

IT SEEMS TO ME How Many Killed In Previous Wars?

By the Rev. R. J. Searls

As the casualty figures are given each day in the Vietnamese conflict, you might appreciate the U. S. total death toll in other wars in which we have lost lives.

Korean War World War II World War I 53,402 Spanish-American War 618,000 Mexican War 1,733 War of 1812 2.260 Revolutionary War ::::::

I shall never be able to wipe

from my mind the memory of the 'relocation camps' of World War II. You will recall that all persons of Japanese ancestry were uprooted from their homes, their friends and their businesses. In some cases the relocated persons had been citizens longer than their 'protectors,' The descendants of Germans were not so treated. Every west coast resident had friends among the Japanese-Americans. Now, in Mississippi, Negro citizens are treated in much the same way. The National Council of Churches sent investigators to the scene at the Mississippi state fairgrounds: their reports tell, among other things that: no medical treatment is given wounded or ailing prisoners; prisoners have been subjected to beatings; alternately hot and cold blowers have been systematically directed on the prisoners; periods of sleep have been systematically broken; women prisoners have experienced "lewd and suggestive" remarks. The investigators were convinced that "the primary purpose of the incarceration is not to serve as a place of incarceration but rather as a place to break the will, the spirit, the health and even the body of each individual" sent there. Is this the American way of life? Not as you and I have seen it function. Or so It Seems

The 100th year of Salvation Army Service is being celebrated

in England this summer. William Booth started the Salvation Army the same year that Cass City was founded. It is difficult to imagine why and how some of the good people of that era opposed him. This was the first war on poverty. Booth recognized that starving men and women could not understand religious appeals. Today the crowned heads of many nations pay tribute to his memory.


