"It was really cool," Carla reported, as she attempted to describe the feeling, the camaraderie and the singleness of purpose that prevailed in the entire throng of an estimated 250,000 persons.

We arrived too late to participate in the death march, but watching it was simply great, Carla says. It was a dark, rainy day and this added to the feeling as the marchers carried signs of the names of persons killed in the Vietnam

It was really a beautiful thing, she continued, and I was happy to be able to participate.

Even greater than the march, the young student feels, was the Peace Raily held after the

All the people gathered and

listened to speakers like Dick Gregory, Dr. Spock, Leonard Bernstein and singers Peter, Paul & Mary and Arlo Guthrie.

There were people everywhere on a huge hill...all you could see in any direction were people. It was a beautiful sunny day but it was COLD. People everywhere were huddled together and trying to keep warm under blankets. Total strangers were sharing food while we listened and sang peace songs, the WMU freshman said.

For Miss Calka, the interest in the Peace movement started with discussions with other students and ideas exchanged in

From there she branched out to attend local meetings and helped the project along by making posters.

She plans to continue her involvement. Moratoriums are planned once a month. Another visit to Washington is probably not possible because of the time and expense involved, but if peaceful demonstrations are held, say in Detroit, I'd be happy to go, she explained.

Because they went as a caravan, the actual expense for last month's trip wasn't too great, just \$20 each.

The students left at 6 p.m. Thursday, drove all night and arrived at Washington at 9a.m. They returned to the campus Sunday at 7 p.m.

That's progress? An old myth maintains that you get more out of college if you earn your way. The theory is that the financial struggle gives a new meaning and a new appreciation of your education. If you have to work to get it, it automatically becomes more valuable.

Many still believe this, but it's doubtful if it's true for most students. Unless you are one of those rare brains, when you pay your way through you spend all of the time studying or working and have precious few leisure moments for causes, the exchange of ideas or anything else.

A good many World War II veterans found, as I did, that college was not only easier, but a whale of a lot better when the government paid the freight after we were discharged than it was before we entered service and paid our

But even when money was not of immediate concern, in the 1940's and early '50's, the prime concern of collegians was getting a job and "getting Good Joos were the specter of the depression of the 1930's was still vivid. One acquaintance (now well-to-do) put it succinctly when he said: "once you have been poor you never forget it." Those college students were battling for the good things in

But the college kids of today are more concerned with issues and answers than with jobs, Even the poorest are assured of not one, but many job offers.

Is that progress? It was refreshing to talk with Carla Calka last week, as she was home from school, about the moratorium, or when Larry Werner worked at the Chronicle to hear him question our Viet Nam involvement.

The recently concluded deer season in Tuscola Countyranks with the best if not the very best ever held, Conservation Officer John Walker reported

According to Walker, who works out of the Caro office of the Department of Natural Resources, a reported total of 325 bucks were killed in the 15-day season. That's over twice as many

as the 135 killed last season, which also was regarded as a good year for hunting. Walker attributed the large

kill to an increase in hunting pressure and the best dee weather in four years. Much of the time there was

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

Hypertension-its causes and treatment

People think the word "hypertension" means tension nervousness. Actually, doctors define "hypertension" as an increase in blood pressure in the circulation. Just as when you tighten the nozzle on the hose, the pressure builds up in the tubing behind, so high blood pressure occurs-in the closed circuit which is the circulation of the blood.

Some people have the impression that high blood pressure is related to anxiety. But it isn't. A patient can have blood pressure and be outwardly as calm as anybody else.

High blood pressure may produce no symptoms in the individual for many years. However, the increased pressure can cause mechanical defects. The heart has to squeeze blood out into the circulation against a higher resistance; this requires more work per heart beat so that the heart enlarges and progressively uses up its pumping capacity at a much greater rate than when the person has normal blood pressure. Too much pressure in the fluid circuit can lead to strain or bursting of the arteries. There's no question that

patients with high blood pressure are more apt to have a stroke due to a tear in the arteries, in the circulation to the brain, or in disturbances to

The kidneys are particularly susceptible to the effects of high blood pressure because the kidneys happen to be an organ full of many, many small blood vessels which have to withstand the higher pressure.

Hypertension is primarily a disease which comes on in middle age, although it can affect young children; sometimes it begins at a very advanced age. The average age is about 32. With no treatment at all the average life-span is about 20 years. This makes the average age of death of these patients about 52. In the first 15 years of the average case, there are no complications and there are only minor symptoms such as headaches, fatigue and ner-

The cause or causes of blood pressure is still a subject under intensive study by investigators. There are, however, three or four basic, recognized facts. One is that the kidney plays a very important role in hypertensive or high blood pressure patients. Many people with kidney disease have high blood pressure. How this comes about isn't known, although there are hormones made by the kidney which can raise the blood pressure.

