Artist unretires in Cass City

Sam Sammons: He's done it all

Lindsey (Sam) Sammons has done about everything. What he hasn't done, he has probably drawn.

The Cass City area resident, 55, has been in the Army, Navy and Air Force, been a Secret Service agent guarding President Lyndon Johnson and was editor of a monthly newspaper.

Throughout his varied career, he had engaged in various forms of art as a sideline, something he has never had formal training in.

His artistic talents came in handy as early as Army basic training in 1943. He got the task of painting names and serial numbers in helmet liners.

"In the military," he explained, "if you've got something no one else can do,

that's a good way to get out of work."

Thus he got such assignments as painting road signs and murals on NCO club walls and drawing cartoons for post newspapers.

Sammons served in the Army until the end of World War II as the pilot of a spotter plane.

After his discharge, in 1946, he joined the Navy. He was a photographer. He transferred the next year to the Air Force. He was a cryptographer, decoding messages and preparing new codes. Most such cryptography is now done electronically, he said, instead of on paper.

He left the Air Force in 1965. There was a prohibition against going to work as a civilian for the Air Force

for a minimum of six months so he joined the Secret Service.

He was assigned full-time to President Johnson's Texas ranch, so his duties when the President and-or his family were there was mainly keeping the tourists away.

Sammons had been assigned to an Air Force base in San Antonio, to which he commuted home on week ends. After a year-and-a-half with the Secret Service, he went back to the air base as a civilian, still as a cryptographer.

He left that job in 1973 and went to work for the Non-Commissioned Officers Association, which has its headquarters in San Antonio.

He helped form the group in 1961. It has about 200,000 members on active duty, retired and in the reserves. Sammons has been on its board of directors since 1965 and from 1961-73 was the only artist for its monthly publication.

He first served the organization full-time as executive vice-president, then for his final year as editor-writer-illustrator, etc. of its monthly 40-page newspaper.

In 1976, "We just decided to come home for a little while."

SAMMONS IS ORIGINALLY from Wyandotte and his wife, Sally, from Yale. Her brother is Clayton Harmer, who lives near Deford, a factor in their decision to move here.

They moved into their home northeast of Cass City on Seeger Road in June, 1976. The Sammons have one son, Timothy, who teaches school in Boston. Sammons found he wasn't suited for retirement. He now works full-time as an interviewer at the Michigan Employment Security Commission office in Caro.

HE DESCRIBES HIMSELF as a commercial artist. "A commercial artist will draw anything that needs drawing. I'll draw anything that needs to be drawn."

Thus he has drawn everything from a portrait of President Nixon (for the cover of the NCO magazine) to sailing ships to landscapes to cartoons.

The latter is his favorite, perhaps because it allows him to express his good sense of humor.

He especially likes political cartoons, his idol being political cartoonist Bill Mauldin, who started his career as an Army enlisted man in World War II drawing "Willie and Joe."

"If I were to go into the art field," Sammons said, "I would like to be a political cartoonist."

He never has tried to get a full-time art job, figuring he didn't have the proper background or training, plus "I was too busy doing my regular job to look for something."

HIS ONE "REGULAR" art job is to do the illustrations for the panel strip, "Stars in Stripes," which is syndicated to various military and veterans' publications.

It was started in 1970 by a friend, Charles R. Linderman, then public relations officer at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio, now retired, to publicize the exploits of enlisted men.

In most military history, it's the officers who get the

glory, explained Sammons, whose top rank was technical sergeant in the Air Force (equivalent to Army staff sergeant).

"Stars in Stripes" appears once a month.

Its topic back in August, 1973 was Alex Haley, identified as a Coast Guard commissary steward for 20 years and an author. Among his listed accomplishments were having written the "Autobiography of Malcolm X" and having "traced his ancestors for 270 years." That was before Haley had written about his ancestors in a book called "Roots."

Sammons usually retreats to his upstairs drawing board "when the mood strikes."

He may draw a cartoon to kid a friend or he may do something on request. "I do what needs to be done when somebody asks me."

Adds his wife, "He does it for fun, really."

Gen-Tel allots \$57,500 for Cass City exchange

General Telephone Co. will spend \$57,500 this year for various improvements at its Cass City exchange.

Improvements at the Kingston exchange will total \$16,300.

Included will be work on eventual elimination of the use of operators to request the caller's telephone number on long-distance calls.

The most costly project in Cass City will be \$24,300 for rearrangement inside the company's Seeger Street building to accommodate

Radar detectors now illegal

Michigan State police Monday began enforcement of the state law banning motor vehicle use of electronic devices for detecting police radar speed monitors.

The Michigan Court of Appeals in a test case ruled March 7 that Michigan law banning the use of radar speed detectors was constitutional and that any use of detection devices to thwart police radar speed monitoring is henceforth illegal.

additional central office equipment and for office space. The work won't be done until 1980.

