# **Board stalls teacher bargaining plans**

The Cass City Board of Education threw a roadblock into ambitious plans by the Cass City Teachers' Association to become a member of a tri-county bargaining association Monday night at the regular meeting at the school. Leo Gengler, represent-ing CCTA, made the presentation to the board requesting that the school go along with the teachers in the change.

The board demurred on the advice of Supt. Donald Crouse. The stumbling block, as the board sees it, is that it removes local control of bargaining-situations from local teachers.

Perhaps an even more serious objection is that the move is seen as the first step towards state-wide bargaining by the union and the schools.

Gengler conceded that the purpose of the enlarged bargaining board was to take the initial step toward this objective. Ğengler told the board that

74 of the teaching staff of 88 have indicated that they would like to be represented by the newly formed unit. Crouse said that there is a question of the legality and appropriateness of the new

# Relief drive helps family start rebuilding home, lives

Mrs. Mary Vatter of Shabbona and her four children started rebuilding their lives this week following a fire that destroyed their home and its contents Monday, April 4.

It hasn't been easy, Mrs. Vatter says, but the shock is wearing off and the family is starting to function again. She's just glad everyone got out alive.

"I thought it was the end of the world when I saw those flames," Mrs. Vatter said, taking a break from her job as activities coordinator at Provincial House in Cass City.

"We lost everything," she said.

Everything included irreplaceable mementos such as photos of her dead husband and a guitar belonging to a son who was killed in a New Year's day auto crash in 1974. "If I could have gotten six or seven things out, I'd have felt a little better," she said. "But I'm still thankful no one got hurt. There's no house more important than one of

"It seems as though everybody is helping us all the time and I'm not able to do anything for anybody, else," she said.

Her only problem now, Mrs. Vatter said, is finding a way to thank everybody for their help. "We couldn't have made it without it," she said.

The increase amounts to about 2012 cents an hour, McConkey said. He added that the increase during the first year will amount to slightly less than \$400, since raises were calculated at a rate of 15 cents an hour while the employees were without a contract.

The new pact also establishes a pay plan which sets a starting rate for each job classification.

THUMB INTELLIGENCE GROUP

The Tuscola County Board of Commissioners didn't say no to a request for renewed funding of the Thumb Intelligence Group (TIG) during its Tuesday meeting at the courthouse in Caro.

But the board didn't exactly say yes either.

TIG spokesman William Bliss, Cass City, asked the board to commit itself to spend \$20,123 to fund the unit's drug enforcement investigation through June, 1978.

The catch, Bliss explained, is that if the county agrees, it also must commit itself to another year's entire funding which totals \$52,394.

The program is in its second year and the \$20,123 figure represents nine months of funding from Oct. 1, 1977 through June 30, 1978.

TIG operates with monies from Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties. Under a criminal justice grant, the federal government will chip in \$54,332.62 for the nine months, while the state will

Dear Dr. Morgan: Vitamin D supplements are part of a friend's health program. She urges me to take them too but I've heard excess vitamin D is dangerous.

Please advise us. A. You are right. The liver and kidneys change vitamin D to its active form dihydroxy-vitamin-D3. This raises blood and body calcium. Lack of vitamin D leads to soft bones, but in the U.S. this is exceedingly rare.

Excess vitamin D overloads blood with calcium, raises blood fat, for reasons unknown, and can settle as calcium stones in kidney, bladder and joints. In adults 150,000 units of vitamin D daily may cause stones. Only 700 units a day can raise blood fat to abnormal levels.

You need 400 units daily and you get this from a well-bal<sup>1</sup> anced diet. Ask your doctor to check your blood and bone calcium before taking possibly dangerous extra vita-

Dear Dr. Morgan: I've heard an ultrasound test can detect the cause of stomach pain, without X-rays. My doctor has scheduled X-rays for me. Should I ask him for an ultrasound exam instead? A. No. Ultrasound is more expensive and results can be difficult to interpret. The ultrasound machine emits very-high-frequency sound waves that bounce off body tissues, drawing a contour map of your insides. With the waves there have been no side effects.

