Hills and Dales General Hospital only has one major hurdle to clear before the hospital board can advertise for bids for construction of its emergency and out-patient services building.

That will take place Sept. 8 when the Project Review Committee of the East Central Michigan Health Systems Agency conducts a hearing to review the hospital's application to build the facility.

The committee then makes a recommendation to the governing board for the 14county health agency, which then approves or rejects the application. Approval is expected.

The hearing is mandated under the National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974. The law requires hospitals and other health institutions to seek approval for major projects from the state health department and regional health planning agency in order to eliminate unnecessary duplication and ensure the projects are needed.

The 3 p.m. hearing at the Ramada Inn in Saginaw also concerns applications from three other hospitals and a nursing home form concerning various building projects. Hills and Dales Administrator Ken E. Jensen hopes final approval from the health systems agency board will come within about 30 days.

After that, he said, it will take about a month for the architects to draw up the final specifications. The hospital board can then advertise for construction bids.

The goal is to start construction before the end of the year. The project will take 18 months to complete.

Included in the construction and as part of the Sept. 8 hearing will be correction of licensing deficiencies at the estimate provided by Har-

man-Tibedeau-Wedge & Ashospital.

Rioting rocks Owendale track

Rioting took the place of racing Sunday night at the Owendale Speedway, with police officers being called from numerous Thumb communities to quell the disturbance

Efforts were made during the disturbance to burn the concession and restroom buildings at the track, but the fires were put out with fire extinguishers prior to the arrival of Owendale firemen. State police from Bad Axe

were the first ones called, just before 9 p.m. The serious trouble erupted about 10:30. Before it was over, there were state police there from Caro and Sandusky, in addition to Bad Axe, and troopers

in Bay City were put on alert. There were sheriff's deputies there from Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac counties. Officers from Cass City, Gagetown, Caro, most communities in Huron county and some in Sanilac county were also dispatched. A total of 30-40 officers were at the track, according to state po-

lice. No serious injuries were reported in the melee.

Most races at the two tracks were for hobby stocks, also called "flyers". At Thunder Road, they were only allowed to run 7-inch wide tires, but at Owendale, they could run 10-inch wide tires.

Mrs. Duncan said her husband was sitting on a front end loader, and was then hit with various thrown objects, including stones. She quoted her husband as saying he drove the loader onto the track but did not hit any race cars.

Some witnesses claimed Duncan drove the machine into one car, and narrowly missed the wives of two drivers, who were sitting on the fenders of their husband's

cars A driver who was present said it appeared Duncan drove the loader onto the track in order to clear the car from the track that was blocking the race from start-

Mrs. Duncan, who was in the concession stand, said the spectators -- estimated at about 600 -- started yelling for

the racing to begin. She said the people in the stands "were not unruly," that it was disgruntled drivers' wives, loval to the old track management, that started throwing things.

According to police, some spectators began throwing rocks, bottles, and beer cans onto the track after Duncan cancelled the evening's show. partly because it started raining, and refused to give refunds.

With cans and stones flying, his wife said, it was impossible for her to give out refunds.

She added that insurance prohibits running in the rain, and that standard procedure is to honor the tickets at the next race.

The driver contacted by the Chronicle, who didn't want to be named, said he never has run at a track that gave refunds, that they always give "rain checks."

Loss heavy in village

house fire

Damage has been estimated at \$20,500 due to a noontime fire Tuesday in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Diebel, 4176 Maple Street.

Elkland Township Fire structural damage at only about \$2,500. Heavy smoke, however, resulted in estimated damage of \$18,000 in terms of needed repainting, new carpeting, cleaning, and damaged furnishings.

The fire started, according to the fire chief, in electrical wiring running along studs in the basement ceiling in the northeast corner of the home, apparently due either to a short or overloaded line.

The fire burned through the ceiling into the wall and floor above it, in a child's bedroom.

No one was home at the time of the fire. Mrs. Diebel said she left the home about 10:15 a.m. and her husband, who is an auxiliary fireman, about a half-hour later. She returned home about 12:15 to find the house full of smoke. Her dog, a small poodle, ran out as soon as she opened the door.

