


Brother Killed As Gun Fires

"The gun just went off in my hand, don't ask me how," said grief stricken Ed Lasko Monday when he described the tragic death of his brother Gerald Saturday night at their farm home, eight miles south and two miles east of

Cass City. We have a gun rack in our room, he said, and I took the gun, a .22 caliber pistol, from it and was looking it over when Gerald asked me to change the channel on TV. I turned around to ask him what program he wanted and the gun went off. The next thing I knew the blood started pouring from his

forehead as he toppled on the bed. The 19-year-old youth was killed instantly. The accident was investigated by Sheriff Hugh Marr and deputies of the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department and Coroner Ben Collon.

Mr. Lasko was born in Cass City June 30, 1947, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Steven Lasko.

He graduated from Kingston High School this year and was employed by the Bauer Candy Co. of Cass City. He was a member of St. Michael's Church, Wilmet. Surviving are his parents; two sisters, Mrs. William Endert of Caro and Miss Elaine Lasko, at home; his brother, Edward, at home; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Zyrowski of Kingston, and paternal grandmother, Mrs. Julia Lasko of Deford.

Rosary was recited at 8 p. m. Monday at Little's Funeral Home and final rites held at St. Michael's Church Wilmet, Tuesday.

The Rev. Raymond Pilarski officiated and burial was in the St. Michael's Cemetery.

10-Vote Margin Gives Kingston New High School

A new \$1,225,000 high school for Kingston was authorized Monday in a special election that saw the measure pass by just 10 votes.

The new school is scheduled to be completed in Sept. 1968 and the additional three mills authorized will increase the total tax levy of the district to 20 mills.

The new school will accommodate at least 500 students and will be located on a 60-acre site on the east side of Kingston Road. There are now 320 high school students. The sale of bonds is expected to begin in February and construction is expected to begin in April.

After the new school is completed, the elementary grades will occupy what is usable of the old building.

In addition to these offices, a trustee will be named to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of James Baker who is leaving the community.

The council this week appointed Dr. William Selby to replace Baker and it is expected that he will run for re-election for the post he is now filling.




Another feature of the vocal program will be caroling by everyone, singing such old favorites as "O Come, All Ye Faithful," "Silent Night" and "Joy to the World."



The vocal groups are under the direction of Roger Parrish.

Set Tour, Dedication of Jail Saturday; Churchill to Speak

site will be where the former jail is now. The old building will be razed, according to present plans.

Circuit Judge James P. Churchill will present the dedication address. He will be the key speaker in a program that will see many law enforcement and local dignitaries introduced.

Introduced will be Elkland, Supervisor Edward G. Golding, chairman, board of supervisors; Charles F. Woodcock, chairman, special building committee; Hugh Marr, sheriff; Robert Russell, Michigan Department of Corrections; Col. Frederick Davids, commander, Michigan State Police, and Elwyn J. Smith, president, Michigan Sheriff's Association.

A commemorative plaque will be unveiled which lists the members of the board of supervisors, Hugh Marr, sheriff, various special committees and the date (1850) that Tuscola county was established.

Closing remarks will be presented by Prosecuting Attorney James J. Epskamp.

Plan Tour
After the dedication, a tour of the new jail will be held. Visitors will follow a trail marked by numbers in which some 36 different features of the new building are outlined.

Generally, the jail is divided into three sections. The basement holds two committee rooms, general office space, mechanical equipment room and storage. It is here that the county civil defense will be headquartered. The civil defense headquarters were built with Federal funds.

When visitors walk through the main door in the front of the building they will see a spacious lobby and work room.

Some of the features of the new jail that visitors will probably want to visit include the incorrigible cell for severely unruly prisoners.

Sheriff Hugh Marr said that one of the finest features of the new facility is that he will now be able to separate the first offender from the hardened criminal types that sometimes are housed in the jail.

Communications Center
The communications center will feature radio connections to all law enforcement agencies in the state as well as Thumb fire departments and Tuscola county schools. The center has monitoring equipment so that the entire jail can be monitored. Tape recording equipment is included.

One room that is not monitored in the jail is the new conference room for prisoner-attorney discussions. Complete privacy between prisoner and lawyer is assured.

The identification room contains complete photo darkroom, identification photo equipment and fingerprinting facilities.

The jail's capacity is 46 persons. There is a large 30-man cell block and a smaller 16-man cell block.

The second floor of the building contains the sheriff's bedrooms and bath.

