# Council nixes food stand by village park

CASS CITY

There will not be a permanent concession stand across from the south edge of the village park, the Cass City Village Council decided Tuesday evening.

There might be a portable concession stand in the park. Following a public hearing on the request to rezone

property between Church and Main Streets from one family residential to general business, the council voted unanimously to retain the present zoning.

Four closeby neighbors to the proposed refreshment stand and a representative of the nearby Church of Christ all objected to the proposed project. Objections included possible litter, increased traffic and noise, and that once rezoned, part of the property could be resold for other business purposes.

The only person in favor was Geraldine Suzor, who was seeking the rezoning, who mainly explained some aspects of what she was proposing. The rezoning had been recommended for approval by the village Planning Commission.

The one councilman who expressed his opinion prior to the vote was Jim Ware, who said the main issue was spot zoning -- zoning different from that of surrounding property. Denial of the rezoning request was necessary, he explained, in order to maintain the integrity of

the council granted one rezoning request while denving others, it might be subject to law suits for not giving equal treatment.

Following the council's rejection, Roger Little in behalf of the Cass City Rotary Club, presented a request for permission for the club to put a portable refreshment stand in the park as a fund raising project. He said later the request would have been presented regardless of

the rezoning request. The stand would be located near the ball diamonds on the east end of the park, be open only during ball games and other special events and be removed after the season ended.

Councilman and softball player Elwyn Helwig asked about the apparently church-sponsored refreshment trailer that was at ball games last summer, It was removed each night.

Other than that the facility must have a health department permit, village Superintendent Lou LaPonsie said, the village never has had a policy concerning portable refreshment stands in the park.

The Rotary Club request was then referred to the park committee for a recommendation.

The village's attorney, Clinton House, commented, "I think the ordinance in that area is vague."

For lack of a more appropriate committee, Village President Lambert Althaver referred the issue to the personnel committee for a recommendation on a possible change.

SEWAGE PLANT, TAXES

With approval by voters March 13 of the \$1.2 million bonding proposal to finance the local share for expansion and improvement of the wastewater treatment plant, the big hangup now rests in Lansing and Washington.
The state Water Re-

sources Commission and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency have yet to approve their financial share of the \$6 million project (5 percent and 75 percent respectively).

The delay means construction can't start in June, as had been anticipated.

Village officials and the village engineers and possibly legislators will be putting pressure on the appropriate authorities to get the needed funding approvals as soon as possible.


The council was to have set the millage rates for summer tax bills but didn't for two reasons.

One is that it isn't known yet the amount of millage it. will have to levy for the first year for the sewage treatment plant.

Secondly, it won't be known until the legislature decides, how the Headlee amendment will affect the operational millage.

The 1979 budget was predicted on continuing the present 13 mills, which it was anticipated would bring in \$194,000. The now known assessed valuation of the village is \$16.1 million, an increase of 13.92 percent from last year, which at 13 mills, would bring in

# Run, run, run - Local joggers do it for lots of reasons

Vic Guernsey jogs for fun. Jim Ware runs to keep in

Jim Fox says it keeps his weight under control. For Larry Whittaker, running is mental and spiritual

therapy.
The "father of aerobic exercise" (exercises to strengthen the heart and cardio-vascular system), Dr. Kenneth Cooper of Dallas, Texas, estimates 25 million Americans are jog-

The estimate seems high -it would mean almost one of every eight Americans dons running suit and shoes for their originally intended purpose -- but there is no doubt that jogging is very popular.

The St. Patrick's Day run in Essexville, held the day after, March 18, drew at least 1,000 runners.

How many joggers are there in Cass City? It's hard to say, but based on joggers supplying names of other ioggers, and excluding high school athletes, there maybe are 15.

The one who has perhaps been running the longest time is Jim Ware, 43, who

has been doing it off and on since he ran cross country in high school.

There isn't much physical activity in his job as Walbro treasurer and vice-president for finance, so he needs to exercise to keep in shape. He finds jogging more enjoyable than calisthenics. Ware runs three times a

week, year-round, usually four miles during weekday evenings twice a week and eight miles on Sunday. He averages about 10 minutes a The most he has ever run is 12 miles, which he did this

past Sunday, despite the snow. His eventual goal is to run a marathon -- 26 miles, 385 yards -- "just to say I've VIC GUERNSEY, 48,

started running five or six years ago to win a bet with three others over who could lose the most weight. (He won.) ''I got to like it, so kept Jogging doesn't help him

He has participated the running. Fox tries to run last two years in the July 4 run at Frankenmuth. He covered seven miles the first year and ran six last year.

