**Nitrate poisoning slight  
from drought corn**

Fear of nitrate poisoning in dairy or beef cattle fed drought-stricken corn is probably unwarranted. Well fed cattle can safely consume feeds containing up to two per cent nitrate in the diet without harmful effects. In known cases of nitrate toxicity, the feeds generally contained 3 to 8 per cent nitrate.

Drought stricken corn that contains harmful levels of nitrate is very rare. Studies have shown that less than three per cent of drought stricken corn contains more than one-half per cent nitrate.

Donald Hillman, Michigan State University dairy specialist, agrees that the "project of nitrate toxicity is quite remote and in fact seldom occurs."

The most common cause of nitrate toxicity is the sudden change to feed containing nitrates. If you suspect your feed to contain higher than normal levels of nitrates, feed only a small amount of the suspected feed for the first couple of days and then gradually increase the amount over 7 to 14 days. This allows the microorganisms in the ruminant stomach to become adapted to the new feed and convert the nitrate into ammonia, which the rumen bacteria use for synthesizing protein used by the animal.

When cattle receive more nitrate than can be reduced to ammonia, an intermediate product, nitrate, accumulates in the rumen and is absorbed in the blood causing the toxicity. Recent studies show beef cattle fed rations containing up to eight per cent nitrate without harmful effects when the amount was gradually increased to this level.

Cattle fed grain are less susceptible to nitrate toxicity because fermentation of the grain creates more acid condition in the rumen and enhances the conversion of nitrate to ammonia and bacteria protein.

Also, recent studies have

shown that Vitamin A levels of cattle fed nitrate are not seriously affected by nitrate in the diet, and supplemental Vitamin A is of little value in preventing nitrate toxicity. Likewise, the feeding of urea to cattle does not increase their susceptibility to nitrate toxicity.

Nitrates tend to accumulate in the lower stalks and leaves of plants when normal metabolism of the plant is reduced by lack of water, sunlight or damage from insects and diseases. Plants grown on heavily fertilized land or soil high in nitrogen accumulate increased levels of nitrates.

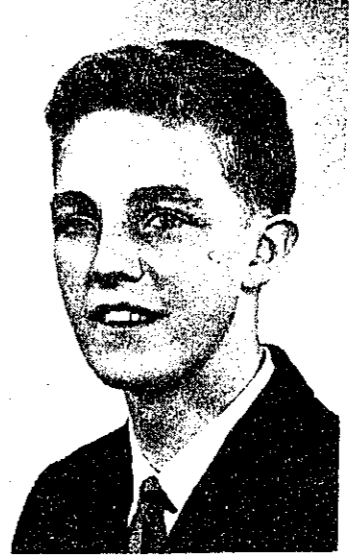
In recent tests on Indiana corn land, application of 800 pounds of nitrogen per acre (6 to 8 times normal) increased the nitrate content to 0.44 per cent compared to 0.06 per cent where no nitrogen was applied. But none of the feeds contained sufficient amounts to affect the health of the cattle. Ensiling of the crop reduced the nitrate content about 40 per cent compared to the fresh plant fed as green chop.

Harvesting of growth-stunted corn should be delayed as long as possible or at least until after tasseling since early fall rains could increase the growth and produce badly needed for age even though the plants may not produce grain.

If cattle suffer from nitrate toxicity, their blood turns dark brown, almost the color of black coffee. That's because the nitrate has converted the hemoglobin to methemoglobin. During nitrate toxicity cattle will breathe heavily due to lack of oxygen carrying capacity of the blood. They also froth at the mouth and their non-pigmented skin and mucous membranes turn bluish grey.

