The Cass City School Board gave the green light to eventual revamping of the intermediate school home economic room by approving expenditures for preliminary drawings for the work at its regular session Monday night at the school.

Written records vary slightly in the date set forth during the early years of construction, but the church generally adopts the date 1881, the year marked on the cornerstone, as its begin-

ning. Under the guidance of the Rev. James MacArthur, the first pastor, stumps were removed from land, bought in 1878, during October 1882. During the next February, time, teams and wagons were donated to haul fourteen loads of lumber from Houghton's in Novesta township. Total cost of the first building completed in 1884 was about \$1500. The most recent addition

and remodeling cost more than \$100,000, A Ladies' Aid Society was organized in 1891, the same year the bell tower was constructed. An addition to the east of the original building was made in 1911, with the basement being dug out that same year. In 1939 the auditorium was remodeled. In 1955 the structure was again remodeled. Two years of work saw the church nearly doubled in size at a cost of approximately \$14,000, with ap-
