## Sewage plant millage wins big

Cass City voters Tuesday overwhelmingly approved levying of a millage to allow the village to borrow up to \$1.2 million to finance its share for improvement and expansion of the sewage treatment plant.

The vote was 179 in favor, 40 opposed and one vote spoiled.

"Good," was village President Lambert Althaver's reaction upon hearing the news.

Although people he talked to prior to the vote were generally favorable, he said, he had no strong feelings beforehand one way or the other on how the issue would do at the polls.

Passage of the levy, Althaver said, indicated "people have faith to go along with what the (village) council feels is right."

The ballot proposal, he continued, represented a "bargain" in that the wastewater treatment plant project would never get cheaper had it been delayed because of a negative vote Tuesday.

Late last week, village officials received good news when they were notified the **Farmers Home Administra**tion (FHA) had approved a \$1.25 million loan to Cass City to finance the local share.

The loan is to be paid back over 40 years at 5 percent interest.

The loan ensures a maximum millage rate for village residents of an estimated 4.5 percent, with the levy to decrease each year as the valuation of the village increases. With more people and business paying for the project, each will have to pay less.

Without the FHA loan, the village would have had to go finance the project, which would have meant considerably higher interest rates, hence, higher millage.

Total cost of the project will be an estimated \$6 million, with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency paying 75 percent and the

According to information presented by Dale McIntosh, president of the Cass City Teachers' Association, Hurt was observed six times. The first three were spaced several months apart and showed no unsatisfactory marks. Another was Feb. 20 and the last two on the fourth and sixth of March. The teacher was not informed of the results of these unfavorable observations until last Friday, according to McIntosh, which gave the teacher no chance to find out about her progress.

Smith said that the teacher has shown poor classroom control, a bad attitude and that she had received several complaints from parents, and asserted she could get signed statements to that effect.

Hurt said that the princi-pal had told her that she was "unfit to be around children" and said that she was being punished because "no one before had ever asked for a transfer from ber school and that she (Hurt) was not going to be the first.'

Donna Larson of Caro, a criminal justice student at Saginaw Valley State College, presented results of a study she made of escapes from the work camps.

From 1976 through 1978. she said, there was a total of 14,587 men assigned to the 11 camps in the state and 353 walkaways." Of those, 304 left the camp, 37 failed to return from furlough and 12 on work-release didn't come back from their jobs.

In addition to escape being a crime, which gets them sent back to a regular prison, there were 30 convictions for crimes committed while the walkaways were on escape status. Twenty-seven of those crimes were committed in a

county other than where the camp was, from which the inmate escaped. The three "in-county" crimes were a robbery, aggravated assault and a burglary.

Pamela Withrow, supervisor of Camp Brighton, explained the screening procedure. Inmates must have had no serious institutional misconduct during the previous two years before being assigned to the camps, not have a record of previous escapes, not be serving a sentence for sexual offense or drug trafficking, and be in

within a few months of their release date. They must be within four years of their parole date.

In answer to another question, Robert Groenleer of the Department of Corrections, said it has been determined that the maximum practical size for the camps is 100 inmates, thus there is no possibility the camp will be expanded to house more people in the future.

Groenleer also pointed out that it costs about \$15,000 per bed to build a work camp facility versus \$50,000 per bed to build a prison.

Any additional money raised will be held in reserve for other worthwhile causes, according to organizers Dick and Pam Roth.

The auction a year ago raised about \$1,300, which was donated to Hills and Dales General Hospital to help purchase a hyper-hypothermia blanket machine.

The machine pumps either very cold or warm water through the "tubes" of the plastic blanket which is placed over and under the patient to lower or raise his or her temperature. ("Hyper" refers to raising temperature; "hypo" to lowering it.)

Following the auction, Dolly Tracy, who works in the hospital laundry department, organized a rummage sale with her fellow employ-

Money still needed after that was contributed by the hospital board out of hospital funds and the \$3,200 machine was delivered in late November.

