to settle unresolved issues. "A date for mediation has not been set, but TIPPA would like to get back to the bargaining table as soon as possible.

"Issues yet to be resolved include employee protection, working conditions, grievance procedure, and salary and fringe benefits.

"The TIPPA negotiators are not encouraged by the board's reluctance to move in non-economic areas, yet maintain a positive attitude toward reaching an agreement."

Intermediate Superintendent Dr. Bruce J. Dunn was optimistic about reaching an agreement with the paraprofessionals, "I think with the para-professionals, we're very close and hope to reach a settlement soon," he said

Monday morning. As he saw it, the major issue is hospitalization benefits for part-time em-ployees. The intermediate district only wants to offer them for full-time employees; the non-professional union wants them also for

part-time workers. As for pay, he said, "We're very close together on that."

The Tuscola Intermediate Education Association, a Michigan Education Association affiliate, represents the district's professional staff -- including special education teachers, school psychologists and social workers, and speech therapists. It has 68 members.



The road commission gets about \$1,800 per mile of state road per year for maintenance and snow clearing. For county and local roads, slightly under \$600 per mile is available from state motor fuel tax and license plate proceeds for maintenance, snow removal, and construction.

With more money available for work on the state highways, commission crews are more likely to be seen removing snow from them after hours and on weekends when necessary.

# Janna Herron - Miracles helped her to survive

The Edward Herron family doesn't need Thanksgiving to remind them to be thankful. They have Janna Herron for that.

Janna is three now, but if it weren't for the work of some dedicated doctors in Ann Arbor and a few miracles from upstairs, her life would have ended only a few days after it began.

Janna was born to Janice Herron on Aug. 2, 1974, at 10 a.m. in Hills and Dales General Hospital.

There were two things wrong with the eight-pound, 10-ounce infant, low blood sugar and breathing problems.

The baby was taken by ambulance to Saginaw General Hospital "and that's where the slip-up happened," Mrs. Herron explained in a now matter-of-fact voice.

To overcome the low-blood sugar deficiency, she had to be fed intravenously with glucose through her navel. However, the vein there is hard to find and when the doctor injected the needle, he missed.

A blood clot formed. Doc-

tors said there was nothing they could do, but suggested the baby be taken to Mott's Children's Hospital at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, which was done by

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**HEALTH TIPS** Aiding the handicapped

By Frank Chappell, American Medical Association

Does someone in your household have a physical handicap?

The American Medical Association points out that it is understandable and quite normal that you should wish to "do for" the disabled member of your family, but it may be more helpful to allow him to do for himself.

To make sure you are really being helpful, it is wise to consult with the patient's physician and have him outline the patient's real capabilities and limitations. It is possible that the patient is not interested in minimizing his physical problems.

Real psychological problems are best handled with the advice of a physician, but there are several factors that illustrate the type of problems that may be encountered in living in a household with a handicapped person. --

--The dependent nature of some people, which their disability tends to accentuate. --The lack of intellectual ability or educational background.

--Just plain laziness. --The need to let others do the work, after having spent a

## AGENT'S CORNER **Food safety tips** for the holidays Ann Ross - Extension Home Economist

multiply like Bacteria crazy when they are in warm, moist foods - especially milk and other animal products. Some bacteria even produce toxins that can't be killed by boiling.

So the message is: keep foods below 40 degrees or above 140 degrees if you want to prevent illness over the holidays.

Keep your refrigerator set cold enough to hold the temperature below 40 degrees. Refrigerate foods in fairly small quantities because food in large containers cools slowly! Pop foods into your refrigerator as soon as the meal is over.

Buffets for parties should be managed so that foods with eggs, cheese, meats are kept cold or hot. Don't mix the remains of a long-standing bowl of cheese dip with a fresh batch - you could contaminate the new batch.

Store turkey dressing, gravy and meat separately. If you have questions, contact Thumb area Extension Home Economist Ann Ross at 269-9949 in Bad Axe.

Total crops, however, will be limited to the farm's normal crop acreage, less the set-aside.

Participation in the program is voluntary. Nonparticipants, however, are not eligible for price support loans, disaster payments, or target price payments. Participants must "set

aside" one acre for every 10 acres of feed grains actually planted for harvest in 1978. In addition, if wheat is planted. an additional two acres must be "set aside" for every 10 acres of wheat planted.

Under the "cross-compliance" feature of the program, a farmer who does not participate in the "set-aside" if he plants wheat, corn, sorghum, or barley is meligible for loans and payments on all other price supported crops he may produce. Kretzschmer said the USDA is proposing that acreage designated as set-aside must be in an approved vegetative cover crop, such as annual or perennial grasses or legumes or small grain which is not allowed to mature. It is also proposing that eligible land should be cropland that was tilled within the prior three years in crops other than hay or


