okay pact

A new three-year contract between Walbro Corp. and United Auto Workers Local 213 was ratified Monday afternoon by a slim two-vote

Results of the election showed workers approved the pact 153-151. Workers had stayed on the job without a contract following expiration of the old agreement Wednesday, April 27.

Overall, the contract will cost Walbro \$1.51 per hour in wages and fringe benefits over the three-year period.

Included in the agreement was a 15 cent cost of living increase per year beyond wage increases in each classification. In addition, 12 cents an hour over base pay for second shift and 15 cents for third shift were approved.

The new pact removes restrictions on Saturday overtime. In the old agreement, Saturday work was paid at straight time if a worker missed a day during the

Under the new agreement, Saturdays are paid at time and a half regardless of whether or not a day was missed during the week.

Workers also won six paid holidays between Christmas and New Year's in 1977, six days in 1978 and seven days in 1979. These are in addition to other paid holidays during the

Life insurance was increased and hospitalization went from a flat rate to "all reasonable and customary charges".

\$3.5 million project in balance

Village, Wesley's seek treatment plant accord

Cass City's proposed \$3.5 million wastewater treatment plant hung in the balance this week as representatives for the village and the parent company of Wesley's Quaker Maid, Inc., attempted to solve a problem that could tie up the project indefinitely.

Village Supt. Lou LaPonsie said Tuesday afternoon negotiations were still in process with attorneys for Borman Foods, Inc. of Detroit, parent company of Wesley's, which may result in a letter of intent from the firm needed before the treatment plant project can continue.

LaPonsie said the company attorney was checking the interpretation of Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) rules regarding user charges and how binding a commitment will be needed from Wesley's in order for the company to participate.

Without the letter, indications are EPA would have to turn down Cass City's application for \$2.8 million in

federal money needed to construct the plant.

Late last week, company attorney Lawrence Stockler advised the firm not to commit itself to the plant.

In a letter to Wesley manager Gerald Stilson, he said reasons included unknown cost factors and the commitment to pay \$10,000 a year over 30 years as its share for waste treatment at the plant.

He also said a modern freeway system may one day result in a decline of the Cass City plant's operation and said the "expected" population (growth) should pay for the added plant capacity.

Village officials Tuesday took a conciliatory tack, seeking to arrange an agreement which would satisfy Wesley's and keep the treatment plant

project moving on schedule. Village President Lambert Aithaver said Cass City wasn't notified by EPA until late March that Wesley's was a "major user", meaning it

According to statistics gathered from water usage, the plant contributed about 20 per cent of the current plant's capacity last year. Since then, Wesley's has reportedly cut back on the amount of

Under EPA rules, all major users must sign a letter of intent, stating that they will comply with the rules when the plant goes into service.

Under the present timetable, construction of the new plant was expected to get under way sometime this

Village officials are worried that if the project has to

the year after that. There's also concern that the current \$300 million available through various grants may either dry up or the formula for splitting it with local communities may be revised.

Officials of Hubbel, Roth and Clark, village engineers, also have been seeking clarification of EPA rules governing the treatment plant grant. Nothing official had been heard from Washington at press time.


Both LaPonsie and Althaver stressed they want to reach an agreement with Wesley's which would satisfy both sides and get the treatment plant moving again.

Jensen takes reins

New administrator sees bright future at Hills and Dales toward the family practice and Britain and I still think

Health care is still the best buy in the country today, despite its relatively high cost. But that doesn't mean hospitals shouldn't try to cut their expenses as much as possible.

At least that's how Ken E. Jensen, new administrator at Hills and Dales General Hos-

pital, sees it. Jensen, who says he's 'pushing 40", took over the reins at the hospital in late April following the resignation of administrator Bruce Krider, Actually, Jensen is an employee of Saginaw General Hospital whose services are contracted by the board at Hills and Dales.

A native of Duluth, Minn., Jensen served as an administrative assistant at Asbury Hospital in Minneapolis and at a hospital in Menominee, Wis. He became administrator in Menominee in 1969 and came to Saginaw General this year after a dozen years in Wisconsin.

He admits he'd never heard of Cass City or the Thumb prior to his new job, but he

says he's learning fast. "I see this job as a challenge," Jensen said, leaning back in his office chair and puffing on a pipe.

"This community has an excellent facility and a good group of people working here," he said. "It's probably one of the finest rural hospitals in the state.' He says his main concern is

trying to hold costs down by sharing services. He's particularly happy with the arrangement between Hills and Dales and Saginaw General. "I'm the type that if you

give me \$50,000 or \$40,000 or \$10,000 to do a job, I'm going to see if I can't get it done for \$5,000," he said.

