### Caroite **Guilty of** Perjury

Pre-sentence investigation was ordered for a Vassar man after he pleaded guilty to perjury and a Caro man was found guilty of violating probation in

criminal court action Monday. Cases were heard before Circuit Court Judge James P. Churchill in the Tuscola county courthouse. Charles Slater pleaded guilty

to perjury in action stemming from a Feb. 1967 case heard before Justice Frank J. Rolka in Caro. Slater, the State's witness at the time, testified that Harold Audinet, also of Vassar, had furnished alcoholic

beverages to minors. Audinet was found innocent. Slater's bond has been continued until his July 31 sen-

#### tencing date. Richard Brock of Caro was found guilty of probation violation for breaking a curfew

set as a part of his parole sentence. Brock was on probation for the July 22, 1966, breaking and entering of the Club Restaurant owned by Mable and Leslie Hejzer.

The thought of summer school--the missed ballgames and stuffy classrooms--once brought instant panic into the hearts of every red-blooded boy and girl. Now it's a different story.

"It's a fun way to learn," said 11-year-old Sheila Guc about the program where individual attention can be given to each student. Others were just as enthusiastic about learning with story problems, practice slates and the SRA (Science, Research, Associates') Reading Kit that teaches reading for comprehension, speed and listening.

Approximately 75 regular session students are enrolled in the summer program under the direction of Donald Crouse, superintendent of schools. This point is made clear, too, by the children themselves who make no bones about liking the summer program. They are interested and enthused about their work, said Mrs. Cardew. ### Drownproof your Family





You can drownproof your family this summer by teaching them a new floating technique. The method, developed by Professor Fred R. Lanoue, head swimming coach at Georgia Institute of Technology, is simple. According to him, most people drown because they panic; they exhaust themselves needlessly and soon go down. Object of Lanoue's method is to relax, make use of your built-in floating power without trying to overwork it by keeping the whole head above water. His six-step technique is shown above. In step 1), the student takes a deep breath and plunges in, allowing himself to stay submerged, face down. While exhaling in a normal breathing pattern, he slowly raises his arms 2) and when he needs to inhale, 3) he gently pushes down with his arms, forcing just enough of his head above water to breathe. In step 4) he inhales quickly through the mouth and lets himself sink again. Two common errors are trying to breathe twice during this stroke, and to get the head too far out of water. Both waste energy. In step 5) he will sink because he has just pushed his head above water, a motion which has overcome his natural buoyancy. The less the head is raised when taking a breath, the less the body will sink. In 6) he has once again bobbed to the surface, exhaling as he regains this natural position, and is now ready to start over. In practice, the rhythm of these motions can be timed to a comfortable breathing speed. You should not wait to breathe until absolutely necessary. -- Mich. Dept. of Conservation

## By County Agent To Buy or Hire? **Costs Compared**

More farmers are asking the question: "Should I own my own equipment and do this job or hire a custom operator?"

This is particularly true of harvesting machines, says Alfred Ballweg, County Extension Agricultural Agent, adding that the use of such equipment is very seasonable and the total hours used on one farm is quite small.

The agent says when hiring a custom operator, the harvesting cost is known and agreed upon in advance. But when the machine is owned the farmer is never quite sure what it costs. Operating costs could include such items as fuel. lubricants, twine, or wire, and labor in addition to the annual fixed cost.

Fixed costs include the deto call on him for help when preciation on investment rewe feel overwhelmed by the pairs and maintenance, insur-

consider this cost as from 15 to 20 per cent annually of the cost of a new machine.

Once the farmer figures the fixed costs, he can estimate the operating cost and arrive at a figure which may be close to the actual cost of owning his own machine and doing the job himself. This could then be compared with what the custom operator charges.

Some farmers have made the Mrs. James Sangster and Mr. decision to buy the machine and and Mrs. Harold Ferguson and help pay for it by becoming a custom operator. This is good business if the farmer is a good manager and does not have enough employment on his own farm to keep him busy. the agent believes. In most localities there is a good demand for efficient custom operators.