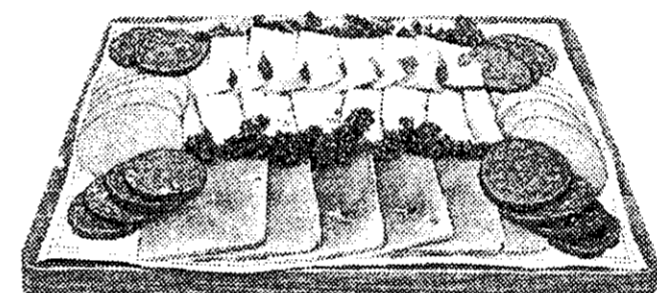

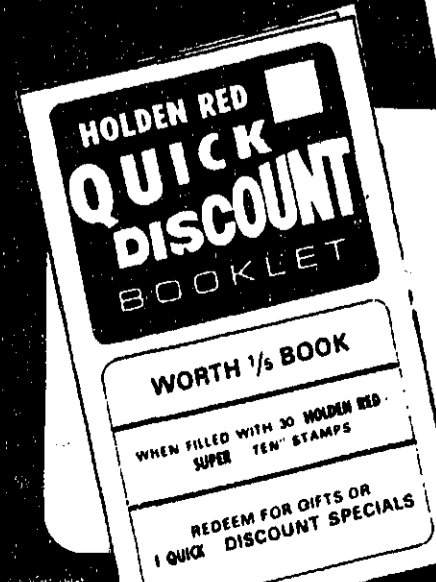

**New facts about Multiple Sclerosis**

As some people know, to their sorrow, multiple sclerosis is a strange disease of the nervous system which generally strikes young adults, appearing for the first time between the ages of 20 and 40. MS then keeps reappearing, occasionally injuring the function of a few nerves, for the rest of the person's days. The great difficulty in multiple sclerosis is caused by the loss of the MYELIN (a sort of insulation) which protects the nerves. The effect of this apparent "eating away" of the protective covering of the nerve is the same as if a rat were to chew the insulation from a wire -- the nerve impulses are distorted, and sometimes blocked altogether.

For this reason, there are a number of different symptoms of MS which may come and go in various parts of the body. Any part of the central nervous system may be involved and there is no way of predicting what symptoms a particular patient may have. There may be only some blurring of vision that may come and then go away. The person may have a weakening of an arm or leg, or difficulty in co-ordination; the speech may become slurred. In advanced cases there may be partial or complete paralysis of the legs, or difficulty with bladder and bowel control.

About a quarter of the persons with this disease keep at work for many years. The big questions are, what is the cause, and what can be done to cure the patients? Much study has failed to give the answers. Recently, a big effort has been made to find the cause of the disease by noting in what countries the incidence is high and in what countries it is unusually low. One of the remarkable facts about MS is the prevalence of the disease in colder climates; its incidence declines from north to south, and it is practically absent in tropical areas.

In 1922, the great Dr. Davenport, on studying draftees in the United States, said that the disease was found most frequently in men coming from the states bordering on the Great Lakes. Recently, it was found that the incidence varies greatly in the different countries of Europe.

New I read that Drs. Milton Alber, Michael Ochihiro, William Rowley and Tom Morris, of the University of Minnesota and the Straub Clinic in Honolulu, have been studying the differences in the incidence of the disease in the Orientals and Caucasians in Hawaii. The doctors studied 77 patients with MS who had lived in Hawaii for at least two years, and found that the incidence of the disease in Orientals and Caucasians who were born in Hawaii was low (from 8.8 to 10.5 per 100,000 population, respectively). But among immigrants to Hawaii -- most of them from our Northern states and from temperate parts of foreign countries -- the incidence was more than five times higher. In another paper Drs. Oliveira-Rabiela, Rabiela-Cervantes, Feria-Velasco, Marquez-Padilla, and Gonzalez-Angulo, in Mexico, report on two cases of MS -- one, a woman of 65, and the other, a man of 20. The doctors wrote up these cases because MS is extremely rare in Mexico City, and according to the doctors, is totally absent in young people living in tropical areas.

A very interesting finding was that when the two Mexican patients died, and their brains were sectioned and carefully studied with the very powerful electron microscope, peculiar grayish plaques were found in several parts of the brain. The Mexican doctors say that their observations are similar to those reported by two other groups of men. This is a helpful finding, but we don't know what caused the plaques. The big thing is that if we can ever find out what is the factor that makes the geographical differences in the incidence of MS, we may begin to understand what the cause of the disease is.

