She stopped again twice, but Gross continued, and each time she revived.

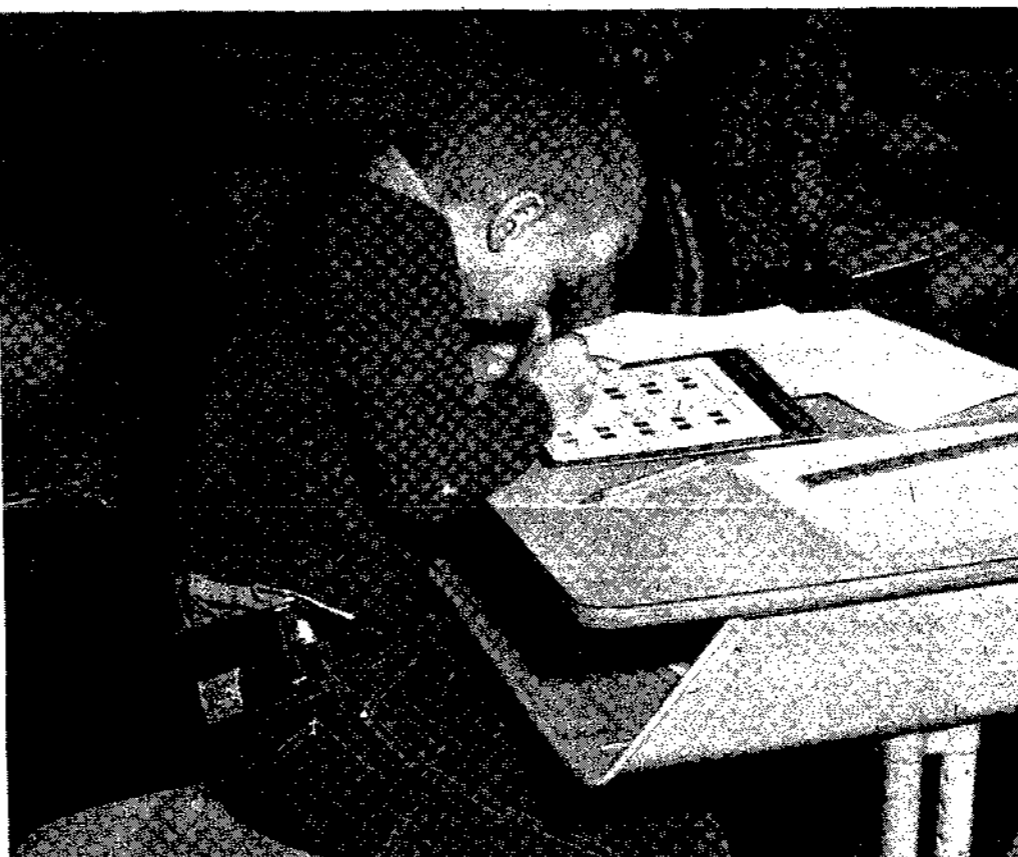

Robin struggled for air, and started to cry.

She was listed in satisfactory condition Tuesday.

High Acclaim! Even the Kids Like Summer School

Individual attention is possible in the summer program as the size of each class is limited to 16 pupils. This way if one student needs help in percentages, a second needs it in oral reading and one or two need it in "regrouping."

Mrs. Howarth and Mrs. Erma Cardew, fifth grade, stress that those attending summer school are not repeating grades or being punished for lessons missed in the regular session.

Approximately 75 regular session students are enrolled in the summer program under the direction of Donald Crouse, superintendent of schools. Run in half day sessions from 8:30 to 11:30 all students in grades one through five study math and reading.

One of the reasons for complete attendance, explains Mrs. Howarth, is that the children want to come back. They like summer school. Other teachers report similar enthusiasm in their classes.

Judy LaPratt 8th Crash Victim

Miss Judy LaPratt, 21, of Caro was one of two persons killed in traffic accidents in Tuscola county during the week bringing the county's death total for the year to eight.

