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## Mediator called for in intermediate district talks

Non-professional employees of the Tuscola County Intermediate District have authorized their negotiating committee to call for "supportive actions" to protest lack of progress on a new contract.

But based on what was termed "substantial progress" with intermediate board negotiators Monday night and a decision to call in a state mediator, no action will be taken immediately.

The action, if any is taken, could include a strike. "We do intend to take action and it will probably interrupt school services," said Jane Lalko of Kingston, president of the Tuscola Intermediate Paraprofessional Association (TIPPA) prior to Monday night's negotiating session.

The Michigan Education Association-Organizations affiliate represents approximately 125 secretaries, bus drivers, teacher aides, and custodians.

The employees voted a year ago to organize and affiliate with the MEA-O. Negotiations for the first-ever contract with the intermediate board started in early June.

In addition to the paraprofessional group, the intermediate board will soon start -- or restart -- negotiations with its professional employees, who voted Friday to be represented in bargaining by the Tri-County Bargaining Association.

A statement read by Mrs. Lalko after Monday night's negotiation session, said, "Substantial progress was made at the bargaining session, which lasted until after midnight. Several articles of a proposed contract were

agreed to, including vacations, probation, and sick leave.

"Other areas of the contract remain open. Both parties have agreed to call in a state mediator in an attempt to settle unresolved issues. "A date for mediation has not been set, but TIPPA would like to get back to the bargaining table as soon as possible.

"Issues yet to be resolved include employee protection, working conditions, grievance procedure, and salary and fringe benefits.

"The TIPPA negotiators are not encouraged by the board's reluctance to move in non-economic areas, yet maintain a positive attitude toward reaching an agreement."

Intermediate Superintendent Dr. Bruce J. Dunn was optimistic about reaching an agreement with the paraprofessionals. "I think with the paraprofessionals, we're very close and hope to reach a settlement soon," he said Monday morning.

As he saw it, the major issue is hospitalization benefits for part-time employees. The intermediate district only wants to offer them for full-time employees; the non-professional union wants them also for part-time workers.

As for pay, he said, "We're very close together on that."

The Tuscola Intermediate Education Association, a Michigan Education Association affiliate, represents the district's professional staff -- including special education teachers, school psychologists and social workers, and speech therapists. It has 68 members.

The TIEA made its last contract agreement with the intermediate board in June, the professional staff having worked the 1976-77 school year without a contract. Negotiations started on the new contract in July.

TIEA President Peggy Jean Joslin of Caro said her union wanted to see how negotiations progressed before deciding to petition (in September) for the representation election.

The vote Friday in favor of

being represented by the Tri-County Bargaining Association (TCBA), she said, was 40 in favor, 12 wanting continued representation by the TIEA, and one with no preference.

Up to now, she said, the major issue discussed with the district bargainers was the school calendar. There was some discussion about contract language, but nothing was settled. The negotiators never got to the issue of salary.

Job security remains a concern of the staff, she in-

dicated. The previous contract only established a procedure for layoffs and recall by the intermediate district.

The next step, Miss Joslin said, will be appointment of a TCBA bargaining team, which will include from 1-3 intermediate staff members, and then start negotiations.

Dr. Dunn, stating that the results of the election recognizing the TCBA haven't been certified yet, declined comment Monday about negotiations with the professional staff.

## Seven accidents

### Cars, deer often collide

Car-deer accidents in the area were numerous during the past week.

At noon Thursday, Nov. 17, Caro state police reported, Lonnie R. Ernst, 35, of Dorance Road, Kingston, struck a deer while westbound on Stevens Road, east of Murray Road. He was given a permit to keep the animal.

Also last Thursday, according to sheriff's deputies, Delbert A. Englehart, 22, of 5656 DeLong Road, Cass City, struck a deer while westbound on Deckerville Road, east of Hurds Corner Road, at 5:45 a.m. In braking to avoid hitting the animal, his rear wheels locked up and the vehicle went out of control and rolled over.

Walter S. Partaka, 62, of Ubyly, was northbound on M-19 at 6:35 p.m. Friday, north of Bay City-Forestville Road, when he struck a deer, Bad Axe state police reported.

At 7 p.m. Friday, Bad Axe troopers said Michael A. Troemner, 17, of Cass City, struck a deer with his pickup while westbound on Bay City-Forestville Road, a half-mile west of M-53.

Wallace A. Hammond Jr., 22, of Harbor Beach, according to Tuscola deputies, was headed northeast on M-81, southwest of Colwood Road, at 11:20 a.m. Saturday when he struck a deer. He was given a permit to keep the animal.

Kimith H. Hill, 21, of 5296 Robinson Road, Cass City, struck a deer at 11:45 a.m. Saturday. Deputies said he

was eastbound on M-81, west of Crawford Road. He was given a permit to keep it.

Michael LeValley, 37, of Monroe Street, Caro, was westbound on Deckerville Road, just east of Dodge Road, deputies said, when a deer jumped into the path of his vehicle. The accident took place at 8 p.m. Sunday.

In the one non-car-deer accident reported, deputies said Paul A. Glentz, 19, of Sandusky, was eastbound on M-46, east of Phillips Road, when he slowed to let a vehicle turn.

A truck-trailer started to pass him, and in doing so, struck the Glentz vehicle in the left rear. The driver of the truck did not stop after the 7:30 a.m. Saturday accident.

State Police Trooper Charles H. Seeley, 32, of Ubyly, injured in an off-duty accident Nov. 5, was released from Huron Memorial Hospital in Bad Axe last week. His mother and two sisters live in Cass City.

Seeley was driving his own car when it collided with a van which apparently ran a stop sign. The van driver, Robert E. Boyer, 44, of Warren, was killed. The accident took place at Atwater and Bad Axe Roads, west of Ubyly.

A Mayville boy, William Sarles, 7, was still reported in critical condition Monday afternoon in the intensive care unit at St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw. He has been there since being struck by a car Oct. 26 in Mayville.

## Road commission ready for winter

"We hope there isn't any snow, but whatever comes, we'll remove it."

Since Robert Wellington, engineer for the Tuscola County Road Commission, doesn't live in Florida, chances are there will be lots of snow for commission workers to remove before winter is over.

Last winter was one the road commission would rather not repeat, as plowed out roads often drifted shut again.

The agency had \$150,000 budgeted for snow plowing last winter on county and local roads. Wellington didn't have the specific figures available, but said more than that was spent.

He pointed out that the

more spent on snow plowing, the less there is available for maintenance during the rest of the year.

