Assessed Value Of Village Land Due for Boost

Look for the valuation of property in Cass City to jump some 39 per cent next year as the village moves to state equalized valuation, President Lambert Althaver told members of the council Tuesday evening at the municipal

According to a conversation I had with Ed Golding (Elkland Supervisor) the law requires that townships be on State equalized valuation by Jan. 1 and that the village assess at the same rate as

the township, Althaver said. Most of the property valuations are similar now, he continued, but there are a few discrepancies. These must be changed and all

of the valuations boosted. At the present time the valuation in Cass City is \$5,131,000. Under State equalized valuation the

valuation will be \$7,029,000. If the 13-mill rate remained the same as it is today (13 mills) taxes would jump from \$66,000 to \$92,000. Althour said that it is obvious that the village could not

raise taxes this high. What will probably be done is that the mill rate will be lowered. However, it is almost a certainty that taxes will be substantially

raised in the village next year. Prior to the discussion about raising the valuation, the council was casting about for ways to increase village revenues. In the November session a 13 per cent raise was bandied about by the

Marine Sgt. Mike Wesolowski, 21, of Kingston has experienced either a very lucky life in service of his country or a very unlucky one. . . .depending on your view-

If you take the positive approach, you'll say that any young man that has been injured three times and served two tours overseas in a four-year enlistment is lucky to be recovered and in the obvious good health that he now

In addition, you'll note that Wesolowski is married to a pretty, young girl who completed her college education while her husband was in service and with a fine, healthy seven-month-old son, Michael Steven, is sitting on top of

And he is. But the other side of the coin is that many servicemen complete their entire hitch in the service without serving overseas in a combat area, suffering any wounds or other hardships. At the very least, most men have a year or so of state-side duty before taking off for foreign shores.

Not so with Mike, the son of the Leo Anthony Wesolowskis of Decker. He enlisted in the Marines July 22, 1963, shortly after graduating from Marlette High School. Five months later he was floating off the coast of Vietnam. He served overseas until April 22, 1965, when he returned home. A week later he married Corrinne Moore

It wasn't long before the accelerated Vietnam war called him back into combat duty in his Marine infantry company,

It was in June this year that a series of accidents started that eventually caused Wesolowski to be rotated to the United States. June 15 he was part of a 21-man



Village Crew Asks Pay Hike Of 15 Per Cent

Employees of the village Tuesday submitted a written request for a substantial boost in salaries

According to a letter to the council, hourly rated employees are asking for about a 15 per cent increase across the board.

Hourly men want a 35 cent an hour raise and salaried personnel a straight 15 per cent raise. President Lambert Althaver said that the requests would be carefully reviewed, but that it was exceedingly doubtful if the budget would stand an increased cost of this kind.

Although salaries in the department were quite low two or three years ago, Althaver said, and the area has been subject to increasing wage costs, the village has raised salaries by 30 per cent in three years. Fringe benefits have also been established that add 10 per cent to the cost.

At the present time wages for hourly rated employees range from \$1.85 to \$2:02 per hour and for salaried employees \$105.77 to \$146 per week.

Delta College will offer its first out of district extension course in early February when introductory speech will be made available for college credit at Cass City High School, Donald J. Carlyon, Delta acting president announced today.

Instructor will be Mrs. Richard W. Drews of Cass City, a former English instructor at Muskegon Community College. Mrs. Drews earned her BA in speech at Adrian College and MA from the University of Michigan.

Preregistration with George W. Elliot, counselor at Cass City High, or Donald G. Crouse, superintendent of schools, Cass City, is requested before counseling tests are given Jan. 11 and 12 from 7:30 p. m. to 10 p. m. in Room 30 of the high school,

Attendance both nights is required for matriculation. Course fee is \$17 per credit hour for the three hour class. There also is a \$10 registration fee.

The textbook "Creative Speech" by Stonge, will be available at the first class session, which school authorities say will be announced shortly. Special counseling is available following the two nights of general examinations.

The course will be offered to any adult with college or high school transcripts and to selected high school seniors.





