## State Dashes Hopes For Main Street

Residents on Main Street have almost no chance of receiving road improvements in the foreseeable future, according to information received from Ed Upson of the Michigan State Highway Department at a meeting held recently.

According to Lambert Althaver, Upson said that there is nothing in the budget for M-81 in Cass City in the next five-year program and the prospects are not bright for any work in the following five-year program.

There is a chance for drainage work of the area on a share-the-cost basis. Drainage built to State specifications would cost an estimated \$45,000 and would drain that area of Main from West street to the west village limits.

The State says that they will pay only for the amount of drainage that comes from the road and the village will have to pay for any other water disposal. On this basis, State spokesmen said, Cass City would be responsible for 60 per cent of the cost.

Judging by informal conversation, it is likely that the village would attempt to place the drain-

age program in the budget, if no other work can be arranged.

However, the council is sending a resolution to the State Highway Department at Lansing requesting a more extensive program even though the outlook is anything but bright.

Althaver told the council Tuesday that he asked the highway department representatives if curb and gutter could be installed at the property owner and village's expense, leaving the shoulder gravel.

He was told that because of legal complications that this procedure would probably not be allowed.

There was no mention of any kind of a project for East Main street.

## Other Business

Three bids were received for the sale of a used truck owned by the village. It was sold to a Caseville man for \$175.

A new man will be added to the disposal plant to assist Nelson Willy. The village will advertise the open position.

Dean Toner presently is filling in at the disposal plant on a part-time basis. Willy would like him to become a full-time employee at the disposal plant. However, Village Engineer William Schram would like him to remain with the street department where he feels his experience is needed.

## 3 Alleys Qualify For Work

Three of the four blocks of alleys adjacent to Main street scheduled for hardsurfacing this year will be completed late in August, according to present plans of the village council.

Mrs. Gladys Albee reported for the committee in charge Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the council, and said that not enough of the business property owners adjacent to the alley in the fourth block, south of Main between Leach and West streets, have agreed to terms to complete the work.

The council has passed a resolution saying that business property owners of 80 per cent of the lineal footage adjacent to the alley must agree to hardsurfacing their property before the village will pay for blacktopping the alley.

Meanwhile, Village President Lambert Althaver said that all preliminary work prior to the arrival of the surfacing crew has been completed. Proper drainage and water service to the various buildings is now assured.

Because preliminary work has not been completed there are no plans for adding one of the other business alleys to the hardsurfacing program this year, Althaver explained.

In connection with the alley improvement, it was revealed that a lease had been signed with Keith Pobanz and Mrs. Gladys Fort for enough land adjacent to the alley in back of Fort's Store so that off-alley parking for a single row of cars can be accommodated.

## Tyre Fire

In another area fire, the Ubyly Fire Department was called Saturday morning to the farm of Marvin Soule of Tyre.

A barn and toolshed were destroyed with a loss estimated at \$10,000.

## To Change Water Charge Regulations

The Cass City Village Council has authorized a change in recommendations by the planning commission that will result in a bargaining system for the installation of water lines in the village.

Sparking the change was a request from Almer Krueger for the cost of running a water line with hydrant to a new building that will be leased to United Parcel Service.

Under the new charges, recommended by planning, the charge could be just \$200 as a tap-in fee in a subdivision.

Total cost of the line to the building that will face Doerr Road and is located south of Anrod Screen Cylinder Co. in the industrial park has been estimated at \$2,800.

