### Teachers Still Bargain

## Up Salaries for School Employees

Members of the Cass City School Board of Education raised the salaries of non-teaching school personnel Monday night at their regular board meeting while the pay status of teachers remained shrouded in doubt.

No teacher in the Cass City School system has yet signed a contract while negotiations are limping forward and as a consequence contracts that normally are issued sometime in March have yet to be signed.

The teacher-school talks have been held in strict secrecy and none of the taxpayers of the school district, with the exception of the board, have been informed of how the talks are progressing.

Supt. Don Crouse this week said that Cass City is in no different situation than most school districts which are just beginning to talk salary for next year.

Cass City teachers, as members of the MEA bargaining unit, will not sign a contract until all terms of an agreement are reached.

Meanwhile, the school system is forced to hire new teachers for the estimated five instructors who have indicated that they will not return, regardless of the school-union agreement.

With this in mind, the board has set a "recruiting" salary of \$5,300 for first-year teachers. An early

elementary teacher has been hired, Crouse reported, but will receive less than this minimum because she is not a degree teacher.

#### The Raises

Affected by the raised okayed by the board Monday were the cooks, secretaries, school nurse, custodians, bus drivers and assistant track coach.

The cooks are paid on a varying wage basis. Top wage is \$1.35 per hour and this remains unchanged. Other cooks in Cass City were raised from \$1.45 to \$1.55 and \$1.25 to \$1.35 per hour.

In Deford, a cook receiving \$1.75 remained unchanged while a wage of \$1.25 was boosted to \$1.35.

The school nurse's salary was raised \$100, to \$2,350 per year. Secretaries paid by the year were jumped \$300. The head secretary went from \$5,200 to \$5,500 and the other secretary was raised from \$4,350 to \$4,650. Hourly secretaries not drawing the \$2.00 maximum were raised to cents per hour.

A \$300 increase in base pay for custodians was authorized, bringing the yearly salary to \$4,400. The head custodian's job is now worth \$6,000 per year as compared to \$5,725 last year.

Many of the custodians also drive school buses and are paid the regular driver's wage for this.

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### Still Seek Tuscola County Jail Escapee

The Tuscola County Sheriff's Department is still looking for William Carl McCullough, 22, of Ortonville who escaped early Sunday morning from the Tuscola County Jail.

Sheriff Hugh Marr said that the escape was made when the prisoner smashed the padlock on a grate to gain access to a window.

He broke the brick on the ends of the window bars and went out through the hole, Marr said.

The county is currently building a new jail from which escapes of this type will be eliminated, authorities feel.

McCullough was to have been sentenced for burglary. He is a white male, five feet, nine inches tall and weighs 160 pounds. He has black hair and blue eyes.

### Tuckey Block Buys Forbes Plant in Caro

"With the addition of the Forbes Transit Mix Company of Caro," Robert Tuckey of Cass City said last week, "Tuckey Block Co. is in a better position to offer complete concrete and ready mix service to the Thumb area."