Hostetler's Hodgepodge

A New School Isn't The Complete Answer

One of the disadvantages of living in a small town is that you watch the babies grow up to be children and young people, and then about the time they attain adulthood they move away to the

But during the holidays they come back, and their coming stirs heart-warming memories of experiences out of the past.

A few days ago an attractive young nurse spoke to me in the hallway of Hills and Dales Hospital. "I don't suppose you remember me, but you were my Latin teacher in Kinde several years ago. My name was Etzler at that time, and now it is Fuester, and I live in Caro."

I did indeed remember Elaine Etzler as one of the best students in a class I had taught once upon a time, and as the memories gradually floated to the surface the following story reconstructed it-

After the Kinde high school burned down on a bitter February night in 1953, the Board of Education found it necessary to hold classes in the educational rooms of the three Kinde churches until the new building could be com-That fall several students wanted

to study Latin (which in those days was considered a prerequisite for nursing, so that the nurses could more intelligently read the Latin medical and pharmaceutical terms). Since no faculty member at that time was qualified to teach it to them it was decided that they should take the course by correspondence from the University of Michigan, and that I should be their non-certified tutor. They met in my study for several months, and were making fairly good progress, as I recall it. Then the new building was ready to use, and school bus transportation to the various centers was discontinued so it seemed convenient for the Latin class to meet at the school building. But the only available space was in one end of a storage room. . . the other end of which was serving temporarily as a principal's office. The confusion in the room was so great that the tutoring sessions were held less and less frequently, until finally each student was endeavoring to carry on the correspondence course by himself. But, as so often correspondence courses, most of the students quit before completing the work. The moral of this story is that having new school building won't solve all of your probems, and may

beginning of a legislative session which promises to be very interesting for those who understand the procedure.

To the uninitiated, however, the myriad activities which attend the lawmaking process can be very confusing. Newspaper accounts can easily give the impression a bill is dead when actually it can

be revived in numerous ways. By law, the Michigan legislative session starts each year at noon the second Wednesday of January. Proposed laws are known as "bills" from the time they are introduced until they have been

> Between introduction and final approval, the bill is designated by number and-or title. It is read a first and second title, usually by title only, when it is formally introduced.

At this time it is referred to a committee for study. If approved by the committee, it is brought back to the membership of the house where it was introduced. Debate follows, first informal and then the "third reading" or formal

If a bill passes by recorded vote after third reading, it goes to the second house for the same procedure of committee consideration and floor debate and vote and is sent to the Governor.

Confusion can arise if a bill fails in either house. It can be re-referred to committee and brought out again at a later date in the session, or it can be reconsidered for an additional vote.

Stop Growing Recent emphasis in education is to provide high school learning for every child and advanced training

to all who desire it. Vast programs of financial aid, in forms of scholarships and loans. were established in an attempt to assure funds.

Result of this trend has been almost astronomical growth of both public and private colleges and universities in terms of physi-Caro cal expansion and enrollment

Now comes a Michigan State University spokesman with considerable rank urging thought to the idea that colleges are being taxed for education to the point of di-

minishing returns. MSU has seen its enrol'ment more than double in the past 15 years. Its faculty has grown from 900 to more than 1,900 in the same period. Graduate student enrollments have nearly tripled. The campus has developed into a small city, requiring bus service to transport students from dorms to class-

Dr. Howard R. Neville, MSU provost, is not offering a firm plan for slowing down future growth of the institution. He is simply offering ideas to be considered.

"The question now arises:

Might we best serve our land and time now by developing and emphasizing quality in every branch of our undertaking?" he submits, Without management of size in line with available resources, Neville contends the university cannot meet its obligations to the

students it seeks to educate. Expansion of programs has been nearly as extensive in the past 15 years as the enrollment and staff levels. Neville suggests it is time to level off this area of expansion

In short, Neville suggests it is time for MSU to consider the essential question of whether it is as good as it should be

Living with them, caring for the dying grandfather, Ballard discovers, is a former schoolmarm to whom Ballard proposes and who accepts. The unifying theme in which all these people find them-selves involved, is the attempt of Skyline power company to flood Crowder Valley, erecting one more power dam at its narrowest point. Ballard finds that the power company charges residents more for the electricity they use than they charge an out-of-state firm, that