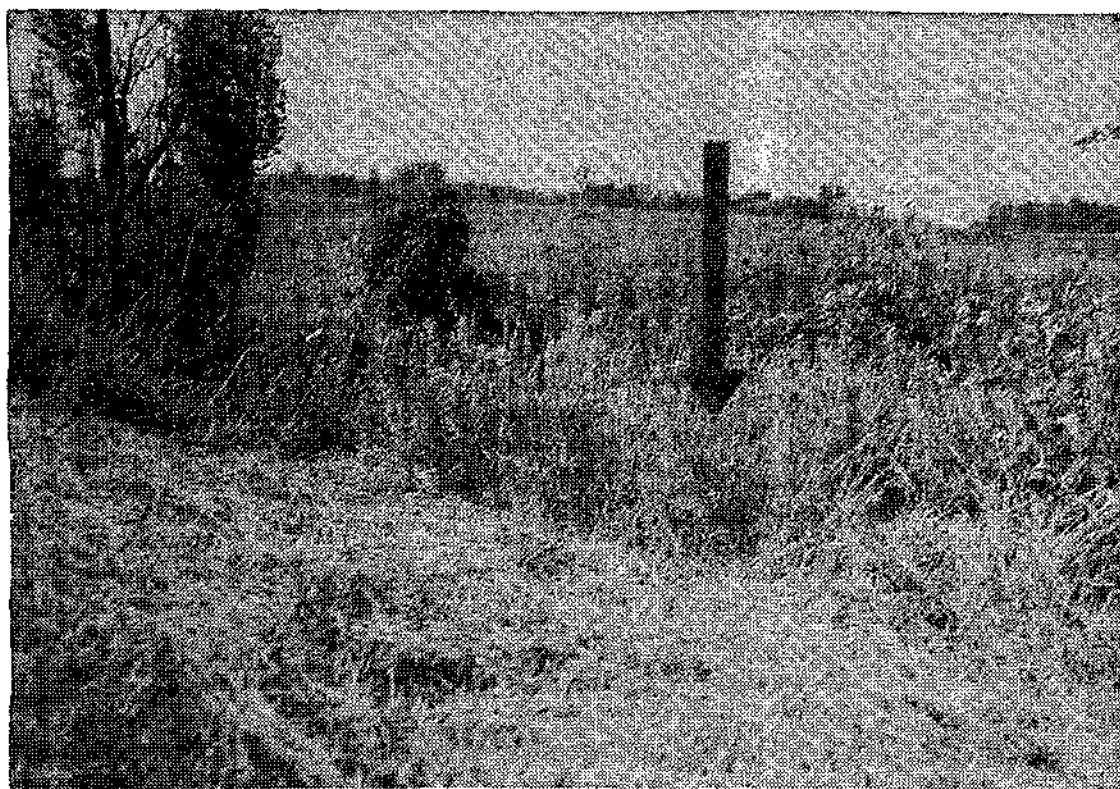
Krueger has agreed to pay half of the cost, not to exceed \$2,800, for the water service and a hydrant.

Trustee Dr. D. E. Rawson questioned whether or not a charge other than the \$200 tap-in fee could be made under the provision as presented by the planning commission.

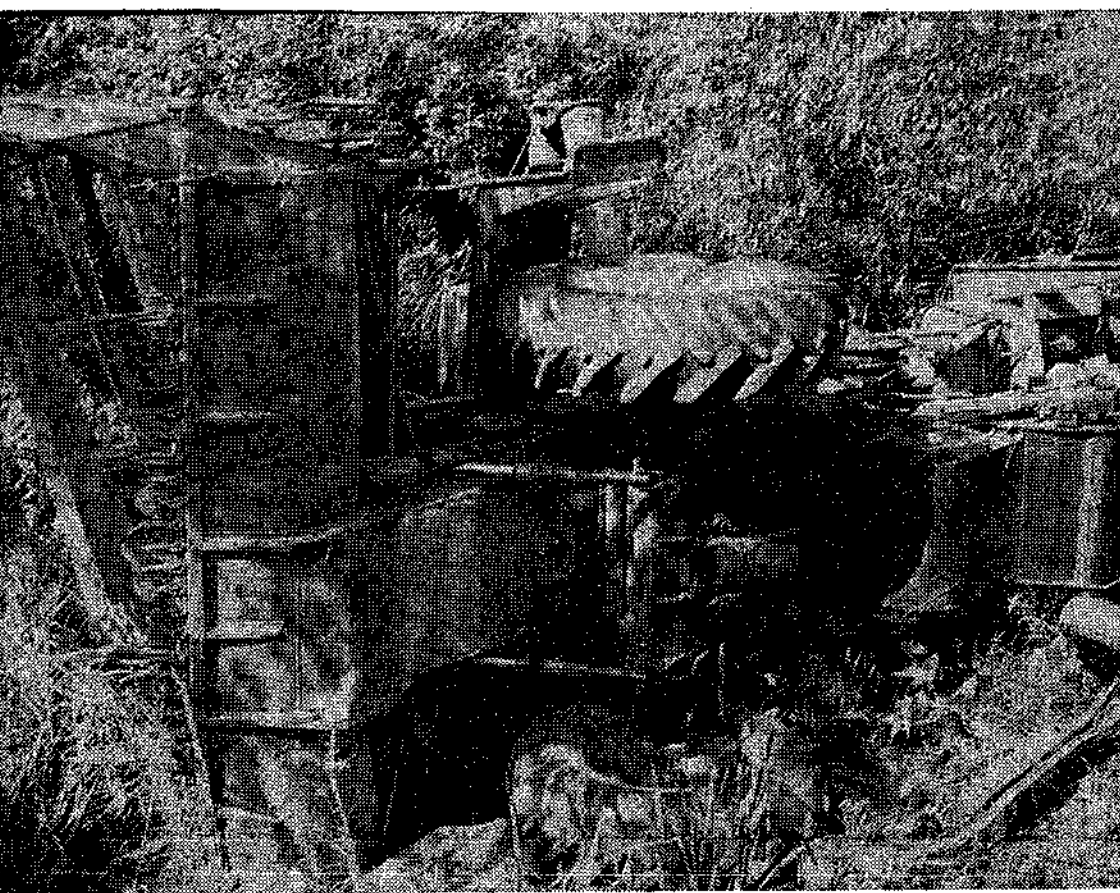
After considerable discussion, the council decided to amend the portion of the proposals on tap-in fees to include "except in rare and unusual cases".