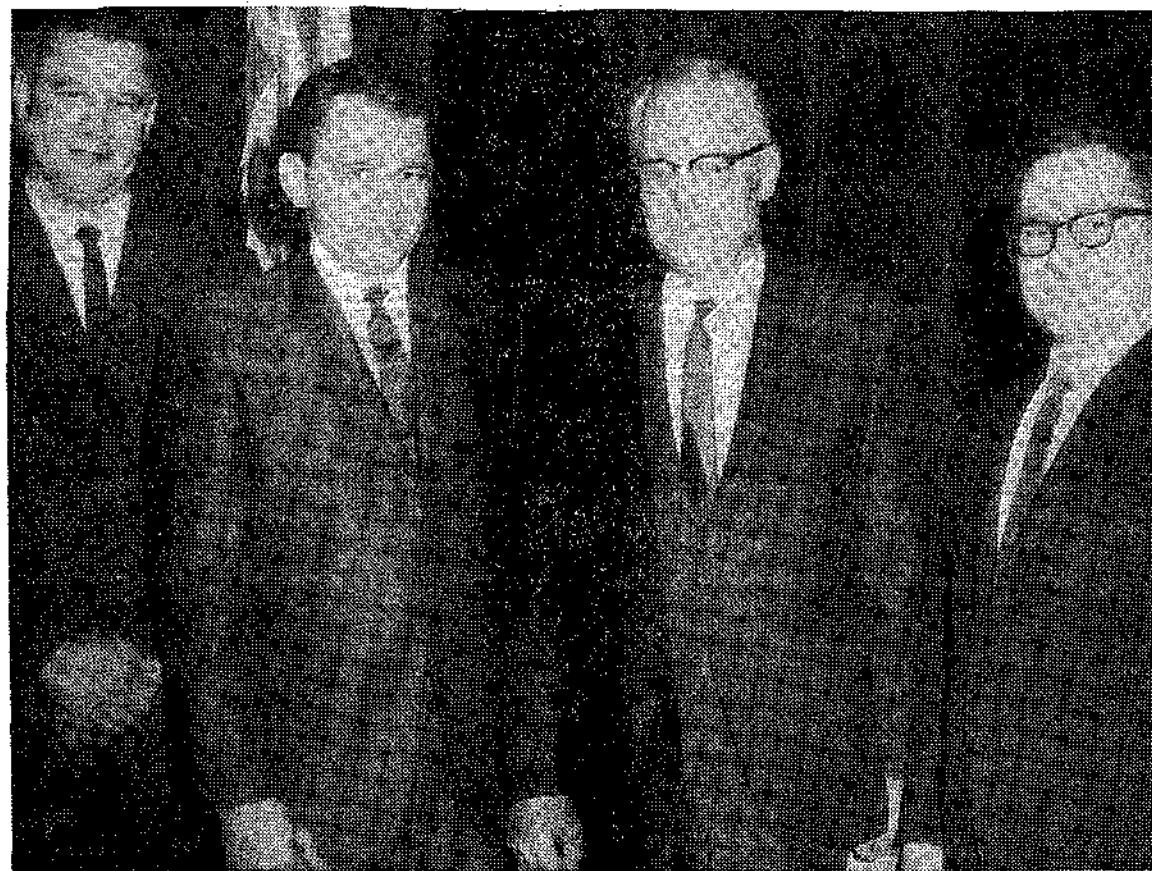
"We now can make ready mix at the plant west of Cass City and at our new location on Butler Street in Caro," Tuckey explained, "and still have the plant located south of the village for use in making blocks."

The Caro purchase was the third within a year for the Tuckey brothers, who own the business. Last year J. D. Robert and Roy Tuckey purchased the original Tuckey Block Co from their father, Luke, who has retired.

Later the brothers added the Cass City Concrete Products plant south of Cass City.

Another change brought about by the most recent acquisition will be the return of a fourth brother to the business. He is Bill Tuckey who resigned a position with a Florida insurance company to manage the Caro outlet.

Tuckey's now have 10 ready mix trucks to handle the growing construction needs of the Thumb area, Robert Tuckey concluded.

## The New Community College—A Lot for Your Money-Smith

The thing to remember, Dr. Max Smith told members of the Cass City Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night, is that you are paying for a community college whether you have one or not.

Speaking at the annual banquet at the high school Dr. Smith explained why taxpayers pay for colleges that they don't have.

Every community college is financed in three ways, he said. The student pays a third, local taxes raise a third and the state pays a third.

Because community colleges are springing up all over, your tax dollar is helping to pay a third of their costs... and you get nothing in return unless you have a college of your own, Smith declared.

The guest speaker from Michigan State University also pointed out that community colleges are cheaper for the students and keep the money the student spends in the home area.

In addition to these benefits inherent in every community college the college proposed for the tri-county area has some unique features, not present in any other school in Michigan, Smith said. You will be getting a lot for your money.

The bonus for the area is the prospect of one or more vocational schools in the Thumb for special training in skills needed in the area. This is the first area in the State to combine a study for both type units.

One of the major reasons that so many community colleges are planned or under construction today is the changing job picture for the young graduate, Smith continued.

When I finished high school, he explained, I had the choice of going to school or taking a job. Today, the high school graduate actually has no choice but to go on to school for some kind of advanced

training, either for an advanced degree or for a vocational skill.

#### Reviews Achievements

Prior to Smith's address James Ware, retiring president, reviewed the accomplishments of the Chamber through its civic and business projects.

He ended his year in office with a plea that everyone support "your Chamber of Commerce as the one organization capable of making the town one you and your children can be proud of."

He then turned the meeting over to Clinton House, president-elect, who promised a year full of activity as the Chamber works for a better community in much the same way that it did under the direction of Jim (Ware).

### From the Editor's Corner

Contrary to how it sometimes may appear, I like to write nice things about people and so it's with pleasure I talk a few moments about Jim Ware.

Ware handed over the reins of the Chamber of Commerce to Clinton House Tuesday night at the annual meeting of the organization and ended his year in office.

Not only did he devote more time than most to the demanding task of running the Chamber, but he did it without a glimmer of personal gain.

Alleys, meters and off-street parking are the financial lifeblood of all of us on Main Street. With Ware, it's not a matter of great concern whether or not shoppers continue to come here or go to Caro, Saginaw, Bad Axe or Tumbuktu. Walbro Corporation doesn't sell locally and it doesn't affect his job.