Ultrasound is most useful in finding: 1) abscesses and cysts; 2) tumors in areas X-rays can't study, e.g., pancreas or adrenal glands: 3) abnormalities in the heart. Ultrasound can outline heart chambers, and even heart

Dear Dr. Morgan: I'm scared of being bitten by a black widow spider whenever I go camping. How common are these spiders -- and are they really dangerous?

A. Black widow spider bites are dangerous, but rarely fatal. This spider -- Latrodectus mactans -- is the commonest poisonous spider in the U.S. It is black with a red "double-diamond" hour glass on the undersurface.

Spider venom attacks nerve tissue and causes immediate severe pain about the bite. Death occurs from muscle spasm and nerve injury. Ten to 15 people a year die from black widow spider

bites. People most often get bitten in outhouses, where the female spider may spin her web.

If your camping takes you into dark or unsanitary enclosed areas, especially in the South or Southwest, be sure there's light so you can see if spiders are around. If you

1. What does this Farmland Act do?

This act enables a landowner to enter into a farmland preservation program agreement with the state. This agreement is designed to insure that the land remains in farmland for an agreed upon period.

2. What is the period of time involved with Act 116?

The minimum time period for a preservation rights agreement is 10 years. However, you as a landowner have the right to sign up for a greater number of years, if you wish, when the questionnaire is returned following the submission of the application for the farmland agreement to the Office of Land Use. The guestionnaire asks you for the number of vears which you wish to enter into an agreement with the state of Michigan.

3. Number of agreements which you may submit.

There are advantages for a landowner to submit separate agreements for each different description of land on separate agreement forms. If you decide to sell one parcel away from the agreement and it is listed on a separate agreement form, you will only have to pay back the penalty on that separate agreement. Don't forget each agreement must have a minimum of 40 acres or qualify under special provisions with highly intensified farming under line 17 on the agreement form. This is a new ruling and if you have already submitted several parcels of land under one agreement and wish to change you may do so by writing the Office of Land Use in Lansing. However, this cannot be a benefit to you immediately since you are trying to sell one parcel but a long term benefit if you decide to sell the land several years in the future. 4. If the landowner re-signs

with the program and elects to get out, what are the penalties?

If a landowner ever gets out. of the program before the contract expires he must pay; back the full amount of money which he has received

individual is in the program for 13 years, he would pay back any money which he had received during the first 13 years plus an interest charge of 6 per cent. However, if an individual will allow the contract to terminate, the only obligation is the last seven years with no interest charge. There would truly be an advantage to an individual to allow the contract to terminate prior to selling the land so there would not be the

extra amount of money to pay

back.

There is no lien against the property and the last seven years' money which you had received does not have to be paid back immediately. You may wish to wait and pay this back when you sell part or all of the property or change the farm to another use rather than agriculture. This would be interest-free until you repay the money to the state of Michigan.

6. What about a second lien with a creditor if the landowner should decide to mortgage the property?

There was a question in regard to a creditor using the land within the agreement as mortgage for another property. However, this has been clarified with the state of Michigan since the creditors would have the only lien against the property. The state of Michigan does not have a lien and they will only attach a statement to your property when the agreement is completed and this must be paid prior to the disposal of the property.

7. If the landowner dies what is the obligation to the beneficiaries?

# **Greenleaf residents still angry** over Germania Road condition

Greenleaf township residents living along Germania Road were still angry this week over what they consider a lack of action by the Sanilac County Road Commission toward rebuilding their road.

They say most of the fourmile stretch of road between Bay City-Forestville and Cass City Roads has been torn up for nearly three years. They're tired of waiting.

'We're patient people out here if we can see progress," Lynn Spencer, a Germania Road resident says. "But we haven't seen any.'

Spencer says road construction signs went up 21/2 years ago when the first quarter-mile was dug up. By the following spring, the remainder was ripped up and power and phone lines were relocated.

He and other residents along the road assumed the job would be completed that summer. It never happened. Spring is the worst time,

Spencer says. Over the past 12 months, the retired rural letter carrier maintains the road was impassable between 25 and 30 per cent of the time. "If it rains, we can't get out," he says.