In effect, the wording leaves any new water line installation open for interpretation by the council. Another case that is almost sure to draw attention will be the water line that will be needed by the Lutheran Church at their new building site on the east edge of the community on land just annexed to the village.

The remainder of the provisions of the increased rate structure remain unchanged and adoption is expected as soon as ordinances can be written to cover the provisions.

## From the Editor's Corner

I stopped at the Michigan Livestock Exchange yard in Cass City last week on a business call and while there stayed around a few minutes to watch cattle auctioned.

At the time, Boyd Tait was the auctioneer and the packer buyers were seated in chairs around the ring.

Just for fun I tried to spot one of the buyers make a bid or to follow the calls of the auctioneer.

It was impossible. Although there must have been 30 or 40 head of cattle sold while I watched, I never saw a bid or understood what price the cow brought until the auction was over.

I talked with Chris Labor, the manager of the yard, later and he explained that buyers usually buy by just wagging their finger a trifle.

They have no trouble understanding the auctioneer, he said, and the auctioneer (Tait and Lorn Hillaker) very seldom miss a bid of the buyers.

And thousands of dollars are spent during the sale in a seemingly casual air. We timed the sale of the cattle in the ring and while we were watching an average of three head a minute were sold.

The casual air is deceiving, according to Labor, because the buyer's living depends on how well he purchases.

The trick is to be able to visualize how the animal will be when it is dressed out after slaughter. The key is how much it cost per pound "hanging" and if the buyer is too often wrong, he is no longer a buyer.

If you never have been to an auction yard, take a trip out to one of the many yards in the Thumb (at Marlette, Bad Axe, Sandusky, Caro and Cass City) and watch for awhile.

It's fascinating.

## Lucky Lurch Lets Maharg Escape

A Cass City man narrowly escaped death Thursday when the back wheels of his combine locked, throwing him and his machine into a 10-foot deep ditch.

Uninjured in the accident was Kenneth Maharg, 50, of Cass City. According to Jim Maharg, 13, his father was turning from the road into a wheat field, approximately one half mile north of the Maharg farm. As Maharg backed up to finish making his turn, the rear wheels of the machine locked.

"I was at the other house and I heard my father call," said the boy. "This was just before the combine went into the ditch."

When the machine landed in the ditch it pinned Maharg under it in about a foot of water. He was freed when the combine gave a final lurch, allowing enough room for him to crawl to safety.

On Monday, Maharg had no plans for moving the combine until talks with the insurance adjuster are completed. The combine was valued at approximately \$2,000.

Maharg, married and the father of four sons, feels that he is "one of the luckiest persons around."

## Survey Shows Apathy Everywhere

## Voters Exhibit Little Interest in Election

Apathy towards Tuesday's upcoming primary election can be found everywhere in the area.

Elkland Township Clerk Robert M. Hunter reports that only eight absentee ballots have been applied for by those township residents who will be unable to go to the polls in person.

Tuscola County Clerk Archie Hicks also reports the interest in the Aug. 2 primary in the northern and western half of the county to be, "...spotty and depending on where the competition is."

And in a telephone survey taken Monday by the Chronicle, this same apathy was found in the Cass City area. Fifteen voters were picked at random from the phone book and asked if they planned on voting, if they were registered, what contest they

thought the most important, what they thought of the State Senate race in this district between Frank Beadle and Edmund Good and what they thought about the township race if they lived in Elkland Township.

One Couple Interested

Of those 15, only one couple will go to the polls aware of whom they will find on the ballot and the issues of the election. The other 14 did not know who was running and in several cases were unaware of the upcoming elections.

Three of the 15 were not registered and did not plan on voting. Most of the voters didn't make it past the first question. When asked if they were going to the polls, they said yes, they were planning on voting but did not know the candidates or the issues.

One eligible voter said, "I could care less."

A Huron County resident, when asked about the Aug. 2 primary, answered, "I don't live in that county." The upcoming elections are state-wide. Beadle and Good were unfamiliar names to this voter.

Excuses for not going to the polls ranged from the weather to, "If I'm home, I'll vote." This last voter had given no thought to absentee ballots.

The one Cass City couple that was interested and enthused about the upcoming elections felt that the township contests were the most important. Their hopes for the outcome of the race between Elkland township incumbents, and opposition was, "...not the incumbents, but the opposition is elected."

## Past Years

The highest voter turnout for a primary election in recent years was in the 1964 presidential primary when 7,000, or 40 per cent of the county's 17,500 registered voters went to the polls.

In 1960, also a presidential primary, only 4,000 voters went to the polls.

In the state primary of 1962, 6,500 votes were cast.

Both Hicks and Hunter said that it is too early to estimate this year's voter turnout.