Two hundred more lines and 200 more terminals are to be installed inside the building to provide for exchange growth. Of the total cost of \$50,800, \$6,100 is to be spent this year. The project will also be completed in 1980.

Completion of added long distance circuits to Saginaw, started in previous years, will cost \$12,300 this year out of total project cost of \$16,300.

More circuits to Saginaw will be installed starting this year. There will be \$4,800 spent this year; \$24,800 in 1980 to complete the project.

A new long distance cable to Gagetown is to be installed at a cost of \$62,500. Of that, \$4,900 will be spent this year, the rest next year.

Installation of private branch exchange equipment for business service will be finished this year at a cost of \$300. Total cost was \$800.

Work will be done this year in Cass City and Kingston on installation of specialized equipment to provide for automatic number identification when private line customers place long distance calls.

An operator will only come on the line during extremely busy periods. Otherwise, a centralized automatic message accounting system will record all data on customer dialed long distance calls needed for billing.

Total cost of the Cass City project will be \$66,900, of which \$4,800 will be spent this year. The project won't be done until 1981.

Total cost of the same project in Kingston is \$19,500, of which \$2,500 will be spent this year. The work will be done in 1980.

The other 1979 Kingston

project is spending \$13,800 to complete installation of added long distance circuits to Saginaw. Started last year, total cost is \$15,500.

The work to be done in Cass City and Kingston is part of the \$12.3 million General Telephone will spend in 1979 for improvements at its 31 exchanges in the nine counties of its northeastern division.

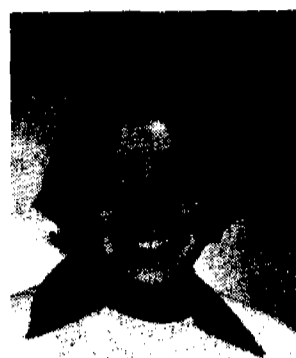

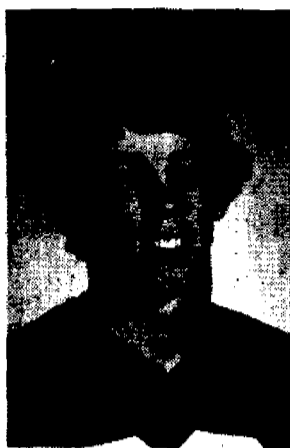

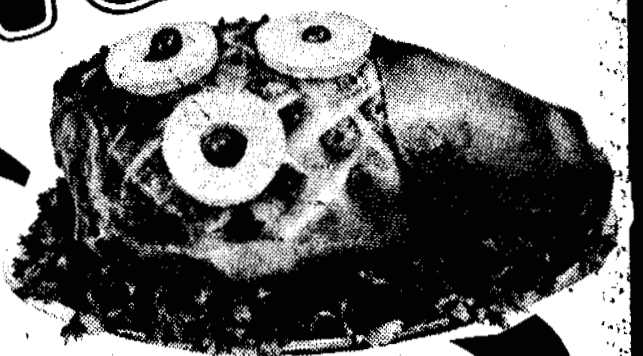

Lakers dash Hawk hope for district cage crown

Cass City's highly successful basketball season came to an abrupt end last Wednesday when an aroused Laker quintet dominated the boards to score a 69-45 win.

The ending was the exact reversal of the previous year when the Hawks bowed twice to the Lakers in the regular season and won in the tournament.

The Lakers broke open a tight game in the third quarter as the Hawks went stone cold from the field and Jeff Smith started grabbing every rebound in sight.

The Hawks led only during the opening moments of the first quarter and for a brief moment in the second period. After that it was the

Green and White all the way. Adding to Cass City's woes was its poorest shooting percentage of the season. The Hawks hit just 17 of 56 shots from the floor for a .304 average. The Lakers converted 30 of 59 shots for .504 percent.

The Hawks trailed by five at the half, 30-25, and scored the first basket of the second half to close the gap to three points.

But the Lakers came charging back to take command. At the end of the third quarter the winners had moved in front, 50-28.

With the lead, Coach Bill McLellan had his charges move into a control ball

offense, taking only the 75 percent or better shot.

Meanwhile the Hawks were forced to try and play catch up and shot over the Laker zone. When shot after shot failed to fall, the Lakers bounced into a 60-39 lead.

The Hawks went 5½ minutes in that stretch without scoring.

Smith led all scorers with 24 points, many of them on rebounds off the offensive boards. Kent McKenzie scored 17 and was also effective on the boards.

Cass City was led by Clare Trischler who netted 17 in his final game. Ken Martin scored 12 and was Cass City's most effective rebounder.

