Auditor General. He was Speaker of the House in the last session, and has a long record as a keen student of government.

Both of them have high standards to maintain if they are to operate at the levels of their predecessors, and there is nothing to indicate they will not.

The administration is talking about a bona fide, real job paying at least \$1.25 per hour and 10 or more hours per week. 





BOOK REVIEW



First, in this review, allow me to take note of some things I do not usually mention in reviewing a book. One is the paper used; I do not think I have ever read a book with such white paper. If you doubt that there are different shades of white, you can check with Russ Leeson or you can examine this book. This does not affect the readability of the novel; but was so obvious I felt it necessary to warn you. Secondly, the 'blurb' on the jacket frankly admits that this is the first book published by this author and, bragging a little, he is currently writing another -- for which they have a contract to publish! Thirdly, this would seem to be a new publishing company (Ivan Obolensky, Inc.). All these things are well worth noting for your fut-

ure selection of books. I found this novel to be a book that was undemanding of the reader, not too fast moving, and yet with enough suspense that I read it (214 pages) at two sittings. The suspense is not that of the murder mystery but of the very definitely myterious any-

The title is "Running Scared" and it was written by Gregory

As the tale begins, we see Tom Betancourt calmly reading as Campus Police tramp about trying to get some idea concerning the death of Tom's long-time. roommate and friend. Tom volunteers the information that his roommate had told him that he was about to take his life, so Tom, by invitation had watched as his friend had slashed his wrists! Notification of the Police was just as casual as was the book Tom had been reading all the while that these events took

place. As the author tells it, we learn that Tom Betancourt is a most unusual young man and has been roommates with Case since they were students in Prep school together. We see Tom gathering his friend's possessions to be sent to his family. Although he had not recognized it before, Tom knew practically nothing about his friend's family. Casey had gone home with Tom during most, maybe all, vacations, never offering any explanation concern-

ing the detachment from his own

By the Rev. R. J. Searls family. A measure of the affection that the pair had for each other was evidenced as Tom tried to pack all of Casey's possessions. Frequently the boys shared in buying clothing, books, records, etc., never concerning themselves with questions of ownership. In case of doubt, Tom threw the article in question into his roommate's trunk: that is. with one exception; a picture of

Ellen Case, which Tom kept. The University held an investigation into the affair but Tom left, despite the lack of any pressure to have him do so. His family welcomed him home; we learn that the Betancourts are concerned for each other although they live, not as a family does, but as a group of like-minded people. We get a good picture of this kind of family as they react to these strange and unusual circumstances - including his mother's asking their minister to stop by and have a chat with Tom.

But Tom had received a bitter letter from Ellen, whom he had never met, and is determined to meet her before she realizes who he is. Remembering that the Cases owned a summer home in one of the innumerable communities that dot \tag{the New England coast, there he anonymously secured a summer job in the club to which the Case family belonged. We watch Tom play his cards right until he and Evelyn fall in love - the romance that lacks nothing - except honesty. What happens when he admits that he is, in fact, her dead brother's roommate? Well, gather in a circle, friends, and sit in front of the cheery fire in the fireplace while I tell you - to borrow this book and read it for yourself.

There are some other parts of the story which are worth mentioning, too. Outside Tom's being a too-perfect man, I enjoyed this

Along with the publisher, I look forward to reading the author's new book!