There has been little pre-election campaigning in the Cass City area. A visit by Volton Ferency was the only campaign stop for any major candidate.

Ed Good visited the community briefly in his drive to unseat Frank Beadle as State Senator on the GOP ticket, but the remainder of the candidates were conspicuous by their absence.

## Teachers Sign Pact

Cass City teachers have agreed to terms for the 1966-67 school year following ratification of an agreement at a meeting Wednesday, July 20, previously hammered out by teacher-board representatives in a session that climaxed months of bargaining.

The agreement calls for an increase in starting salary of \$400 yearly. From \$5,900 to \$6,400 and an increase in increment pay of \$15 yearly, boosting the maximum that teachers can receive to \$6,950 from last year's \$6,400.

Teachers with a master's degree will receive \$200 additional, the same differential that was received last year.

Ratification of the agreement by the Cass City School Board is expected to be a formality when the board holds its regular monthly meeting Aug. 9.

The final salary settlement represented a compromise between the teachers' last demands and the board's offer.

Previous to the meeting where agreement was reached, the board had offered increases of \$150 a year to a maximum of \$6,900 with MA degree teachers receiving \$300 more. The teachers requested increments of \$160 a year to a maximum of \$7,000 and increases of \$165 a year to a maximum of \$7,350 for MA degree teachers.

Accumulated sick leave was unchanged with teachers receiving a half of unused days when services are terminated.

Cost of Package

The boost in salaries will cost the district taxpayers an additional \$28,800 over the amount paid last year.

Total cost of teachers' salaries will be up some \$40,000, Supt. Donald Crouse estimated, but some of the increase will be for an expanded teaching staff.

To pay the increased cost, the school district expects to receive an additional \$35,000 from the revised State Aid formula.

Crouse stressed that the figures released do not include Evergreen teachers. They will be on the same schedule, of course, he explained, but were not a part of the collective bargaining.

The new schedule will mean increases for Evergreen teachers, but the increased cost is expected to be compensated for by the increase in valuation (\$2 million) that the district received when districts consolidated.

## Vandals Wreck Phone Service

Michigan State Police and Saginaw County Sheriff's officials are looking for vandals who shot up a toll cable and nearly eliminated long distance service for Cass City for 22 hours.

Richard Drews, manager of General Telephone Corporation in the Thumb, said that the lines went out of commission at 5:10 p. m. Monday and full service was not restored until 7 p. m. Tuesday.

Cass City's long distance telephone service was cut from the normal 32 lines to three. Besides the obvious inconvenience, Drews said, there is a definite fire and injury threat when communications are cut. We made several special calls for the hospital Monday, he said, to illustrate the danger.

Cass City's plight was shared by most Thumb communities. Two were completely isolated. Millington and Postoria were without any long distance service until Bell Telephone Co. sent in mobile units. Authorities report that the toll

cable was shot 14 times in a mile and a half stretch near the I-75 Interstate Highway, north of M-46. Police found 36 empty cartridges in the area. The lines are owned by Bell and connected with General Telephone's for long distance service.

## Village Edging Close to Meters

The village edged closer to a uniform traffic ordinance and parking meters Tuesday night at their regular session at the Municipal Building.

The council reviewed the new traffic code designed to update traffic enforcement in the village and the new provisions will go into effect when the ordinance is published, possibly next week.

The provisions covering the parking meters are expected to be available in the very near future and will be reviewed and published as soon as possible, trustees decided.

## Seek Motorist Who Forced Boy into Car

State Police of the Bad Axe post were told Wednesday, July 20, that a nine-year-old Gagetown boy had been forced to take a ride with a stranger.

According to the boy, a middle-aged man in a black auto stopped and asked him if he wanted a ride. After the boy refused, the man seized him and placed him on the front seat, then drove away.

The man went about two blocks on Reagh Road north of Gagetown before releasing the youngster when the boy attempted to open the car door.

## Decker Man Now Parole Eligible

A Decker man, in prison since 1936 for two slayings connected with activities of the old black legion, became eligible for immediate parole consideration Wednesday, July 20, by act of the governor.

Gov. George Romney commuted the two concurrent life sentences of Ervin Lee, 60, an inmate at Southern Michigan Prison in Jackson.

Lee was sentenced Oct. 9, 1936, for the murder of a man on May 12, 1936, and again on Dec. 4, 1936, for the killing of another man on May 25, 1936.

Lee plans to live with friends in Okemos after his parole.