SEASON'S RECORD

Cass City compiled an excellent year shooting from the charity circle. The team converted 70 percent of its foul shots, led by Todd Comment with 89 percent and Trischler with 83 percent.

From the field the Hawks converted a creditable 47 percent.

Trischler was the top average per game scorer with 15. He scored 283 points in 19 games. Ken Martin led in total points with 288 in 21 games.

Steve Richards and Tim Severance tied for most assists with 65. Richards led the team in rebounds with 194.

Warriors edge Bulldogs in district final, 57-55

The crowd got its money's worth Friday night and North Huron got the trophy as the Warriors won the Bad Axe Class D district crown with a hard fought win over Owendale-Gagetown, 57-55.

It was the second time this season the Warriors defeated the Bulldogs by two points. The win avenged North Huron's loss to Owen-Gage in last year's district finals.

"I told the kids before the

game it would be decided at the free throw line and I guess it was," Owen-Gage coach Phil Gray said afterwards.

Neither team shot spectacularly well from the floor. The Bulldogs connected on 23 of 54 shots, 43 percent. Their opponents made 21 of 65 shots, 32 percent.

The big difference came at the charity line, where the Warriors collected 15 points (of 26 shots, 57 percent), to only nine for the Bulldogs of 21 shots (43 percent).

The Bulldogs led at the end of the first quarter, 12-10, and held the lead through most of the second, only to see their opponents edge ahead, 26-25, in the final moments on two free throws by Joe Knoblock.

North Huron came out in the third quarter with guns blazing and led 35-27 when Owen-Gage called time out. The Bulldogs pulled within two points twice later in the quarter but trailed at the three-quarter mark, 45-39.

The Bulldogs fought back and with 4:10 left in the game pulled ahead, 46-45, on a field goal by Dick Glidden.

The Warriors quickly got a basket and a free throw to go back in front, 48-46.

Jim Hendershot made one charity toss to pull his team within one, 48-47.

With 45 seconds left, the Bulldogs were within two, 53-51. With about 25 seconds left, Glidden got a chance to pull his team even when he was fouled but missed his first attempt.

With only a few seconds left, the Warriors had opened their lead to four points but a Bulldog shot at the buzzer created the final margin of 57-55.

Leading scorers for Owen-Gage were Mark McDonald with 17 points and Glidden with 10. Each collected 10 of their team's 45 rebounds.

Dennis Kennedy collected 17 points for the victors. His brother, Kevin, had 11.

North Huron collected 33 rebounds. The team had 29 turnovers to 21 for Owen-Gage.

The game was the final one for senior Bulldogs McDonald, Glidden, Jim Hendershot, Asa Cervantes, Sean Barr and Tom Howard. The team finished the season with an overall mark of 13-8. It was 9-7, good for a fourth place tie, in the North Central D League.

The win put North Huron into the regional semi-finals Wednesday night against Flint Holy Rosary at Davison High School.

The feat is expected to be entered in the Guinness Book of World Records.

