The new bridge will be over 10 feet wider than the present structure. The old bridge is 20 feet wide. The new will be 30 feet, 41/2 inches.

In addition, the new bridge will remove the hazardous angle that exists with the present structure. There will be a slight curve, Wellington said, but you will not notice it as you drive. To remove the angle, the road for 1,000 feet on each side of the river will be torn up and replaced.

The road commission refused because they said that even the most primitive (tubes) type of bridge would cost \$6,000 to \$10,000 to build. No Bus Service To 3 Villages With Road Closed



Research biologists of the Conservation Department are on the threshold of gaining an electronic "edge" in studying the movements and habitat needs of game. Stealing a few pages from space-age technology, these men are "bugging" whitetails with transmitter-equipped collars at the Department's Cusino wildlife research station near Shingleton in the Upper Peninsula. After the deer are released within 🎋 the station's mile-square enclosure, biologists will tune in on the animals' travels later this spring by manning directional receivers to pick up different signals from each of these tiny transmitters. After using the Cusino station's enclosure as a testing ground for the next year or so, the Department plans to expand its radio telemetry study to track deer, bear, coyotes and, possibly, bobcats on open # wild lands. Electronics will also be brought into play this fall to chart the comings and goings of elk in the northern part of Lower Michigan. In southern Michigan, similar studies are scheduled later on small game and deer.


the other lane and make a wide sweep, using the banking of the highway to slow him. Usually after the curve, however, the road opened up and he gained more

In 1964 there were nine traffic fatalities in the county in the first seven months . . . this year there have been 11.




Nothing to do but look for the park. We finally found it and the grills turned out to be one big fireplace, surrounded by a dense forest of mosquitoes.

Instead they dined on us. As the sun rose in the east, we left the sleepy little village of Chinook and with heavy hearts




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



Farther south, blueberries are produced on poor non-agricultural soils and in some undisturbed woodlots. Also, they may be found in swampy locations or on uplands --- or "or inbetween lands. Within state game areas and state forests managed by the Conservation Department, there are many good picking places and people can pluck berties on .these public lands to their hearts' content. -- Mich. Brainstorming is a process used in business to get new ideas and solve problems.

The idea behind brainstorming is to come up with any idea, no matter how ridiculous or far out it may seem.

Our thinking tends to start out in the groove and end up in a rut. Brainstorming is an effective way to shake up our thought patterns and become more creative. The first step in buying a new article, for instance, is to put the function into as short an explanation as possible. You want to buy wall-to-wall

carpeting. Your husband says you have wall-to-wall toys, why bother? The family then sits down to-

gether and you decide that the purpose of carpeting is "cover floors". Your husband, as men will, refuses to let his little joke die.

In listing everything from toys through rag rugs to acrylic wallto-wall carpeting, you discover that you want many factors besides covering. You want warmth, color, silence, easy cleaning, luxury and status.

The decision then is to decide which of these have the most value to the family and which of the floor coverings best fits those values. In solving a problem, the process is used the same way. Johnny wants to quit school. Shortest possible positive reason, "make money". All the occupations he is interested in are listed by the family. In brainstorming these will range from running a con game to becoming President. Income and training necessary

to get each position, as well as whether he will be fulfilled by it should be considered. This puts quite a different light on the subject than looking at the short-term picture of whether a paycheck will be coming in next week or not. Brainstorming, like any storm, may cause some explosions and turbulence, but storms usually clear the air.



More Laws Legislative activity in Michigan grows in leaps and bounds, although it might seem there should soon be a leveling off point when laws exist and are adequate in every area of public concern. In the past three years alone, a third or better increase has been noted in several of the many steps in the legislative process. These include bills introduced in both houses, measures sent to the governor, and new laws becoming effective.

Considerably less change was noted in the number of bills which. remained in committee or were killed. In 1963, for example, the legislature sent to the governor 254 of the 1,223 bills introduced. This year the governor got 405 of the 1,693 proposals introduced. As was expected Republican Gov. George Romney found morefault with the ideas passed by this year's Democratic-controlled legislature.

BOOK REVIEW You Are Helped to See the Race Problem By the Rev. R. J. Searls

LOOK AWAY. LOOK AWAY by Ben Haas is the best of the novels that I have read that concern themselves with our nation's internal race conflicts. There is a thinly-disguised but of journalism in sections of the book, but from beginning to end the characters are carefully delineated so that we see the backgrounds of the leaders of the integration movement in their correct sociological setting.

Throughout the book, we are helped to see the race situation as it affects two close friends. Cary Bradham is white, while Houston Whitley is Negro. As boys they played together and fished together. In World War II they are parted, each playing an important role in the armed services. Both of them found themselves growing up during the war, which (among other things) made it difficult to resume their friendship after they return home

Houston, from a family of impoverished Negro sharecroppers, found in the Armed Forces a freedom, both of thought and action, which only made it more difficult to return to his home in the South. He has completed high school, and, unable to find a job which will make use of his education, goes to college under the GI bill.

Cary, on the other hand, is the talented heir apparent to the Governorship in his state - a position for which he had been groomed from childhood. Three generations

this time of crises. Ben Haas, the author, is from North Carolina. This is his second novel. While this is not the great American novel, it is a good book to read. Though it is long, I certainly don't know just what I'd eliminate to shorten this book. I hope we hear more of Mr. Haas in the literary world.
