In a year where events moved swiftly and change was the name 10 is the turn down of the of the game, picking the top 10 stories of the year is not affected 90 per cent of the

The stories selected were not always the most sensational, but rather those that had the most lasting effect on the people and the community.

Some of the top 10 are actually not one story at all, but a series of stories that made news through all of 1969 and will continue to do so in the foreseeable future.

The Chronicle's nomination for the top story of the year falls in this class. It is the record 47 deaths recorded on the highway through Christmas

The continued highway carnage has been the subject of special meetings, police concern and frustration all year. It continues now as the county battles for a State Police Post.

New owners to pump \$100,000

into Sherwood Forest revival

Sherwood Forest Country Club in Gagetown was opened five years ago it was hafled as a truly wonderful addition to the area—something a long time coming and something truly needed.

But many respected businessmen had serious reservations about the club as a business operation and to date their fears have proven to be well

For in its first five years it has been struggling, struggling, struggling.
While the Club was open for

Christmas and New Year's 1964, it was over a year later that it received a liquor license.

The delay came because Rice was attempting to get a private club license, but approval from the State never came. He was forced to accept a public bar license and open the club to the public. The golf course remained private, as it is today.

Sherwood Rice Jr.'s vision of an exclusive club featuring quality at prices that quality should bring never found enough acceptance to become a paying proposition.

But the dream is not yet dead although the Rices finally gave up trying Dec. 5 and sold the business to James Molnar and Associates, Inc. Molnar is far from convinced

Under the new ownership the club will not close this winter. It will remain open on week ends, Molnar noted, instead of closing for January, February and March. Snowmobiling for members is planned. This is the approach that

the new owners are taking, but if it doesn't work there is an

way and realize a normal return on investment, Molnar said, we'll open it up.

We plan to have in the future up to 100 persons (from the Detroit area) participating in the ownership and can use these people as a base for promoting, if necessary.

Right now, Molnar said, we are aiming for a membership of 150. When our golf course is 18 holes we're aiming for 300. That's all you can handle comfortably and keep the course from becoming overcrowded.

Costs for members will be more next year. It will cost \$25 per month for membership with no charge for January and February this year only. Presently members pay \$150 yearly and an additional \$150 that can be used in trade in the dining room and bar.

That's the short range plans for the club. Other changes are on the planning board, but not yet definitely decided.

One of these is increasing the number of motel units from 20 to 60, giving the club enough hotel space to attract conventions and groups from the city. Right now Molnar is in active charge of the operation.

But he plans to bow out after the club is running smoothly. Then the club will be run by two persons. Already hired is Miss Cheri Rice who will





Emergency aid

What would you do if the man next to you collapsed? First, check to see if he has emergency medical identification—a tag on his wrist or ankle, or a card in his wallet.

It may have information such as the man's doctor, his ail-ment and the immediate first aid he might need. The American Medical As-

sociation is now conducting a national campaign to "tag" everyone in the U.S. with an ID card. It claims at least 40 million people have health problems that warrant such identification. The card supplied by the

AMA has room for any special problems, where the person lives, and when or where he was immunized. It might tell you about allergies, diseases, vital prescriptions, or drugs he is now taking.

A small tag—and there are several available commercially -might alert you to look in the person's purse or wallet for a card with more detailed

The Health Insurance Institute suggests that even a healthy person should carry a medical ID card, kept where it can easily be found in case of an accident.

In some states, it's now possible to carry a card or tag if you want to donate your heart, kidneys or other organs for surgical transplant when you die. Speed is important in these operations, and delays can

Better health, longer life ahead

Modern communication and transportation have made the world a shrinking globe. A traveler can now touch four continents in one day by jet airplane. In so doing he can spread disease, if he happens to be infected, to a tremendous portion of the entire world.

In the Western Hemisphere the Pan American Health Organization endeavors to control epidemic disease, and to assist the populations in less-favored portions of this hemisphère. We are fortunate that the health record of the United States has been kept on a continued high level, with freedom from major epidemics. Most health progress depends

upon medical science, so it is healing profession with a serimportant to recognize that vice motivation. medical science is based on innumerable hours of tedious. laborious, undramatic work by professionals and patients also individuals with an intense scientific curiosity. As an example, the modern

so that they produce immunity without producing disease, are the result of an incident in the laboratory of Dr. Pasteur in Paris. He developed a culture of bacteria for use in the study of a disease in chickens. He was distracted from the experiment, and the culture stood around in the laboratory for some time. When he got back to the experiment and tried to use his old culture, which should have infected the experimental birds with disease, it was found that nothing happened. Even when a new culture was used, the birds did not become ill. He immediately began to wonder what had happened to the culture that stood around, and what, if anything, that culture did to the birds that they failed to become ill from the later injection.

He arrived at the conclusion that the first culture had grown weak through aging, and that, although weakened, might still have the ability to protect. The experiments instituted to prove that point were the beginning of aging, or otherwise weakening, bacterial cultures to create immunizing agents.

In a similar fashion, penicillin was discovered. It was noted that bacterial cultures sometimes failed to grow as expected, but developed other types of growth. Examination of these under the microscope disclosed a well-known mold, the penicillium, or ordinary bread mold. The secretion, or product, of penicillium slowed the growth of bacteria. This led to a clinical application and it was appropriately named penicillin.





\$1 billion seen for new housing

HOUSING NEEDS

Both state and federal officials have been giving a great deal of attention recently to the problem of finding decent housing for all Americans,

Gov. William G. Milliken estimates Michigan has a need right now for 46,000 more housing units than exist. He said construction of these units would cost \$1 billion.