Because of this, kudos are even more in order for Jim. He's spent uncounted hours to bring to the merchants and the shoppers a plan to solve Cass City's parking.

Whether or not this plan is accepted is beside the point. What is pertinent is that he took the time to investigate and work out a plan of action. For 10 years parking has been a discussion topic. Thanks to Ware and the committee which helped him, the talk can now center around a plan for action based on opinion supported by facts.

Ware's work on parking was typical of the dedication he brought to all Chamber problems during the year, including the Cass City Centennial.

House has big shoes to fill.

A couple of weeks ago we completed an appointment as a member of the citizens' advisory committee for the proposed community college for the Thumb.

If you were not a member of the steering committee (teachers) or a member of the community college coordinating staff at MSU, you were essentially a rubber stamp for policies they proposed.

That's all right with me, I am willing to leave the details to the professionals, but I do object to wasting a lot of time discussing what should be done in every instance when the road to be traveled has been laid out.

Funeral services were to be held Thursday for Otto S. Goertsen, 79, who was instantly killed when he was struck by an auto on M-53 Monday as he attempted to cross the road in front of his home.

Mr. Goertsen was attempting to reach his mailbox when he evidently became confused by cars coming from both directions.

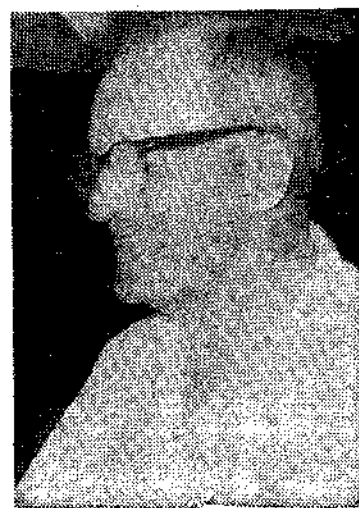
He avoided the car travelling south but was unable to avoid the car travelling north that was driven by Arthur Vernon Belloli, 24, of Detroit.

Mr. Goertsen was honored at a farewell party at Walbro Corporation in August, 1965, when he retired after 10 years with the company. An experimental tool designer, some of his first designs are still in use at the plant.

He was an active member of the First Baptist Church in Cass City.

The accident was investigated by Sanilac Deputy Sheriff Don Trowhill, aided by Huron county deputies.

Mr. Goertsen was born in Omaha, Neb., Feb. 5, 1887, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel

The new chairman and his wife, Frances, have two children, Ed Jr., of Cass City, and Mrs. Betty Russell of Gagetown.

