Dump Plans Fizzle Again

Secret negotiations by the Cass City Village Council to secure 16 acres of land for a dump site collapsed at the last minute when the owner refused to sell when he learned the land was to be used as a dump.

The property, owned by Charles Stamfast of Rochester, is located near the Cass River, southeast of Cass City.

In one of three special unannounced meetings during the month the council voted to purchase the land for \$2,950. The action was taken Wednesday, Sept.

Actually, the land was probably about as near to an ideal dump site as it is possible to get. It is at least a half mile from the nearest residence and had received health department approval.

Stamfast reportedly refused to sell when he learned that the land was to be used as a dump because he feared that other property he owned in the area could be devaluated.

The council will attempt to explain the sanitary land fill type dump proposed with coverage of all debris within 24 hours in an attempt to get Stamfast to change his mind.

A proposed site directly south of Cass City at the village limits brought a storm of protest from persons in the south village limits and was one of the first abandoned after a wave of indignant property owners protested to the

A site owned by Tuckey Block and an abandoned gravel pit owned by the county were rejected . . . the first because it was in Novesta township and the second because the county would not re-

C. R. Hunt donated use of a gravel pit as a dumn for a short period and then withdrew the land.

The council went through about 10 laborious months working towards a site east of Cass City in conjunction with Elkland township only to find that the water level was too near the surface for the landfill type dump needed.

Also considered briefly were sites west of Cass City and northeast of the village.

After 10 years of striving the village now stands in essentially the same position that it did when it started with the exception that the State Health Department looms more strongly in the background ready to take action to see that a sanitary landfill dump is established as required by recent law.







90-Day Wonder



Last spring, some 800,000 coho salmon about the size of the little fish shown above this ruler were released in three streams of lakes Michigan and Superior by the Conservation Department. Here, below the smaller coho, is how one of these fish now looks. The big fish, first confirmed coho recovered from Michigan waters, made a 9-11 inch gain in only 90 days. Caught by commercial fishermen about two miles north of Manistee, the $1\frac{1}{4}$ -pounder turned out to be a fast-maturing male (jack). This is more good news for Department fisheries men who hope that cohos will successfully reproduce in Michigan streams next fall. Since this first coho was netted, several others have been taken in waters near Leland and Ludington. They averaged about 12 inches, more in line with original expectations. Cohos still have several good-growing weeks left this year, and some of the early-maturing fish may run up a few of Michigan's Great Lakes streams this fall. They are now legal catches under regulations much the same as trout fishing rules. -Mich. Dept. of Conservation

Collectively, poachers also "steal" thousands of dollars from northern businessmen who make their living from the hunting and tourist attraction of deer. Conservation officers make an all-out effort to protect the interests of these people, but the poaching problem is bigger than they can cope with alone. Without the help of everyone who has a personal stake in the deer herd, poachers will continue to cheat the public. Their violating mocks the law-abiding citizen with this question. "What are you going to do about it?"







Although not quite as bad as it was, this act is still not needed in rural areas. The amount of the Bond for the individual has been reduced from \$10,000 to \$2,000 for those with business under \$200,000 per year.

The stickler in the whole act is that it is very difficult for a small builder financially to secure a bond and license. If he can secure the bond and license, this cost must be passed on to the consumer; there is just no other place it can

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Give Labor An Incentive to Remain on Farm-Kebler

By Don R. Kebler

Will we be seeing the time in the very near future, when farm buyers or renters are as scarce

If this does occur there are going to be some real problems basides those of food shortages. One of these problems will affect the present operator-owners when the time for their retirement comes. How will this affect the owner? First of all, he and his wife will no longer receive income from their farm investment once he retires and there is no one to take over. Secondly, with no ready buyers or renters, his farm invest-

ment over life-time is valueless as market, · a cash convertible asset. Next the tax and improvement obligations will need to be paid out of savings and-or from the retirement income.

Another problem to occur will affect all agribusiness plus others depending on local buying power for a living. Decrease this buying power and the community will wither on the vine.

What will be the cause for developing these problems? There will be several and they won't happen all at once. One cause we are most familiar with is the cost-return squeeze which has been with us for many years since the Korean police action. The next and probably the least observed and slowest growing cause is farm labor loss. The first cause certainly caused the second to occur as it forced this farm labor to abandon the farming business. Hired men and sons have left the farm business for greener pastures. Some have gone to college, into the armed services and elsewhere with very few returning to farm-

As this continues with increasing intensity the number of farm operators cannot help but diminish. An ever increasing number of present operators will be of retirement age in another 10 to 15 years. The average operator age in Tuscola county today is in the mid-fifties.

Within the next decade and a half we could see some real agricultural change. Farm land could lose its position as a much sought after item and become a drug on the market. The remaining farm operators couldn't operate more land regardless of price and therefore are out of the buyer or renter

Where would this leave the retired and retiring farmer with no one to take over? He is in a position where he can't rent or sell

his farm; he must pay his taxes and may be depending on extra needed retirement income from his This will place him in a posi-

tion of trying to sell his farm for whatever small amount is offered. It will be a buver's market. If there are any buyers they can name their price. Is there a solution to help prevent this possible problem or development? Yes, if the labor

source is given an incentive to remain on the farm. A widening of the margin between costs and returns would help. Other incentives might be; development of father and son operations and partnerships at an early age; better and more adequate farm credit and the removal of causes which require the son to leave the farm even though he desires to make farming his lifetime profession; more better management knowledge, and record use.