Firemen initially had to wear oxygen tanks and masks when entering the home. They were at the scene about 1¼ hours.

Ironically, a "for sale" sign was posted in the front yard.

The replacements will use pre-stressed concrete beams, with either concrete or steel tubular guard rails. All will have load limits the same as for class A highways; that is, any vehicles that can legally travel on highways in terms of weight will be able to use the bridges.

The new bridges will be from 28 to 36 feet wide, in most instances wider than the ones they are replacing.

Which bridges get replaced when depends on their present condition and the amount of traffic that uses them, Wellington explained.

Funding for the bridge construction comes from two other sources, in addition to the county bridge millage. Townships in which the bridges are built pay \$2,000 per bridge. The rest of the

money, about 71-75 per cent of the total cost, comes from various federal programs. Wellington said federal funds have been assured for the road commission's 1978 program. Since that isn't true yet for 1979, that year's schedule is still tentative.

By township, the 1978 bridge construction program is as follows (add \$2,000 per bridge for township contribution)

Ellington -- Hurds Corner Road south of Dutcher Road, over Cass River, current load limit 7 tons. Federal contribution, \$150,000; from bridge millage, \$56,000.

Hurds Corner Road south of Broadway Road, over White Creek, 2 tons. Federal contribution, \$180,000; bridge millage, \$40,000.

Cass City Supt. Donald G. Crouse pointed out his district won't gain in revenue from the property transfer, that the gain in local property taxes will be offset by the loss in state aid.

Owen-Gage Supt. Ronald G. Erickson remained confident the Supreme Court will ultimately decide in his district's favor. "Don't be premature," he cautioned.

The gain of the Goslin parcel, Crouse said, will mean about 55 more students living in the district. However, of those, all but about 12 previously attended the Cass City district as non-resident students.

As non-resident students, they had to provide their own transportation to the nearest point in the Cass City district, where they could catch a school bus.

The addition of the parcel, according to the superintendent, required a revision of one bus route to pick up the 55 students

The attorneys for the 42 property owners in the Goslin parcel, Barley and Kleeb of Howell, filed their response to Schouman's motions with the supreme court Wednesday, Aug. 31.

The state attorney general's office, acting for the state board of education, also filed a response Wednesday. In turn, Schouman filed a reply Friday.

The attorney said his appeal contains two basic arguments: That the Owen-Gage board does have legal standing to appeal the state board of education decision and that the Goslin parcel, together with other pending property transfers, constitutes more than 10 per cent of the area of the school district. Accordingly, under state law, residents of the district must approve the transfers in a public referendum.

Barley and Kleeb's arguments, of course, are the

opposite. James Barley explained their response argues that the appeals court was correct in that the school board did not have the authority to appeal and that the Goslin parcel constitutes less than 10 per cent of the Owen-Gage district. The law, he

said, only applies to property contained in one transfer petition, not to all of them. lumped together, therefore, no public vote is needed. According to Schouman, the attorney general's brief

supporting the state board of education says that the appeals court was wrong in saying the Owen-Gage board couldn't appeal but that the lower court should be upheld because the Goslin parcel is less than 10 per cent of the district.

Barley agreed on the latter but said the attorney general 'sidestepped the issue of standing.

In another legal maneuver, on Schouman's recommendation, the Owen-Gage board Aug. 23 scheduled a special election Oct. 22 for residents to vote whether they approve of transfer of property to other school districts.

As of Friday, Schouman hadn't written the official wording for the ballot proposal

McConkey said some thought has been given to dividing the present courtroom into two courtrooms, but it isn't known yet whether that is practical.

The Cass City commissioner leans toward the idea of a third judge. He pointed out that due to the large number of criminal cases, there has only been one civil trial in Tuscola county so far this year. The backlog for civil cases is about two years. "It just is not a good way to do business," he commented. Because of the need for two courtrooms with three

judges, Tuscola Prosecutor Patrick Joslyn suggests splitting the 40th circuit, with one judge being assigned fulltime to Tuscola county, The prosecutor bases his suggestion on the assumption

the two circuit judges at present spend the majority of their time in Lapeer county, thus one full-time judge here would be able to process more cases than are being processed now.