He tries to run at least four times a week, year-round, but doesn't like to go if the temperature is below 20 degrees. Starting at 6 a.m., he normally runs for a half-hour, which works out to 21/2-3 miles.

JIM FOX, TRANSPORtation director for the Cass City schools, used to run in early morning but switched because it was too cold then. Now he splits his lunch

hour into two parts, eating about an hour before he goes out running. Departing from the intermediate building at noon, within a half-hour he runs 11/2 miles, showers, and is back to work.

He started running that distance in the late 1960s while in the Air Force as a required exercise program.

When he left military service in 1975, he didn't run for a year and could really tell the difference when he started again "in how much better I

"I just feel a lot better and it keeps your weight under control," he says of his each weekday, year-round. JOGGERS ARE PRE-

dominately male, but there are a few women who run. One who does, and has a vested interest in keeping in good physical condition, is Patricia Holt, women's physical education instructor at Cass City High School.

She has been jogging about four years, but doesn't do it during the coldest months. She started in again about a month ago. She jogs almost a mile to school in the morning; when running with the girls' track team she coaches, can put in another 2-3 miles, then runs home at

"I enjoy physical activity," she says understandably. Jogging does help in losing weight, she explained, provided the runner also is careful about what he or she

PROBABLY MOST DEDIcated of the Cass City joggers is Larry Whittaker, 25, a logger by trade.



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



# Teacher auction nets \$900

Despite poor driving conditions probably keeping down attendance, the Cass City teachers' auction Sunday afternoon at the high school netted more than **\$90**0.


The proceeds, minus expenses, will be donated to the Cass City Area Ambulance Service for purchase of radio pagers for use by attendants.

The amount raised was less than the approximately \$1,300 netted a year ago at the first annual auction. Forty-six persons took out bid numbers, less than the number last year.

Those who did show up got some bargains. A workable dishwasher sold for \$5. A used portable color television set, worth \$160, went for \$80, and a metal sculpture,

worth \$80, went for half that. A total of 226 items went on the auction block of which 23 were donated by merchants. Refreshments were also on sale.

The teachers plan to have another auction next year, according to one of the organizers, Pam Roth.



Don't be surprised if some day 48 members of our august State House of Representatives urge us to drink more beer or soft drinks in order to conserve water.

Ridiculous, you say? I agree. But consider this recent action of our representatives and you'll see that anything is possible.

By a 48-45 margin they voted to increase the speed on the state's freeways to 62 miles per hour and lower it to 50 on secondary roads.

According to proponents of the bill this legislation is a boon to energy conservation. It will save 125 million gallons of gas annually.

This is how all of this comes down. Because 75 percent of all driving is on secondary roads the reduced

speed would increase mileage on all of these miles. Only 25 percent of driving is on freeways where increased speeds would be allowed.

All of which leads to one of two conclusions. Either our legislators are among the most stupid of persons or they believe that we are.

Let's forget for a moment that on secondary roads stop and go driving is the rule. The top limit is not maintained for long because of traffic and other road conditions. You just don't drive at constant speeds for long stretches like you do on freeways.

You don't have to be a genius to figure out that if this State wants to conserve energy increasing speed is not the way to do it

If reducing speeds on secondary roads would save 125 million gallons of gas (it won't) and saving gas is what the representatives are after, the obvious route to tollow is to cut the speed to 50, period.

The solons could do plenty for conservation if they really wanted to. Very simply. All that is necessary is to enforce the present 55-milesper-hour law.

The way to do that is to tack on points for every violation and tell State Police to crack down.

That's not about to happen because there really is no grass root support for it.

Maybe when the energy crisis really heats up and gas is tough to get we'll be ready to do what is neces-

sary to combat it. Until that time we won't. We'll all sit around and grouse about inflation that energy cost is sparking and ask each other why don't "they" do something about

We all tend to forget that "they" is really you and me and our neighbors...

We won't do anything until we become convinced that there is no other way.

When we are it's likely that our elected representatives won't try to tell us that the way to use less gas is to increase our speed.