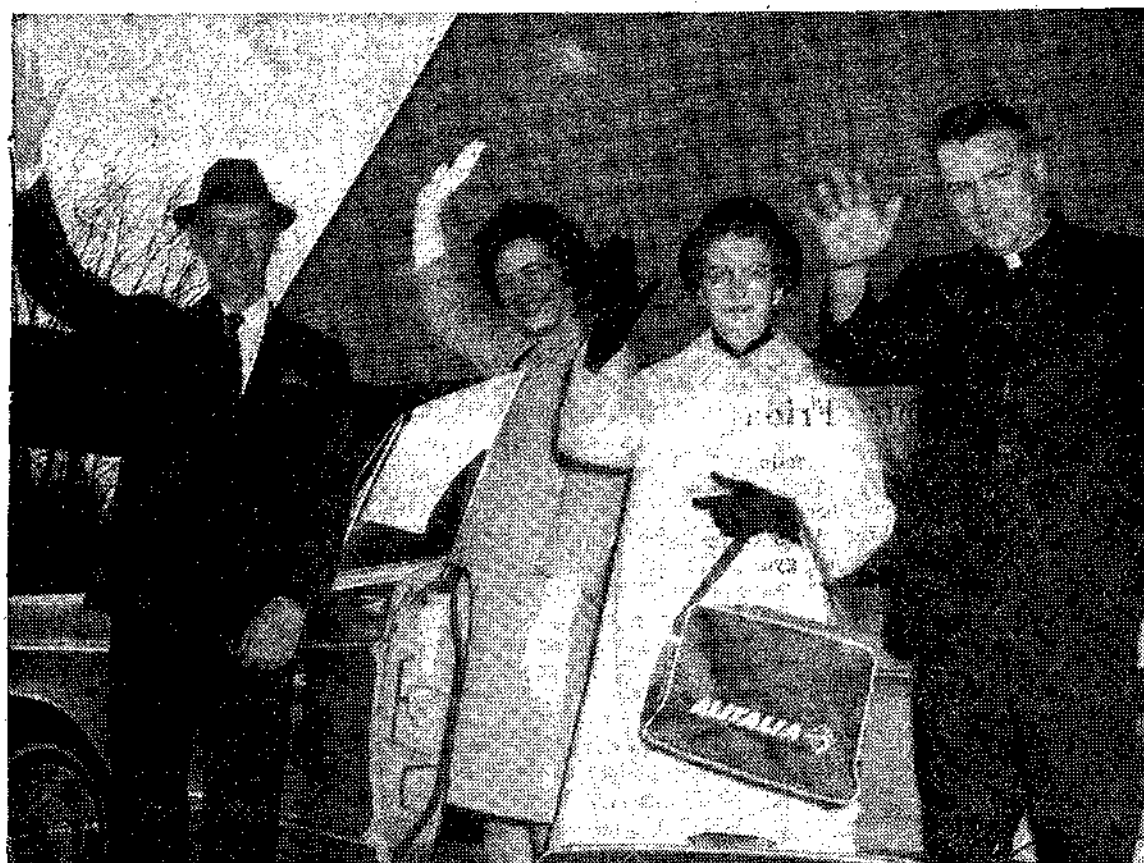
## Vandals Destroy Four Mailboxes

## Fr. Messing Hopes to Establish Rapport Between Parishes

It would be hard for anyone to think of a better anniversary present for a priest than a visit with the Pope. That's why Father Arnold Messing, pastor at St. Pancratius Church, was obviously excited about his trip to Rome moments before he was scheduled to take off for Detroit Sunday and a jet plane ride to Europe.

For this is Father Messing's 10th anniversary into the priesthood, and the tour he and his family

will accompany is scheduled to have an audience with the Pope April 20.

of 140 on the tour, costs are surprisingly low, Father Messing reported. Our round-trip fare is only \$280.

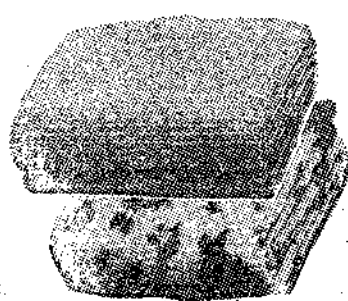

## BOOK REVIEW

### It Was A Very Brutal Honeymoon

By the Rev. R. J. Searls

**The Scarlet Thread**  
This is the first of the novels published by Doris Betts that I have chanced to read. In it, she apparently has tried to look deep into the lives of one family, and the setting in which they lived. Insofar as she succeeds in this, it makes for good reading. While she has undoubtedly a moral to her tale, she is not insistent on her reader's facing it head-on or repeatedly. She throws in some Bible verses just, one feels, to dress-up the book which also contains a few sexual episodes. The episodes fit into the story, and are not over-drawn, nor are they allowed to dominate the story. In Thomas we see his interest in things sexual begin to form; and later on we peek in on a most brutal honeymoon which brutality stems from childhood experiences.

Set in North Carolina, the story is of the family of Sam and Mildred Allen who live in Greenway. Esther Allen and her two brothers, Thomas and David, are still children in 1897. It was in that year that plans are launched to bring a cotton mill into Greenway. The citizens of Greenway look to the mill as salvation following reconstruction that every southerner hated so much.

But the mill brings tragedy and problems to Greenway, too. Actually a whole new community springs up near to the mill. Here Sam Allen runs the general store, systematically stealing goods and money from the store's owner until one day he takes over the store as owner.

The daughter, Esther, who is described as gifted, rebellious, and beautiful finds that the mill (and especially its manager, Max Carson) offers escape to the outside world. Sam sends Thomas, the older son, away to school, from which he is sent back home again to become a clerk in the family store. David, the baby in the family, just whittles away creating things until he finds himself in the job of making tombstones. The reader first is led to decry David's way of life; but imperceptively finds himself admiring this sensitive man as possibly the one family member who allows himself to live naturally.

This book is essentially a collection of episodes; "The Klan rides; there are murder and sadism; birth is revealed in stark ugliness and death in triumph," the book's dust jacket tells us.

Esther leaves home with Max Carson, and the closing chapter of the book, while never saying it is her, tells of a mystery woman who stops over a few hours in Greenway, visiting the places where the