Operating the sheriff's department is big business for Marr. Under his direction directly are some 20 persons including nine full-time members of the law enforcement division of his operation. They include: Sgt. Hilton Sables, Detective Robert Larsen and Deputies Paul Berry, Ronald Iseler, Forrest Lobdell, William Lawrence, Robert Fox, John Horwath and Ronald Phillips. Another full-time employee at the jail is Clerk Deputy Joyce Howell.

In addition to these persons, Marr has a water safety department and a volunteer sheriff's posse.

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Discuss Special School Items

Special items for the new high school occupied the majority of the regular school board session Monday night at Cass City High School.

Committees are investigating three different items for the school.

Mrs. Katie Jackson who has been investigating sewing machines was reported to favor a Singer zig-zag machine. The model selected would cost \$120 each and the eight machines needed will cost \$960.

Two scoreboards would cost \$1,350. Supt. Donald Crouse told the board. They are from the same company that furnishes the boards for the present gym and service has been good, according to Crouse.

"Pace" Office Now Operating In Courthouse

A small, but busy office in the Tuscola County Courthouse is now in operation with a goal of creating, "Projects to Advance Creativity in Education."

"Pace," as the program is called, operates under Title Three of the Federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, and it came about because of a request from the Intermediate School Superintendents: Morgan Ballagh of Huron county, George Leckrone of Sanilac county, and William Scott of Tuscola county. The six-month existence of "Pace" as it stands now, will have a budget foundation of \$21,925 in Federal funds.

George Quinn, 26, of Caro, is heading the project's office. Quinn is a graduate of the University of Michigan with a bachelor's degree in English and he's taught school for two years in the Caro system. He is the son of Appellate Court Judge Timothy Quinn and he brings an inquiring mind and broad vision to the job of handling the projects of "Pace." Says Quinn, "This project is so new it is almost unique," and he points out, "we hope to walk new paths in finding ways for children in school to advance themselves and each other for the future." Quinn points out that the project operates independently of the poverty program and the proposed Tri-County College, although he is quick to say that he welcomes ideas from all groups interested in education.

"The first task will be to assess each school district in the three counties and to assist us we hope to find part time persons with educational backgrounds and open minds who can review the educational opportunities now offered to boys and girls in these districts," said Quinn. "After that we hope to

Power Equipment
Cass City may be the only community in the Thumb to have power bleachers in its gym.

The board will study the feasibility of power to move the bleachers back and forth when members visit other schools to see various types available.

Crouse said that he thought that the power in the bleachers would add over \$500 to the cost, but that he feels that it is worth it.

With these type bleachers, he explained, you could have a gym class, dismiss it 10 minutes early, and move the bleachers back into position and be ready for an assembly.

Convention Delegates

Two board members, Don Koepfgen and Kenneth Maharg, are seriously considering attending the National School Board Convention at Portland, Oregon, April 22-25. Cost to the school district would be somewhat over \$500.

Cafeteria In Black

Crouse reported that the Cass City cafeteria now appears to be operating on a break-even basis since the raise in rates this fall. Deford's cafeteria is running at a slight deficit, he explained.



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
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
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
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Traditional Services Highlight Season







Amish Continue to Defy Authorities; One-Room Eighth Grade School Open

"Exceptional" School

Squeaking wheels get the grease, it is usually said, but Michigan has been witnessing a case in which one of the most passive groups in society has achieved its goal with a minimum of squeaking.

The Amish people in Hillsdale county, a close-knit group of religious-oriented farmers, have been quietly ignoring Michigan's law requiring certified teachers in pri-

vate schools.

State officials for two years or more have been telling the Amish spokesmen they must either follow the law and hire a qualified teacher or close their small school, one of the few one-room schoolhouses still in use in Michigan. The Amish traditionally educate their children only to the eighth grade level.

Teaching the dozen-plus Amish children has been a young girl who herself was educated in the sect's tradition. She has no higher education degree and thus cannot qualify for state certification.

After ignoring the state mandates from the Attorney General and the Department of Education for two years the Amish have now gained a reprieve of still another year.

During the initial period several legislators tried to come to the defense of the Amish in seeking to permit this one school to operate in its own way.

Difficulty in these attempts arose because laws specifying the Amish might violate the church-state separation provisions of the U. S. Constitution, and broader legislation might permit anyone to establish their own sub-standard system.

In giving the Amish at least one more year to operate the school, State Board of Education members emphasized this was a special exception to the law and "should not be considered as opening the door to compromised standards elsewhere."

Indian Needs

Junketing legislators have frequently been called to task in the press for seemingly unnecessary trips and futile studies which continue for years without result and sometimes without any recommendations.