Jensen, a graduate of the University of Minnesota and a six-year veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps, doesn't think rural hospitals such as Hills and Dales ought to specialize. Instead, he thinks the hospital should provide for "common volume needs".

"It should be able to handle the typical kinds of illness and injuries that come here," he says. "It should be oriented and general surgery.'

SMALL HOSPITALS IMPORTANT Jensen says the cry that there are too many small

hospitals isn't being heard as much these days from medical experts. "I think the worm is turning," he says. "I think you'll see the day coming when the

rural hospital ranks in importance with larger hospitals because, after all, this is where the people are." By sharing services with a large hospital such as Sagi-

naw General, Jensen says Hills and Dales has a better chance of cutting costs than without it. He's not particularly happy with President Carter's atti-

tude toward reducing medical costs by cutting down on hospital reimbursements. "If you figure it costs eight

cents out of every dollar for health care, it's a tremendous buy," he says. "Even if it went up to 20 cents it would still be a good buy.

"I've studied health systems in Canada, Scandinavia lenges on the job is getting the

there's no comparison with what we have.

"I'm against socialized medicine. I can see a need for a national health insurance plan with a flexible reimbursement system for hospitals that can advance health

He said simply being against increasing health care costs is misleading. If you say health care has increased 1,000 per cent in cost since 1950, you have to consider how it's changed, he

"Our life expectancy is longer than it was in 1950," he says. "Equipment is better. We didn't have the types of physical therapy in 1950 we have now. We didn't have cardiac machines, pacemakers and all the rest.

"In 1950, the average patient stay was 18½ days. Today it's five. That means a

BUILDING PROGRAM

Jensen sees one of his chal-

hospital's building program under way as quickly as possible.

He said last week a letter of intent to build has been sent to the State Department of Public Health. After that, a Certificate of Need must be approved and once that's done, construction can get under wav.

Just how soon all that happens isn't known, but Jensen says it will come as fast as the bureaucracy can be prodded to act.

Jensen says he's also anxious to maintain a good working relationship with hospital employees which he described as "fine, beautiful people."

For the time being, Jensen, who is married and the father of four children, Kim, 20, Debbie, 18, Jeffrey, 16 and Jimmy, 14, is staying by himself in Cass City. He said his family plans to join him

after school is out. He is the third administrator at the hospital since Saginaw General was brought into the operation in 1974.

China is for painting, says artist Myrtle Ludlow

By Jim Ketchum

Fine china is something you use at the dinner table, right? Not entirely. If you're an artist like Mrs. Myrtle Ludlow of Cass City, anything made of china is the setting for a myriad of color and

Mrs. Ludlow has been creating multi-colored flowers on china plates, cups, saucers and an assortment of serving dishes for over 13 years and in that time, she figures she's decorated at least 100 plates with roses, violets, morning glories and just about any flower you can name.

"It's relaxation for me," Mrs. Ludlow says. "I get great satisfaction out of the finished product. It's pretty.'' Not everybody can simply

sit down and start painting fine china, I proved it when Mrs. Ludlow handed me a cruet, a brush and an array of paints and turned me loose on a pattern she'd already

It's definitely not as easy as she makes it look.

"It takes time to learn the technique for holding the brush and knowing just how

much paint to put on it," she said as she picked up a blank plate and began spreading light blue paint on the sur-

Three or four strokes later. she had produced a morning glory blossom. She used no pattern.

For other designs, Mrs. Ludlow traces the pattern on tracing paper, then transfers it to the plate using carbon paper. In some cases, she draws the design on the surface with India ink.

But the ink or carbon tracings aren't a permanent part of the plate. They disappear after one "firing", Mrs. Ludlow says.

"After you paint it once, you place it inside the kiln and fire it for about two hours." she says. "Then you paint it again and fire it until you get the shade you want."

The firing takes place inside an electrically-powered kiln in which temperatures can range from 1,000 to 2,400 degrees Fahrenheit. The intense heat bonds the paint to the plate permanently and literally burns off the ink and carbon.

Many of her finest works

have been fired three times. She emphasized that she doesn't heat up her kiln just for one or two pieces. She waits until she has a full load before she does a firing.

Mrs: Ludlow began her china painting career in 1963 under the tutelage of the late Fannie Hutchinson as part of a group of women who met with her regularly to learn the fine points of the craft.