With three judges for the two counties and two of them holding trials in Caro at once. Joslyn explained he or an assistant would have to be in each courtroom. At the same time, there would be a need

At present, Joslyn has one assistant. With one full-time judge here, he said, he could get by with two, but with three judges for the two counties, he would need three. And with each attorney, he needs a secretary.

Joslyn's present assistant, Thomas Carlson, is leaving to go into private practice. The new assistant will be Scott Steruer, who has been working in the prosecutor's officein a state-funded program to make divorced fathers pay child support who haven't been paying. A new attorney will be hired to fill Steruer's position.

The prosecutor is also looking for a secretary, as one of the two in his office just quit for another job.

Even without a new circuit judge, Joslyn said he could use two more assistants, one result of which would be less plea bargaining.

For the 12 months starting July 1, 1975, according to the prosecutor, 33 felony cases went to trial and 96 resulted in pleas. Most of the latter were plea bargains, with the defendant pleading guilty to a esser charge or to only one of more than one charge against

him. With a shortage of staff and the fact that a circuit judge can only try about 40 felony cases a year, Joslyn feels plea bargaining is a necessity under present circumstances.

It takes months of planning Taking things as they come and work to put together an and selling them at a profit is agricultural show that will attract an expected 30,000 persons and still remain relevant to modern farming. That's the intent of a committee of 30 farmers who are the backbone of Michigan Farm Expo '77.

The exposition will be on the 1,250-acre farm of John Homakie Sr. and Jr. at Colling and Cass City Roads in Columbia township.

Caro area farmer Jim Vollman, the Expo chairman, explained the event will not have a carnival atmosphere. "We want to provide agricultural producers with information they can use in next year's cropping program," For non-farmers, he said, "I guess it's also a way to show how 4 per cent of the population feeds the rest, and we're pretty proud of that." John Homakie concurred. "It's a big undertaking alright, especially when you have to do it along with your farm work, but we are just as interested in seeing these new crop and machinery developments as everyone else.

"The results of last year's Expo made quite an impression on us and we wanted to see it in our area again." He pointed to a more practical aspect: "Where else could you have the chance to see more than 100 pieces of equipment in action and evaluate the performance of each? This can be mighty important to the guy thinking about buying a new tractor

next winter." Bill Bortel, Expo coordinator and Tuscola County exten-sion director, said, "I have never worked with a more progressive group of farmers than there are in this county. For the most part, they are always eager to try out the new ideas in agriculture. "That, in large measure, is

how last year's Expo got started -- they wanted to gather together in one exposition all of the latest technology and equipment developments in agriculture."

An estimated 10,000 attended last year's Expo but that wasn't a true indication of interest, because more than two inches of rain drowned out the second day's activity.

Those who did attend weren't disappointed. They saw 200 acres of corn and sugar beet harvest and tillage operations on an equal amount of land. More than 100 exhibitors displayed everything from tractors to hybird seed corn.

This year's Expo will be twice the size of last year's format. Here's the line-up of demonstrations:

There will be daily harvesting of corn (100 acres), corn silage (20), dry beans (15), and sugar beets (80), and daily tillage demonstrations on 240 acres.

Cropping demonstrations include cultural and harvest practices of corn, sugar beets, and dry beans under a variety of fertilization and herbicide application rates. There will be 48 corn varieties in show plots, a corn

challenge yield under two tillage programs (which will hopefully produce 200 bushels per acre), and a variety of herbicide demonstrations. Sugar beet demonstration

plots will contain sound herbicide treatments and results of a soil anticrusting applica-

Navy bean plots are to demonstrate effectiveness of several herbicides and inoculation and noninoculation under compacted and noncompacted soil conditions, Another plot will show the results of bean yield under mechanical damage conditions contrasted to beans without seed coat damage. Forty acres have been set

aside for equipment, seed, and chemical displays by manufacturers major throughout the United States. MSU agricultural specialists will have 15 educational clinics dealing with topics from using the computer for marketing to trimming energy requirements.

