### Added judges likely

Added circuit judges for the Tuscola-Lapeer and Huron-Sanilac county circuits have been recommended to the state legislature.

Prospects appear good that the legislature will approve the two new judges, according to the associate state court administrator.

The recommendations are contained in a report from the state court administrator's office that says 29 more district, circuit, and probate judges are needed throughout the state.

The Michigan Supreme Court approved the recommendations Oct. 18. Due to the time spent in printing the report, it wasn't presented to the legislature until last

According to Associate Court Administrator John Mayer, judiciary committees of the house and senate could hold hearings on the entire package in late January or early February and depending on when the legislature approves it, it could be on the governor's desk for signature by March. He was not optimistic that the timetable will be that fast.

The four factors on which the need for the additional judges was based, Mayer explained, were caseload per judge, time from filing to trial for criminal and civil cases, and population of the counties involved per judge.

Both the Tuscola-Lapeer and Huron-Sanilac circuits were above the state average in all four categories.


Tuscola and Lapeer counties share two circuit judges, Martin E. Clements and Norman A. Baguley. Huron and Sanilac share one judge, Allen E. Keyes.

Although the Lapeer County Board of Commissioners has endorsed a third circuit judge for it and Tuscola county, the latter's board of commissioners gave it only qualified endorsement, that the third judge should be from Tuscola county. The two present judges are both from Lapeer county.

However, the recommendation of the state court administrator's office simply calls for a third judge, to be elected in November, 1978 and to take office Jan. 1 of the following

As Lapeer county has more voters than does Tuscola, it is conceivable that the third judge could also be from Lapeer county.

Mayer said the legislature frequently makes changes in the court administrator's recommendations, so it's possible a change could be made to ensure a judge being elected by Tuscola county voters -- presumably by making Tuscola county a separate Please turn to page 18.

# Shooting vic final rites Friday

Murder-suicide was the apparent cause of the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Rabideau Monday, according to sheriff's department investigat-

Their bodies were found about 8 p.m. Monday evening in a bedroom of their E. Cass City Road home.

Preliminary autopsy findings put the time of death at some time early Monday morning, but a more definite time won't be known until the final autopsy results are released.

Dale Rabideau, owner of Rabideau Septic Tank Service, was 43. His wife Dolores

Their deaths leave four sons, Dale, 17, Dean, 14, David, 9, and Darren, 7, without parents.

The apparent weapon used was a .22 caliber rifle. Detective Larry Walker of the Tuscola County Sheriff's De-

partment said the weapon was found in the bedroom where the bodies were discovered.

The bodies were found lying on a single-size bed in the bedroom in the northwest corner of their home, which is about a quarter-mile east of the Cass River bridge.

They were discovered about 8 p.m. Monday by Keith Pobanz, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Rabideau.

He told the Chronicle he preferred not to tell the circumstances leading up to the discovery of the bodies until the investigation is com-

The sheriff's department received the call for an ambulance at 8:15 p.m. The ambulance, from Little's Funeral Home, was sent back empty from the Rabideau home. It returned once the on-scene investigation was completed. The bodies were

Mary's Hospital in Saginaw, where autopsies were performed Tuesday morning. The on-scene investigation

was handled by Detectives Walker and Ron Phillips of the sheriff's department and two investigators from the state police crime lab at Bridgeport. Phillips said Wednesday

morning that based on the autopsy results and other findings, it appears Rabideau shot his wife first and then himself. The detective wouldn't say how many shots Rabideau fired at his wife.

He also said the time of death was apparently before dawn, possibly in the middle of the night.

The investigation will be complete, according to Phil- City.