A second important fact about high blood pressure is its close relationship to the amount of salt that a patient eats. There is no question about the beneficial effect of withholding salt from the diet of patients with high blood pressure. This is both salt that is contained in food and also that which is added with a salt shaker. How salt raises the blood pressure isn't altogether clear, except that it creates a hydraulic effect perhaps by retaining more fluid in the blood circuit, which in turn tends to raise blood pres-

The body has evolved a very complicated chemical system for regulating the amount of salt present in normal subjects. Some people secrete enormous amounts of a hormone, made by the adrenal glands called adrenosterone. Adrenosterone causes a person to retain fluid and not let out the salt which he eats into the kidney. People with nephrolysis and cirrhosis. and to a lesser extent, people with heart failure, have in common too much fluid retention. They make too much adrenosterone and studies have shown

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that swelling and fluid retention is under the control of this adrenal hormone.

looking into the role this salt hormone might be playing in causing some kinds of high blood pressure, doctors found that there is a condition known as primary adrenosteronism, or Kahn syndrome, in which there is too much adrenosterone in the blood. The high blood pressure of these patients can be cured by removing the adrenal tumor which is causing the overproduction of this hor-

There is another kind of high blood pressure called malignant hypertension in which the adrenal glands produce enormous amounts of salt-retaining hormones. This is a special kind of high blood pressure with a very devastating course. It's usually fatal in a year or so if the patient doesn't come under treatment. In effect, there is a chemical system that controls the blood pressure. It seems to be more apparent in malignant hypertension.

Corrective measures can be taken in these cases. There is an increasing fraction of patients with high blood pressure who can be cured, and there are wonderful drugs for the lowering of blood pressure for those patients who cannot be specifically cured by identifying the bio-chemical defect,

Kelley seeks to avoid Dem for Yule at nomination for governor

KELLEY WANTS OUT

Michigan Mirror

An untold number of politicians over the years have tried unsuccessfully to be Governor. And for every one who tried, there were scores more who never got to the point of trying

For example, a state senator once said every man who is elected to the Legislature has

dreams of occupying the Governor's chair. Thus, it's more than a little

unusual that one of the Democratic Party's most attractive vote pullers, Attorney General Frank Kelley, is avoiding the governorship like it were the

Kelley not only is avoiding it, he is campaigning against

The reason is that Frank Kelley wants to be a member of the U.S. Senate.

Since he is a Democrat he can't challenge Philip Hart, who is up for re-election in 1970. As a result, his only chance is to take on Robert Griffin in

And he couldn't do that if he were elected Governor in 1970. Neither would his chances be as good if he ran against incumbent Gov. William G. Milliken and lost.

So, Kelley is running hard in an attempt to convince the Democratic hierarchy that he shouldn't be thrown at Milliken,

He is arguing that he should run for re-election as Attorney General, an almost sure thing, and build a bigger base to defeat

Griffin in 1972,

An aide once said Kelley wants to be Governor so little that "he'd rather have cancer than be Governor."

The Attorney General seems to be confirming this prognosis these days as he travels around the state convincing Democrats he shouldn't be thrown against

"One of our problems is the fact party leaders might feel Frank owes it to the party to take on Milliken," said an aide recently. "The polls show Frank is about the only one with a

One of the less ballyhooed parts of Kelley's argument, one which he himself says little about, is the feeling that Milliken is unbeatable.

"How can a Democrat run against that guy?" said a party official recently. "He's got more opposition to his programs within his own party than in the Democratic

Ironically, Kelley's decision may be made for him by a Republican----former George Romney.

If Romney were to decide to run for Hart's seat, the Democrats would need all the strength at the top of the ticket they could get to ward off the Romney-Milliken combination. If Romney doesn't run, the

party may feel more like putting up a sacrificial lamb against Milliken while the Republicans do the same against Hart.

Capitol observers have been giving more serious consideration lately to the possibility Romney might run, and some pundits are saying flatly he

It will be several months, of course, before the answer is known. The Republicans have

follows: (a) Be a citizen of the United States.

(b) Minimum age of twentyone vears.

(c) Graduation from high school or equivalent. Equivalent defined as having attained a passing score on the General Education Development \ test indicating high school graduation level.

