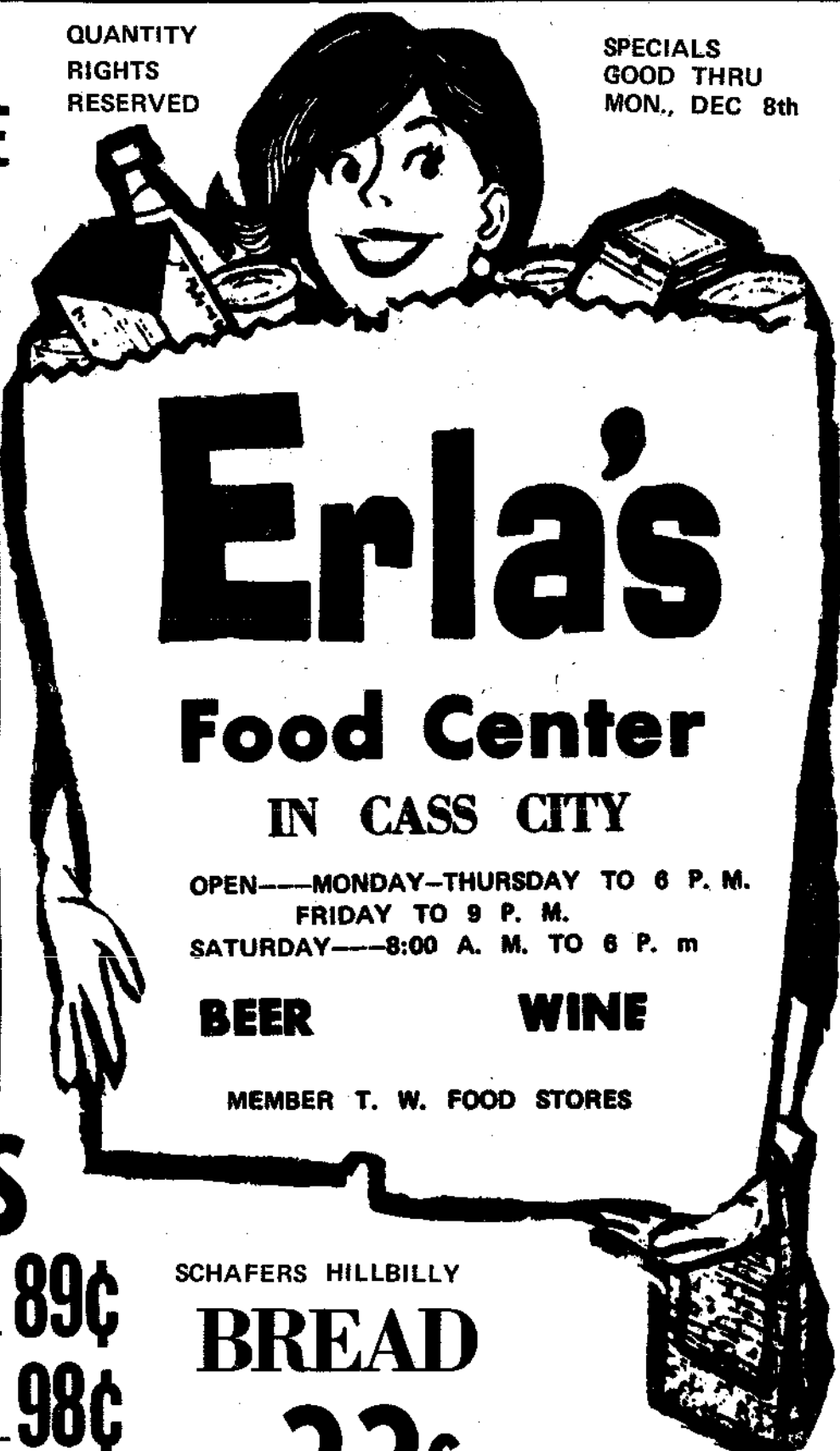

Fans, coach to find out about Hawks in cage opener at Marlette



PERSISTENCE PAID off for Robert Vargo Jr. when he bagged this huge buck in a corn field on his farm, northeast of Cass City Friday, just two days before the season ended. The buck had 12 "legal" points and 15 points in all. Although giant sized, the deer won't take any prizes, Vargo said, because the rack spread was just 12½ inches. But I'm not complaining, Vargo stressed, because it's a lot better than up north where I hunted six days and saw just two does.