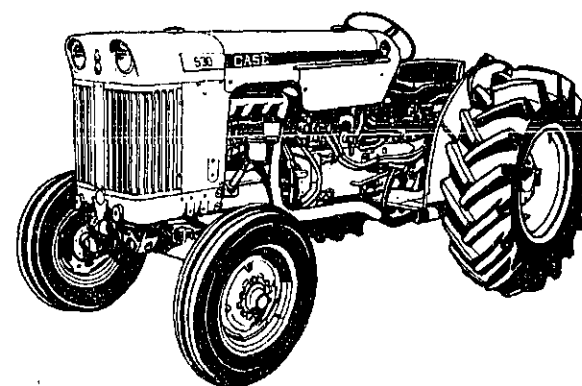

## To accept bids for 8 county bridges

Bids for the construction of eight bridges in Tuscola county will be taken Wednesday, Aug. 18, in Lansing, the State Highway Commission announced.

Total estimated cost of the work will be \$410,000 with completion by September, 1972.

- Bay Park Road over the Allen Drain five miles west of Unionville.
- Bay Park Road over Walker Hayes Drain four miles west of Unionville.
- Bay Park Road crossing Akron-Centerline Drain three

miles west of Unionville.

- Bradleyville Road crossing the Northwest Drain 1.5 miles south of Gilford.
- Gilford Road crossing the Northwest Drain west of Fairgrove.
- Bradleyville Road crossing the Northwest Drain north of Gilford.
- Bradleyville Road crossing the Northwest Drain five miles north of Gilford.
- Gilford Road crossing the Northwest Drain just east of Gilford.

## Distribute 2nd quarter motor vehicle funds

Second quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections are being distributed to Michigan counties, cities and villages, totaling \$886,080 for Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties.

The State Highway Commission reported that net receipts of the fund during April, May and June of 1971, amounted to \$1,275,495, an increase of \$1,129,009 or 4.7 per cent, compared to the same three months of 1970.

Of that amount Tuscola county received \$312,988, an increase of \$13,955 over last year, Huron county, \$272,501, an increase of \$9,395, and Sanilac county, \$300,591, an increase of \$12,719.

Funds distributed to Cass City were \$6,914, which was an increase of \$144 over last year. Other villages to receive funds were Gageton, \$2,364; Kingston, \$1,728; Owendale, \$1,811, and Uby, \$3,064.

The Motor Vehicle Highway Fund, which is made up of all state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees, is distributed after deduction of collection costs, 1.5 per cent of gasoline taxes to State Waterways Commission and other fixed costs.

The Department of State Highways receives 46 per cent of net proceeds, the 83 counties receive 34 per cent and 529 cities and villages, 20 per cent.

Under this formula, the Highway Department will receive \$41,986,728 as its share of second quarter collections. The counties will receive \$31,033,568 and the incorporated cities and villages \$18,255,099.

## Fluoridated water saves teeth according to study

More proof of benefits from fluoridation of drinking water was apparent in a new study released by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

The statistics come from a study of all public school children aged 10 through 12 in four Michigan cities: Flint, Jackson, Battle Creek and Kalamazoo.

Flint began fluoridating its water in 1966, and a study conducted there in 1970 showed children had 30 per cent fewer cavities than did children in the same age bracket in 1966 before fluoridation began. In addition, the 1970 study group showed 22 per cent fewer missing permanent teeth.

Dr. Louis F. Szejda, research and special projects chief of the department's dental division, conducted the analysis. He says that while the benefits of fluoridation are clear in Flint, "the Flint story is modest compared to what has happened in the other three cities."

The final estimate amazed even the traffic engineers who compiled the survey, the department says, and the figures were rechecked and recomputed just to make sure.

The 25 million figure is a substantial increase since the first state highway roadside park was constructed on old US-16 near East Lansing in 1935.

The first travel information center to serve tourists was opened that same year near New Buffalo. Prior to that, picnic table sites and parks had been established along many county highways.