The Cass City Village Council Tuesday night got its first look at a proposed 1978 village budget which shows no major changes from the present budget. The new budget estimates

Council members will discuss the budget further and present their own suggestions at the Dec. 27 meeting and approve any portions of the budget necessary to start the new fiscal year, such as salaries. The total budget will be approved in January or



He says that robots will do 90 per cent of the work to support society. The good professor prob-

ably knows all about robots but he isn't with it at all when it comes to figuring out what makes us tick. There's a good deal of con-

troversy about the role of robots and their future. There's little doubt that they will do more and more of the routine jobs as time passes. Germany, Italy and especially Japan are moving full speed ahead with robot development. In Japan a gov-

ernment aided project aims

for a robotized machine tool factory with only a few workers by 1990. You can believe it or not that the robot revolution is upon us. Let's assume that all the most optimistic predictions come true. Only one job in 10 that we have now

will be necessary to do the same work. I submit that there still will be work aplenty just the

Increased productivity will inevitably be followed by increased demand. There's no question that we produce more efficiently today then we did 20 years, or 10 years, or five years ago. Yet more persons are working in the United States today than ever before.

You can explain some of it

by shorter work hours, more vacation time, retirement. That's just the tip of the

iceberg. What really keeps us working is the "necessity" of a second or third car, a television, tape decks, stereo, power mowers, air conditioning, extra telephones, snowmobiles, deluxe tractors, bigger homes, golf clubs, golf carts

. . . the list is endless. Necessities for us that generations before us never had, never missed.

It's doubtful if anyone can predict what the "necessities" of life will be 25 years from today. It's certain that it will be something that no one has or needs today.

### "If It Fitz..." Viewers' intelligence??

One TV commentator said Anwar Sadat's visit to Israel was more important than man's first landing on the

One TV watcher said: "Tell them to take that bleeping camel jockey off my set."

Critics often warn TV executives not to underestimate the intelligence of their audience. Today's question is: Can it be underestimated?

Is there enough intelligence present to be underestimated or measured in any way? It is difficult to put a tape measure to the inseam of a

Sadat's arrival in Israel knocked the Michigan-Ohio State game off TV for six minutes. Thousands of football fans were furious. Many of them phoned Channel 7 and the Free Press to voice their beefs. Several of these complaints were recorded, word for word, so that they might later be examined closely for traces of intelligence.

The "camel jockey" quote mentioned earlier was one of those complaints. It came from a woman who didn't really say "bleeping". She used the vulgarity most commonly heard when fun in bed is discussed. This vulgarity has not yet won wide acceptance in family newspapers, but stick around,

Here are some more illuminating opinions from TV viewers who would like to have seen Woody Hayes sock Anwar Sadat:

"It's terrible for us to kiss this Arabian guy's butt. Football is America. We don't want this jerk on. We got to watch some bleeping greaseball with a goatee trying to control things. Missing the game doesn't bother me as much as this guy. This is kowtowing to these Arabs. These Arabians will just go down to City Hall in droves tomorrow to say they own the world."

"Boy, it bleeps me off. I don't give a damn about Arabs and Jews anymore. I think the network executives are Jews.

"I think this is ridiculous that all three networks put this program on TV and I hope they get the FCC or whoever is responsible. They schedule the NASA moon shots when there is nothing else on".

"I think it's terrible that the broadcast executives can force us to watch this. It really opens your eyes to how much freedom we have in America.

Meanwhile, the state Supreme Court, in an effort to expedite pending PBB cases, ordered the transfer of all pending related cases to a single, specially-designated judicial officer or court.

The order followed a petition by the Michigan Chemical Company and Farm Bureau Services, maker and distributor, respectively of the toxic chemical.

The petition asked for superintending control to afford the opportunity to all PBB litigants to have their cases heard and finally concluded by the arbitration process without delay and cost attendant upon a formal adjudication process.

A public hearing has been set for Dec. 8 in the Supreme Court hearing room in Lansing to allow all persons, agencies or organizations who can identify an interest in the outcome of PBB cases to

# Emergency disaster loans available in area

and Saginaw counties have been declared eligible for low interest disaster loans by the Small Business ministration (SBA), according to Gov. William G. Milliken.

Milliken said farmers and farm-related businesses can apply for loans to recover actual losses due to drought and excessive rainfall.