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I'm not sure which is worse. Watching the price of gasoline go up each week or hearing about our "energy prisis" on the news each

One expert says there is a shortage; another says there isn't. Since no one likes the idea of a gasoline shortage, or a fuel oil shortage next winter, most people prefer to listen to the "expert'' who says the shortage is being manufactured by the oil companies. Thus, why bother to conserve.

I will now contribute my 10 cents worth. Previously, it would have been 2 cents worth, but everything has

gone up due to inflation. Obviously, there is a problem. Even if there is plenty of gasoline and fuel oil, the increasing cost takes a bigger chunk out of everyone's paycheck.

One of the contributing factors to the increased cost of gasoline and fuel oil is that most of the "easy" petroleum is gone.

At one time, all of the petroleum consumed in the United States came from this country. Now almost 45 percent comes from other countries

The oil left in this country is getting harder to get. Getting Alaskan oil to the "lower 48" required building f a multi-billion dollar pipeline and there still is no practical means to get the oil, once delivered to the est Coast, to the Midwest and East. The amount of Coil we import increases each year, which makes us vulmerable in two ways.

First, the countries that have it know we need it, thus whatever price they charge, they know they can get. Why should they sell their oil Cheap?

Secondly, more imports makes us increasingly vulnerable to the whims of those countries who have the petroleum. The cutoff of upplies from Fran is one illustration. A much better example is

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

what happened in 1973-74, when the Arab countries shut off their supplies to the U.S. Unfortunately, since the embargo, the amount of oil the U.S. imports has substantially, increased which means the impact of another embargo will be much worse.

I can't help but wonder whether the Arab countries will show their displeasure over the signing of the U.S.-backed Israel-Egypt peace treaty by halting their exports to this country, at least temporarily.

As for how much supply there is, experts may disagree, but I have yet to hear one say we are not running out of oil. Thus, doesn't it make sense to conserve as much as possible to make what we have last longer?

The supply might not run out in our lifetimes, but must we be so greedy that we don't leave anything except maybe a trickle for future generations?

Even if we eliminated petroleum as a source of fuel, we still need it for lubrication and as a raw ingredient in many prod-

What's the solution? . In the short run - and to better prepare for the long run - we must conserve.

According to the Federal Highway Administration, 54 percent of all trips made by car are less than five miles. How many of those could be eliminated? As amazed as I am by those persons who ride 160 miles to and from work each day, whom I wrote about last week (at least they ride in car pools), I am equally amazed by persons who for any distance more than a block will drive their car.

I'm sure Cass City mer-chants would be delighted if fewer shopping trips were made to Saginaw-Bay City and more buying were done

If there isn't enough gas to go around, I think the only. ing it is to let the price rise.

The tourism business doesn't want rationing or closing of gas stations on week ends for obvious reasons. Workers have to get to work. Businesses have to get goods delivered. There's no way to allocate gasoline and be fair to everyone.

If the price gets high enough (without rationing), people will be forced to cut back on their driving but still have the freedom to decide where to cut back.

The COM project got underway in July, 1977. The two women handling the project in the three upper Thumb counties, Eileen Koroleski of Bad Axe and Martha Santos of Filton Martha Santos of Elkton, began in April of last year.

So far they have been to the libraries in Bad Axe, Pigeon, Vassar, Sandusky, Millington, Fostoria and

After Cass City, they have nine libraries to go.

They started at Rawson Memorial March 15, workfull-time Monday through Friday. As of Monday, they weren't quite half way done going through the cards for the approximately 13,000 books in the library.

Their task consists of

comparing the index card for each book with the microfiche to see whether the book has already been recorded. If it has, they only have to write down an index

If it hasn't, they have to write down more complete information. The information is transferred onto microfiche at the White Pine headquarters.

Once the project is completed - which will probably take a few years yet -- each library will have a microfiche reader.

If a patron requests a book the library doesn't have, the librarian can take the appropriate microfiche card from her file and check via the reader on whether the book is available elsewhere. If it is, she can order it sent from the library that has it.

Since the reader and microfiche cards take little space, it is possible in the future to place them in non-library locations such as nursing homes, jails and community centers, thus expanding services to persons who find it difficult to get to the library.

Another advantage of the project is that it will enable libraries to share greater numbers of books, thus cutting down on costly book purchases.

In addition to the three upper Thumb counties, the White Pine cooperative which is funding the project also services libraries in Saginaw, Bay, Midland, Iosco, Arenac and Ogemaw counties.