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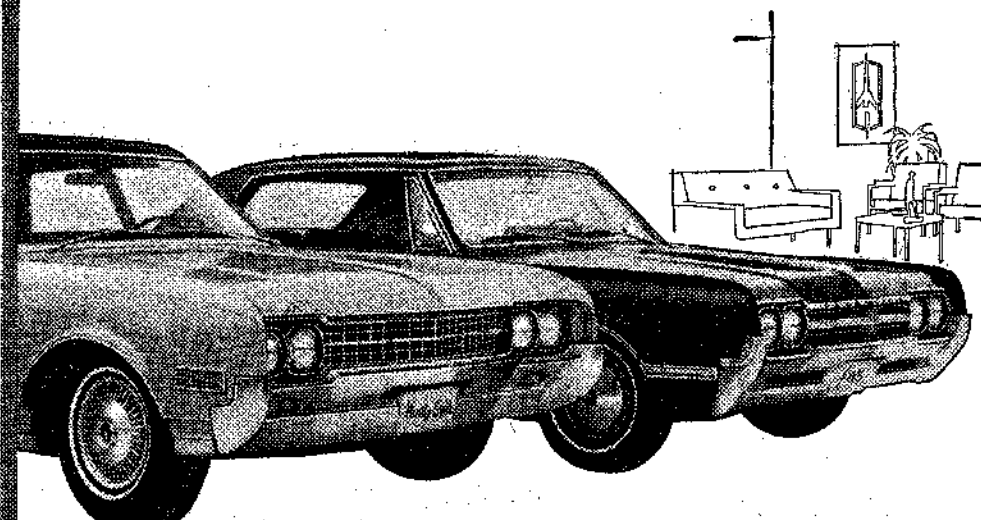

# Any Way You Measure It, Tourist Industry Booms

**Billion In Business**  
Ever since 1961, when the figure stood at \$650 million for the fourth consecutive year, the barometer measuring tourist activity in Michigan has been steadily climbing toward the billion mark.  
Boosts to \$680, \$727 and \$850 million preceded the 1965 giant step to \$960 million in recreational travel spending in Michigan.  
Officials emphasize these figures are conservative estimates. Extensive surveys in 1964 and 1965 have placed these spending rates in a category called "primary tourist spending."

Only overnight travelers and their expenditures for food, lodging, entertainment and transportation are included.

Best guesses of the other fringe areas of spending indicate the business activity involving recreation travel would be well over \$1 billion. Indications that the year round travel attractions of Michigan are gaining in popularity were good in 1965. Winter spending was up 4 per cent; summer travel activity increased by about 9 per cent.

Measurement of these activities takes in the several important sources of information throughout the state. These include traffic on the Mackinac, Blue Water and Ambassador Bridges and the Detroit-Windsor Tunnel.

Inquiries to local Chambers of Commerce and the state and regional tourist bureaus also are a part of the tabulation. Attendance at state parks provides still another portion of the measuring stick of tourist volume.

Still another gauge is found in numbers visiting special points of interest such as Greenfield Village and the Soo Locks.

Reports from almost every indicator in the state showed a good year in 1965 and aside from a somewhat disappointing ski season early this year, experts expect the \$1 billion mark to be easily passed this year.

**Publicize Delinquents**  
Threat of public identification of juvenile law breakers is the latest state effort to combat rising crime rates among youngsters.

Many have overriding doubts that threat of publicity of vandals,

thieves and other offenses would have any lasting impact on juveniles. Indeed, there have been instances where publicity was seen by juveniles as a form of recognition rather than a criticism of them.

On the other side is Rep. Bobby D. Crim, Davison Democrat, who sponsored the legislation now under consideration. He contends that if both the juveniles and their parents were publicly called to task for delinquency, it might provide a two pronged deterrent: from the family and from peers of the offenders.

"As it is now, says Crim, 'every time some hood is arrested and convicted, it is never said who it is and the whole juvenile class gets blamed.'"

Theory of the family pressure idea is that parents might be more concerned about their children's activities if they thought anti-social behavior would openly be reflected on the home.

As the law stands now, probate courts dealing with juvenile law breakers are forbidden from releasing to newspapers the names of youngsters involved.

Crim's bill, now under Senate consideration after passage in the House, would give the probate judge discretionary power to release or suppress these names.

**Eliminated Overlapping**  
Elimination of overlapping services was one aim of state government realignment completed this year.

Even before the reorganization was completed, there arose a question of duplication which caused some hubbub but over which the state had no control.

An example is the Michigan State University Highway Traffic Safety Center and a traffic research program at the University of Michigan. There is already assurance there will be no duplication.

MSU's Center has been in operation for several years. It depends almost entirely on legislative appropriations for funds and has concentrated on short-term applied research dealing with immediate problems.

The University of Michigan proj-

Abbott also announced that one other transfer is being made which will affect the Caro office. Robert A. Howland, assistant county supervisor, has been training here and is moving to West Branch this week.

## Restored Pasture

### Can Pay Cost in Year

Even one ton of low quality forage to four tons of alfalfa-vinegrass in a single year is possible by re-establishing worn out native pasture land in Michigan.

Research work at Michigan State University has proven that many unproductive pastures can be made highly productive at a cost of from \$40 to \$50 an acre.

Alfred Ballweg, county extension agricultural agent, says increased production during the first year will often pay the renovating cost and three to six more years of good improved forage for green chopping, silage, haylage or hay remains.

