### Last details set, landfill opens

land township and the village paid by the township. of Cass City has removed the last obstacle in the opening of the sanitary landfill south of Cass City and the new facility is now officially open although the village is still ironing out opening problems.

At a recent meeting Elkland township voted to pay \$1,300 of the cost of maintaining the new facility for the 1968 calendar year and went on record as wanting the village to establish a fee system infuture

The payment for the dump is an estimated third of the annual operating cost. It is a lower percentage than the 50 per cent the township paid to operate the old dump on River Road.

The figure was arrived at by figuring that about a third of the township residents live outside the village limits so the township should pay a third of the costs.

No allowance was made for the fact that persons in the village will pay the two thirds footed by the village and also

### Farmer faces fine for failing to file fire



There are some people who are not talented at the reading and writing which are basic in all our regular public schools, but who could earn a good living by doing something with their hands. Vocational training ought to be available for those who want it--whatever their age. If we had a few vocational high schools related to a community college, Judge Wills thinks many farmers, for example, would learn how to do welding and how to repair their own farm machinery, and this would give a boost to the agriculture in the Thumb.

Judge Wills said it is no longer true that it is extremely difficult to obtain a baby for adoption. At the present time there is a surplus of babies waiting to be adopted. It is, of course, still necessary to go through a period of interviews and home studies before an adoption can be completed, in order to assure a proper matching of home and child.

The Judge has figured out a formula for teen-age accidents. A teen-ager driving a car all by himself has a 5% chance of violating a traffic law. When two teen-agers are in a car. there is a 50% probability of a violation. If a car is packed full of youngsters, something is bound to happen. . . what one doesn't think of, the other will. It's the Judge's theory that an accident-prone young driver may be permitted to drive alone or with his parents, but not with other young people in the car.

It's a little more than 200 miles, as the crow flies, from Cass City to Sault Ste. Marie, If the crow continued north another 225 miles from the Soo, he'd come to Hearst, Ontario, a city of 2050 people. Somewhere in that vicinity (but too small to be on my map) is Cree Indian village named Calstock. And the teacher in the first three grades of the school on the reservation is Mary Stirton, granddaughter of Mrs. Archie Stirton.

"Parsonage" is a familiar term in Cass City for the residence provided for a parson. In Calstock the residence provided for a teacher is called a teacherage. Mary lives in a very comfortable teacherage with her younger sister Alison, who attends a secondary school in Hearst.

How would our Cass City first graders like to attend a school in which all the teachers spoke Japanese--but no English? Life would be difficult for both teacher and pupils. It has been said, "An Indian child begins school by learning a foreign language. The White Man's school is an alien land for an Indian child."

I found that quotation in the Canadian Indian Pavilion at Expo 67. . . one of the most moving exhibits we saw there. The Indians not only showed how ingeniously their people had coped with a difficult environment -- they also made the the white man wonder whether he might not have been too overbearing in his dealings with Other signs in the pavilion bore these messages: "When the White Man came

we welcomed him with love. We sheltered him, fed him, and led him through the wilderness. He could not have lived without us." "The early missionaries

thought we were pagans. They imposed on us their stories of God. But we spoke with God--the Great Spirit--in our own way."

We can't suppose that the Indians are entirely without bias in their understanding of the truth. But it's good for all of us to take time to look at things occasionally from the other person's point of view.

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

Spanish as well. Major problems face the young nation: secondary education, sanitation, poor economic conditions, lack of industries, and low agricultural production.

But the country enjoys an ideal climate, fertile soil, ample resources and a stable two-party system of gov-ernment patterned after that of the United States. Its Prime Minister, George Price, is an educated leader devoted to his country and its development as a strong, democratic nation.

Results of the Partnership are already apparent. Under the chairmanship of former Congressman Alvin Bentley of Owosso, the Michigan-Belize program was organized into 10 committees, each responsible for a different area of development. Each Michigan committee has a counterpart in Belize. The Michigan committee on public health, for example, communicates directly with the Belizean committee on public health.

This system has worked well in the short time the Partnership has existed, but much more needs to be done in the areas of agriculture, education, public health, business development and other important fields.

A membership drive is underway in Michigan to develop higher interest in the project and stimulate greater citizen participation. A small part of Belize's gratitude and respect for this state was reflected in the naming of three Belizean cities: Mount Pleasant, San Luis and San Ignacio. The Michigan flag is flown in Belize's Central Park, further dem-onstration of that country's appreciation.