For the fiscal year starting Jan. 1, the road commission has budgeted \$70,000 for plowing on primary roads and \$121,000 for local roads. Wellington also didn't have the figures on how much is budgeted for this winter (1977-78) and how much for next winter.

The road commission also does maintenance and snow removal on state highways in the county, under contract with the Department of State Highways and Transportation.

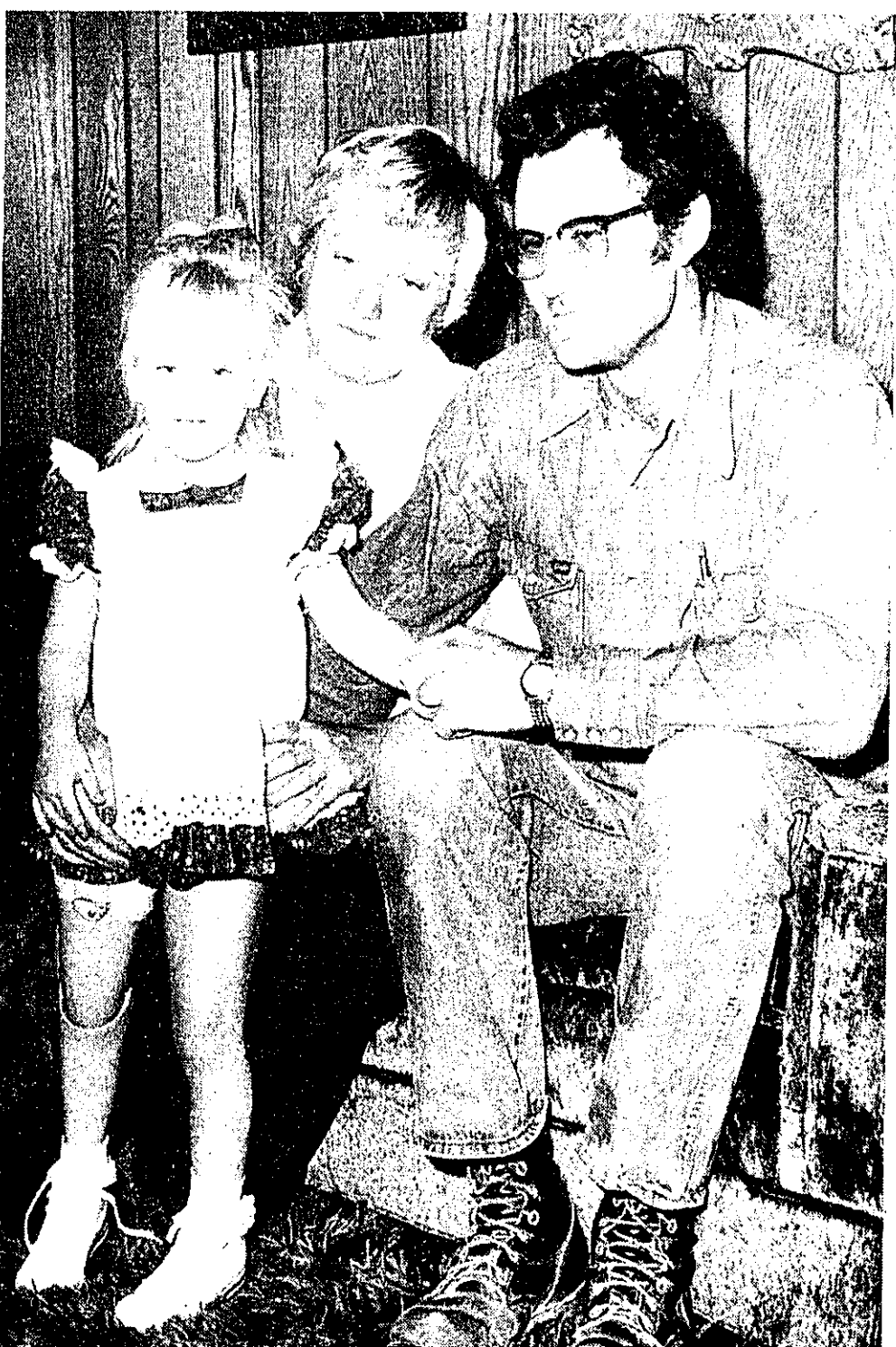
Although the highway department sets a certain

amount for snow clearing, Wellington said, additional funds are available should they be needed.

The road commission gets about \$1,800 per mile of state road per year for maintenance and snow clearing. For county and local roads, slightly under \$600 per mile is available from state motor fuel tax and license plate proceeds for maintenance, snow removal, and construction.

With more money available for work on the state highways, commission crews are more likely to be seen removing snow from them after hours and on weekends when necessary.

## Janna Herron - Miracles helped her to survive

The Edward Herron family doesn't need Thanksgiving to remind them to be thankful. They have Janna Herron for that.

Janna is three now, but if it weren't for the work of some dedicated doctors in Ann Arbor and a few miracles from upstairs, her life would have ended only a few days after it began.

Janna was born to Janice Herron on Aug. 2, 1974, at 10 a.m. in Hills and Dales General Hospital.

There were two things wrong with the eight-pound, 10-ounce infant, low blood sugar and breathing problems.

The baby was taken by ambulance to Saginaw General Hospital "and that's where the slip-up happened," Mrs. Herron explained in a now matter-of-fact voice.

To overcome the low-blood sugar deficiency, she had to be fed intravenously with glucose through her navel. However, the vein there is hard to find and when the doctor injected the needle, he missed.

A blood clot formed. Doc-

tors said there was nothing they could do, but suggested the baby be taken to Mott's Children's Hospital at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, which was done by ambulance before she was 24 hours old.

There the waiting began, with little hope the baby would live. It was thought the clot would go one of two ways, to her brain which would cause mental retardation or to her heart, which would kill her. There was the slight possibility it would dissolve.

The clot did none of those things, instead going to her right thigh. After five days, the maximum doctors could wait before gangrene set in, they amputated her right leg, which by then had turned jet black. Only a very short stub was left.

It was still touch and go for the next 10 days to two weeks before it was definite the baby would survive. Doctors and nurses called her their "miracle child." For the first 10 days, Mrs. Herron was still in Hills and Dales recuperating.

Her mother, Mrs. Virginia

Gierman of Decker, stayed the first week in Ann Arbor and Edward Herron drove there about every other day.