The new renovating system can start after the heavy production of June grass or quackgrass is pastured prior to mid-June.

The process includes:  
(1) Using herbicides and/or tillage to control competition from existing vegetation, primarily quackgrass, and for soil preparation.  
(2) Band seeding in summer for better stands.  
(3) Omitting oats in seeding establishment.  
(4) Using proper forage mixture.

Details for successful re-establishment of pastures and hay fields in the limited time are available in MSU Extension Service Bulletin 627 available from the County Extension Office in the Courthouse, Caro.

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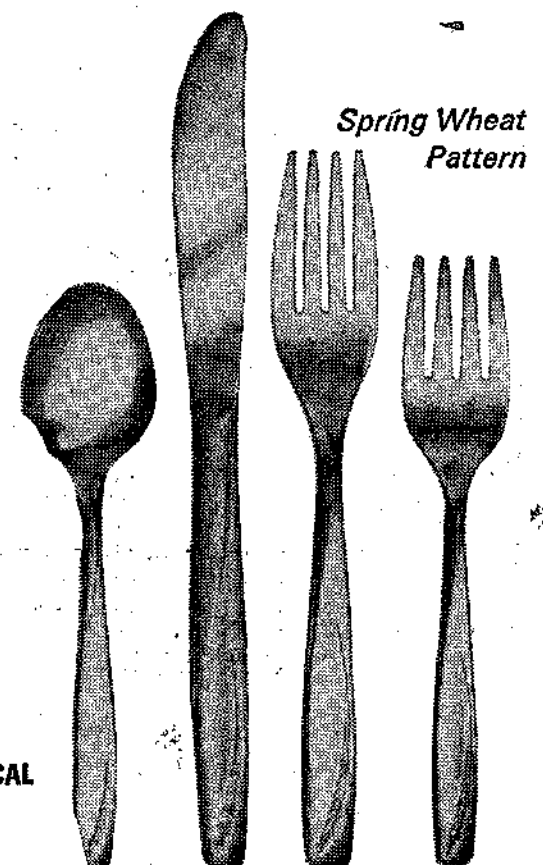

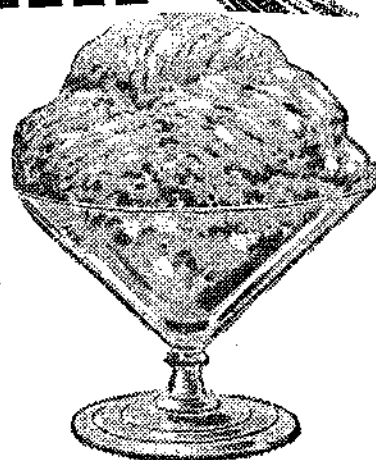

## Thumb Primary Tornado Area

Michigan is part of the nation's prime tornado area, and Thumb area families should take certain precautions, Mrs. Ann Ross, Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac County Extension Home Economist, says.

Under the revised warning system, a tornado warning will be given when a tornado has been sighted within a 200-mile radius of your home. The agent says that the possibilities of a tornado will vary with the seasons with the peak months being April, May and June. However, Michigan "twisters" can occur in any month, March through September.

A tornado may accompany or follow familiar spring and summer thundershowers, and are sometimes accompanied by greenish-black clouds. However, there are really no foolproof signs, Mrs. Ross says. Most tornadoes develop after the warmest part of the day, and have traditionally occurred most frequently between the hours of 4 and 6 p. m.

Families can best protect themselves by following a few simple guidelines, the home economist advises. Windows should be opened on the north and east sides of the house to help equalize the sudden drop in pressure which accompanies a tornado.

The family should gather in the southwest corner of the basement or protected area. Blankets, coats and a battery operated radio will improve comfort and provide information about local conditions. The family may find it wise to keep important papers in a portable box, so they may be moved to the place of shelter and will be readily available in an emergency.

A leaflet entitled "Preparation for a Tornado" is available without charge by writing Mrs. Ross either at the Courthouse, Bad Axe; Courthouse, Caro; or at the Federal Building, Sandusky.

### Land Retirement Deadline Nears

Frank Light, Chairman of the Michigan ASC State Committee, announces that May 30, 1966 is the final date agreements may be entered into with those producers who wish to retire land from agricultural production under a long term agreement not less than 5 years or more than 10 years. Presently, there is no final date set prior to May 30 for accepting requests in this program. Eligible producers or land owners may still file a request to participate with their local county ASC committees.

There are 5,000 requests on file in the State of Michigan at the present time; 575 agreements have been finalized. Those remaining requests on file must be completed by the final date or they will be cancelled. If requests for long term land retirement program are not acceptable, those producers will be offered an opportunity to participate in the annual feed grain and wheat programs.