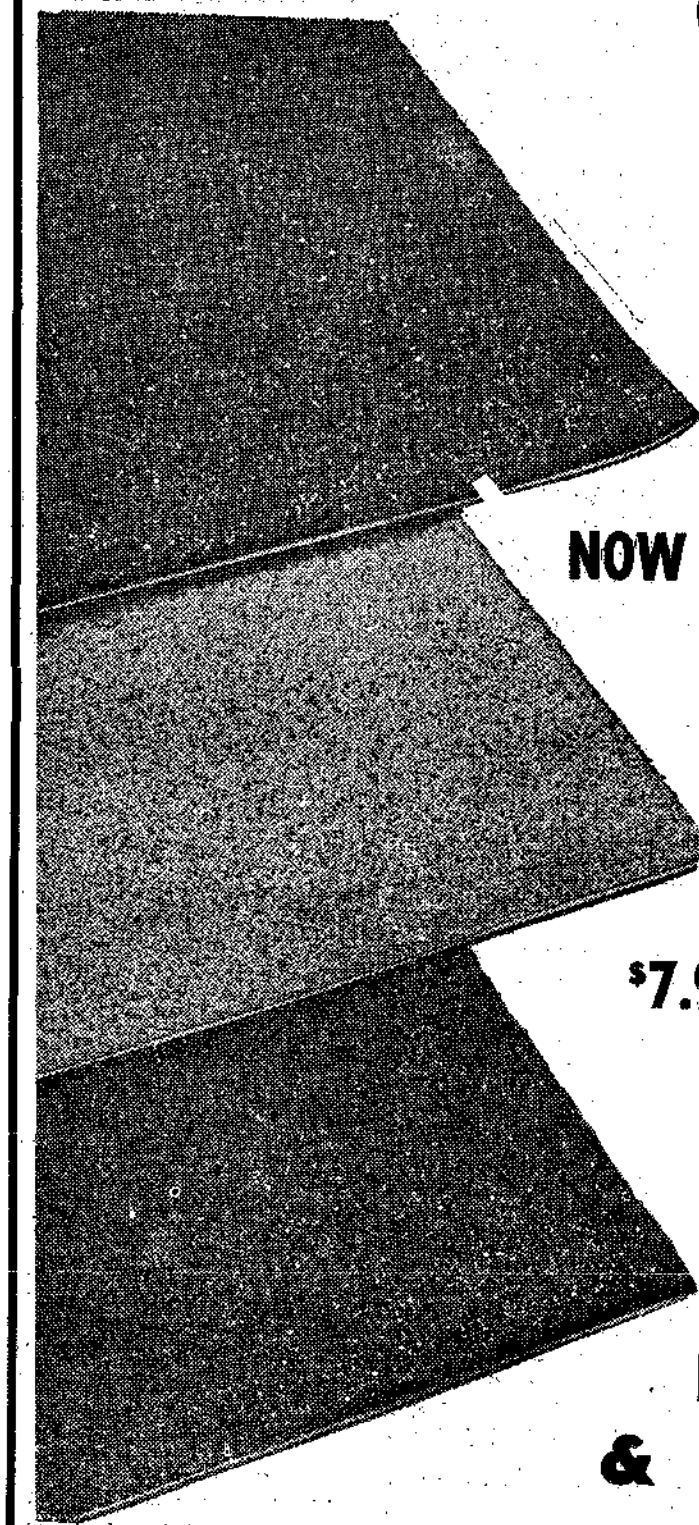

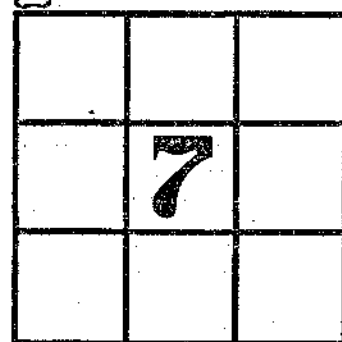

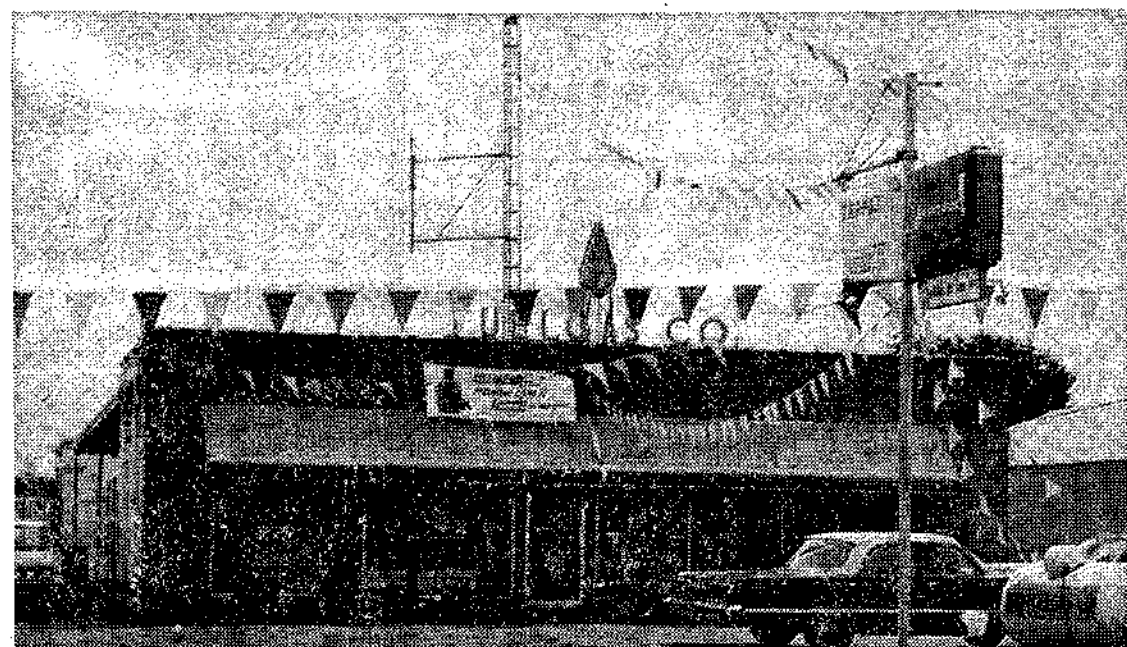

Now the General Telephone Enterprise operator in Wichita Falls, Tex., knows where the Cass City area is. Chances are she couldn't pinpoint the county seat on the Chronicle, but she knows a little more about where her General Telephone counterparts work and the area they service, thanks to Nelson Pelletier, head of the road construction crew working out of Kingston on the new M-46.

Last week Pelletier's big machines dug up some of General Telephone's cables at the corner of Froede Road and M-46, three miles west of Kingston.

In order to fix the cables and reinstall telephone service to the people of that area, an Enterprise operator had to be contacted for repair service. Here is where the confusion begins.

Pelletier began by asking for a road service crew to be sent to the Froede Road location.

"Where's Froede Road?" asked the operator.

He then explained that it was three miles west of Kingston.

"Where's Kingston?" questioned the woman.

Pelletier figured that if he told her it was on M-46, he should get

some positive results. "Where's M-46?" she asked once more.

A little bit perplexed, Pelletier questioned the operator. "This is Cass City, Mich., isn't it?"

The operator went on to explain that it wasn't Cass City but Wichita Falls, Tex., he was talking to. She also told Pelletier that this was the second time a call had come from the Cass City area for repairs since she had been on duty there.

R. W. Drews, of the General Telephone offices in Cass City, says that what happened could be the result of any one of 10,000 things, "and when it comes to repairs, we have to check them all."

Drews pointed out that the wrong connection could have been made as a result of a piece of wire dropped across a circuit, dirt on a switch, a faulty dial on the operator's phone, a mix-up at the relay station or a wrong number on the operator's part.