Special events for women and youth are also planned. Further information is available at the county extension office.

Duck and goose hunting in the lower peninsula starts Oct. 12, the state Natural Resources Commission has decided. The waterfowl season starts Oct. 1 in the Upper Peninsula.

Although a definite decision has yet to be made, it appears the traditional sunrise to sunset shooting hours will remain in effect.

Point system values similar to last year's apply again for the daily bag limit.

The one exception to the above mentioned opening dates is that the goose hunting

season also opens Oct. 1 for the northern lower peninsula and Saginaw County Goose Management Zone. Hunters wanting to enter

Application forms for the drawings are available from Department of Natural Resources offices.

Larry Sokol, 35, drives forklift at the Pontiac Motor Division plant in Pontiac. His wife, Linda, is a self-employed interior decorator. Howard Kelley, 42, fixes machinery at the Saginaw Steering Gear plant in Saginaw. His spouse, Gerry, is a housewife.

But when the Cass City foursome go on vacation, they leave their cars and pickup trucks behind and hop on their motorcycles.

Wherever possible, they travel on the more scenic back roads, as opposed to the four-lane divided highways, The two couples always stay in motels, preferably small ones so they can park their cycles just outside the door to guard against poten-

tial thieves. Not all of their travel this year was by motorcycle. The four went on a horse and buggy ride in Quebec and took a ferry to Martha's Vineyard, a Massachusetts island south of Cape Cod.

They did take two of their three cycles with them on the ferry so they could ride around the island.

Larry and Linda each ride a 750 Honda. Gerry Kelley prefers to let her husband do the driving, so sits on the back of their Italian-made Moto Guzzi 850.

In their four years of touring, they have not had an accident or mechanical breakdown, other than a broken chain once on Larry's bike. It took about 20 minutes for him to replace it with the spare he carried with him.

For protection, each of the riders wears a leather jacket and helmet. If it rains, they put on their rain suits -preferably just before it starts raining, as opposed to just after.

Although they stay fairly dry -- the windshield fairings on their bikes also help by deflecting much of the water - riding in the rain does have one disadvantage.

When cars pass by, Mrs. Sokol said, the occupants 'wave at you and laugh.' Other than when it's rain-

ing, the four agree the people they encounter on their trips have always been friendly. Most of the reaction comes from people driving in cars,

according to Kelley, "especially when they see your license plates.'

In addition to wonderment about the distance they travel, another common reaction, Sokol said, is a nostalgic "I used to" from older motorists who used to ride motorcycles. As for other motorcyclists, Mrs. Sokol said they saw more of them on the road this year than they ever have. It was Mrs. Sokol who got

her husband interested in motorcycling. Her fondness for the two-wheelers goes back to when she was a little girl, though she didn't get her own machine until 10 years ago

Howard Kelley bought his first cycle in 1968 and then his wife got interested in the sport.

In addition to the touring machines, each family also owns a bike for riding on dirt. In addition to his two-wheel sport, Larry Sokol owns a four-wheel super modified race car, which he races at the Thunder Road Speedway. Motorcycles are an economical way to travel. Kelley's total fuel bill for the 2.300 miles this year was \$30.11; the Sokols', about twice that with their two cycles.

Their cycles aren't, though, what a high school kid would buy with what he makes from a part-time job.

Including accessories such as the fairings and saddlebags, the Kelleys have about \$3,500 invested in their twincylinder Moto Guzzi

With accessories (including a regular radio on one, a citizens band radio on the other), Larry and Linda Sokols' four-cylinder Hondas are

each worth about \$2,700. As for next year, the four are planning to travel out West. They were hoping to make that trip this year, but didn't have enough time. If the enthusiasm of Linda

Sokol is typical, they can hardly wait. "It sure is fun," she ex-