Miss LaPratt is the sister of Mrs. Richard Spencer of Cass City. She was killed instantly at 2:50 a. m. Monday when her car crashed into a tree on M-24, two miles south of Caro.

Miss LaPratt was traveling north when the crash occurred. The car was demolished.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at Huston Funeral Home. Survivors include: her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carlton LaPratt; two sisters, Mrs. Spencer and Mrs. Mike Franzel of Caro; two brothers, David and Scott, both at home, and the grandparents.

Ken Rosenstangel, 22, of Cass City was a passenger in a car driven by Irvin Robert Schram, 23, of Gagetown as the Schram car skidded into a ditch at the intersection of Dickerson and Jacob Roads.

Schram was slowing his car where gravel road met the blacktop when he skidded.

No injuries were reported. The car received damages to the top and left front and rear.

LOSSES CONTROL

No injuries were reported in a Monday accident at Seeger Street, one half block south of Main when cars driven by Leola M. Masten, 66, of Postoria and William A. Parrott, 77, of Cass City collided.

Mrs. Masten said she saw Parrott coming down the street but did not see his turn signal indicating a left turn into the alley behind the Sinclair station.

Mrs. Masten was backing out from a parking space at the time of the accident. Parrott was traveling south at approximately 10 miles per hour when the collision occurred.

Parrott's car received damage to the left front fender and bumper. Mrs. Masten's car received damage to its left rear corner. She was issued a ticket by patrolman Jezewski for failure to yield the right of way.

No violations were indicated in a June 27 accident at the corner of Seeger and Houghton Streets.

Leona Marie LaFave, 30, of Gagetown was driving west on Houghton, and Patrick Francis Doyen, 35, of Cass City, was driving South on Seeger when their cars collided at the intersection.

The LaFave car was damaged at the right front end and door. Doyen's car was damaged on the left front end.

Mrs. LaFave stated she did not see the Doyen car because of cars parked at the corner intersection. Doyen also stated the parked cars obstructed his vision. He did not see the La-Fave car until just before the impact and skidded 48 feet trying to avoid the crash.

No injuries were reported.

Passengers in the Peters vehicle, Linda Sue Groth, 18, of Ruth, and James Smielewski, 15, of Ubyly suffered cuts and bruises.

Card Flood Starts Trickle of Cash To Cagey Company in California

A flood of cards designed to confuse area businessmen have inundated the Cass City area during the last week. The cards are clever, unscrupulous and somewhat effective.

In the upper left corner is a telephone book picture craftily printed in "yellow pages" yellow ink.

In the right top corner is the figure \$67.00 and below it the words: pay this amount by June 30, 1967.

At the very top in prominent position in capital letters is the wording: please return this card with your check.

In smaller letters on the lower left of the card is printed: this is a proposal form and not a bill, invoice or renewal.

The complete details of the contract are listed on the back of the card.

Persons bothering to read the fine print will find that for their money they are promised a listing in a directory to be published by the company. No mention of the number of copies, the exact distribution area, the extent of distribution or any other information is included.

The card has succeeded in getting \$67 from at least two businessmen, thinking that they were paying for classified listing in General Telephone of Michigan's yellow pages listing.

We were going to ignore the cards, District Manager Dick Drews said this week, but when we found that money was being sent we felt that subscribers should be warned that our yellow pages advertising has no connection with the advertising service with the address of Tarzana, Calif.

Program Great at Girls' State, Says Gloria Stine

Gloria's week of tours, lectures and mock governmental participation began with Sunday registration and meeting with the counselors who acted as guides for the 462 girls.

"Each girl belonged to a city, a county and a state," said Gloria. "There were 22 girls in a city, 66 in a county and 462 in the state."

Organized this way, the girls became familiarized with the governmental workings found at each level.

Gloria described a typical day as beginning at 7 a. m. --if you wanted to eat breakfast at 7:45.

After breakfast came the conventions or state meetings stated. Sometimes two or three in a day. Lectures on topics from civil rights to Vietnam to democracy were given by college professors or government employees who acted as the girls' advisors.