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

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

Around The Farm 'Grocery' dollar buys more than food

By Alfred P. Ballweg

the supermarket to buy food for the family table, give a thought to the agricultural industry which made it possible. Cherries from Michigan, wheat products from the Dakotas. oranges from California, steak from Iowa--all right at your finger tips--as much as you wish to buy--processed according to your specifications. It's almost a modern-day miracle and perhaps it is. More realistically, it is part of the success story of American agriculture and too often it's taken for granted.

The next time you go into

Just look'at what agriculture has done for the consumer-vou and me. First, there is abundance.

Ninety percent of us can do our harvesting in the supermarket -- rather than on the farm. Ten percent of our population produces enough for all of us, and a little bit more. When we buy our food we know that it is the safest, cleanest, and most wholesome food in the world. Farmers, industry and the government are working together to see that food safety begins on the farm and doesn't end until it is in our hands.

We know that the products we buy are graded and inspected. This assures us that they were handled and processed under sanitary methods. Agricultural researchers are constantly working to develop new food products or to process established products in different ways. When we show our preference for a particular

type of product, agriculture

tries to get it for us. Look

around you on the supermarket shelves and you'll see a variety of "new" products. Time was when we didn't expect to buy many fresh fruits and vegetables--except when they were "in season". Not so today. Through the use of modern methods as vacuum cooling, refrigerated trucks and rail cars, agricul-

ture brings us farm fresh prod-

ucts twelve months of the year. What do all these benefits cost us? Actually they're costing us less each year. Today we only have to work 38 hours to buy what it took us 59 hours of work to purchase only 10 years ago. In a real sense, in relation to today's income, food prices are at the lowest point in history. And look what we're getting for our money. Over five million people process our vegetables, pack our meat, bake our bread, premix our foods and even prebake them. We're buying convenience right along with our

Incidentally, our grocery bill today often includes items previously bought elsewhere. Things such as items of clothing, cigarets, toilet articles, light bulbs, and what have you. Sometimes when we complain about high food prices, we aren't talking about food at all.

Where does our food dollar go? Only 38¢ goes to farmers.

The other 62¢ goes to processing, transportation, distribubusiness expenses and

Increased efficiency on the farm and in the other phases of our vast agricultural industry have helped keep food prices from rising as much as many other major expenses. Our food bill rose 15 per cent in the past 10 years and all of the increase was in costs beyond the farm. At the same time, housing costs rose 32 percent; transportation climbed 46 percent; medical care grew by 57 percent, and the average take-home pay jumped 59 per-

We in America have much to be thankful for, As consumers, can especially be thankful for an agricultural industry which provides us with nutritious, wholesome food in good supply and at low prices and in so doing it has helped achieve the highest level of living the world has ever



### Pros and cons of double-oven ranges

By Mrs. Ann Ross

Impartial scientific tests have been completed by Consumers Research on seven popular double oven electric ranges, according to Mrs. Ann Ross, Thumb Extension home economist.

The dazzling upper oven showed both advantages and disadvantages for the homemaker. This type of equipment contains in a relatively small space, both the cooking elements and two ovens.

While showing comparatively low efficiency in use of electricity, the upper oven's eyelevel location lends itself to better broiling of meats or toasting of breads. The foods are easier to see.

The upper oven may be so high that lifting a large roast in and out of the oven would be difficult.

Upper oven doors that swing out may cause heat to be momentarily intense at the level the homemaker's face. Counter balanced doors (which raise) may lessen the size of the interior of the oven.

Controls on cooking elements of many of the double oven

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ranges are thermally actuated switches which turn the heating elements on and off intermittently, depending on the position of the control knob. continuous control switches provide an infinite number of heat settings for added convenience.

One disadvantage of all models tested is that the upper oven restricts the freedom of use of the two rear cooking elements on the range top. It is difficult to place and remove large pots from the back burners if the front burners are in use. Some of the manufacturers have decreased the depth of the lower drawer and thereby lowered the height of the surface units to 32 or 33 inches from the floor as compared to the normal 36 inches counter height.

The research indicated that range hoods are considered necessary with double oven ranges to prevent condensation of moisture on the upper oven when food is being cooked in water on the burners. It is recommended that the hood be vented to the outside.

The testing agency recommends a built-in hood which is made expressly for the range purchased.

So far, self-cleaning upper ovens do not seem to be available. Self - cleaning lower ovens, including one with a window-in-door, are available and becoming increasingly pop-

Today's homemaker needs to consider carefully the features of new equipment and base her choices on knowledge as well as personal preferences.