There will be no tune-ups for the Cass City Red Hawk basketball squad this year as the season opener Friday at Marlette will plunge the hardwood quintet into Thumb B Conference action.

The game will be of more than usual interest to local fans and Coach Fred Hurlburt. For Hurlburt it will be his first look at the caliber of play in the league and for fans it will be the first official glimpse of the team under the new coaching regime.

Although Marlette is not considered to be one of the league's powerhouses, the Red Raiders are usually tough in basketball. They topped the Hawks twice last year.

But anyway you figure it, the Hawks should be better than they were during dismal 1968-69.

Three regulars and one near regular are back from last year's team which won just once all year.

All figure to be starters this season. The boys are Joe Hillaker, Tony Davis, Marty Zawilinski and Rob Alexander.

The fifth starter is Cass City's deluxe import from Kingston, Richard (Zike) Miller and he promises to be one of the bulwarks of the team.

The way the team stacks up, the 6-foot, 4-inch Hillaker will be in the center, flanked by Miller and Alexander. Alexander is a shade over six feet and Miller has shown that he

can rebound well for his height. Zawilinski is being groomed as the team's ball handler and Davis promises to be a top Hawk gunner.

Those boys will be the starters, but look for the team's number six man, Scott Guernsey, to see plenty of action. Jim Wentworth, a sophomore who is improving steadily, will also play. Dale Ashmore is waiting in the wings, as is Dan Caister.

Cass City lost several players last year who saw considerable action. Gone are Terry Brinkman, Tom Guinther, Tom Kolb and John Bifoss.

Coach Hurlburt said that the boys looked a little sluggish in the second half in a practice session against Reese Monday.

The coach was reasonably pleased with the team's showing in the first scrimmage. I think we will continue to improve, he added.

We'll be working hard this week, he said Tuesday when interviewed, to correct some of the mistakes we made in Monday's scrimmage.

But for Hurlburt, the fans and probably the players themselves, the answers will not come until Friday when the curtain rises on the new season.

After the Marlette game, Cass City will show the home folks the team Tuesday against St. Charles. The visitors are rated to be not overly talented this year and Cass City should enter the game as the favorite.

First the TV networks. Then the New York Times. Spiro Agnew is obviously working his way up and it is only a matter of time before he gets around to small-town editors. I plan to be ready for him.

Spiro says we writers are no longer free from criticism. Which sure shows how dumb I am. I always figured I was the most criticized slob in town.

At the country club recently, several merchants kept tripping me as I walked around the pool table. And under the poker table, they kicked my shins. They were peeved because I'd printed that they should have uniform store hours instead of each store locking the customers out on a different half-day.

"Let's hang him," said a car dealer, "but not until he buys a round." Only my economical nature saved my life. Fortunately I had bought my round for 1969 the month before.

On my desk right now is a sweet postcard from a reader who really knows how to hurt a guy. He sends me an insulting note every week, which is bad enough, but he doesn't even pay the postage. The newspaper pays it. This clown somehow got a large supply of our return-postage-paid cards. You are supposed to use these cards to order subscriptions but this anonymous bird uses them to call me names. The latest message said: "You nigger lover. You want to raise a nation of half-breeds and mulattos. I'd hate to see your family. Why don't you wake up and wise up?"

I wasn't particularly stung by

the snide reference to my family because I don't get along so well with them, either. In fact, they are my severest critics. My wife says I'm unfair to women, my daughter won't speak to me because I wrote she didn't play the guitar so hot, and my smart-aleck son goes through every edition with a black crayon, circling misspelled words.

Geez, I remember once when I wrote that our churches were full of prejudiced phonies. The next day I walked down main street and so many people crossed to the other side to avoid me, the downtown area tilted.

But Spiro Agnew says newspaper writers weren't criticized until he came along. And from now on we should be prepared to defend ourselves, he says.

Far be it for me to argue with the man who is a breath away from this nation's top office. I might better spend my spare time praying for President Nixon's health.

But just recently, while in a rather giddy mood, I did write

something like this: "The name of Spiro Agnew has now become a household word. In my household, some young rebel wrote it on the basement bathroom wall."