It was five weeks before Janna came home. For the next three weeks, every three hours around the clock, her parents had to clean the open incision with peroxide where her leg was amputated and then bandage it. That was so the wound would heal from the inside out. If it healed from the outside, there would have been complications later on.

For the first six months, there was the fear that Janna might be mentally retarded, due to lack of oxygen at birth because of her respiratory problems. After that, it was apparent her responses were normal.

Today, at age 3, Janna is a perky little blonde, seemingly in continual motion, with apparent above average intelligence.

Mrs. Herron, 36, adds, "I don't know if she's more active or I'm older." The youngest did ask once what happened to her leg. "We told her and that's all

that was ever said," according to her father.

She still suffers from low blood sugar, which requires her parents to keep a careful eye on what she eats, which must be high in protein. It's possible she may outgrow the condition.

Once a month, she goes back to Mott for checking of her artificial leg.

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## "If It Fitz..." Executing TV execs

There are a couple of things you should know, about how to treat TV executives, and how to eat Heath candy bars.

Evel Knievel recently pleaded guilty to charges of hitting a TV executive with a baseball bat, breaking the guy's arm. Evel didn't like something the executive had written about him.

This sounds like a great idea for a TV series. People are bored watching brave Knievel jump his motorcycle over canyons and buses. Why doesn't he jump it over a long line of TV executives, live and in color, once a week?

The TV executives could be lined up, flat on their backs, on a football field. They could be arranged according to their contributions to the nation's culture.

At the far end, nearest to Knievel's descending wheels, could be the executive who decided it would be cute if one of the Osmond brothers were

a girl. Next could come the executive who introduced Laverne to Shirley.

There also would be dangerous spots reserved in Knievel's line for all TV bosses responsible for big-family shows in which hundreds of siblings resolve each other's crises by exchanging boring sermons while waiting to get into the bathroom.

Viewers would vote each week on which executives should be added to the imperiled line below Evel's soaring motorcycle. At least one executive would be added each week, and none would be allowed to leave, except to go to the siblings' bathroom.

The terrible suspense would grow weekly, right along with the length of the line of prone executives. The series would not end until either Knievel or at least three TV executives were killed.

The details of the fatal statistics would not be important to the Nielsen ratings. The important factor would be that, no matter who lost the thrilling gamble with death, the viewing public would be the winner.

The dumbest commercial currently on TV stars several people taking huge, crunching bites out of Heath candy bars. Anyone who knows anything knows this is no way to eat a Heath bar.

Heath bars are delicious but they have always been too small, and they shrink more every year. Therefore they must be savored, not chomped.

As you must know, a Heath bar is a thin piece of hard toffee, thinly coated with chocolate. It is this constant thinness that makes it difficult to eat a Heath bar properly, but it can be done if you really put your mouth to it.

The important thing is to eat the chocolate off the toffee without breaking the toffee, which is exceedingly brittle. Your teeth must barely penetrate the chocolate, without touching the toffee. Once the chocolate coating is dislodged, it should be slid gently off the toffee. This is done by slowly pulling the toffee out of

your mouth while your teeth keep the chocolate on your tongue.

It is sometimes possible to remove the chocolate coating in only two large pieces, one from each side of the bar. Such a maneuver is rare, but when it happens it is more satisfying than peeling an orange in one peel.

The chocolate should be eaten slowly while the toffee is held far away from your mouth. Sometimes I put the toffee on a table and walk away from it, as though I really didn't care. This is fun, but not a good idea if you own a cat.

When the chocolate is gone, you still do not bite it. You suck it, moving it occasionally from cheek to cheek, but always with caution. You still do not want to break the toffee.

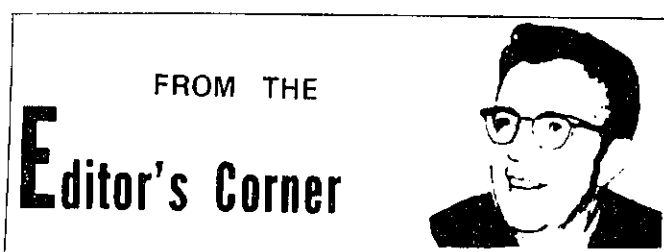

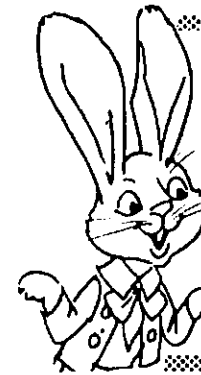
QUESTION - I see where the Intermediate District is pushing a vocational educational center again. What's the chances of it passing this time.

**PEDALING AROUND**

**Television watching**

I don't often watch television Tuesday night, as that is the last time I have to get all my articles completed in time for Wednesday morning, when the paper gets put together.

But Tuesday night of last week, I found time to turn on the TV (though I typed while I watched).

One of my Tuesday night favorites is MASH. There's only one thing that bothers me. That show has run more years than the Korean War did. The Korean War lasted three years, MASH, which supposedly takes place during it, is, I would guess, its fifth or sixth season.

Despite the show having been on so many years, I think it's still a high-quality program.

A fault of some programs that are on too many years is that the writers run out of decent plots, so the shows become increasingly inane. Examples that come to mind are the "Six Million Dollar Man," "Chico and the Man" (even while Freddie Prinze was still living), and "Sanford and Son" (no longer on the air).

Another Tuesday night favorite is "Lou Grant."

I hesitate to praise it, because I keep thinking of the

line about "to praise him is to bury him."

That, plus I have a phenomenal record of liking television shows that don't last long.

A show I really liked last season (or was it the season before?) was "Ball Four." The comedy about a baseball team not only didn't score a home run, it didn't even make it to first base. It was cancelled after about four weeks.

A favorite a few seasons back was "Beacon Hill," about a wealthy Boston family upstairs in the 1920s and their servants who lived downstairs. It didn't last the standard 13-week trial period.

Thus I fear the same fate for "Lou Grant." For those who haven't watched it, it features Ed Asner as Lou Grant, who was the news editor on the "Mary Tyler Moore Show" (one show I liked that did last) and is now city editor of a big daily newspaper in Los Angeles.

I've never worked on a big metropolitan daily, so I can't say for sure, but it strikes me as a fairly accurate portrayal of the newspaper business, within the confines of changes that have to be made for the sake of television. (For instance, that only two reporters do most of the stories.)

The one exception, judging from the preview (I didn't have time to watch the actual episode) was when the mad gunman took over the newsroom. That seemed a little far-fetched.

Reporters don't chase after crooks in high-speed chases, beat up the bad guys, or break into homes in the middle of the night to get information for a story.