"There are 10 million miles of wire and 1,000 switches in the several offices a call like that would have to pass through," continued Drews. "It's hard to say what causes such a connection."

Enterprise numbers enable a calling party to call an out-of-town firm at no charge to himself. After a Cass City resident places his Enterprise number with the operator, she relays it to Saginaw, the Saginaw operator relays it to Flint where it is relayed to Detroit. The Detroit operator completes the call when she relays it to Adrian.

The telephone end of the connection is the simplest piece of the equipment. With all the apparatus involved in making a call, it's surprising that there is only one misconnection with every 1,000 calls, the average figured by Drews.

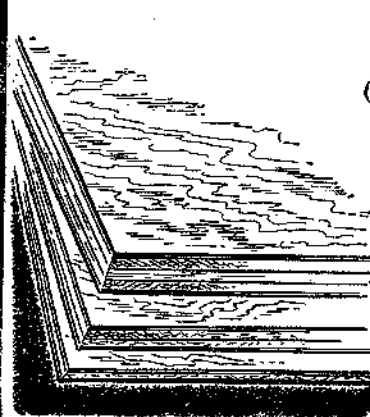

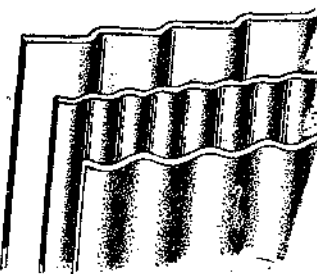

## Hostetler's Hodgepodge

### Be Prepared to Go Back to School

By Marion Hostetler

I see by my favorite weekly that Circuit Judge James P. Churchill has received a fellowship to attend the National College of State Trial Judges for four weeks this month.

With information accumulating as fast as it does, we have to recognize that education cannot end with a high school or college commencement, but must be continued all through life. Authorities are saying that some individuals will have to learn three or four different occupations in the course of a lifetime, as their old jobs become obsolete or are automated.

Walter Wagoner, who is summertime chaplain of the William Lyon Phelps Memorial Chapel at Huron City, as well as executive director of the Fund for Theological Education, recently wrote, "As a Yale economist puts it, all professional people (not just scientists) have an academic half-life of about ten years: that is, half of what we need to know ten years from now is not new knowledge."