Loan applications will be accepted by the SBA until Aug. 7, 1978, for losses occurring between Aug. 1 and Oct. 7, 1977, in the four counties, due to excessive rain and flooding and, in the case of Saginaw county, also for any damages due to drought from Sept., 1976, to May, 1977, and hail which occurred Sept. 19,

Karen Smith, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor in Bad Axe, said she and other FHA officials are still waiting for details, but apparently the SBA loan application forms will be available at her office and the one in Caro, which serve the four counties.

Reportedly, the SBA will establish a temporary office in the four-county area in which to interview loan applicants. That isn't known for sure yet.

The FHA offices in Bad Axe and Caro are currently processing farm disaster loan applications under an FHA program, which required the Department of Agriculture to designate the four counties an agricultural disaster area.

State officials have estimated total agriculture damage to the four counties in excess of \$21 million. About 970 farmers may be eligible for the SBA emergency loans. The state's dry bean crop was the hardest hit; damage is estimated at \$16.8 million for that crop alone.

Milliken also announced that he has asked the SBA to extend the same disaster designation to Arenac, Bay, Genesee and Lapeer counties. Documentation submitted shows an estimated \$28.8 million in damage to dry bean, corn and forage crops in those counties.

# Board okays jail matrons

The Tuscola County Board tions this week and should of Commissioners, Tuesday, have the three women hired Nov. 22, ended a controversy over whether to hire three clerk-matrons or clerk-dispatchers for the sheriff's department by designating them matrons and letting the sheriff decide their duties.

The three persons hired will be paid \$3.53 an hour with federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act funds for a 40-hour week. Sheriff Hugh Marr said last Wednesday that with a matron required around the clock, the three women hired will be trained at first to only per-

form matron duties. Later, if it is found performing matron duties doesn't take all of their time, they can be trained to perform other duties, such as dispatching or clerical work.

Marr requested the county board approve three positions in June. The board originally designated them as matrondispatchers.

Representatives of the sheriff's department later asked that that be changed to matron-clerks, so that they could type deputies' reports when not performing matron

The county jail has had as many as seven women prisoners at one time, Marr said, with the usual ratio being one woman out of each 10 prisoners. Last Wednesday, there was one in jail.

Performing the matron duties up till now have been part-time help and other women employees of the depart-

The sheriff said he will advertise for the three posiby Jan. 1.

In other action last Tuesday, the county board authorized the building of new restrooms in the county's Vanderbilt Park at Quanica-

It set park fees at \$3 per season per vehicle and \$1 per day for persons wanting to use an electrical outlet.

A request from the City of Vassar to have district court sessions held there once or twice a week was referred to committee. The committee will meet with District Judge Richard F, Kern to decide what the ramifications of such a move might be.

Glass Christmas tree ornaments definitely are not recommended for baby's diet this holiday season.

Absurd statement? Of course. But not as absurd as you might think. Every Christmas season physicians are called upon to give emergency treatment to small children who have swallowed bits of ornaments and glass.

### Christmas is a time of bright little lights on a tree in the parlor; shiny glass ornaments and decorations; filmy spun glass filaments; toys that sometimes have sharp, rough edges, and lots of candy, nuts and other rich edibles.

These are part of Christmas, and no one is suggesting there's anything wrong about

The American Medical Association at this holiday season, however, points out once again there are safety hazards at the Christmas season that aren't encountered during the rest of the year -- hazards that can turn

a happy holiday into tragedy.
-- Check over your old strings of Christmas tree lights and discard those that are worn or brittle. If there are very small children around your house, discard burnt-out bulbs with caution, so baby can't get at them.

-- Keep the glass ornaments and filmy glass "angel hair" out of baby's reach. The ornaments crumble readily into sharp slivers.

-- Make absolutely certain that no toys coated with leadbased paint are included in Santa's pack, Lead poisoning is a danger should the child chew on the toy. Almost all manufacturers now avoid dangerous paints.

-- Select toys with a minimum of sharp, rough edges: that won't burn quickly if flicked through a candle flame, and that are large enough so that babies

can't swallow them. - Electrical toys, such as trains, should be selected with safety in mind. Is the wiring intact and strong, or is it loose and flimsy?