But my cynicism tells me that the American public would rather watch "Police Woman" Angie Dickenson (granted she's better looking than Ed Asner) playing around at Hollywood's unreal version of cops and robbers, full of car chases, shootings, and cops discussing important investigations in fancy bars than to watch something closer to reality.

**\$20,000 damage**

**Home burns before repairs completed**

The cause of a late Monday night fire which caused an estimated \$20,000 damage has yet to be determined.

The fire was in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Diebel of 4176 Maple Street.

The home was unoccupied because it was the scene of a fire Sept. 6 which caused about \$18,000 damage. According to Elkland Township

Fire Chief Jim Jezewski, the Diebels and their two children are living with Mrs. Diebel's mother and were hoping to move back into their repaired home by Christmas.

The fire started in the attic, immediately below where the flames burned a hole in the roof. Although new wiring had been installed and the

electricity was on, the chief said, there was no wiring in the vicinity of where the fire started. The Sept. 6 fire started in the basement.

The fire was discovered by a neighbor about 11:15 p.m.

He guessed that damage will total about \$20,000, with there being extensive water and flame damage. The roof will have to be replaced, he said. The home was insured.

The chief said Tuesday he may ask the state fire marshal's office to help investigate what started the fire.

Firemen were at the scene about two hours.

**Okay vo-ag center**

The Cass City Board of Education made official its backing of the proposed vocational center for Tuscola county at a special meeting Monday at the high school.

The board also voted to allow girl scouts to use the sewing machines at the Intermediate School.

A presentation for the

scouts was made by Mrs. Linda Marshall.

After discussion the board voted, 5-2, to allow the use provided a teacher in charge of the room would agree to supervise the scouts. Feeling the move set a precedent and voting no were Dean Hoag and Dr. E. Paul Lockwood. Pushing for the proposal was Dr. Ed Scollon.

**Record corn crop seen in Michigan**

The largest corn for grain and soybean crops ever produced in Michigan are now being harvested, according to the Michigan Crop Reporting Service.

The corn for grain forecast is for 174 million bushels, 23 per cent larger than last year's crop. The yield forecast is for an average of 85 bushels per acre, also a record.

The national forecast is for 6,367 billion bushels, 2 per cent more than the 1976 crop. Feed grain production (corn, sorghum, oats, and barley) is projected at a record high 201 million metric tons, 5 per cent more than a year ago.

The Michigan dry bean forecast is the same as last month, 5.25 million hundred-weight (cwt.), eight per cent larger than the small 1976 crop.

The U.S. forecast is for 15,862 million cwt., eight per cent less than 1976 production.

State sugarbeet production is forecast at 1,806 million tons, 17 per cent larger than the 1976 crop, with an average yield of 21 tons per acre.

National sugarbeet production is projected at 25.6 million tons, 13 per cent below the 1976 crop.

The Michigan soybean forecast is for 19.4 million bushels, a whopping 68 per cent more than last year's crop. A record yield of 27 bushels per acre and record 720,000 acres harvested account for the huge crop.

In the U.S., the predicted 1,683 billion bushel crop is up 33 per cent from 1976.

Michigan fall potatoes should add up to 8.8 million cwt., six per cent more than a year ago.

The national fall potato crop should total 303.43 million cwt., as compared to 306.91 million last year. The combined summer and fall crop this year will also be slightly under the 1976 total.

**No injuries in bus mishap**

Students on an Owen-Gage school bus escaped injury Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 15, when the bus was struck by a pickup truck. There were 21 students on board.

The bus flashers were on at the time of the collision, deputies said.

**HEALTH TIPS**

**Aiding the handicapped**

By Frank Chappell, American Medical Association

Does someone in your household have a physical handicap?

The American Medical Association points out that it is understandable and quite normal that you should wish to "do for" the disabled member of your family, but it may be more helpful to allow him to do for himself.

To make sure you are really being helpful, it is wise to consult with the patient's physician and have him outline the patient's real capabilities and limitations. It is possible that the patient is not interested in minimizing his physical problems.

Real psychological problems are best handled with the advice of a physician, but there are several factors that illustrate the type of problems that may be encountered in living in a household with a handicapped person.

-The dependent nature of some people, which their disability tends to accentuate.

-The lack of intellectual ability or educational background.

-Just plain laziness.

-The need to let others do the work, after having spent a

lifetime of "doing for others." The parents feel the children should take care of them.

-The aesthetic type who may object to equipment or certain techniques (such as use of mouthstick, wearing of spints) because they are not cosmetic or graceful in use.

-The false expectation of complete recovery, so that devices aren't seen as necessary.

Once you know what can be realistically expected of the handicapped individual, and you know that he is desirous of receiving help, then your help can prove invaluable.

Even here, a few points of procedure may prove useful --

-Offer help, but don't force it upon someone.

-Find out what activity is most important to the individual and start with that -- eating, putting on make-up, reading, playing cards.

-Seek the patient's idea. Otherwise you may be only gratifying your own desires.

-If possible, seek the guidance or consultation of a physician.

-Keep an open and receptive mind to the ideas of others.

-Keep devices simple.

**No jobs for illegal aliens**

There is increasing concern in the United States over the large number of illegal aliens here, many of whom hold jobs that could otherwise be held by citizens.

One proposal to counter the problem is to make it illegal for employers to hire non-citizens who are not here legally. A recent Gallup poll indicated 72 per cent of Americans favor such a law.

Linda Schember agrees with the majority. "There should be (such a law)," she said. "We've got enough people on unemployment."

She sees nothing wrong with requiring Americans to carry an identity card with a photo on it, to make it harder for illegal aliens to find a job. Most people already carry some kind of identification, she said.

Lastly, she favors President Carter's proposal to grant permanent resident status to all illegal aliens who entered the U.S. before 1970.

An estimated 500,000 people would be involved.

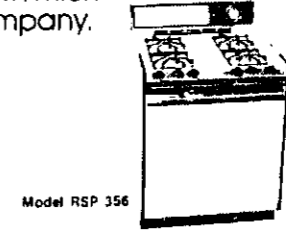
"If they've been here that long, I'd let them stay," she said. "They've already set up their life here. It would be hard for them to go someplace else and start over."

**Woodworking projects**

Skill with a saw, hammer, and brush is handy and also an asset to boys and girls.

As a result, woodworking is an example of a 4-H project area that attracts all youth, whether they are from the city, town, suburb, or farm.