At present there are 57 freeway rest areas and 103 roadside parks in the state, as well as 30 state highway scenic overlooks and 1,000 roadside picnic table sites.

Plans call for eventual construction of 96 rest areas to

be spaced at intervals of approximately 25 to 40 miles on all divided state and interstate highways in Michigan.

Battle Creek, Kalamazoo and Jackson began fluoridating water 20 years ago in 1951. Children in those cities show a dramatic 52 per cent to 67 per cent reduction in decayed, missing and filled permanent teeth.

As a matter of fact, more than 40 per cent of the children examined in the three cities showed no decayed, missing or filled teeth at all.

Szejda says the benefits of fluoridation "are really no surprise, of course. They simply confirm the overwhelming evidence of other studies, including the study in Grand Rapids, the first city in the world to begin water fluoridation."

Other officers are Colleen Stafford, president, Norma Wallace, vice-president, and Cella House, treasurer.

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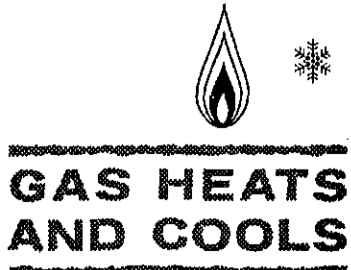
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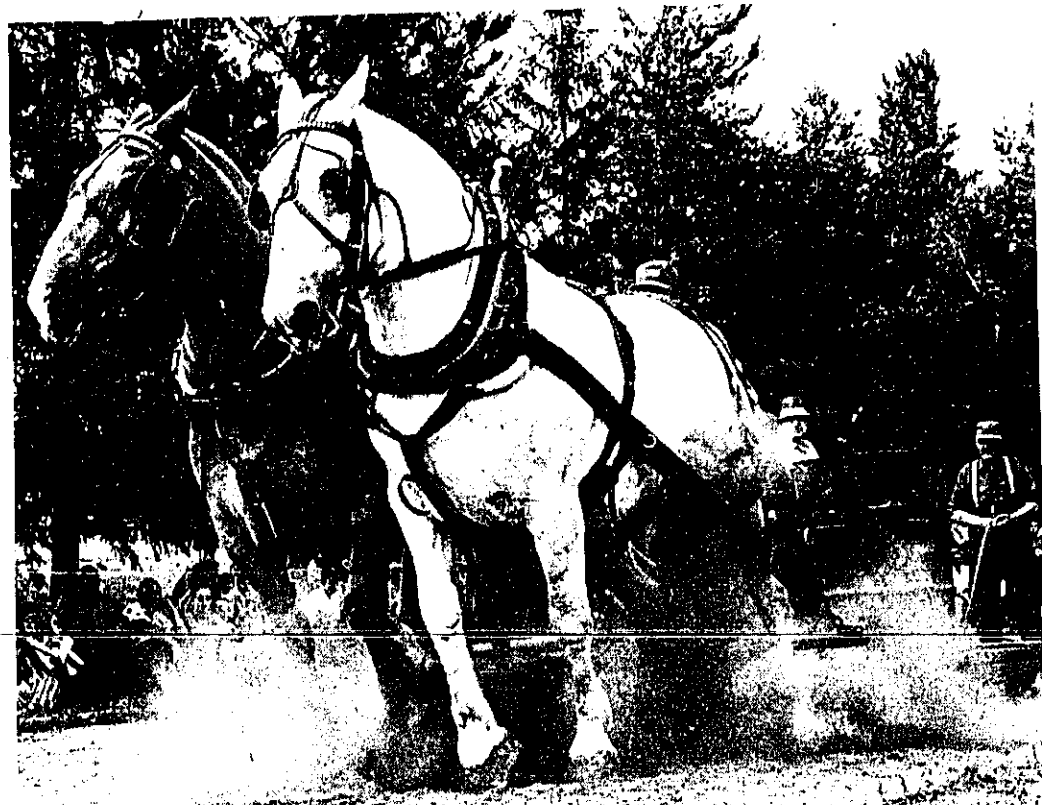