Since then, according to Jane Mitchell, RN and hospital in-service educator, the unit has been used 15-20

times, mainly to lower the temperature of children with high temperatures, such as due to infections. Instances where the blanket would be used to raise below-normal temperatures are when patients are suffering from shock due to blood loss or exposure to extremely low tempera-

tures. Persons with items to donate for the auction can drop them off at the high school the day before the auction, from 9 a.m.-noon. If they want them picked up, they can call the Roths at 665-2589 or Jim Hobbs at 872-3852.

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



I can't recall a close game this season when fans from every school haven't been guilty of harassing referees. Teams in the Thumb B never lose a close game. They are always robbed by the referees.



Lawhorn and Spencer were later released on bond from the county jail. Their district court arraignments will be Monday.



# **Owen-Gage files suit**

Owen-Gage's claim against the county board and Russell is without foundation and therefore should be dismissed.

The board discussed petitioning the Huron Intermediate School District Board of Education to have possibly 27 square miles of the Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port (Laker) district transferred to Owen-Gage. It then tabled the matter until it can find out the state equalized valuation of the area and the district.

The move would be retaliatory in that Lakers in 1975 petitioned to have part of the Owen-Gage district, the Parker parcel, transferred to it, despite the property owners involved wanting to stay in Owen-Gage. The state board ultimately approved the transfer.

Supt. Ronald Erickson explained the action would educate people that their okay isn't needed for the state board to transfer their property to another district.

The board did approve a motion to petition the Huron intermediate board to have the Elenbaum parcel, now part of Lakers, transferred back to Owen-Gage. It was informed that the

appeal before the state board for transfer of the Miller parcel to Cass City, scheduled for a hearing before the board's hearing officer last Friday, was withdrawn. The parcel represented about 9.5 percent of the Owen-Gage district.

Chronicle the appeal was withdrawn because Huron Intermediate School District Superintendent James McBride couldn't find the original petition from 1975 requesting the transfer, hence the hearing scheduled Friday could not have been legal.



# Insurance usually pays **Fires 'free' in Elkland**, but most units charge

The Elkland Township Fire Department no longer charges for fire runs.

The practice ended June 30. 1976. but according to Fire Chief Jack Hartwick. firemen still are occasionally told at a fire that the property owner tried to put out the fire to avoid being billed. When the fire got out of control, then the fire

department was called. According to township Clerk Carolyn Ware, state Attorney General Frank Kelley ruled in 1974 or 1975 that townships could charge persons whose property burned but they didn't have the authority to take the person to court if he or his insurance company wouldn't pay. "Rather than get into a legal hassle, the board decided to drop it," Mrs. Ware said.

Kelley later reversed himself (or it may have been a change in the state law), but it is now legal for townships to charge for fire runs and to collect, but the board chose not to resume the practice.

Part of the problem was that some insurance companies will pay reimbursement to fire departments and some won't, plus some people didn't have insurance. The board decided the only fair thing to do was not charge anyone. The Elkland department

has seven sections covered by Elkland, passes on the cost to the property owner who had the fire. The townrun. ship receives a notice from the fire department, then bills the property owner \$150

for the time firemen were there. When Elkland was billing for fire runs, the fees paid a considerable portion of the fire department budget. For the 1975-76 fiscal year, according to Mrs. Ware, collected fees totaled \$13,200. The total fire department budget was about \$19,000 plus the standby fees collected from townships.

For the year before, however, due to fewer fires, only \$7,000 was collected in fees. The fire department budget for the current year, which ends at the end of this month is \$20,750, of which standby fees collected from townships will total \$16,000. Elkland's budgeted contribution was to be \$2,750 (\$2,000 was left over from the previous year), but that doesn't include any additional money needed if the department ran short. In addition, the township paid almost \$63,000 for a new fire truck last October.

## Artist unretires in Cass City

# Sam Sammons: He's done it all

Lindsey (Sam) Sammons has done about everything. What he hasn't done, he has probably drawn.

The Cass City area resi-dent, 55, has been in the Army, Navy and Air Force, been a Secret Service agent guarding President Lyndon Johnson and was editor of a

monthly newspaper. Throughout his varied career, he had engaged in various forms of art as a sideline, something he has never had formal training

His artistic talents came in handy as early as Army basic training in 1943. He got the task of painting names and serial numbers in helmet liners.