The state government already has begun a program, directed by the State Housing Development Authority, intended to prothis housing in future

Immediate goal of the

authority is to build 2,500 housing units costing \$50 million this year. The housing would be used by low and moderate income families able to pay off mortgages at a small rate who would be unable to pay off a regular mortgage. The lower mortgage rates,

which would be spread over a 40-year period, are made possible by several factors. First of all, the authority is

a state agency and thus can issue tax free bonds and notes to finance construction of the housing. Since the bonds are tax free, they are cheaper, and the cost of financing construction is cheaper.

Conventional construction financing, for example; now runs between a 10 and 15 per cent interest rate, compared to the 6 to 6 1/2 per cent rate on

Also, the mortgage issued to the home buyer ordinarily would to 9 per cent. But the authority can issue bonds for 6 1/2 to 6 3/4 per cent.

These two factors alone result in a "spectacular effect on the cost of the total house," according to the authority.

Cost of constructing a \$19,000 home can be cut by \$1,700, or some 9 per cent, if it is financed through the authority. The result is to make it possible for persons who otherwise would be unable to own a home. A system of mortgage sub-

sidies also is included in the plan. The authority says the total cost of living in the \$19,000 three-bedroom house referred to above, including mortgage payments, utilities, main-tenance and other costs runs to \$225 per month. Under a federal subsidy pro-

gram, the cost can be cut by as much as 40 per cent, dropping it to \$135 per month.

"Translating these costs into income levels," the authority says, "the combined federal and state program will provide assistance for families in the \$6,000 to \$9,000 a year income bracket, as well as elderly couples living in a one-bedroom unit with a \$4,000 to \$6,000

It said a special supplementary subsidy from the federal government also allows some families in the \$4,000 to \$6,000 range to participate.

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

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

Mail swindles are big businesses

At this time of the year numerous government publications point out the pitfalls of mail order shopping.

They point out that while you can't be sure that a "money back guarantee" in a mail order advertisement will be honored, that you can take steps to minimize the possibility of being swindled by a con artist.

The Post Office Department and the BBB (Better Business Bureau) in particular caution unwary mail order shopping. Postal authorities are currently investigating more than 600 "failure to furnish" complaints against mail order

Both agencies agree that the best way to avoid getting hooked is to know the company with which you plan to do business. or failing that, consider well the character of the publication in which its ad appears. Reputable magazines and news-papers try to avoid printing

advertising from questionable

It's a good idea to look for a street address in a mail order advertisement. The address is at least a minor indication that the company has an established place of business. While many reputable companies list only a post office box, the out-andout swindlers almost always give a box number in order to be harder to trace.

What should a consumer do if he thinks he has been stuck by a mail order company that has taken his money and either failed to send him the ordered merchandise or else has shipped something clearly inferior to the advertised item?

First write the company a letter of complaint, It's a good idea to send the letter certified mail, return receipt requested, so you can be sure the complaint was delivered If there is no answer, report the problem to the publication in which the ad appeared, and send a copy to the Better Business Bureau, 230 Park Avenue, New York City 10017. If the BBB finds a company is ignoring complaints or is conducting a fraudulent business, it will usually publicize the circumstances.

Also notify the Post Office Department, Washington, D. C. 20260, whose inspectors will investigate if there is a suspicion of mail fraud such as a lack of intent to furnish ordered merchandise. The department doesn't function as a collection agency for defrauded comsumers, but it can put fraudulent operators out of business.

The consumer cannot always hope to get his money back, but many do. It should be remembered that many failures to ship are not caused by fraud but are the result of poor business practices such as slipshod organization methods or unforeseen strikes.

But when the consumer feels that he's being cheated, he should apply the pressure.

Even when it doesn't get him his money back, it may make a little better for the next fellow by driving a fraud out of business.

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



Legal ways to cut income tax

Many times I have stated that proper income tax management will save many hard earned dollars.

I know many people detest keeping records and doing figuring. I also know others who have a system and earn high hourly wages for their efforts from the tax saving made.

Every year several farm operators ask me how much can they pay their children in vages for their on-the-farm work and still declare them as dependents. Actually any son or daughter who receives more than fifty percent of their annual support from their parents qualifies as a dependent of the

If this son or daughter earns under \$900 in wages from any source, they won't have any income tax to pay. They are required to file the necessary returns after earning \$600 or more as hired labor. I believe the real decision here is "has that son or daughter done the labor to substantiate the wage received?"

Another income tax saving tip is to plan your personal family deductions by doubling up. What is meant here is to pay two years' property taxes, medical, dental bills and contributions in one year. Adjusting and rotating these deductions have allowed some people to apply the 10% standard living deduction in one year and itemize in the next year.

How can tax money be saved by selling the farm, livestock and equipment? Easy! Sell on a contract spread over more than one year. Using this procedure the gains portion of the seller's income tax will only be on the portion of principal received in the tax year.

A few farmers who have machinery for sale have worked out rental arrangements whereby their ownership period is extended long enough for them to qualify the items for full investment credit. After this time they sell the items to the renter or elsewhere. The renter charges the rent off as expense and the owner declares rent income and depreciation. The rent fee is often the same as the annual depreciation of the

averaging may save money too and can be applied in any selected year. Here is a good quick measuring stick to see if income tax averaging will save you money. Divide the total of 1965,1966, 1967 and 1968 taxable income by 3 and add \$3,000. If the taxable income for 1969 is greater than the above result, there is likely to be a benefit in applying the income tax averaging rule.

There is talk of reducing the surtax charge in 1970 so this average tax will be about 5%. Also there may be an increase in dependency deductions and percent of income tax charge. Maybe the state tax deduction allowance for property taxes will be removed. If all or any of these come to pass, this may be the one year to keep your taxable income down.

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