(d) Fingerprinting of applicants with a search of local, state and national fingerprint files to disclose any criminal

record. (e) The applicant shall not have been convicted of a felony

offense. (f) Good moral character as determined by a favorable report following a comprehensive background investigation covering school and employment records, home environment, personal traits and integrity. Consideration will be given to any and all law violations, including traffic and conservation law convictions as indicating a lack of good character.

(g) Acceptable physical, emotional and mental fitness as established by a licensed physician following examination to determine the applicant is free from any physical, emotional or mental condition which might adversely affect performance of duty as a police officer.

The applicant shall (h) possess normal hearing and normal color vision, shall be free from any impediments of the senses, must possess normal visual functions and visual acuity in each eve correctable to 20/20, and the applicant must be physically sound; well de-

veloped physically, with height and weight in relation to age as indicated by accepted medical standards. The applicant shall possess all extremities, and shall be free from any physical defects, chronic diseases, organic diseases, organic or chronic diseases, functional conditions, or mental instabilities which may tend to impair efficient performance of duty which might endanger the lives of others or the applicant if these qualifications are/

lacking. (i) A declaration of the applicant's medical history shall become a part of the background investigation. The information shall be available to the examining physician.

(i) An oral interview shall be held by the hiring authority or its representative, to determine the applicant's acceptability for a police officer position and to assess appearance, background and ability to communicate.

(k) Recruitment and employment practices and standards shall be in compliance with existing Michigan statutes governing this activity.

SECTION 2. The standards of

the Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council are recognized as minimum standards and higher standards are recommended by the Training Council when qualified applicants are available. Any portion of any ordinance not meeting the minimum standard is hereby repealed. Any portion of any ordinance which meets the minimum standards or exceeds those standards shall remain in



So I am making a list of all the other dirty words on rather giddy mood, I did write that bathroom wall.



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

ONE FOR THE ROAD



By Dan Marlowe

There is one collection of mystery short stories each year to which mystery readers and mystery writers alike pay attention.

It's the annual collection of Mystery Writers of America, this year entitled MERCHANTS OF MENACE (Doubleday; \$5,95), edited by Hillary Waugh.
The selected stories echothe

suave sophistication of Waugh's own novelistic style. Not that there isn't mayhem ranging from subtle to sadistic, or assault and battery ranging from minor to aggravated. There is both. There is present also, however, a lowkeyed storytelling style which intrigues by understatement.

Robert Bloch contributes a story in which, as he says himself, the seeds of the booklength Psycho can be found. Stanley Ellin, one of the masters of the short story format in recent years, advises us about DEATH ON CHRISTMAS EVE.

The short-short is represented by NEVER HIT A LADY by Fred Tobey, and Ellery Queen himself (themselves) presents a beautifully detailed puzzleplot, THE PRESIDENT'S HALF DISME, by which the publisher's usual representation that all characters, living or dead, presented in the collection are fictional is put to shame.

In GONE GIRL, Ross Mac-Donald gives us one of Lew Archer's infrequent appearances in short fiction. Newcomer Al Nussbaum with THE DEAD PAST takes us on a startling excursion to the turn of the century when men were men and women were devious. And THE PEPPERMINT-STRIPED GOODBYE by Ron Goulart certainly deserves mention in the same paragraph with Ross MacDonald since Goulart's story is a clever parody of MacDonald's situations and style.

Celia Fremlin contributes SOMETHING EVIL IN THE HOUSE, and only Charlotte never get rid of them.

Armstrong is her peer in evoking horror in the midst of COUNTER INdomesticity. TELLIGENCE by Robert Fish takes a larceny ploy and twists it in and out of shape several times. H AS IN HOMICIDE exploits humorously a day in the life of a working cop; Lawrence Treat is the master of the police procedural short

Two stories in the collection deserve special mention.

As editor Waugh remarks, nobody but nobody writes detective fiction like Don Von Elsner, In THE MAN WHO PLAYED TOO WELL, Von Els-ner moves to the bridge table (where he is an expert in his own right) to delineate the downfall of a master cheat. Psychology is an integral part of any Von Elsner story.

And finally there is Cornell Woolrich's THE MOON OF MONTEZUMA. Woolrich, who died last year, has long been acknowledged the king of the macabre and the bizarre. In this offering he displays his gifts at their finest. There is a word to describe THE MOON OF MONTEZUMA, and the word is haunting. It's hard to imagine anyone but Woolrich writing this story,

Space forbids listing all 20 stories in MERCHANTS OF MENACE, but be assured there is excellent reading for all mystery fans.