In general, woodworking experience usually determines which phase of the project the 4-H member will enroll in. It is apparent that the different phases of 4-H woodworking projects require different amounts and kinds of experience and ability.

Each boy and girl can discuss with a 4-H leader which items or activities they would like to work with. The 4-H woodworking project offers an opportunity for originality and creativity by the youth enrolled in this project area.

One of the major goals in the beginning woodworking

project area is to learn the proper use of hand tools. Suggested projects include flower boxes, knife holder, doorstops, mail boxes, book ends, broom and mop holders, birdhouses, and bird feeders.

On the more advanced level, the member may learn to properly use power equipment such as sanders, jig saws, and other woodworking equipment. The advanced member may select such projects as bookcases, workbenches, screens, lamp bases, lawn chairs, picnic tables, and household furniture plus repair or maintenance of certain items.

If you wish more information, contact a 4-H club in your area or contact the extension 4-H office in the Civil Defense Center, Caro. We need more adult leaders to help out with our handicraft clubs or to start new clubs in many areas in the county.

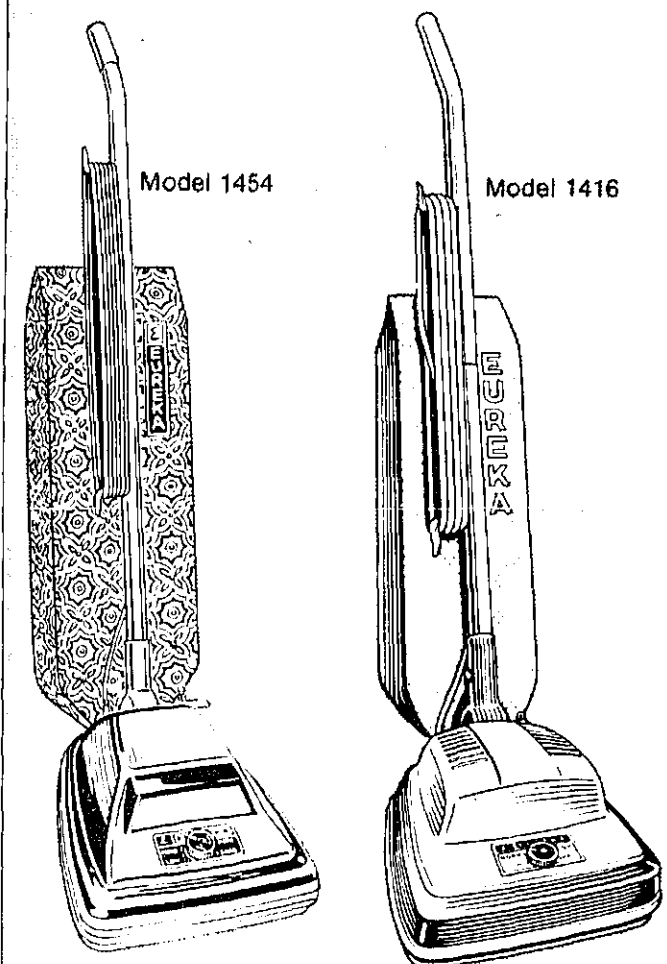
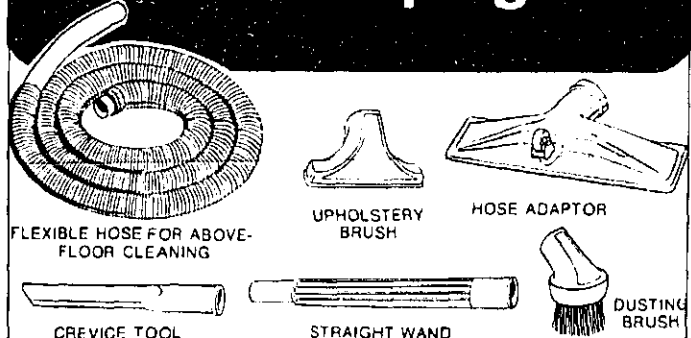

### Farm show bus trip planned

The 1978 National Farm Machinery Show and Championship Tractor Pull will be the focal point of a four-day educational tour for residents of Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties, according to George W. Atkeson, Huron county Extension agricultural agent.

Dates for the tour via bus to the event at Louisville, Ky., will be February 15-18. The first day of the tour will involve traveling to Plain City, Ohio, for an evening meeting and discussion with representatives of Select Sires, Inc. The following morning, Feb. 16, participants will tour the Select Sires facilities and bulls. Later, en route to Louisville, two commercial dairy herds will be visited.

An additional \$7.50 per person is needed for tickets for the tractor pull.

All reservations will be handled on a first-come, first-served basis through the Huron County Extension Office, 104 County Building, Bad Axe 48413.

**AGENT'S CORNER**  
**Food safety tips**  
**for the holidays**

Ann Ross - Extension Home Economist

Bacteria multiply like crazy when they are in warm, moist foods - especially milk and other animal products. Some bacteria even produce toxins that can't be killed by boiling.

So the message is: keep foods below 40 degrees or above 140 degrees if you want to prevent illness over the holidays.

Keep your refrigerator set cold enough to hold the temperature below 40 degrees. Refrigerate foods in fairly small quantities because food in large containers cools slowly! Pop foods into your refrigerator as soon as the meal is over.

Buffets for parties should be managed so that foods with eggs, cheese, meats are kept cold or hot. Don't mix the remains of a long-standing bowl of cheese dip with a fresh batch - you could contaminate the new batch.

Store turkey dressing, gravy and meat separately. If you have questions, contact Thumb area Extension Home Economist Ann Ross at 269-9949 in Bad Axe.

**Set-aside slated for grain crops**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has conditionally announced a 10 per cent set-aside on corn, sorghum, and barley, according to Vernon L. Kretzschmer, chairman of the Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

A 20 per cent set-aside for wheat was announced earlier this fall.

Kretzschmer said the USDA decided on a feed grain set-aside because current farm prices are below the effective loan rate and estimated cost of production, and domestic 1977 coarse grain

production appears to be a record with carryover stocks expected to reach 43.5 million tons.

It was concluded that a 10 per cent set-aside will reduce U.S. production by an estimated seven million tons, three per cent of U.S. production. This reduction is not expected to have an effect on consumer food prices.

There will be no land diversion payments on the acreage set-aside. This is the same policy in effect for the wheat set-aside program. Also, there will be no limitation on the feed grain acreage which can be planted. Total crops, however, will be limited to the farm's normal crop acreage, less the set-aside.

