In the last two weeks the Chronicle took the first steps in a modernization program for the newspaper that will cost upwards to \$20,000 immediately and possibly much more in a year or two. It will be three months or more before you notice any changes. it takes that long for equipment

on order to arrive. When we start using this equipment, in a process that is sweeping through the newspaper industry, our pictures will be very much clearer, the type more distinct and

your newspaper easier to read. Buying equipment is a case of being damned if you do and damned if you don't, as most farmers and small manufacturers will agree.

At the Chronicle, for instance, the move means scrapping a press that cost \$9,000 five years ago and is worth the price of scrap metal today. It antiquates an electronic engraver (purchased three years ago) and makes the paper's tape operated type setting machine (purchased two years ago) sur-

plus. The Chronicle is changing to this new process for a variety of reasons. Back of the decision to take on new mortgage payments is a confidence that the community will grow and prosper.

We don't feel that the community is ready for the scrap heap and are backing our opinion with the modernization.

For unless Cass City continues to be a sound business community for the next decade, there is no chance of the paper ever justifying this most recent change,

Just how much is received in

fines is a little difficult to determine. Fines paid by motorists and placed in the collection boxes along the street are counted with meter money, while fines paid at the office are figured separately. However a breakdown of the figures for the first two weeks show that about 24 per cent of the money collected was for fines and about 75 per cent for the privilege of parking.

It is entirely possible that the fines in the opening week were greater than in succeeding weeks as drivers became accustomed to fines for violation.

Separate Fund

The money goes into a separate fund for parking. From this runa, payments for leases for lots have been made. There has been no payment yet to the parking meter company pending adjustment for returned meters. When payments start, half of the revenue, 'before expenses, will be sent until the meters are paid for.

Stalks Can Tip Off Corn Yields

If your corn yields are not coming up to expectations this fall, it may be a good time to count the cornstalks before they are chopped, shredded or otherwise destroyed.

Alfred Ballweg, county Extension Agricultural Agent, says corn growers frequently have fewer stalks per acre than they realize. To get good yields farmers need at least 16,000 stalks to the acre. To find out how many stalks you actually have, Ballweg offers this simple method of measurement:

Take a 25-foot tape measure and go into a typical part of any field. Measure off a 25-foot section. Then

The county extension agent advises that it would be good to check now and then to be sure your planter is set for the proper planting next spring when you seed your corn crop.


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



Coming Attraction for State Anglers



On tap to join Michigan's growing list of sportfishing attractions is this, the chinook of king salmon. The chinook, a close look-alike to the exciting coho which has already made a big splash in this state, ranks as the most prized salmon catch among sport fishermen in the West. Recently, the State of Washington donated 1 million chinook eggs to Michigan. From these eggs, the Conservation Department hopes to rear 800,000 900,000 young chinooks which will be planted at 3-4 inches next spring in a Michigan stream yet to be picked. If these new fish thrive as well in the food-rich Great Lakes as the coho, many of them will grow to the 15-40 pound class within their 3-5 year life cycle to provide terrific trophy fishing. And if they grow at the tremendous rate of the coho, a few two-year-olds are expected to return to the planted stream in the fall of 1968. It is hoped that heavier chinook runs will occur from the first planting of these fish during the next few years after that. When the time comes, the best way to tell chinooks from coho salmon will be their distinctive black gums; the coho's are white, .-Mich. Dept. of Conservation

Venereal Disease **Rise Blamed on Home Discipline**


"The loss of values and moral ethics is blamed today on living in a time of radical changes,' stated Lucy Miller, from the Thumb District Health Department, "when actually the blame should be placed in the home". Speaking at a meeting sponsored by Farm Bureau Women, November 25, at the 4-H building in Caro, Mrs. Miller charged the group, "to become the nucleus of launching the attack on the blight of venereal disease in our society".

Tuscola county, along with all others in the state, has a high incident rate of the infectious disease.

Gladys Rydeen, from the Michigan Health Department, cited that curbing venereal disease is a problem because of the indifference of the public, lack of education and relaxed discipline of children. In other activities of the meet-

ing, the Farm Bureau Community groups are participating in a "soon for Viet Nam" project. Soap will be shipped to a Marine soldier from Clio, stationed in the war area, to dispense directly to the Vietnamese people.

Mrs. Carl Keinath of Vassar, legislative chairman, was selected to represent the farm women's group on a legislative leaders' tour to Washington in March.

George Romney made his program known to the legislature.

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The two programs were very similar, both in general and specific terms. That they would be similar was known to the Democrats. Their early introduction was aimed at being able to take credit for accomplishing "their program."

This year the Democrats lost the majority, but one of the few remaining office-holders from the Party has again jumped the gun on the Governor.

Not quite new, but with a few fresh proposals, the traffic safety program announced by Secretary of State James M. Hare contains many of the ideas pushed unsuccessfully in previous years by himself, the Governor, the State Safety Commission and several other

agencies. Implied consent legislation in drunk driving cases, state-sponsored annual vehicle inspection, more leeway in applying the point system in certain cases, periodic physical examinations for drivers. and generally stricter enforcement of laws against delinquent drivers were among the priorities on Hare's list Since there has been an implied

threat against Michigan's federal highway funds if some substantial traffic safety legislation is not enacted, many of the segments of Hare's legislative program are sure to be included in Gov. Romney's "State of the state" address to the legislature two months hence.

::::: Nobody Loses Surprise was expressed by some

political observers that the 18year-old vote referendum did not fare better with Michigan voters than it did.

After all, they noted, the Republican Governor was behind it, as were many leaders of the Democratic Party. And it sailed through both houses of the legislature with almost no opposition on its way to the ballot test.

The key to defeat seemed to lie in two factors. Lowering the voting age by three years would be a rather, radical move and Michigan voters, in the main, tend to be conservative in change.

Assecond factor, well known to the politicians who had to vote on it before it could be considered by the people, was that history tended to foreclose passage. Never in history has the franchise been granted to any group on the first request.

Why the overwhelming support from political leaders? It could do no harm to support a proposal they were quite sure would lose, but failure to endorse it could