After Mrs. Hutchinson died, Mrs. Ludlow said the group continued to meet. Today, Mrs. Ludlow, Mrs. Marion Keating and Mrs. Mildred Herr get together each Wednesday for a china painting session.

'It's work but it's a lot of fun, too," she says. "I guess that's why I like it."

China painting isn't the cheapest hobby in the world, Mrs. Ludlow said. Paints alone run an average of 50 to 85 cents for a small vial. Some have particles of gold in them and they can run as much as \$4.50 a vial.

Then there are the plates themselves which begin around \$2.50 for an eight-inch plate and beyond \$3.00 for larger plates. Cup and saucer sets run about \$3.00 each and salt and pepper shakers sell for around \$2,25 each.

'Actually, the prices vary, depending on what you want," she says.

PAINTING TECHNIQUE

The technique used in painting the designs involves more than simply picking up a brush and painting.

For one thing, colors are mixed by combining the powdered paint pigment with a dab of oil on a porcelain tile with a knife.

Then it takes just a hint of color on the end of a continuously treated brush with fine strokes to achieve the color. Additional color is painted on the surface following each firing until the final hue is achieved.

ORDINANCE 89

AN ORDINANCE GOVERNING EN-ERGY CONSERVATION IN NEW BUILDING DESIGN: PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS: MAK-ING OF INSPECTIONS AND EN-FORCEMENT: PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES IN VIOLATION THERE-

The Village of Cass City Ordains:

Section I. Rules Adopted The Village of Cass City hereby adopts by reference the Michigan Energy Code and rules relating thereto promulgated by the Construction Code Commission under the authority granted to it by Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1972 as amended, and in accordance with the Michigan Administrative Procedures Act of 1969 as amended. Said rules shall be available for public distribution, at a reasonable charge, with not less than ten (10) copies to be available for public inspection at the office of the Village

Section II. Designated Officials The Village building inspector shall be responsible for the administration of this ordinance, processing applications, issuing permits, inspecting sites, and determining whether work under permits issued pursuant to this ordinance complies with regulations adopted herein.

Section III. Permits, Inspections, Non-Compliance, Appeals The procedures for filing applications and obtaining permits, on site inspections, the issuance of stop work orders in the event of non-compliance, and appeal from decisions of the building inspector shall be the same as those established and contained in the Ordinance 76, the Building Code of the Village of Cass City, and are hereby adopted by reference thereto. Application for permits under this ordinance shall be filed with the required application under the Building Code. No separate fee shall be charged for the processing of the application under this ordinance. The

building inspector shall issue only

permit under the Building Code, which shall indicate thereon that the applicant has complied with this ordinance.

Section IV. Violations, Penalty

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than One Hundred (\$100) Dollars for each offense, or shall be punished by Imprisonment in the County Jall for a period not to exceed 90 days for each offense, or may be both fined and imprisoned as provided herein. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist, shall constitute a separate offense. The imposition of any sentence shall not exempt the offender from compliance with the requirements of this ordinance. The rights and remedies provided herein are cumulative and in addition to all other

remedies provided by law. Section V. Effective date This ordinance shall become effective twenty (20) days after its





Blind cook at home in kitchen

Working 'in the dark' no problem for Freiburger

By Jim Ketchum

Men who can't boil water without burning it don't have any excuses for their lack of cooking ability just because they're men. One of Cass City's handiest men in the kitchen can prepare a full meal without so much as from whipping up a roast,

unsettling one nerve. Alger Freiburger of 6592

Third St. gets around the kitchen with the ease of a Graham Kerr or Julia Child. What makes it even more unusual is that Freiburger is totally blind.

Blindness, which struck him in 1965, didn't keep Freiburger out of the kitchen very long. He already knew what to do. The only problem became finding things.


"The major adjustment I had to make when I became blind was in knowing where everything was," he recalled. "And of course it's a little safer for me to use an electric stove instead of gas because there's a chance you could catch your clothing on fire with an open flame.'

He prepares everything, down to the coffee which isn't hard either. Using a scoop for just the right amount of coffee, about the only tricky part is not overfilling the cup.

That's easy to handle, too, he says. Simply place a finger over the rim and pour until the liquid reaches it.

Despite his blindness, Freiburger still buys the family's meat supply. A former grocery store owner himself, he knows the cuts he wants and how to prepare them.

And in case you men who don't like to help with the dishes were wondering, Freiburger keeps a spotless kitch-