Shortages of food could be the most important single cause to start the pendulum swinging in the opposite direction.





"Four policemen, one school, one stoplight, 2,090 people and no taxis." That might be a description of our fair village, but actually it's the way Laverne, Oklahoma, was described by Jane Anne Jayroe, who grew up in Laverne, and who is now Miss America.

One school and one stoplight are adequate for Cass City, but it might be an improvement to have one taxi. I don't suppose calls would be frequent enough to enable anybody to consider taxi driving as a full-time occupation, but someone who was semi-retired might pick up a little change by transporting townspeople.

I can think of three women who have mentioned that they would be happy to pay someone on occasion to take them to the grocery or the doctor's office, or to visit a friend in the hospital. I have no way of knewing how many people would be willing to pay regulartaxi rates for a ride. And I'm not sure what problems of licensing and insurance would be involved.

Another possibility, which is reported to have been successful in one city, would be to have several people volunteer to provide rides as a public service accepting only enough for gas and oil. Some retired person who is usually at home could agree to receive the phone calls from those who needed a taxi, and then dispatch the call to whichever volunteer driver was available at the time.

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





'Agent's Corner

Crystals that may form in grape jelly are usually collections of tartrate salts - a normal by-product of the tartaric acid present in grapes, says Mrs. Ann Ross, extension home economist from Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties.

To prevent this crystal formation, let the grape juice stand before making it into jelly. This allows crystals to form in the juice

Keeping the juice overnight, or for several days, in the refrigerator may allow some crystals to form and settle to the bottom of the jar, However, Mrs. Ross says canning the juice and letting it stand sealed for several weeks or months is more likely to give enough time for the crystals to form and settle.

This also takes the rush out of the grape harvesting season. Jelly then can be made in small amounts when it is needed. The sealed juicewill hold its flavor better, too, than the made-up jelly.

When ready to make jelly, pour the juice out of the jar carefully so as not to disturb the sediment and crystals that have formed. Discard the crystals and sediment. Strain the juice through double thickness of damp muslin or cheesecloth. Then make the jelly according to your favorite recipe.

Be fair with yourself and admit you are often wrong.



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



Michigan Mirror

Observers Differ on Possible Effective New Ethics Law

Hellow Law

Views vary on what the effect of Michigan's new conflict of interest law will be.

Demanded by Gov. George Romney in conjunction with the legislative and executive pay raises enacted this year, the law is intended to avoid possible charges of influence peddling by persons in au-

People who praise the new ethics law say it will get and keep state employes and officers at all levels out of positions where their official knowledge could possibly be construed as beneficial inside information.

Critics of the law contend that its language is so vague that it cannot be effectively enforced to eliminate the practices intended to be stopped.

Even the few specific sections lack teeth for enforcement, the critics say. For example one section prohibits legislators who are lawyers from representing clients hefore state government boards or commissions, but discipline for infractions rests with the legislative house in which the violator is a

Another section prohibits any government employe from having 'a direct or indirect interest, financial or otherwise, in a contract with the state or any of its political subdivisions." Violation of this ban calls for "appropriate disciplinary or civil action," but the appropriate action is not specified in any way.

Even among the critics the views vary. While some say the vagueness makes the law ineffective, others contend its provisions are too detailed.

Certain language makes the law apply virtually to everyone who is paid a salary or expenses from tax funds of any Michigan governmental unit, not just the state itself.

Thus, this group says, a business executive in a community might be prevented from serving on a school advisory committee if his firm had any dealings with the school system. This could occur if committee members were paid expenses for serving.

All sections of the new law are being studied carefully by the Attorney General's office at this

One saving grace, the critics say, is that the law does not take effect until next spring. Conceivably before that time amendments could be passed to correct any unclear or unnecessary language or any obvious omissions.

More & More

Citizens who lament the increasing growth of government at all evels rarely find anything to cheen in the state Civil Service Commission's annual personnel report and

this year is no exception. Many used to find encouragement in the idea that if the government was in the hands of the Republicans, the trend toward bigger and bigger government would end. This idea no longer holds

This year's commission report indicates some 4,000 state employes have been added to the pay roll since 1962, when a GOP chief

Some state Republicans will try to blame the increase in the public payroll on Democrats, who have controlled the legislative pursestrings the past two years. This accounts only for two of Gov. George Romney's four years in of-

Another argument will be that the Democratic-controlled federal government keeps getting bigger and the state must do its best to get back as many of its tax dollars as possible.

Most politicians legitimately emphasize that the public is constantly increasing its individual and collective demands on the government and they must be responsive to these demands.

Growing Danger

Shocking news that water accidents in the first nine months of this year killed as many people in Michigan as during all of 1965 has provoked a call for increased concern about water safety.

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

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
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