In addition to retiring land from agricultural production, the 1966 Cropland Adjustment Program is also designed to provide more privately owned lands to public recreational use. Towns, cities, and other local units of government are eligible for a grant from the 1966 program to purchase agricultural land and convert it permanently to public use. Grants to units of government would be the same amount as an individual land owner would be eligible for up to 50 percent of the cost of the land.

The Federal Government will also help in sharing the cost of needed conservation measures on any Cropland Adjustment acres including both private individuals and land purchased by a local unit of government.

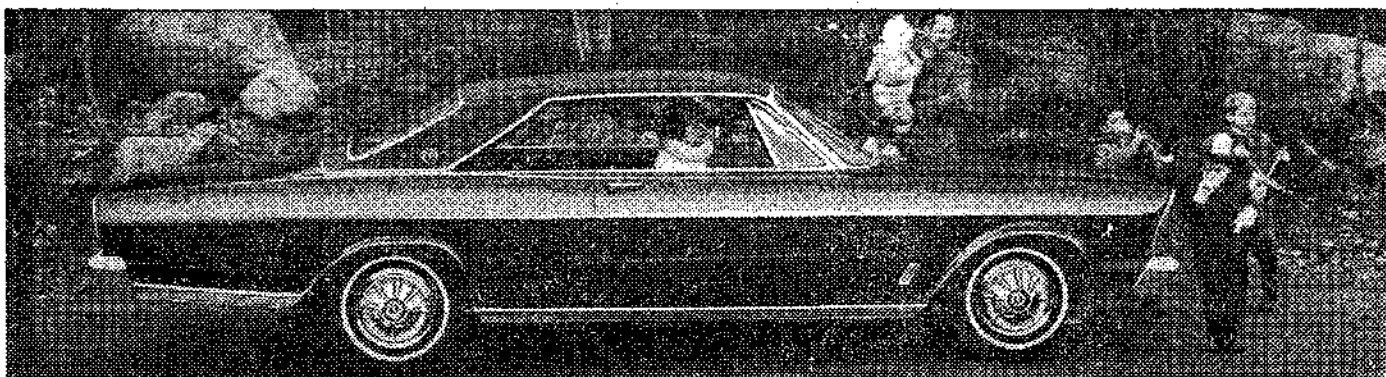

**Bean Growers to Meet in Akron**

A meeting sponsored jointly by the Tuscola County Bean Growers Association and the Michigan Bean Marketing Cooperative was announced by Paul Findlay, president of the County Growers Association, and Paul Nagy, vice-president of the Marketing Cooperative. The meeting will be held Tuesday, April 19, in the Akron school gymnasium at 8 p. m.

Both Findlay and Nagy said they felt it was important for all Tuscola county bean growers to become better acquainted with the programs, policies and objectives of the two organizations as well as give consideration to problems facing the Michigan bean industry.

The program for the meeting will consist of a discussion of the current bean marketing situation and the outlook for navy beans in the coming years. ## Tower Landmark Quickly Fades From Skyline

An experienced crew, subcontractors for Zebrowski and Associates of Farmington, made short work of the old water tower in Cass City. Starting last week end, the three-man crew demolished the tower in four working days.

The problem connected with the job was to dismantle the tower without disturbing the utility wires that are located just north of the site.

The workers made it look easy with the help of a cutting torch. First, they went to the top and started cutting away the fasteners for the giant tank.

They then cut the tank in two and let it drop in sections straight down into the space between the supports. The original plan was to drop the tank in one piece, but it proved to be too heavy, according to the workers.

After the tank was on the ground Monday afternoon the rest was easy. Men with torches started to cut part way through the girders at its joints.

With a tow truck and winch they then applied pressure to each section, breaking it off and at the same time guaranteeing that each piece would fall away from the adjacent wires. The total job was let by the village for \$4,400 and the money was divided between the working company and Zebrowski, who bid the job.

By Tuesday afternoon the tank was gone and another familiar landmark faded from the Cass City scene.

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## Dems Determined to Fill Twp. Ballot

The search is on for candidates for the township primary election August 2, according to Tuscola County Democratic Chairman Melvin J. Stewart.

Stewart said that in 1966, for the first time in Michigan history, all ballots in the State election will automatically include designations for Democratic and Republican candidates.

According to Stewart only about one-third of Michigan's Townships have previously had Democratic candidates on the ballot. This year all of the State's approximately 1,200 townships, including Tuscola county's 23 townships, will have spaces for Democratic township candidates on the ballot.

"We don't intend to leave these spaces empty," Stewart said. "We're starting right now to find the best people in each township to run for office."

Stewart said he and other County Committee Members would like to hear from people who would like to participate in local government by running as candidates.