School teachers always seem to be taking night classes or summer courses. Physicians and pharmacists are constantly struggling to keep up with developments. At least one Cass City church has granted its minister permission to take up to two weeks per year for advanced study, in addition to his vacation, so he won't fall behind current viewpoints and methods.

The problem a minister would face when he came back to town with all that updated knowledge would be that the other people in the church hadn't been to the school, so they would still prefer the old viewpoints and the old ways of doing things. A judge, I presume, can conduct his court according to his own best judgment, as long as he stays within the law. A doctor won't hear many objections if he prescribes a new wonder drug. But a school teacher or minister who wants to try something new has to convince a lot of other people before he can get anything rolling.

It would be interesting to see whether the "clerk of the works" concept could be put into practice in institutional matters. The clerk of the works is appointed to make sure that the donors of a hospital or the citizens who are paying for

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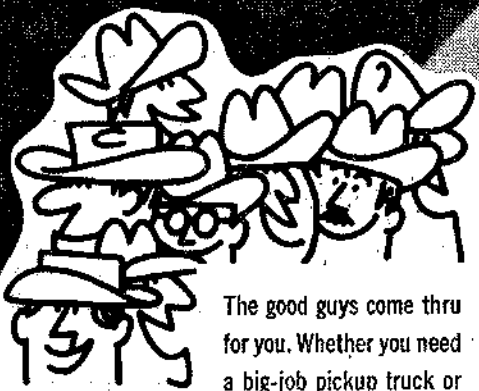

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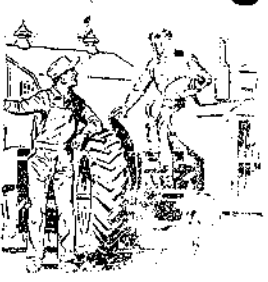

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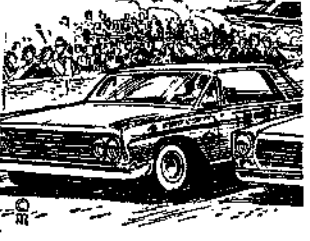

### IT SEEMS TO ME Our Congratulations To Fire Department

Our personal congratulations to Nelson Willy who received an award recently for safe operation of our community's sanitary facilities!

And to the entire village crew goes the first annual Searls award for efficient and polite work! Now, what is to be the future of Houghton Street? It has been depaved over a several block area without mentioning the long-range plans in the Chronicle. Given about five years, it would seem that bossman, William Schram, will see that all of our village streets will be black-topped, and have curbs and gutters. Bravo!

Congratulations, too, to our village clerk, Mrs. House, whose voice on the telephone is always pleasant and whose personal knowledge of village laws is nothing short of amazing. I am told that relations between our clerk and the village's attorney have never been better. He is Mr. Clint House.

In Buffalo, N. Y., Supreme Court Justice Carlton A. Fisher recently ruled against The Immaculate Conception (Roman Catholic) Church Altar and Rosary Society. Forfeiture of receipts from four games was the fine imposed, which is estimated to be \$400 per game. Said Justice Fisher: "The penalty was not unduly harsh in view of the fact they (the church) had previously continually been warned of violations in the operation of their bingo game."

Divorce laws of the State of New York were liberalized recently. Previously, the only legal reason for divorce was adultery. Many persons desiring divorce employed firms to set up false evidence which then was taken to Court as 'proof' of adultery. Said The Christian Century, "In recent years New York's strict divorce law had become increasingly brutal and increasingly brutalizing. It produced 'quickie' divorces in far-off places, complicity in the staging of fake cases of adultery and quiet desperation for those couples whose marriages had collapsed

but who could not afford financially or morally the only escapes open to them." The law now provides six legal reasons for divorce. Framers of the new laws foresee no rush to the divorce courts in the near future. Unfortunately, people get married to other people who have no real basis upon which to create a happy and fulfilling marriage. Improved counseling at the time of marriage appears to offer some hope; at least so it seems to me.

We congratulate the National Council of Catholic Men, and the National Council of Catholic Women who have announced a joint publishing program to assist laymen in their participation in the ecumenical movement. Kits of grass-roots ecumenism will provide not only increased knowledge but suggestions concerning the types of cooperation recommended on a local level. I trust that as the kits become available, Fr. Messing will see to it that Protestant clergymen obtain them. Alert Protestant laymen as well as their Catholic friends will want them both for personal use and for small group discussions. Or so it seems to me.

# Fiscal Reform for Michigan Sure Topic for Legislature

**A Certainty**  
Like the rebel's cry for the South, in Michigan tax reform will rise again.

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Zolton Ferency is making fiscal reform a major battleground against Gov. George Romney, although the GOP incumbent has largely ignored his opponent on this point to date.

Romney dropped his plea for tax reform this year in deference to lack of cooperation from the 1965 Democratic-dominated legislature. Since the treasury was in good shape to carry through the current fiscal year, the pressure for reform was off.

state senators are named to four-year terms.