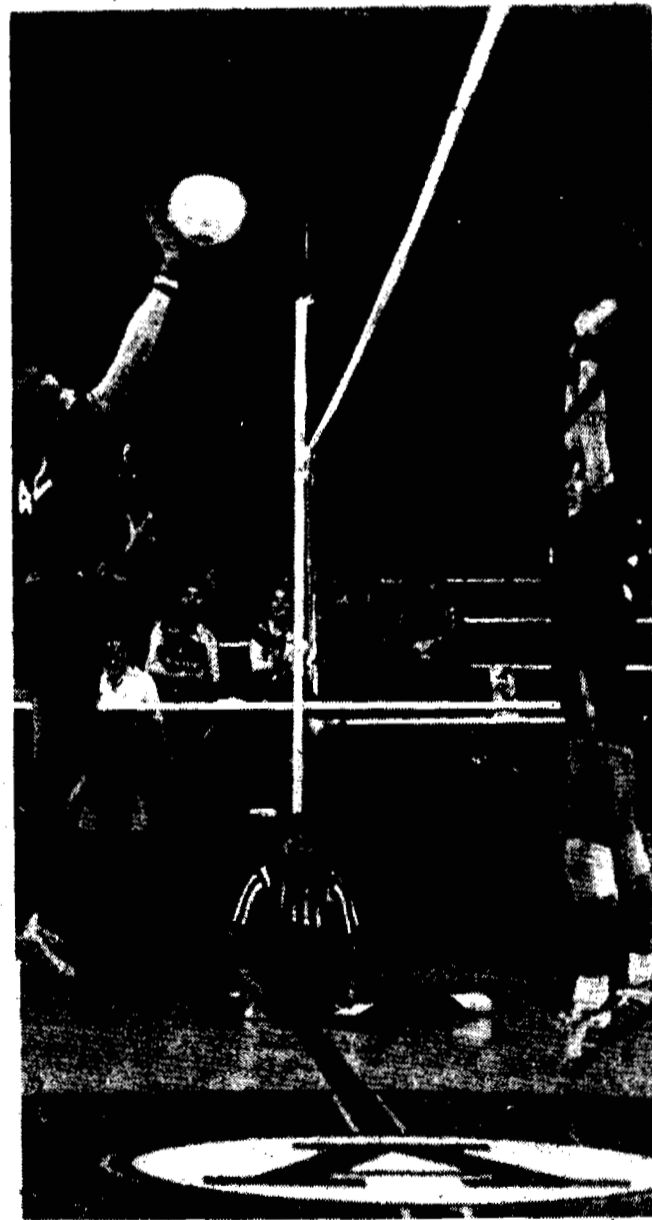

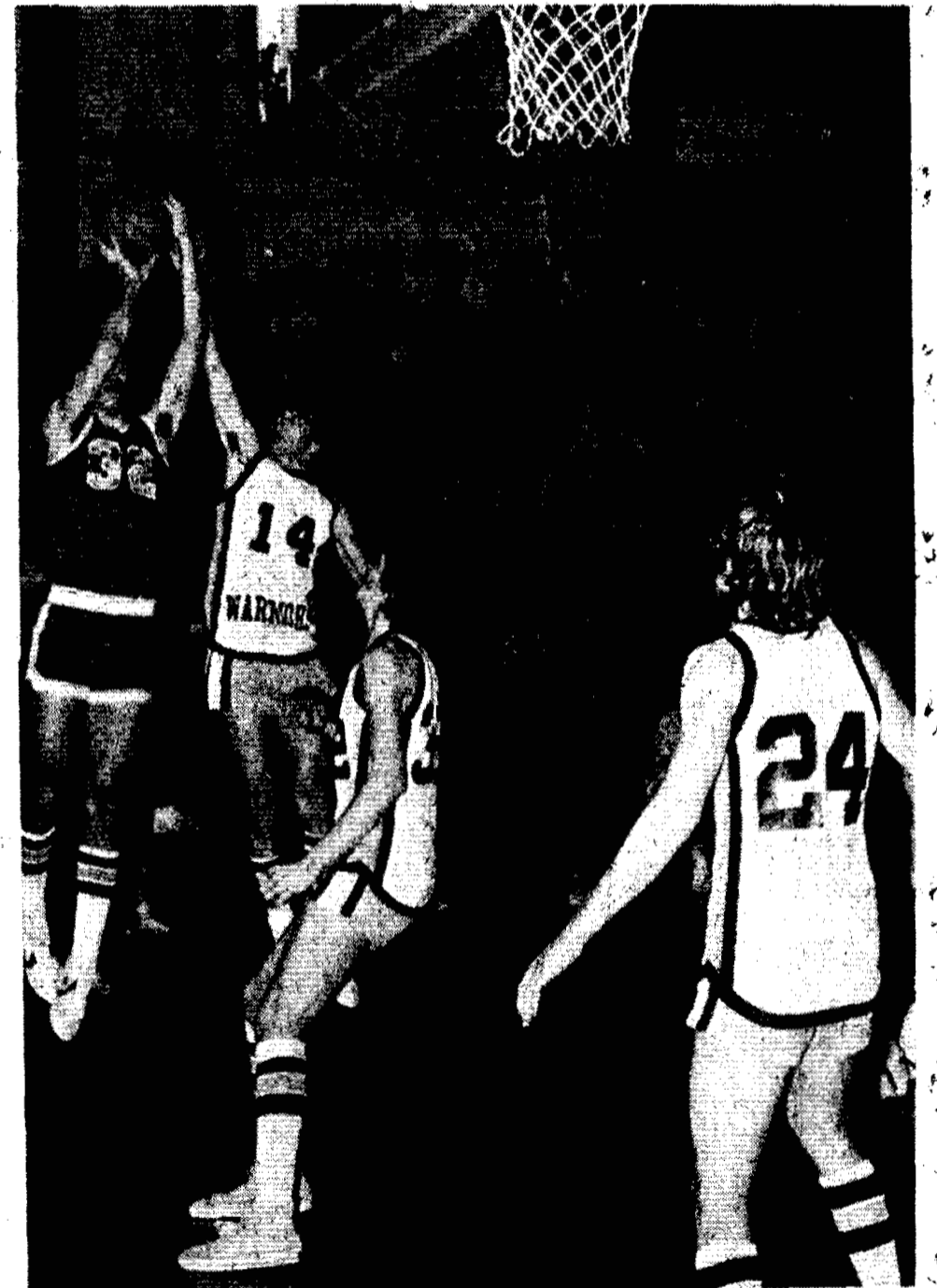
Potterville edges Bulldogs