Letter to Editor

June 24, 1967 follows:

Dear Mr. Editor,

I would like to try to answer a letter written to you, dated June 2, 1967 from A Veteran's Daughter, J. Behr, regarding the placing of small American Flags on the Veterans' graves in Elkland cemetery on Memorial Day and the removing of same the following day.

The writer maintained that the flags should be left on the graves the year around and thought "they were placed there by Cass City to make it look good on Memorial Day, the one day out-side public could see them."

First let me say that these small American Flags are placed on the Veterans' graves by Mr. Charles Bigelow, the Sexton of Elkland cemetery and are paid for by Elkland township and not by Cass City. Approximately 300 flags are placed on the known and designated Veterans' graves; however unfortunately some of the graves are not marked with staffs and therefore some are inadvertently missed; however, if Mr. Bigelow is notified he will see that all are taken care of.

As President of the American Legion Auxiliary of Tri-County Post No. 507 of Cass City I would like to explain the possible reason these flags are removed by the Sexton after Memorial Day.

According to our Current Unit Handbook of The American Legion Auxiliary, under Chapter entitled: "Flag Law and Inter-pretations" (Public Law 829-Seventy-Seventh Congress -Chapter 806 - Second Session -H. J. Res. 359),

I quote, in part: "Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled, That Public Law Numbered 623, approved June 22, 1942, entitled "Joint Resolution to Codify and emphasize existing rules and customs pertaining to the display and use of the flag of the United States of America, "Be, and the same is hereby amended to read as

That the following Codification of existing rules and customs pertaining to the use of the flag of the United States of America be, and it is hereby established for the use of such civilians or civilian groups or organizations as may not be required to conform with regulations promulgated by one or more executive departments of the government of the United

States. Sec. 2 (a) It is a universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings or on stationary flagstaffs in the open. However, the flag may be displayed at night upon special occasions when it is desired to produce a patriotic

effect. Under Section entitled "Interpretations", I quote, in part: 12. Q. "When should small Flags displayed on graves on Memorial Day be removed."

A, "The Flags should be removed, beginning the next day; however, if the staffs have been firmly-inserted into the ground or securely fastened to the cross or tombstone, so that they will not fall on the ground or be displaced with the staff at an angle other than vertical, the Flags need not be removed for several days, To permit them to remain until

they become soiled and torn shows flagrant disrespect to the Flag." End of Quote. I assume the township abides by these Flag Laws and Interpretations and therefore removes the Flags shortly after

Memorial Day. I, for one, would like to thank the township of Elkland and the Sexton of Elkland cemetery, Mr. Charles Bigelow for a job well done.

### **Proposed Channel Would Connect Island Lakes**

Michigan may become even more a "water wonderland" if proposal by John R. Snell is undertaken by the state.

Snell, former dean of MSU's College of Engineering and now president of a Lansing engineering company, proposes that a 300-ft,-wide channel connect a series of lakes to give Michigan an inland trans-state waterway.

Michigan Mirror

Water from Lake Huron would be pumped into the channel insomewhere near Port Huron. Using many available lakes and streams, the waterway would connect with the Looking Glass River near Lansing. From there it would cross above the Grand River and connect into the widened and improved Thornapple River and Battle Creek River. Eventually, the waterway would link into the Rabbit, Paw Paw, and Grand **Rivers flowing into Lake Mich**igan at three points.

A number of other rivers would interconnect, giving Michigan approximately 900 miles of connected passages for boats and more than 1,800 miles of shoreline.

would be deep Channels enough to handle cruisers up to 50 ft. in length.

Ample water supplies for much of the state would be one of the major benefits such a waterway would bring to the state. Many communities which now suffer water shortages would be provided with an endless supply from this sparkling, fresh resource. Increased recreational facilities is another benefit. Dams built along channel would provide hydro-electric power. A general "cleaning up" of existing lakes and rivers would accompany the construction of the channel, thus helping to eliminate current water pollution. Flood control and a boost to Michigan's tourist industry would be subsidiary benefits.

Snell estimates the cost at about \$490 million but notes that project expense could be recovered within ten years by selling the improved waterfront property for private development.