Assuming the Democrats maintain control of the 38-member Senate and 110-seat House, it would be easier to go along with tax reform in 1967 or 1968.

House members seeking re-election in 1968 could claim the Governor wanted reform and the Senate wanted reform so they were powerless to stop it. By the time the Senate members sought new terms, most of the electorate would be so used to the new tax structure they would have lost any anger-based intentions of "throwing the rascals out."

### Badly Needed

When he announced he would not press a reform package this year, however, the Governor indicated the need would be present again soon, probably to make ends meet in the 1967-68 fiscal year.

There were several indications last year that more Democrats might be inclined to get together with Romney on a reform program after the 1968 elections if they maintained their majority.

The November election will be the first at which the Governor and

Michigan State University's request for permission to operate a full-program medical school came as a surprise to some since its two-year human medicine program is just getting nicely started.

The initial program will begin with its first students this fall. It has been in planning for nearly six years and four years have passed since the legislature authorized its operation.

The formal request by the MSU Board of Trustees to the State Board of Education was actually probably very well timed.

As expected, the State Board told MSU President John Hannah the request will need study in terms of the overall medical education available in Michigan.

Study, as President Hannah well knows, can and frequently does involve a number of years before any result is seen in terms of a program.

Thus by asking now for permission to expand the new two-year program, Michigan State probably stands a good chance of handing out its first medical degrees to the students who are enrolled this fall in the limited program.

### Half Measure

"People have regular checkups by their dentist or doctor, but they won't get regular checkups on their cars until the law requires them to," stresses Garnet M. Griffin, managing director of the Traffic Safety Association of Detroit.

Michigan's legislature was not quite ready to require regular safety checks as urged by Griffin and others this year, but it did take a step which the experts believe will eventually lead to mandatory auto inspections.

Traffic safety experts have claimed that states which do require periodic checkups of autos have seen a decrease in accidents.

Legislators were not convinced that mandatory inspections of all cars at state-approved garages would have such a beneficial result.

A spokesman for the Motor and Equipment Manufacturers Association says that over 50 per cent of the cars on the road do not meet generally accepted performance standards for safety. The figure is based on the experience in 20 states which have safety inspection laws.

This was the 15th year the Michigan legislature was asked to pass a compulsory inspection law.

Doubters won out, but they did go along with a spot-check proposal to allow state and local police to establish temporary safety inspection stations.

Motorists stopped and found with mechanically defective autos can be ticketed and taken to court.

Since the bill was not given immediate effect, it will not be used until early next year. Within a year or two after its initiation, this spot survey method is expected to provide data on which the legislature can determine whether mandatory inspection would be of value.

## Tips for Best Time to Sell Wheat Told

When to best market any cash crop always presents problems. We can look at the daily market prices, study the futures, or be forced to sell crops to pay pending debts.

Those of you who can afford to speculate on your marketing have a greater chance to add dollars to your income. You can lose also.

In a farm operator with his own storage, or source of inexpensive rented storage can realize extra cash crop returns. I am not speaking of the operator who tries to speculate on the top market price each year because this is real dangerous.

Marketing economics show when cash crops are sold each year at an average price between annual lows and highs the seller realizes his greatest returns.

It is also seen when products are marketed uniformly by everyone throughout the year the price paid does not fluctuate as great as when the product is marketed at one time.

Farm storage does pay and if you don't have storage you pay for it anyway about every time a crop is sold at the day of harvest. Most farm storages pay for themselves by marketing the operator's off-season labor supply and during a period when stored cash crops command a higher price.

Right now the question is "What should I do with my 1966 wheat crop?"

With the fast changing wheat situation recently occurring, much speculation is going on.

We have heard that our government wheat supply is lower than it has been in some time—I've heard around four per cent. We have seen the wheat acreage allotments increased by 15 per cent for the 1967 crop. We have heard another 10 per cent increase may be added to the 1967 wheat acreage allotment. There might even be an increase in wheat prices above the present board price.

If you want to speculate on your wheat crop, here is the chance. If your decision is to store for a possible future wheat price increase, you might take a real good look at placing that wheat under a government loan at \$1.22 per bushel for 90 per cent of your committed wheat. This loan can be obtained whether your own storage is used or the wheat is placed in government owned storage.

There is a possible income tax advantage when using a government wheat loan program. Government loan monies are not considered income in the year of the loan. Income on this wheat is taxable in the year the wheat is actually sold by the operator.

A government loan allows an operator to pay his debts and charge this debt payment as farm expense in that year. When he sells this wheat in the following year his income will be taxable. This is another income tax management tip of possible value.

Storing your '66 wheat crop has a third advantage of allowing the operator to speculate on a higher market plus using slack season labor.

On the other side of the ledger, to sell now will guarantee the seller today's selling price, relieve his speculation worries, no more handling, pay his debts, no storage costs and little labor demand during the off season. What is your choice?
