School. The SIECUS program is under attack from several conservative groups, including the John Birch Society, which calls sex education in schools a Communistic tactic.

School authorities in Cass City have been quick to point out that the program "A Time of Your Life* is not the same as the one under attack in the Detroit suburbs and across the nation.

drains, that is. County Road Commission workers and the Department of Conservation are plagued by eager beavers in the county where beavers have clogged drains to raise or maintain the water level around their lodges.

Ato the junction of Snover and English Roads southwest of Kingston, County Road Commissioner Robert Wellington reported workers have removed debris from drains 4 or 5 times.

The debris was removed each time when water levels at the junction reach a point threatening a road washout.

The road commission has asked the help of the Department of Conservation and Game Division officer Jim Geilhart reviewed the problem in conjunction meetings between the two departments.

Geilhart said a drain blockup by beaver activity could occur wherever beavers are able to detect the flow of water and wherever they can block that flow with sticks, reeds, and thatch. Geilhart said he would at-

tempt trapping some of the beaver with the intent of population control. He said if the beaver were impaired in their daily activities, it is possible they will leave the area and construct, a lodge elsewhere

Jim Hatch: old time pro recalls glory years of big band era

By RICHARD HAINES

The entertainment world has undergone fervent changes in the last several decades. A man close to those changes is Jim Hatch, Elkton resident, industrial administrator, and Cass City businessman.

"One of the biggest thrills of my life," he said, was his first "job" playing with a 12 piece band for the YWCA in Saginaw for \$1 apiece.

That was in 1931. And since then Jim Hatch, sax and clarinet player has been with bands and names that have spread from coast to coast and himself has managed big-name entertainment houses.

He played intermittently through high school and he recalls one particular percentage job in which each of 12 players made \$.10, except one playerwho broke a string and lost \$.15 because he had to pay \$.25 for a string.

One of the names in entertainment he's played with was the "Moonlight Serenaders", a name his band used which was later used by another band.

Reminiscing on entertainment, Hatch told how Southern Dixie was big up to about 1920 when a Chicago version of it took hold and got in full swing through the "roaring twenties" with dances like "the Black Bottom" and the "Charleston," The 30's and 40's was the

era of the big bands, he said as he recalled names like Guy Lombardo.

At the time James Hatch was a young man who liked to travel, see the world and playhis horn. In his early years, he played in Saginaw's "Green Mill" and "Moonlight Gardens." He recalls jazz sessions with Sagi-

naw and Bay Cityplayers, some of which, he said, "could play with anybody in the nation." There were small band opportunities too, he said. The early 30's saw every bar with a piano, a sax, and a set of drums. Those were days when you could get in with no cover charge, he said, and see a floor

was telling us last week about the Dalton Gang whose legendary finale was brought to an end in his home town of Coffey-

ville, Kansas. The auditor, John T. Tew, a careerist of about 30 with a noticeable Kansan accent did research on his hometown while in high school and also had a junior high teacher who was an authority on the notorious event in which the townspeople met gunfire to gunfire with the lawless Dalton

gang. The junior high teacher, H.H. Benifield, was six years old when on October 5, 1892, the gang came to town and attempted a double-bank robbery which ended in their own slaughter and the murder of four of the townspeople.

Benifield was in the small Kansan trading town on business and when the shooting started, Tew related, Benifield hid under a table on the second floor of a hardware store.

The gang had become legendary because of the Northfield Bank Robbery and numerous train robberies across the Oklahoma-Texas region.

In the gang of six there were three Dalton brothers, Leader Robert Dalton and Grant and Emmet Dalton.

With the sixth man outside of town waiting for them, they divided up and entered both banks. They had been in town a day or two and hadn't in the past committed any crimes in or near Coffeyville.

This was during a time in which townspeople, with poor communication to other regions, left even notorious newcomers alone until they committed a wrong,

The gunfire became fantastic as they exited the banks, except for Robert Dalton, who made for a bank's rear exit, shot square between the eyes an innocent hardware store owner on his way to the horses, only to be gunned down in return by the town sheriff who was waiting for them where their horses were at the rear of another store.

The only gang member who survived was Emmet Dalton who was lined up on the ground on main street along with his



legendary cohorts, the rest of

Michigan's pea beans are grown in the Thumb, the Saginaw Valley, and surrounding areas which have some of the most productive agricultural land in Michigan. However, some of the essential chemical elements needed for high crop yields may be deficient in some of these bean growing areas,

the agent says. Research at Michigan State University's Ferden Farm in Saginaw County and field studies by Dr. Lynn S. Robertson, MSU soil scientist, show fertilization on the basis of soil tests can bring most satisfactory results.

Naturally, if soil tests are low, a greater response is obtained from nitrogen than on land with high soil test levels. In 1968, high fertility plot yields were increased 8.5 bushels an acre by using 40 pounds of side-dressed nitrogen.

The use of banded plantingtime fertilizers increased bean yields greatly. Robertson reported the lowest yields, 22 bushels an acre, was on land where no planting-time fertilizer was used. The highest yields came when the highest rate of fertilizer was used. This was double -- 44 bushels an acre -- the yield from plots where no fertilizer was used. The