Participation in the program is voluntary. Nonparticipants, however, are not eligible for price support loans, disaster payments, or target price payments.

Participants must "set aside" one acre for every 10 acres of feed grains actually planted for harvest in 1978. In addition, if wheat is planted, an additional two acres must be "set aside" for every 10 acres of wheat planted.

Under the "cross-compliance" feature of the program, a farmer who does not participate in the "set-aside" if he plants wheat, corn, sorghum, or barley is ineligible for loans and payments on all other price supported crops he may produce.

Kretzschmer said the USDA is proposing that acreage designated as set-aside must be in an approved vegetative cover crop, such as annual or perennial grasses or legumes or small grain which is not allowed to mature. It is also proposing that eligible land should be cropland that was tilled within the prior three years in crops other than hay or pasture.

# Cass City lifts cage curtain Tuesday

Cass City High School basketball fans will get their first glimpse of the 1977-78 cage squad next Tuesday when the Hawks entertain Harbor Beach.

The Hawks will field a team composed primarily of veterans but there are still questions to be solved.

How they are resolved may well determine whether or not another Thumb B Conference championship trophy will be on display in the school's showcase.

Tops on the list is finding replacements for Chuck Hendrick and Rick Richards. The two 6-3 forwards helped control the boards and were the difference in several close games last year.

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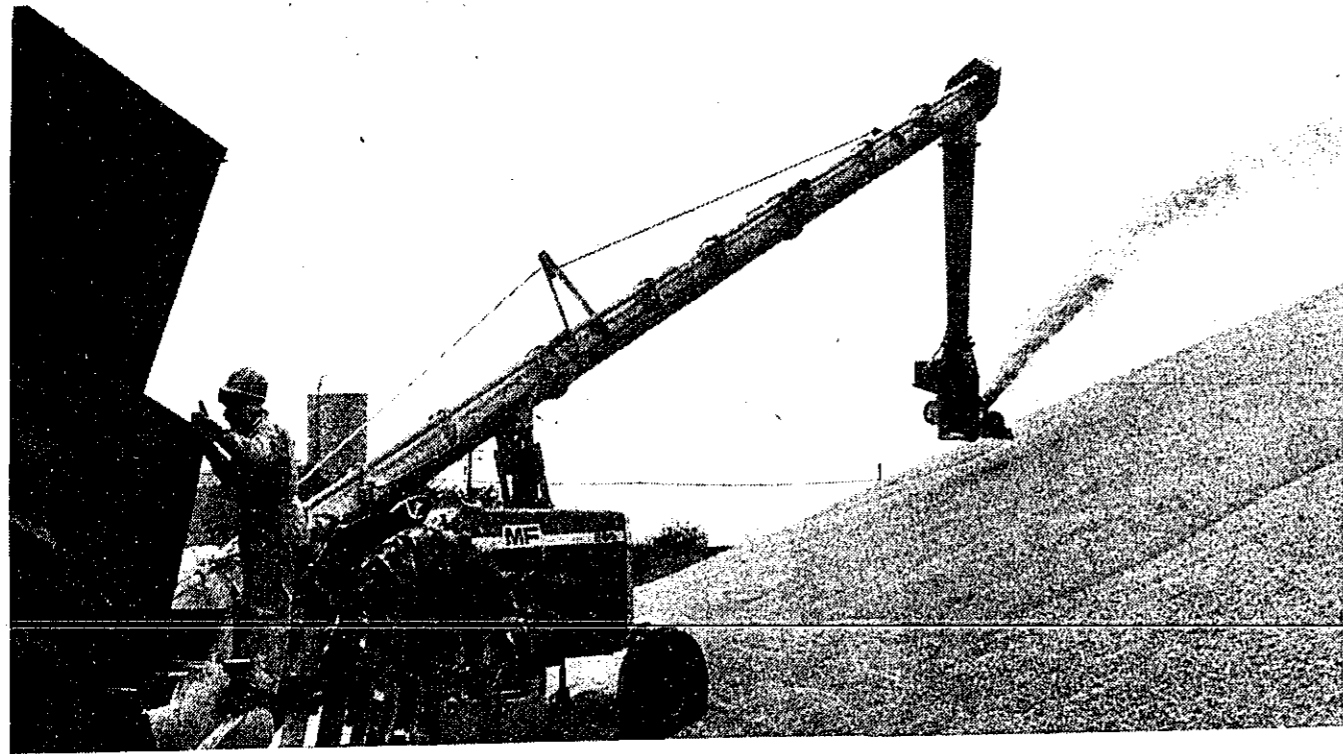
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## Bins should be checked

Millions of bushels of on-farm stored corn grain may be damaged this year if farmers aren't making sure their storage bins are thoroughly aerated.

Aeration is the movement of low volume airflow through stored grain for the purpose of maintaining grain quality.

"When grain was put into storage in 1976, quite a bit of it spoiled, partly due to the manner in which farmers handled the grain and partly due to damp weather conditions. Indications are that the same situation is occurring this fall," said Robert L. Maddex, Michigan State University Extension agricultural engineer.

He explained that corn mold starts with fungi already present on the corn at harvest, and if the grain is not adequately aerated, moisture condensation will occur within the corn mass. Fungi will grow within this environment and mold will spread through a large portion of the storage bin. When grain is properly aerated, and subsequently cooled, mold growth doesn't occur.

"The biggest problem we find in grain storage is that producers don't run their aeration fans long enough to cool the entire mass of corn to 40 degrees F. or lower," Maddex said.

Generally, grain goes into storage at temperatures from the mid-60s to high 70s. If the grain is not sufficiently aerated, cooling occurs on the outside and at the top of the grain mass first.

As the cooler air in the grain settles along bin walls and at the top, the warmer air in the center of the grain mass rises. As this warm air comes in contact with the cooler surface layer, it is chilled and moisture from the warmer air condenses on the grain, causing increased moisture.

Maddex says that an airflow of 1/10 to 1/5 cubic feet per minute (CFM) is needed for most farm stored grains.

Producers who operated the aeration system throughout the time the bin was being filled should be safe until outside temperatures have dropped to 40 degrees. Then the grain should be aerated to drop the grain mass to 40 degrees.

But Maddex cautions those who might have shortened the drying period, especially if the grain went into storage at 80 or 90 degrees -- it had better be checked.

There are two ways producers can check their storage bins to determine potential mold growth. One way is to turn on the aeration fan and

sniff the exhaust, determining if it has an odor indicating spoilage.