"In the military," he explained, "if you've got something no one else can do.

that's a good way to get out . for a minimum of six months of work."

Thus he got such assign-ments as painting road signs and murals on NCO club walls and drawing cartoons for post newspapers. Sammons served in the Army until the end of World War II as the pilot of a

He helped form the group in 1961. It has about 200,000 members on active duty, retired and in the reserves. Sammons has been on its board of directors since 1965 and from 1961-73 was the only artist for its monthly publication.



unanimous Senate approval March 6. Specifically, the measure amends the Michigan Penal Code to allow county prose-

cutors to bring criminal charges against persons who knowingly possess or conceal stolen, embezzled or converted property. Present state law allows prosecution solely of those who buy, receive, or aid in the con-

cealment of such property. "Under current law," De-Grow explained, "county prosecutors often find their hands tied when they attempt to bring charges against some persons who are suspected of participating in a stolen goods racket." He noted, "As a result of a loophole in the laws, they can go after those who buy or receive stolen property, but they can't get convictions on people who knowingly possess or conceal these goods."

He said his bill will help dry up the "steal for resale" market, estimated to total more than \$100 million each year in Michigan. The bill now goes to the

State House of Representatives for its consideration.





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## **HEALTH TIPS Freezing to death** in warm weather

Death from exposure can occur in temperatures well above freezing — contrary to what many people believe - according to an expert on outdoor safety.

"Outdoor enthusiasts are normally cautious about the dangers of ice, snow and sub-zero temperatures, but many people now involved in outdoor activities in remote areas may not be aware of the threat of hypothermia," says Jim Savage, a safety coordinator who advises employees of RJR Archer, Inc. about safety on and off the job.

"Hypothermia, the opposite of a heat stroke, involves a loss of body heat that could lead to death," says Savage.

Most hypothermia deaths occur when the temperature is between 30 and 50 degrees. The malady can strike in spring and early summer so well as fall and winter.

"Hypothermia most often occurs when the weather suddenly changes to rain and wind and a person is far from heated shelter," says Savage. "Wet clothing is the chief hazard, because it takes heat from the body very quickly. For example, wet cotton conducts heat 240 times faster than dry cotton."

Losing heat faster than it can be replaced lowers a person's body temperature. A drop of only three degrees causes uncontrollable shivering and loss of the ability to do tasks such as light a heater or stove to save a life. As body temperature drops, speech and mental processes become impaired and shivering is replaced by extreme muscular rigidity,

causing jerky movements. The symptoms continue until a person becomes unconscious.

"The best defense against hypothermia is proper clothing," says Savage. "Outdoor people have always realized that clothing can be a life or death factor where freezing weather is concerned. When the weather is chilly but not downright cold, too many people are lulled by the deceptively mild conditions into a lack of precaution.'

For cool weather with a potential for rain and wind, Savage offers these suggestions for basic protection: --Wear long underwear, either waffle-weave cotton thermal or woolen. In worse conditions, wool longjohns are better, both because they are warmer and steal less of body heat if you do get wet


--Wool and flannel are the usual materials for coldweather shirts, but two medium-weight shirts are better insulation than one heavy shirt, and offer the option of removing one if you get too warm. --A medium-weight wool

hunting jacket offers warmth and water repellency, particularly if treated with silicone waterproofing spray. Avoid too heavy a jacket - in truly cold weather, you're better off with a down jacket or a down vest

under a wool jacket. -For comfort, lightness and durability, leather is the best boot material. But since leather is not completely waterproof, a rubber-bottom, leather-upper shoepack is a good compromise for wet conditions. Wear shoes big enough to allow two pairs of socks for warmth.

Should symptoms of hypothermia occur, the victim needs quick help because he may not know what is happening or be able to help himself.

To restore heat to the sufferent's body, remove all wet clothes and dry the skin. Reclothe the person in warm garments or a prewarmed sleeping bag. If you can't reach heated shelter, get the patient between two or three camp fires, and give the person plenty of hot liquid and food to introduce heat Don't attempt to travel until the patient has recovered enough to be aware of what's going on. Otherwise, he may hurt himself further.