But one group which has so far escaped criticism is the now non-existent Senate Committee on Michigan Indians. Much was expected of this committee but little beyond its junket has been accomplished.

The study group, headed by Detroit Democrat Charles N. Youngblood, spent part of the summer of 1965 touring the state in five new, borrowed travel trailers, camping at the various Indian reservations in Michigan.

Purpose of the tour was to study living conditions, schooling, job possibilities and general potential for upgrading the life of the Indians.

Indian leaders at the various reservations were also invited to write to or appear at a committee hearing regarding what they considered to be their peoples' problems.

Working with an unlimited expense account authorized by the Legislature, the committee gathered a sheaf of letters and notes

and had a documentary film made of the study trip.

That is as far as the now defunct committee's work went and there appears little more in the making. No written report was submitted to the 1966 Legislature, and authorization for continued committee study was not sought.

No doubt another legislator will some day decide the Indian situation needs attention and another committee will be formed.

Any judgments gathered by the 1965 study committee will likely go unnoticed since they appear only in the minds of the committee members, rather than in the official legislative files.

Another junket will be required because conditions can change as time passes.

Without any official report from the 1965 committee, its observations will be of little value to any future study in this area.

More Than Money

Loss of Dr. Robert A. Kimmich as head of the State Mental Health Department points up an important lesson for government policymakers: high salaries do not automatically guarantee that qualified people will stay on the job.

Dr. Kimmich was brought here from California about two years ago. At the time, Gov. George Romney gained approval to pay the director of this important department \$35,000 a year.

It was argued that the state must offer cabinet-level salaries, ranging from \$20,000 to \$35,000 if it hoped to attract and keep good men at the head of its major units.

Departure of Dr. Kimmich was for personal reasons apparently unrelated to the post he held in Michigan.







We missed too many easy shots to stay in contention with a team as strong as the Lakers. Coach John Oswald said while discussing Cass City's 64-48 loss to the visiting powerhouse Friday night.

Our shooting percentage was only 27 per cent, he continued, and that's not good enough to beat a good team.

The Hawks will have to be better to defeat the Frankmunth Eagles who come to town Friday in the last game before the holidays.

The Eagles' invasion will mark the third straight game against top teams by Cass City. A victory is a must if Cass City is to make a showing in the race.

The Lakers posted margins in every quarter, but it was not until half way through the third period that the visitors capitalized on their husky forward wall to salt away the game.

The visitors opened a big lead in the first period as they burned the nets for a 17-3 advantage. They added to the margin in the second period as they edged Cass City 12-9 in a low scoring effort.

A few days ago one of our taxpayers of the gentler sex asked Ed, "Why do you always have to stretch our money to cover all the gifts we have to buy? Why does tax time have to come at Christmas time?"

And here's a story that might be summarized: "AA to MOM to DAD: SOS."

In this electronic age, one of the problems of childhood is to find (or make) opportunities for using your walkie-talkie. An ingenious lad like Andy Auten will take his set to school and make a date to speak to his mother at recess.

But not until a recent Sunday did this device attain its maximum usefulness. Andy had arrived at Sunday School, neatly dressed and carrying his trusty walkie-talkie, secure in the knowledge that his mother had promised to listen in at 10 o'clock. But when he walked into the room his cousin Barbara exclaimed, "Andy Auten, the junior choir is going to sing today, and you forgot to wear a white shirt!"

Never one to be nonplussed, Andy promptly called his mother and explained his plight. So Dad was quickly called into action, and brought the appropriate shirt to the church in plenty of time for the processional hymn.

Agricultural research is constantly being carried on at MSU in the hope of finding better varieties of crops and livestock, and better methods of pest control and food handling.

Hydro-Handling, a new system for sizing and sorting apples without bruising them, depends on the fact that apples bob up and down in water. The apples are sub-

merged in tanks of water below screens having meshes of different sizes. The little culls bob up through the screens and so can be discarded before the apples are put into storage, possibly saving Michigan growers as much as \$1 million a year in storage costs.

Did you ever stop to think why apples stay firm and fresh in cold storage, but begin to shrink and shrivel in ordinary air? The secret lies in the fact that an apple is still alive after it is picked, just as a cut flower is. It continues to breathe as long as it is surrounded by the cool moist air of the cold storage room, but after being out in the hot dry thirsty air of a modern home for a while it wilts, just as flowers wilt in a vase without water.

A new propulsion system which allows vehicles to operate without traction is being developed in MSU's agricultural engineering department. Remember how you used to sit on a sled and jerk your body backward and forward until the sled started down the hill? This same sort of inertia propulsion is being studied for farm use.