After lunch the girls were free until 3:30 when more meetings started. Bus tours of the campus, movies, skits and mock trials kept us busy until 11:30 every night, said Gloria.

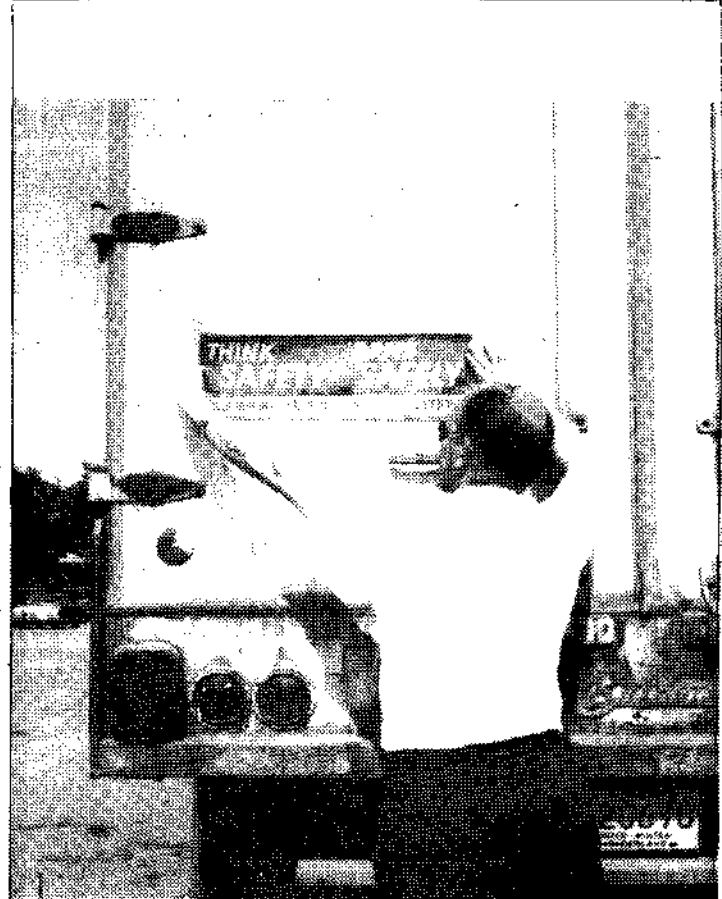

"I learned a lot about government, a lot that will help me in government class this fall," remarked Gloria, "... I wish I could go back."

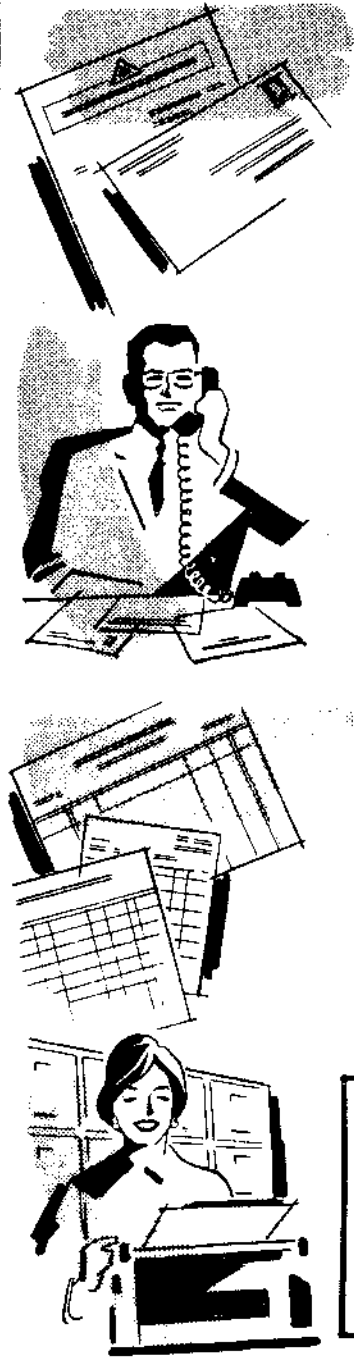