Another is to hang a thermometer in the exhaust stream and tack another to a nearby post or to the outside of the grain bin. The temperature of the grain should be within 10 degrees of the outside temperature. If it is not, more aeration is needed to bring the grain into condition. It can take 80-100 hours

to cool an entire bin.

However, running the aeration system during warm periods can be risky. The fans should be operated when relative humidity is less than 75 per cent and when day or night temperatures are below 40 degrees.

"The way this fall has been, it is advisable to check the bins at least weekly until we are well into cold weather," Maddex said.

restrict its crews to regular working hours on the county and local roads.

Assuming Mother Nature doesn't add insult to injury after a snow storm, it takes three days to clear all the roads in the county.

Snow removal on state highways is done according to highway department established priority.

The only high priority road, which means being kept bare all the time, is M-15 between Vassar and M-81.

Second priority means keeping the center portion bare. That applies to M-81, M-24, M-46, and M-25. (M-53, just east of Tuscola county, is also second priority.)

Third priority, keeping the road passable, includes M-138.

The road commission figures on using 2,000 tons of salt this winter, but just in case, has 3,000 tons on hand.

For cost and environmental reasons, roads don't get as much salt as they once did. Other than the one road, M-15, that must be kept bare, Wellington said, salt usually gets spread along just the center few feet of roads.

For the war on Mother Nature this winter, the road commission has 45 trucks fitted with plows, 12 graders, and four front-end loaders available.

An unknown factor at this point is what effect the layoff of 30 employees (out of 78)

Where does the money go? Property owners will be asking themselves that in early December when they get their tax bills.

The answer to the question is contained in the 1977 report on local taxes, recently presented to the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners by county Equalization Director Donald Graf.

Assuming everyone pays their taxes, the total collected from the December tax bills will be \$13.237 million, based on a state equalized valuation (SEV) for the county of \$370,848 million. The 1976 SEV was \$288,734 million.

Of the total collected, local school districts will receive 72.41 per cent; county government, 14.57 per cent; townships, 6.54 per cent; the intermediate school district, 5.37 per cent, and drains, 1.11 per cent.

Millage rates for schools vary. For the Cass City district, 20.0 mills are levied for operations and 1.7 for debt retirement; Owen-Gage, 23.5 for operations, 1.48 for debt, and Kingston, 22.0 for operations, 3.30 for debt.

The Tuscola County Intermediate School District (ISD)

levies .15 mill for operations, 1.60 for special education, and .17 for debt retirement. Some portions of the county, because of the school districts they are in, are in other intermediate districts, which levy different millage rates.

The county levies 4.2 mills for its operations, plus a special bridge levy (which goes to the road commission) of 1 mill.

Special levies of varying amounts are assessed in some townships for fire protection and ambulance protection, library, roads, and drains. (Drain assessments are only paid by benefiting property owners.)

By township, the amount of SEV and amount of taxes to be collected are:

Elkland (including Cass City) -- SEV, \$23.97 million; county taxes, \$100,674; bridges, \$23,970; township, \$39,550; Tuscola ISD, \$43,845; Huron ISD (from portion in Owen-Gage district), \$964; schools, operating, \$503,919; debt, \$19,947.

Elmwood (including Gagetown) -- SEV, \$13.647 million; county taxes, \$57,316; bridges, \$16,647; township, \$22,517; Tuscola ISD, \$14,072; Huron ISD, \$5,140; schools, operating, \$300,957; debt, \$17,103; drains, \$11,607.

The township is divided between the Cass City and Owen-Gage school districts. The equalization department report lumps all the school taxes together.

Taxes from the so-called "Goslin parcel," which is in Elmwood township, will go to the Cass City district and Tuscola ISD, according to Graf. It had been part of the Huron ISD until its transfer was upheld a few months ago by the state appeals court and supreme court. The Owen-Gage board is seeking a rehearing of the case before the supreme court. The parcel has a SEV of \$3.165 million.

guesses his daughter might need a new leg every year until she stops growing.

In raising the youngster, her parents try to treat her as normally as possible, made easier, they say, because she doesn't like people helping her unnecessarily. She has already learned to make her own bed, for instance.

Mrs. Herron cringes when she mentions some relatives who call Janna their "little angel."

Even without her health problems, some of the special attention would have been natural. The Herrons have two older children, Bill, 16, and Juanna, 14, and before Janna could walk, for instance, the two would fight over which one would carry her into church.

"At Ann Arbor, they stressed to us it would be good if she has someone to grow up with," Mrs. Herron explained.

She and her husband agreed and adopted Lance, who will be two in December.

Not only do they play with each other, "they fight like any kids do," she said. "We really feel we have two special children."

The experience with Janna has left her parents with mixed emotions, primarily positive ones.

They express gratitude to friends, relatives, and their church pastor for "pulling for us."

"We just can't say enough about Hills and Dales," said Mrs. Herron. "I don't think there is anything more that could be done at Cass City than they did." The baby was delivered by Dr. H.T. Donahue.

They also have similar praise for Mott Children's Hospital. "The last thing in

the world Ann Arbor was worried about was their money," Edward said.

When Janna left there after the first five weeks of her life, the bill was \$20,000. A hospital social worker helped the Herrons get aid from the crippled children's fund.

Their health insurance policy did not include maternity benefits, which would have helped pay for Janna's treatment.

"We're just happy she's alive," added his wife.

Edward Herron, 41, farms about 600 acres and feeds about 200 hogs, with the help

of his son, Bill.

The couple at one time owned Beagio's Pizza restaurants in Cass City, Marlette, and Sandusky, plus a Marlette beauty salon, all of which Mrs. Herron ran with occasional assistance from her husband. Now everything except the Beagio's in Marlette has been sold, so that she can spend more time with her two small youngsters.

"We're religious people," Janice Herron said, in looking back on their experience with their daughter. "We always said the Lord won't give you more than you can bear."

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## \$730,000 for jobs rejected

The three upper Thumb counties won't be getting \$730,000 in federal funds to provide jobs for unemployed youths.

The Thumb Area Consortium board authorized applying for the funds from the new Youth Community Conservation and Improvement Projects Program at its Oct. 20 meeting.

The board was informed at its meeting last Thursday that the funding request had been rejected, that available funds will go to three or four job program planning regions in northern Michigan.

Consortium Executive Director Frank E. Lenard was authorized by the board to write to the head of the Bureau of Employment and Training of the Michigan Department of Labor, which allocated the federal funds, requesting an explanation of why the consortium's request was rejected. Notification of the rejection came in a brief telegram received Nov. 2.

