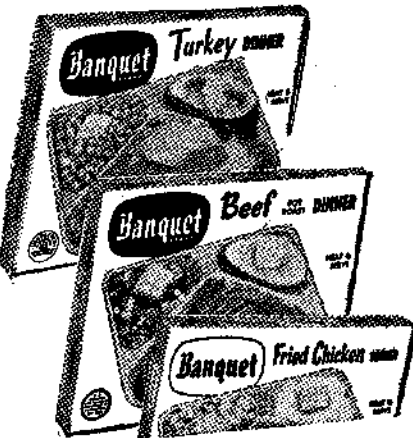

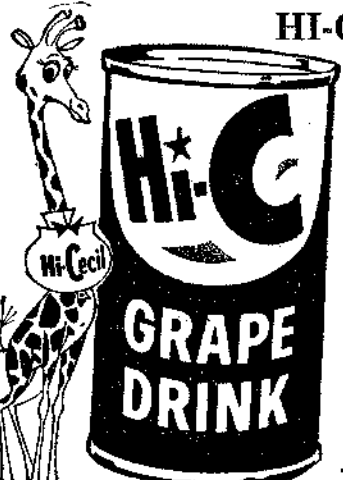

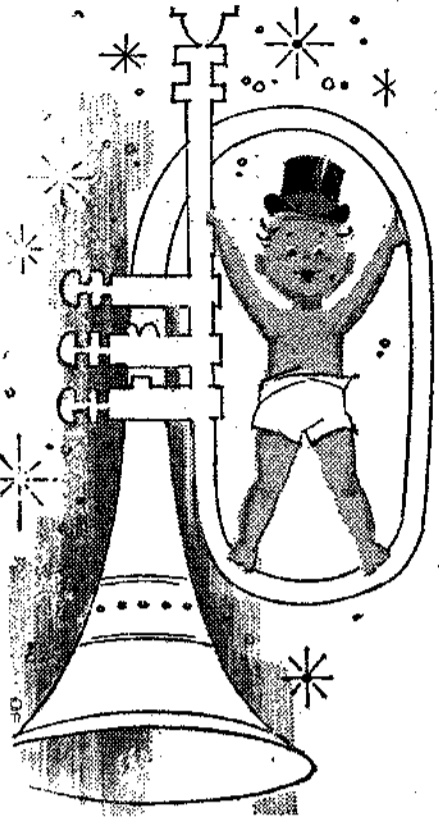

### Hostetler's Hodgepodge

## A New School Isn't The Complete Answer

One of the disadvantages of living in a small town is that you watch the babies grow up to be children and young people. And then about the time they attain adulthood they move away to the cities.

But during the holidays they come back, and their coming stirs heart-warming memories of experiences out of the past.

A few days ago an attractive young nurse spoke to me in the hallway of Hills and Dales Hospital. "I don't suppose you remember me, but you were my Latin teacher in Kinde several years ago. My name was Etzler at that time, and now it is Fuester, and I live in Caro."

I did indeed remember Elaine Etzler as one of the best students in a class I had taught once upon a time, and as the memories gradually floated to the surface the following story reconstructed itself.

After the Kinde high school burned down on a bitter February night in 1953, the Board of Education found it necessary to hold classes in the educational rooms of the three Kinde churches until the new building could be completed.

That fall several students wanted to study Latin (which in those days was considered a prerequisite for nursing, so that the nurses could more intelligently read the Latin medical and pharmaceutical terms). Since no faculty member at that time was qualified to teach it to them, it was decided that they should take the course by correspondence from the University of Michigan, and that I should be their non-certified tutor. They met in my study for several months, and were making fairly good progress, as I recall it. Then the new building was ready to use, and school bus transportation to the various centers was discontinued, so it seemed convenient for the Latin class to meet at the school building. But the only available space was in one end of a storage room, the other end of which was serving temporarily as a principal's office. The confusion in the room was so great that the tutoring sessions were held less and less frequently, until finally each student was endeavoring to carry on the correspondence course by himself. But, as so often happens with correspondence courses, most of the students quit before completing the work. The moral of this story is that having a new school building won't solve all of your problems, and may

even create some of its own.

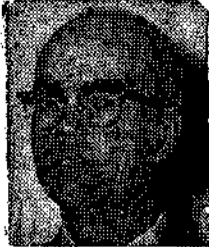

**Explains How A Bill Works Its Way Through State Legislature**

**Bills Vs. Laws**  
Michigan citizens can see the beginning of a legislative session which promises to be very interesting for those who understand the procedure.  
To the uninitiated, however, the myriad activities which attend the lawmaking process can be very confusing. Newspaper accounts can easily give the impression a bill is dead when actually it can be revived in numerous ways.  
By law, the Michigan legislative session starts each year at noon the second Wednesday of January. Proposed laws are known as "bills" from the time they are introduced until they have been

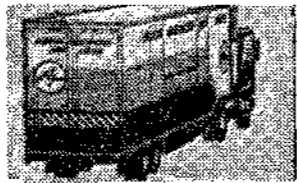
passed by both houses and been considered by the Governor, when they become "laws" unless turned down by the chief executive.

Between introduction and final approval, the bill is designated by number and-or title. It is read a first and second time, usually by title only, when it is formally introduced.

At this time it is referred to a committee for study. If approved by the committee, it is brought back to the membership of the house where it was introduced. Debate follows, first informal and then the "third reading" or formal stage.

If a bill passes by recorded vote after third reading, it goes to the second house for the same procedure of committee consideration and floor debate and vote and is sent to the Governor.

Confusion can arise if a bill fails in either house. It can be re-referred to committee and brought out again at a later date in the session, or it can be reconsidered for an additional vote.

**Stop Growing**  
Recent emphasis in education is to provide high school learning for every child and advanced training to all who desire it.