A collective sigh of relief went out from the Legislature after a lobbyist registration and reporting bill was approved, but the bitter debate is not over as the first public hearing on administrative rules opened in Lansing recently.

Administrative rules set departmental policy in administering and enforcing legislation after it is signed

into law. Often, as it appears in " present case, rules are was ten by bureaucrats wh

completely change the legis lative intent of an action rules ultimately have to b approved by a joint legisla tive committee which oper ates as a check on the rul s writing process.

The reaction to the rules as it surfaced during ithe first public hearing on them foreshadows a vigoride battle, similar to the origina. one staged in the Legisla-

Meanwhile, the law will not become effective and enforceable until six months after the rules are adopted.

The act regulates act. dties of lobbyists who spend at least \$1,000 for lobbying purposes in a 12-month period or more than \$250 on a single official in that same period. Detailed records are required to be kept with quarterly filings with a Secretary of State's office

Testimony, on behalf of Committee to Protect the First Amendment Right to Lobby, declared the rules went far beyond the intent of the legislation.

A spokesperson for the group suggested anyone appearing before a committee. including private citizens, would have to have an accountant follow him around and report conserv tions, both personal and telephone, and time spent making suggestions.

The final answer will be given by the legislative committee, but it could take months before the rules are approved leaving the stable; again, without a lobbyist control act.

His goal this year is to run the marathon distance (26 miles, 385 yards) at the Port Huron event on Labor Day.

Like many runners, Whittaker has had his share of injuries. Shortly after he started, he injured a ligament, which put him out of action for six months, and last summer he pulled a

Those injuries would have been preventable, he discovered the hard way, had he warmed up before he started running. He now does 15-20 minutes of flexi-

bility exercises before he starts jogging. He presently is recovering from shin splints, incurred when he tried a different pair of running shoes. (Shin splints are the most common injury for runners, according to Miss Holt.)

Whittaker, who usually runs before supper, says he does it partly for the enjoyment, "but for me, the main reason is mental and spiritual as sort of therapy.

Running, he said, "seems to make a difference in my personal well being."

Governor William G. Milliken's recent economic forecast does nothing to dispel this fear. His economic experts predict 1979 will be a year of economic slowdown and a high inflation rate.

To the individual, that means no growth in household spending power, more unemployment, a larger strain on state services and possibly, for the first time the necessary use of the economic and budget stabilization funds.

+++++

Dr. Gerald Miller, director of the state Department of Management and Budget, says he still sees no recession on the immediate horizon, but holds out the possibility of one in 1981.

Miller sees inflation as the key problem facing the state and the nation. He predicted there would be a worsening in 1979 -- a boost in prices by 8.4 percent for the largest increase since the 8.55 percent rate in 1974.

"In 1979, the economy will not have bottomed out. A 1980 recession is still possible. If we run into a recession in fiscal year 1979-80, it will be one of the more difficult years we've faced,' Miller said.

For the first time since its inception, the state may have to draw on the resources of the budget stabilization fund. The fund was created to set money aside during good economic years to use during not so good years.

· +++++

Miller said the state might have to tap some money from the fund in the October-December quarter of 1979. Although the unemployment rate is 7.4 percent, he said it could top 8 percent during

that quarter. The stabilization fund law provides for money to be

from the earmarked fund when and if unemployment hits the 8 percent level.

Milliken said the state can deal with the slowing economy by slowing its rate of spending and increasing government efficiency. He said the Headlee tax limitation and the budget stabilization fund will provide the discipline to help meet those

#### LOTTERY EARNINGS NEAR \$1.3 BILLION

One thing that continues to grow in an uncertain economy is the Michigan State Lottery which has topped \$1.26 billion during its first six years of operation.

Michigan's lottery - the most successful in the nation - continues to pump funds into the state's general fund aiding the state to provide essential services to the people.

Estimates indicate the lottery has saved each taxpayer in the state around \$44 per year as players continue to purchase weekly tickets, instant tickets and the daily numbers game.

++++++

During fiscal year 1977-78, Lottery Commissioner Gus Harrison reported record sales of \$326 million of which \$155 million was paid back out in prizes. After subtracting administrative costs, the lottery bureau deposited \$144 million in the general fund during the fiscal year.

During the six-year period of the lottery, it has deposited a total of \$549 million in the general fund while paying out over \$500 million in prizes.