Other residents are also upset. "We aren't asking for a blacktopped road," Mrs. Judy Doerr, another Germania Road resident, says. "All we want is a good, passable road. "We'll even wait for grav-

el," Jerry Cleland, who lives near Spencer, says. The residents aim much of

their wrath at Sanilac County Road Commission engineermanager Fred Elwood. One derisive sign along a particularly bad stretch of the road labels it "Elwood Boulevard' Another homemade sign

tacked up next to a water hole just north of Cass City Road labels the pond "Germania River". It offers a ferry service across the four-inch

deep water for five cents. The residents claim they can't get any satisfaction from the road commission when they call to complain.

"We get put on hold and forgotten about," Mrs. county spent the Germania Road money elsewhere and Spencer says. "Any time we didn't have the funds necestry to call, we can't seem to sary to finish the road work. get through,"

**Urge new** measles shots

Children who received measles vaccination at 12 months of age, or less, and children who received measles vaccine administered with ISG (Immune Serum Globulin) or MIG (measles Serum Globulin) should be revaccinated with live measles vaccine at 15 months of age or older to assure full protection.

Presently there are no recommendations for revaccination of children who were between 13 and 14 months of age when they received measles vaccine. If parents are not sure when their child received the vaccine they should call their doctor or the health department. A single dose of vaccine is normally needed and boosters are not required.

Measles is often a severe disease, frequently complicated by middle ear infection and broncho-pneumonia. Encephalitis, which occurs with approximately 1 out of every 1,000 reported cases of measles, often causes permanent brain damage and mental retardation. Death, predominantly from respiratory and neurologic causes is associated with measles in 1 out of every 1,000 reported cases. With the highly effective, safe vaccines now available, measles should be completely controlled in the U.S.

Still, he's trying to keep it all in perspective. "One thing about it, you shouldn't get discouraged," he said. "The singer Melanie started out this way and her test record. bombed. Yet she came back and became successful.

"That's probably one piece of advice I'd give to anyone thinking about a career in the music business. Don't get discouraged. What one person thinks isn't that great, someone else will pick up and say it has great commercial val-

What happens if he does make it big? He hasn't thought much about it, other than to say he'd probably continue to live in this area. "There are a lot of sacrifices that have to be made,' he said. "Primarily the travelling. I don't enjoy being away from my family. I don't want to take away anything from anyone I love."

That includes his wife and three-year-old daughter.

Meanwhile, he plans to continue his night job at the school, do some rehearsing and wait for the big day when he'll step behind a microphone in a recording studio and make his dream of cutting a record come true.

Another alternative is to leave the soil particles (clods) so large that the wind can't move them.

Leaving the residue of last year's crop on the surface of the land keeps the wind speed at the ground surface too slow the wind reaches eight miles to cause erosion. The effectiveness of crop residue in wind erosion control depends a pin head start moving. on the amount. Sampson said Sampson says the term "at most Michigan soils need 112-212 tons of crop residue on important because that is the soil surface for adequate wind protection and that sandy or muck soils need the

> most. You may not need all the crop residues left from corn or small grains, but you do for soy beans because there is less to start with. The real question is how

> does one prepare the land for this year's crop and still leave last year's crop residue on the soil surface? "That's simple," says Sampson, "just don't bury it with moldboard plow.

Instead of a moldboard plow, he recommends no-till farming which leaves all crop residues on the surface or using a straight point chisel plow which leaves about 80 per cent of the residue on the surface. He cautions against the use of a twisted point chisel plow which buries 40-75 per cent of the crop residue and discing which buries 25-50

per cent. If you are wondering how much crop residue you have left on the surface, there is an easy way to measure it. Simply mark off a yard square, collect, dry, and weigh the residue left on the surface in ounces, then multi-

ply by 300--the answer is the pounds of crop residue per acre. It's already too late for the fields plowed last fall. They

# New trespass law requires written okay from owner

As the 1977 fishing season momentum this gathers month, the Department of Natural Resources reminds fishermen of the new Recreational Trespass Act.

Under the new law, a person must have written permission from a landowner before hunting, fishing, or operating an off-the-roadvehicle on private land.

For fishermen, however, there is an exception.