"In the past," Stewart said, "many rural Michigan townships have had candidates running on People's, Taxpayers and other locally-named party tickets."

"This new State law, which automatically places the Democratic and Republican party on the township ballots, will strengthen the two party system and, I hope, result in more responsible grass roots government," Stewart said.

"Township candidates will be on the ballot with those for governor, the state legislature, Congress, and U. S. Senate," he explained.

Voters will be able to cast a

straight party ticket for all Democratic or Republican candidates from the township level to the U. S. Senate.

Townships have at least nine elected officials: a supervisor, clerk, treasurer, two to four trustees, two justices of the peace, and two members of the board of review.

"The old township caucus which nominated candidates, has also been abolished by state law," Stewart said.

Under the new law all candidates must file nominating petitions no later than June 14. These petitions are, or soon will be, available from the County Clerk.

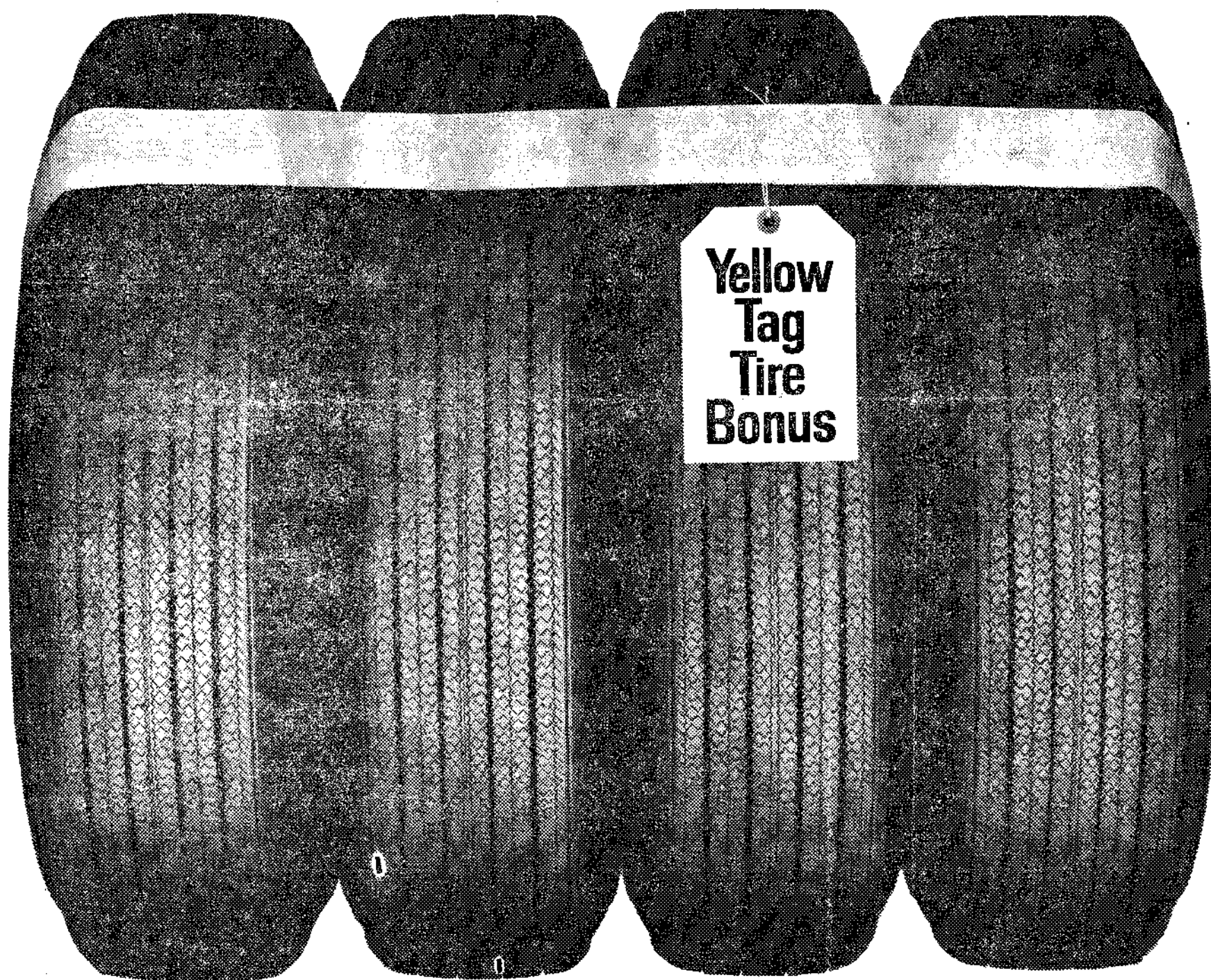