WHEREAS the designated project includes 192,699 acres in Tuscola County, pt which 178,061 acres is intensively farmed, the majority of this being row cropped to dry beans, sugar

beets and corn; and WHEREAS agricultural non-point sources of pollution have been identified by the designated 208 planning program as a contributor to the degradation of water quality in the southeast area of Saginaw Bay; and

WHEREAS the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners is a unit of County government in the Southeast Saginaw Pay Drainage Basin;

the 14th day of February, 1979. PRESENT: Donna Rayl, Royce Russell, Paul Nagy, J. Benson Collon, Margaret Wenta, Robert Russell, Kenneth L.

The following resolution was offered by Commissioner Royce Russell and seconded by Commissioner Wenta: WHEREAS, this Board of Commissioners is authorized by law to create a Tuscola County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund, pursuant to Section 87b of Act No. 206 of the Public

Acts of 1893, as amended.
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF

TUSCOLA as follows:

1. There is hereby created the "Tuscola County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund", which fund shall consist of separate, segregated funds (unless otherwise ordered by specific resolution of this Board of Commissioners) for delinquent taxes due on account of specific tax years and into which funds all such delinquent taxes, except taxes on personal property due and payable to a taxing unit which receives its delinquent taxes from the fund, are due and payable to Tuscola County.

As soon as the segregated fund for any tax year is sufficiently funded, the County Treasurer shall, to the extent permitted by available funds, make payment of any or all delinquent taxes for such year to any school district, intermediate school district, community college district, city, Nownship, special assessment district or any other political unit for which delinquent tax payments are due on settlement day with the city or township treasurers.

3. The County Treasurer shall make such payments directly to single school districts when such single school district exists within a political unit.

4. The interest charges and collection rates established under Act 206 of the Public Acts of 1893, as amended, for delinquent taxes shall, once such fund has been established, be payable to the County and credited to the Tuscola County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund for the year in which such delinguent tax was due.

5. The funds on deposit in the Tuscola County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund shall be deposited in such bank account or accounts or invested in such investments as the County Treasurer is authorized by law to make for general funds of the County, provided that the segregated funds for the respective years shall be accounted for separately and shall be designated as follows:

TAX YEAR DATE BECAME DELINQUENT FUND NO. March 1, 1979

Separate funds for future tax years shall be numbered

from 2 upwards. 4. Any surplus in the Tuscola County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund, including any collection fees which are not pledged for repayment of borrowings, shall be transferred to the County General Fund, as directed by the Board of Com-

7. The Tuscola County Treasurer is authorized to retain John R. Axe, a partner of the firm of Dickinson, Wright, McKean, Cudlip & Moon, of Detroit, Michigan, attorneys specializing in municipal bonds, to arrange for the County to issue its notes for the purpose of obtaining funds for the County's Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund.

8. All prior resolutions inconsistent with the foregoing are hereby rescinded.

The Treasurer of the County of Tuscola is to deposit all public monies, including tax monies coming into his hands, belonging to the general checking account, in the State Savings Bank, of Caro, Michigan, The Treasurer of the County of Tuscola is to deposit all monies of the trust and agency funds in the Peoples State Bank, of Caro, Michigan, subject to the following condition:

A. In the event that the public monies in the hands of the Treasurer of Tuscola County exceed the sum of Two Hundred Thousand and no/100 (\$200,000.00). Dollars then DEPOSITOR, at the discretion of the County Investment Committee, consisting of the Chairman of the Finance Com mittee, County Treasurer, County Clerk, Register of Deeds and the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, has the right to deposit the excess up to the sum of Twenty Five Thousand and no/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars, in any of the following BANKS:

The Pinney State Bank; Cass City State Bank; First Bank of Saginaw, Vassar, Michigan; Frankenmuth State Bank, Reese, Michigan; Frankenmuth State Bank, Millington, Michigan; Farmers & Merchants State Bank of Sebewaing, Gagetown, Michigan; State Savings Bank of Union-ville; Mayville State Bank; State Savings Bank of Fairgrove; Kingston State Bank; Akron State Bank; First Savings of Saginaw — Caro; Second National Bank of

Saginaw, Vassar Branch - Vassar

in the following manner: At the discretion of the Tuscola County Investment Committee, consisting of the Chairman of the Finance Committee, County Treasurer, County Clerk, Register of Deeds, and the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, the excess or surplus funds, may be made available to the above named banks and deposited in Cer tificates of Deposit in all aforesaid BANKS on all monies deposited by aforesaid Committees, as agreed upon by negotiations between the Depository Bank and the Tuscola County Investment Committee; subject however, to the following condition, that is to say, that deposits made in the manner above specified shall not exceed Twenty-Five Thousand and no/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars, and in the event that the excess public monies coming into the hands of the Tuscola County Treasurer exceed said funds heretofore mentioned. the balance of the excess monies, subject to the approval of the Tuscola County Investment Committee, shall be used in the purchase of United State Government Securities.