"The inertia propulsion machine has no wheel drive, no drive shaft, no transmission and no gears. Instead, it has movable weights attached to the machine which are forced slowly forward, then rapidly pulled back. The weights swinging rapidly backward supply the force to move the vehicle forward."

This seems just too good to be true...almost like lifting yourself by your own bootstraps. Or, as Jim Reagh remarked, "It sounds like perpetual motion." But if they can make it work (and nothing seems to be impossible any more) "tractors would travel smoothly through mud and mire. Heavy army vehicles could conquer the roughest terrain without slippage." Meanwhile, I'll just have to drive carefully and trust the snow tires I got from Fred Martin.

Jim Reagh tells me a local inventor is working on a perpetual motion machine. When this starts to hum, read about it first in the Chronicle!



Hog Market May Be Due for Decline

Hog farmers have had two good years in succession and Alfred Ballweg, County Extension Agricultural Agent, says history believes that 1967 will be the year for swine producers to "watch out".

Since hog numbers can be multiplied quite rapidly, expansion following higher prices has been the rule. This larger number on the market then causes a tumble in prices.

Ralph E. Hepp, Michigan State University agricultural economist, says: "Farmers who start to raise hogs when hog prices are up and drop out when prices hit bottom very seldom make any money. They are usually getting out when the prices are on the up-swing and moving in when the prices are on the down-swing."

The county agent says this advice from the MSU authority should be good for farmers trying to decide whether they should raise a few hogs.

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

One of the worst things they found, the report said, was they fill up 2.4 million pages a year with inter-office memos, instructions and communications. Half of them are worth a rejected quarter.

On Maneuvers

Gunner's Mate Second Class Ralph Leyva, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph D. Leyva Sr. of Gagetown, is on maneuvers aboard the USS Plymouth Rock in the mid-Atlantic and Caribbean Sea, as part of "Lantflex-66", the largest composite training exercise for the U. S. Atlantic fleet this year.

It is soon Christmas and I would like to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a real Happy New Year. I would have liked to send each of you a personal Christmas card but it would have been hard so I have to do it through the Cass City Chronicle instead.

I suppose the preparations have started in Cass City too. I suppose most of you have already made your fruit cakes. Generally we don't make fruit cakes but we always make cinnamon cookies.

We make cinnamon cookie hearts decorated with frosting and candies. We hang them in our Xmas tree. Yesterday my mother made our cinnamon cookie house. She makes a landscape of evergreens, animals and small fairies and there she puts the house. You are not supposed to eat it until after Christmas. But when you have kids in the house the candies on the roof generally disappears quite early. Sometimes they even take a piece of the walls before X-mas is over.

You could say that the Xmas celebrations start already the 13th of December, here in Sweden. That's when we have our famous Lucia. She is the girl dressed in a white gown and with a crown covered with green leaves and with candles. She comes with other girls also dressed in white but with a candle in their hands instead of the candle crown. They all sing the beautiful Lucia song and other Christmas carols.

Every town (almost) elect their own Lucia and we also have a national Lucia. She is the one that comes and wakes the Nobel prize winner's up with coffee when they at this time comes to Stockholm to get their prizes.

We have a three week vacation from school from the 17th of Dec. to the 9th of Jan. This is between semesters. We get our report cards before this vacation.

The Swedes eat an awful much, and Christmas is the time of the year when we eat most of all. On a Swedish "Tulbord" (Christmas smorgasbord) you find many, many dishes. You always find a big ham and a smoked pig's head decorated with frosting and with a big red apple in its mouth.

Christmas Eve is the most celebrated day of Christmas. That's when Santa Claus comes with the gifts etc.

We eat "lut fisk" or Christmas Eve fish and for dessert we have rice milk porridge. At 6 o'clock Christmas Day we leave for the Christmas Day early service. Before you leave home you turn on all the lights in your house so it lights up the dark outside.

I hope you all will have a wonderful Christmas and a real happy and successful new year.







DHIA Holds Annual Meeting

Members of the Tuscola county dairy herd improvement association gathered for their annual meeting at the 4-H Club Building, Caro, Wednesday, Dec. 7.

Ron Hampshire, board chairman for the past year and a Kingston area dairyman, led the group in a discussion of problems which occurred during the year, along with some plans for state and county reorganization of the Dairy Herd Improvement testing program in Michigan.

The annual report was presented by David Greenleaf, former supervisor-tester for Tuscola county now serving as lab technician.

Charlie Lassiter, head of the Dairy Department at Michigan State University, discussed problems of reorganization with the membership. He discussed the outlook for the dairy farmer in coming years.