The \$730,000 request was for one year. If it had been received, the money would have been used to provide jobs for 80-100 youth, ages 16-19, working on temporary public works projects, such as street repairs and painting.

The consortium is assured of receiving at least \$311,307 under another new federal youth job program. It may receive as much as \$100,000 more than that.

The money will be used to provide job training for youth 16-21, through such means as on-the-job training and work experience programs. The program will get started within the next few months.

The board approved a new contract with the Tri-County Public Service Agency for the fiscal year that started Oct. 1.

The contract is for \$2,034 million in federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act Title VI funds.

Leonard Hool, who heads the agency, said the funds will provide the equivalent of about 200 full-time jobs. An application has been made for an additional \$1 million, which would boost the total to about 300.

The Title VI program provides what is considered emergency employment with some jobs being less than 40 hours a week and some not lasting a full year; the present funding will actually provide jobs for more than 200 people. As of Oct. 31, 286 were employed.

Of the \$2,034 million, \$152,536 goes for administration, including salaries, rent, and insurance; the remaining \$1.88 million for wages and fringe benefits for participants.

The tri-county agency serves as the employer of persons working for governmental units and other non-profit agencies in the three counties who are paid with Title VI funds.

The consortium board approved several new Title VI positions Thursday including a library aide and clerical aide at Cass City High School and grounds maintenance worker and bus equipment maintenance worker for the Kingston schools.

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Caseville man guilty

Couple receive jail terms for Vassar robbery

A Vassar couple were sentenced Monday by Circuit Judge Martin E. Clements in connection with the robbing of a rural Vassar woman April 2.

Lagusta C. Bables, 29, was

found guilty by a circuit court jury Oct. 27 of aiding and abetting an armed robbery and entering without breaking with intent to commit larceny.

She was sentenced by Judge Clements to serve 12-20 years in the Huron Valley Correctional Facility for Women, near Ypsilanti, on the aiding and abetting charge. On the entering without breaking charge, she was sentenced to a concurrent 40-60 months, credited with two days served.

Jewel Swinton, 26, was found guilty by the same jury of entering without breaking with intent to commit larceny. He was sentenced to serve 2 1/2-5 years in the State Prison of Southern Michigan at Jackson, with credit given for 76 days served. Bond pending appeal was set at \$15,000.

Their companion in the incident, Gregory M. Tyson of Flint, pleaded guilty Oct. 4 to a charge of armed robbery and was later sentenced by Judge Clements to life in prison.

Also Monday, Robert M. Schmitzer, 19, of Flint, was placed on one year probation on a charge of non-sufficient funds - check over \$50. He was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail, credited with two days served. He was fined \$100, assessed \$250 court costs, and ordered to make restitution of \$300.

He pleaded guilty to the charge Sept. 26, in connection with a complaint April 11 from Clarence A. Young in Indianfields township, concerning a check written for \$300.

Nov. 16, before Circuit Judge Norman A. Baguley, a jury found Gregory C. Peter-

son, 20, of Caseville, guilty of two counts of delivery of LSD.

The charges were in connection with the purchase of the hallucinogen Nov. 12, 1976, by officers of the now-defunct Thumb Intelligence Unit in a bar in Unionville.

Bond was continued, with sentencing scheduled Dec. 12.

He was the owner-operator of Les Evens' Farm Machine Repair for more than 28 years.

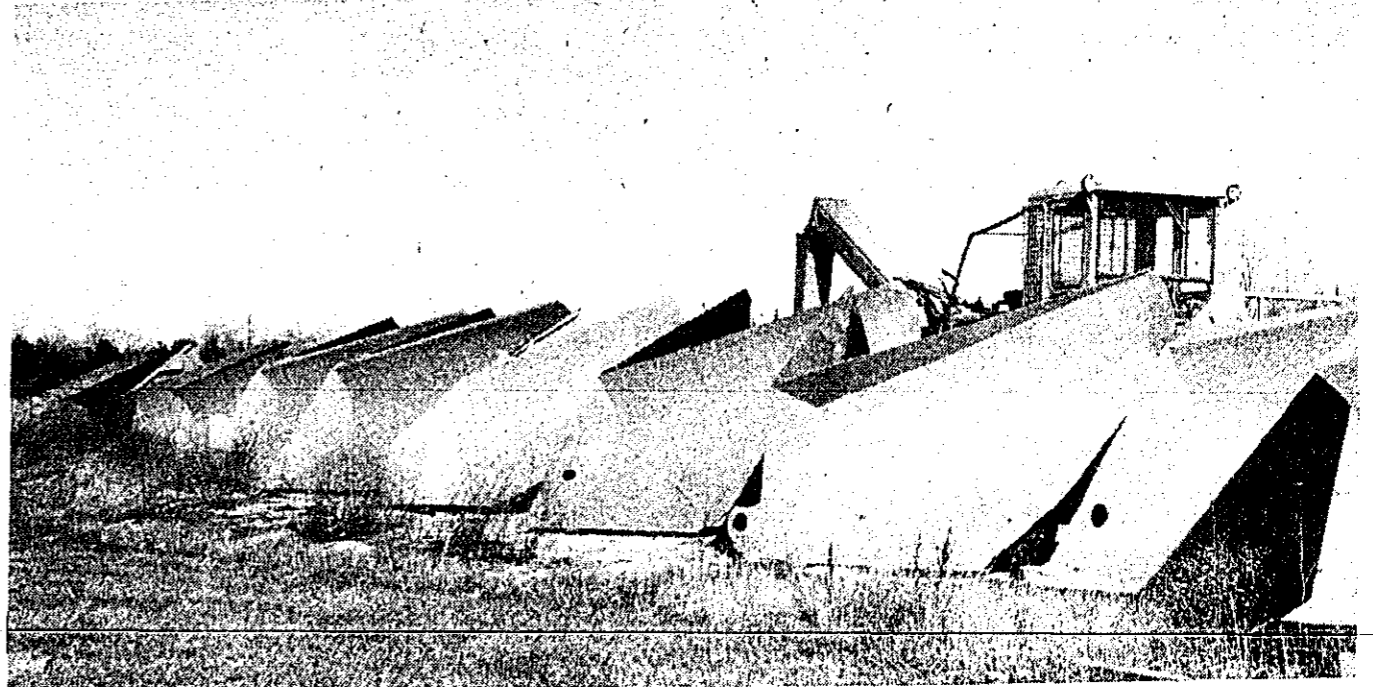