That's just the type of thing Spiro was talking about. He doesn't believe in censorship by government, but he doesn't believe in censorship by newspapers, either. His scorn is for the news executives who censor the available news, choosing what to print and what to scrap. Some dummies call this editing, not censoring, but what were they ever vice president of?

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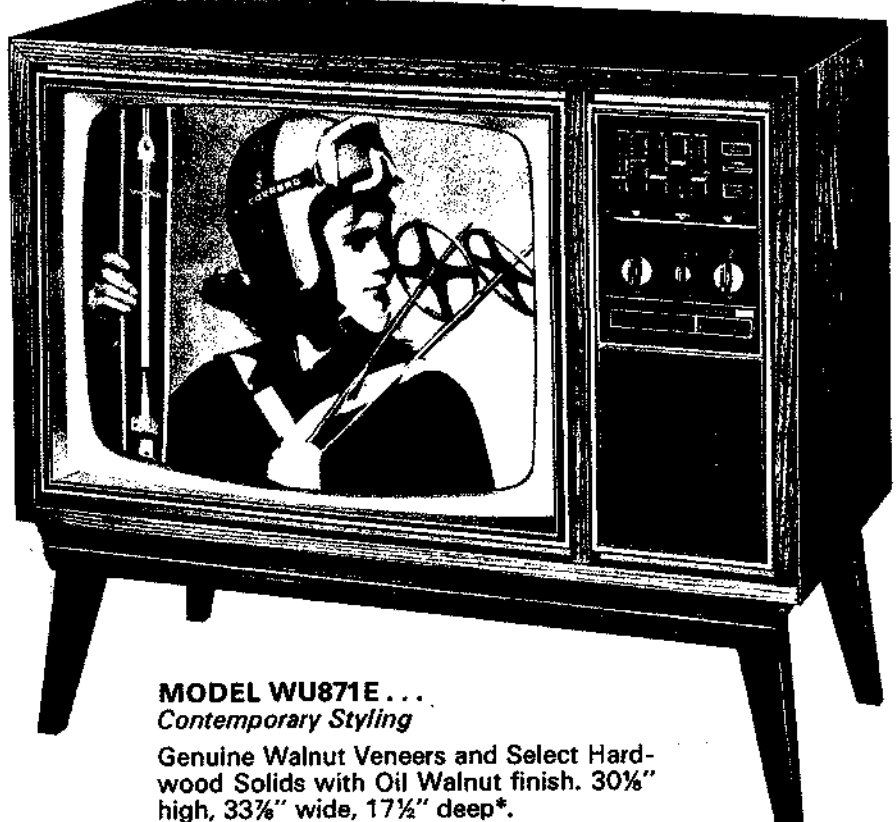

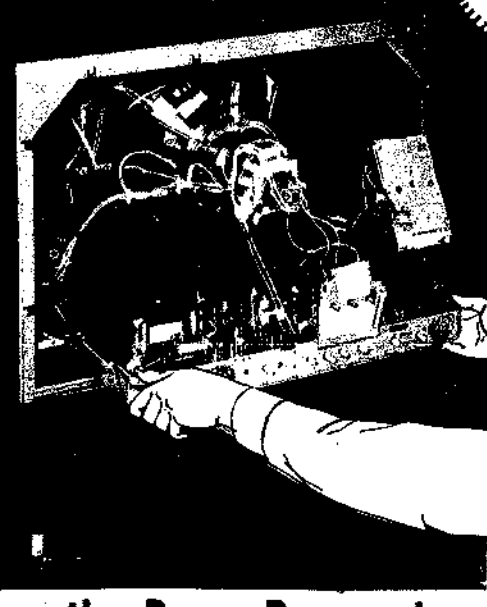

4-H farm projects are increasing

The 1968-69 enrollment figures just re-leased for the 4-H agriculture program show a record of 968,000 boys and girls enrolled in agriculture projects. This is an increase of nearly 19,000 over the previous year.

The popular program covers a broad area of agriculture, not only attracting young farmers, but also serving as an important training ground for future ag-related careers. Agri-Business today employs about 40 percent of the work-ing population.

One of the new projects aids which will challenge our youth to learn more about plants, soils and their environment, is

now being used in the National 4-H Field Crops Science pro-gram across the nation. It is titled "Exploring the World of Plants and Soils", and is the educational manual for 4-H members' use in this first unit in a series on Science of Plants and Soils. The units are de-signed to interest urban and suburban youth as well as rural youth.