-- Air rifles, sling shots, archery sets, and other missile throwing toys are obviously dangerous if carelessly used. Set up a target range and make certain the youngster is taught to use the toy properly and safely.

This list could be continued, but you can make your own. The prime thing to remember is that in the bustle and excitement of Christmas, accidents can happen. Certainly no one wants to spoil the holiday with undue worry. Make your plans for a safe Christmas, and then enjoy it to the hilt.

# Muzzle-loading deer season opens Friday

Michigan's special muzzle- in order to be sure of a clean loading deer season starts statewide Friday.

The season provides an opportunity for hunters who did not take a deer during the regular season to try their luck with the historic firearm --the muzzleloader.

Department of Natural Resources statistics show that approximately 11,500 people hunted with muzzleloaders last year during the special season and that 390 bucks were taken.

Hunters must use a muzzleloading rifle or shotgun, .44caliber or larger, with round ball and black powder.


By its very nature, muzzleloading places restrictions on hunters. Most muzzleloaders,

sure shot, limit their shots to no more than 75 yards.

Dave Arnold, DNR deer specialist, reminds those trying muzzleloading for the first time that the only black powder they should use in a muzzleloader is commercially manufactured black powder specifically designed for use in muzzleloading fire-

The only alternative to this is the brand of powder known as Pyrodex from the Hodgdon Powder Company.

"Pyrodex is a black powder substitute. It doesn't have as dangerous a property as black powder," Arnold said. The muzzleloading deer season ends Dec. 11.








Her father is principal of the high school she attended, which had about 250 students. Her mother is a nurse.

There are some differences between high schools in Sweden and here, such as no interscholastic sports in her country, but she feels they are basically comparable,

At Cass City High School, she is taking physics, ceramics, composition, home economics, and current af-

None of the courses she is taking here are transferable, which is why she will be behind a year in her studies when she returns home.

She finds physics her most difficult course. She took physics in Sweden, but must now translate everything she already knows into English. That means, she explained. sometimes reading something three times before she understands it.

Because students in her country have a more accelerated education, only grades 1-9 until they graduate from high school, she feels they are more mature than teenagers here. "We have to grow up quicker because we graduate earlier."

Students there are also multi-lingual. Everyone studies English starting in the third grade (age 9). In addition to English and Swedish, Miss Lindfors also speaks German, which she started studying in the seventh grade.

They get to put some of their English to work watching television. The two television channels in Swedish, both run by the government, show some American programs. Two popular ones are "Kojak" and "Baretta," which are broadcast in English with Swedish subtitles.

The broadcasting day runs from 6 a.m.-11:30 p.m. There are no commercials, but television owners have to pay an \$18 tax every three months to support the television

programming. "Kojak" and "Baretta"

judicial district. A similar situation exists in the other two counties, because the Huron County Board of Commissioners and State Rep. Quincy Hoffman, R-Applegate, want their county to be made into a separate judicial circuit.

So although changes could be made, Mayer was optimistic the added judges will be approved. "Chances look good," he said, with the usual biggest hurdle, now cleared, having been the recommendation of the state court administrator and Supreme Court justices.

The additional judges will mean increased expense for the counties involved. The state pays each circuit judge \$29,100 per year.

Tuscola and Lapeer counties each add supplements of \$3,500 per judge; Huron and Sanilac, \$7,500 each for Judge Keyes.

In addition to the supplement for an added judge, estimates range up to \$50,000 annually as the cost for county for additional staff that will be needed for each new judge. Some additional office space may also be needed and possibly in Tuscola county, an additional

Still, a hamburger that sells for 35 cents in this country costs \$1 there.

Transportation for Swedish youth is usually by bus or bicycle. People can't drive there until they are 18 and most families only have one car. Gasoline costs \$2 a gallon.

One surprise to Ann is the amount of driving and

Drivers don't drink in Sweden, she explained. If a couple is at a party, one partner may drink but the other doesn't. If a driver drinks, he gets sent home in a taxi.

Any drunk drivers who do get caught lose their licenses. If they then get caught driving without a license, they can go to jail.
