#### FROM THE ditor's Corner

There is a rumor making the rounds that a few disgruntled parents are trying to drum up interest in taking the school to court to force the board to restore full-day classes in the grades.

It may well be, like the majority of the wild ideas that sweep around town, that this is only coffee-time conversation. Most ill conceived ideas never materialize because a more rational approach prevails.

And taking the school to court certainly looks from here as anything but a rational act. Any way you look at it, we all lose.

It's highly unlikely that any court case could have an effect on the class schedule this year. In Cass City the complete

nalf-day schedule will be over by the end of the semester. Long before any meaningful decision can be reached, the problem will have disappeared.

At this writing it is, of course, uncertain how the school board would react to an adverse lower court decision...judging by the initial decisions of the two cases tried in lower courts this year. the result would be a ruling in favor of full days for all students.

Whether or not an adverse decision would be appealed here is conjecture. Certainly, the board would be in an untenable position. On one hand required to run the school on a balanced budget and on the other required to run an education program that costs more than the taxpayers will provide.

The boards of the two metropolitan area districts that have lost lower court decisions have opted to appeal.

And this action removes the second of the only two possible reasons that a petition could serve any useful pur-

### Police crack down brings surge in fines

Magistrate John Bowles said this week that because of the erackdown on violators by law enforcement officials, tickets are pouring into the District Court at a record rate.

On an ordinary day in the past, Bowles said, this court would take in about \$415 in fines, costs and fees. Monday the total was \$840.

## Mushrooming membership moves union to new building

The spanking new headquarters for the AFL-CIOlocal 213 went on public display Sunday and the new building in Marlette reflects the rapidly expanding union membership in the Thumb area. The large 40 x 100-foot build-

ing features spacious offices and a large open area in the back suitable for meetings, dances and any other activities that the local may plan.

It was purchased from a Marlette physician for \$28,000 with \$8,000 down. The man who owns the building didn't want cash. President Roy Corlis of Kingston explained.

Union membership in the Thumb is rising rapidly...perhaps even more rapidly than industry is moving in.

When local 213 was chartered in 1961 there were just 35 members, all in one Mariette trailer plant. Today the local

represents 1,500 workers in 14 plants in Marlette, Cass City, Deckerville, Brown City, North Branch, Lapeer, Vassar and Sandusky. Included are Walbro Corpor-

ation and Anrod Screen Cylinder Co. in Cass City. We don't actively solicit membership in the union, Corlis



Swedes drive in the middle of a country road if there is no one coming from the opposite direction, and they often pass on a hill or curve.

Swedish police strictly enforce laws dealing with drinking drivers --- so much that Swedes will not drink if they are to drive. To illustrate this strict enforcement: If a person had been drinking and went to his car to sleep or smoke, he could be charged with driving under the influence simply for being in his car after drinking.

If there was to be one word associated with Sweden, it would have to be "sex." Whenever Sweden is mentioned, something about that topic comes up. In fact, the first morning I was in Sweden a Swedish ladv asked me jokingly, "I suppose you have heard all about Swedish sin?" I told them, "Oh, yes," and we all laughed. But Swedish morals are different. Most Swedes accept premarital relations as a part of growing up, a part of life. Children are given a complete sex education early in their school years, and parents take time to explain sex to their children, In Sweden "sex" is not a "hushhush" topic as it often is in the United States, Some people say 8 Swedes are "liberal" or "openminded\* while others prefer the terms "immoral" or "atheistic." The interesting highlight of this entire marketing procedure is the farmer is a big part of it to the point of supplying the valuable raw farm products.

Generally, except for the marketing of milk the individual farmer is not large enough to market his products directly to the processor.





Behind the Counter Diet supplements

According to the U.S. De-partment of Agriculture, a diet is "good" if it contains all of the recommended allowances of protein, calcium, iron, vitamin A, thiamine (B<sub>1</sub>), riboflavin (B<sub>2</sub>) and ascorbic acid (C).

Diets containing less than two-thirds of the standard for one or more of these nutrients are classed as "poor." A recent survey revealed that, by this definition, 20% of America's families have a poor diet.

Of the households surveyed, I to 2% had diets that were short in protein, iron, Vitamins B, or B; 8% in calcium; 10% in Vitamin A; and 13% in Vitamin C.

Nor were poor diets restricted to poor people. About 10% of the families with incomes above \$10,000 had problems with their food values.

Reports on this study have led many families to check their diets, and to supplement them where necessary with extra vitamins, or compounds containing calcium or iron.

Said Dr. Frederick J. Stare, Harvard nutritionist, commenting on the study: "I am positive that at least one-third of adolescents, particularly girls, have iron deficiency anemia. And this anemia results from poor diet."



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
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

White gas best for arsonists

ONE FOR THE ROAD

By Dan Marlowe

I received a rejection slip recently from an editor-friend on a short story I had sent him.

The story had a denouement in which a gas station attendant pumped gas over two men in the front seat of a car because they were attempting to hold him up, and the subsequent explosion was caused by sparks from one of the men's cigarettes.

My editor -friend wrote: "Dear Dan, We liked this one except for a scene of which we're not sure. We published a story recently in which it was shown that a lighted cigarette isn't hot enough to ignite gas-The research seemed correct, so we went along with it. I never realized my intention to experiment to test the theory, although I may soon if I can't sell our house, All best," To which I replied as fol-

"Dear Ernie: Question my story-writing ability all you like but never my research. Would you believe that the other writer and I could both be right? Let me tell you about gasoline. It's either write (clear) or colored, depending upon whether tetraethyl lead is used to increase its octane rating.

"If lead is present, the fuel has a dye mixed with it as a visual signal of the fact. And the so-called premium grades of fuel are actually LESS explosive than the regular grades. It's just that the premium grades are able to withstand greater compression without spontaneous ignition (knocking) and as a result produce greater power when used in engines.

"In the open air, though, gasoline behaves oddly. Actually, the liquid fuel does not burn. It's the fumes and vapor which burn, It's difficult to start a fire in a bowl of gasoline, and cigarettes or matches dropped into it will be snuffed out as if it were water. Provided it is in open air.

"If a piece of cloth is added to act as a wick, however, (As in a Molotov cocktail), vastly more vapor will be released and it can be ignited by a few sparks in exactly the same way that a cigarette lighter is ig-

"There are other considerations, of course. Inhot weather vaporation is always more rapid (anyone who ever had a car vapor-lock is aware of this), and a good breeze might dissipate the vapor too quickly to permit ignition. In my story it was the fumes inside the automobile which turned it into a bomb and which were to be ignited by the sparks from the cigarettes,

"A final point, man, as one friend to another; in regard to your house, if you do decide to burn it down, make sure you use a clear gas and not a colored gas. Unless white gas is used by an arsonist, the dye residue in the colored gas gives him away.

"Honestly, sometimes I think you literary types never committed a major crime!"