Vast programs of financial aid, in forms of scholarships and loans, were established in an attempt to assure funds.

Result of this trend has been almost astronomical growth of both public and private colleges and universities in terms of physical expansion and enrollment

hikes.  
Now comes a Michigan State University spokesman with considerable rank urging thought to the idea that colleges are being taxed for education to the point of diminishing returns.

MSU has seen its enrollment more than double in the past 15 years. Its faculty has grown from 900 to more than 1,900 in the same period. Graduate student enrollments have nearly tripled. The campus has developed into a small city, requiring bus service to transport students from dorms to classrooms.

Dr. Howard R. Neville, MSU provost, is not offering a firm plan for slowing down future growth of the institution. He is simply offering ideas to be considered.

"The question now arises: Might we best serve our land and time now by developing and emphasizing quality in every branch of our undertaking?" he submits.

Without management of size in line with available resources, Neville contends the university cannot meet its obligations to the students it seeks to educate.

Expansion of programs has been nearly as extensive in the past 15 years as the enrollment and staff levels. Neville suggests it is time to level off this area of expansion also.

In short, Neville suggests it is time for MSU to consider the essential question of whether it is as good as it should be.

New Angle  
"Pairings" will soon be made for one of the oldest traditions in

the 14-year history of Michigan Week: the Mayors' Exchange.  
Held each year on the Monday of the annual brag week, the exchange of local executives gives the individuals involved just a brief look at each others' problems.

The past several years nearly 500 communities have taken part in the exchange. A similar number is expected for the 1967 observance the third week in May.

Monday of Michigan Week is designated as "Our Government Day," when various departments of government at all levels hold open houses and special recognition is given to public officials.

For several years, participating communities have been given the option of being exchanged in population classifications or in a general grouping.

Plans are made early for the exchanges so that participating towns know who their guest will be and committees and the citizenry can give a royal welcome to the visiting dignitary from another Michigan community.

BOOK REVIEW  
**It's A Crackerjack of A Suspense Story**

By Rev. R. J. Searls

The Last Valley by Ben Haas introduced me to a rising new novelist on the American literary scene. Simple, uncluttered style of writing, unadorned with extraneous material, yet complete with all the detail so necessary if the reader is to be carried away with the plot, this novel hedges well for the future of Mr. Haas and the American literary market.

As the story begins, we join with retired General Ballard being welcomed home to the town of his childhood after a life of military service to a grateful country. A widower, with two sons from whom he is estranged, he has chosen to retire in the region of Appalachia in which he had been raised. Battle weary, the general desires to be left alone, accompanied only by his Negro aide, to write his memoirs (already contracted for by a publisher).

On the motorcade between the airport and the town of Skyline, he goes past the Indian Reservation which was only a sleepy place when he was growing up, but now is a place of neon lights and souvenir stands. Skyline, alone, shows no change. Greenway County, of which Skyline is a part, has applied for aid under the federal government's program of extending aid to depressed areas.

Later, while driving around the area to familiarize himself with the changes in the community, he drives in Brewer's Cove, which once had been the home of the first girl he had ever loved. He discovered living there a young man named Russel Grant, a sardonic youth who is convalescing from a not-disclosed illness.

A lot of very good description marks the public hearing on the dam, including an attorney that comes just this side of being over-drawn. Another good personality portrait is that of a rather senile state senator. All through the novel we see the frustration of the general; and all through the novel we are witness to the regeneration of Russel Grant - who has become a sort of private secretary to the general. In the end we are treated to a different kind of ending than we have been prepared for.

In addition to being a crackerjack of a suspense story, this book also is a good sociological detail of a general's readjustment to the ordinary life.

You'll like this book; at least, I did.

**Dennis A. Wright**  
Serving in Vietnam

Seaman Dennis A. Wright, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Wright of Doerr Road, Cass City, is serving off the coast of Vietnam as a crewmember aboard the destroyer USS Norris.

The Norris, since arrival on station late November, has fired nearly 60 tons of high explosives at 214 enemy targets.

During a 32-hour period recently she fired 827 rounds of ammunition from 1,400 yards offshore, destroying 33 enemy structures, seven tunnels and three bunkers in addition to three sampans in nearby waters.

**"Fake-Fur" Poses Sewing Problem**

Whether you're using "fake-fur" to make toy cats and dogs for gifts, or to make coats or other winter wearables, you'll find sewing on this type fabric a challenge.

Mrs. Ann Ross, extension home economist in the Thumb, says the same guides for buying any fabric need to be applied in buying fur-like fabric. Check the label for shrinkage. A knit-back fabric may shrink excessively. If the fabric is to be used only for toys, this would not be as much of a problem. If the fabric is washable, are there directions on how to make the fur return to its original look?

Most fur-fabrics have a definite nap direction. This means garment pieces must be cut with the pile running in one direction. For the amount to buy, use your pattern yardage guide for fabrics "with nap" and the "same" directions for cutting. The "fur" nap should run down on a garment, according to Mrs. Ross.

Cutting fur-fabrics presents some problems. Laying the pattern on the back rather than on the pile side makes it easier to pin the pattern firmly. If the pile is thick, cut just one thickness at a time. In fact, pile may be easier to control if you cut with a razor blade rather than scissors.

As for the actual sewing, loosen the tension slightly and use a light pressure. Use about 10 stitches to the inch, heavy duty thread and a size 14 or medium size needle.

To prevent "creeping" of pile fabrics baste before machine stitching. Stitching in the same direction that the pile lies eliminates some puckering. Turn to the right side and with a needle pull up the "fur" that has been trapped in the seam. To eliminate bulk shear the pile from the inside seam allowances. And do not press seams with an iron as it may shrink or mat the fabric. Finger-press only, Mrs. Ross says.