2nd. The BANKS agree to accept the deposits of the DEPOSITOR, to honor all checks issued by the said DEPOSITOR, without any charges whatsoever for handling said deposits, and the BANKS further agree to cash any and all checks presented by the DEPOSITOR, without charge for

The following resolution was offered by Kennedy and seconded by Rayl.

WHEREAS, on February 14, 1979, this Board of Commissioners adopted a resolution establishing the Tuscola County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund, pursuant to Section 87b of Act No. 206 of the Public Acts of 1893, as amended; and

WHEREAS, this Fund has been designated as the "100% Tax Payment Fund" by the Tuscola County Treasurer, and it appears desirable to borrow to fund part of said Fund for the

1978 delinquent real property taxes; and WHEREAS, the purpose of this Fund is to allow the Tuscola County Treasurer (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "County Treasurer" or the "Treasurer") to pay from the Fund any or all delinquent real property taxes which are due the County; any school district; intermediate school district; community college district; city, township, special assessment or drain district; or any other political unit or county agency for which delinquent tax payments are due on settlement day with the county, city or, township treasurer and has been heretofore directed to do so by this Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby determined that it is necessary that Tuscola County (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "County") borrow a sum not to exceed (a) the amount of the 1978 delinquent real property taxes (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "delinquent taxes") whichbecome delinquent on or before March 1, 1979, and (b) a reserve to assure prompt payment of the notes, and deposit the proceeds thereof in the aforesaid Fund and the Note Reserve Fund respectively: and

WHEREAS, such borrowing is authorized by Sections 87c and 87d of Act No. 206 of the Public Acts of 1893, as amended (hereinafter referred to as "Act 206"); and

WHEREAS, the total amount of unpaid delinquent taxes. which will be outstanding on March 1, 1979 is estimated to be in excess of \$1,369,000.00 exclusive of interest, fees and penalties.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF TUSCOLA as follows:

1. The County shall borrow one million, five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) or such part thereof as will represent not to exceed (a) the exact amount of the delinquent taxes outstanding on March 1, 1979, exclusive of interest, fees and penalties, and (b) an amount not to exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the amount of the delinquent taxes, in order to constitute a reserve (hereinafter referred to as the 'Note Reserve Fund''), and, as the Municipal Finance Commission may authorize, issue its "General Obligation Limited Tax Notes, Series 1979", payable from the delinquent taxes outstanding on March 1, 1979 and the other sources specified below, the proceeds of which notes shall be placed in and used as the whole or part of the County's 100% Tax Payment Fund Account No. 1 and the Note Reserve Fund, to be used as provided in Act 206. The exact borrowing amount will be designated by the County Treasurer after the amount of the 1978 delinquent taxes are determined, which designation will specify the amount to be allocated to the Note Reserve Fund.

2. The said notes shall bear interest payable November 1. 1979. May 1. 1980 and each November 1 and May 1 thereafter until maturity, which interest is not to exceed eight and three-quarters percent (834%) per annum. Said notes shall be coupon notes issued in denominations of \$5,000 each and shall be numbered from 1 upwards, beginning with their earliest maturities in the direct order of their maturities. The notes shall be dated April 1, 1979 and shall be due and payable as follows: \$600,000.00 on May 1, 1980; \$500,000.00 pn May 1, 1981, and not to exceed \$400,000.00 pn

3. The ex act borrowing amount will be designated by the County Treasurer after the amount of the 1978 delinquent taxes are determined, which designation will specify the amount to be allocated to the Note Reserve Fund

2. The said notes shall bear interest payable November 1, 1979, May 1, 1980, and each November 1 and May 1 thereafter until maturity, which interest is not to exceed eight and three quarters per cent (834%) per annum. Said notes shall be coupon notes issued in denominations of \$5,000 each and shall be numbered from 1 upwards, beginning with their earliest maturities in the direct order of their maturities. The notes shall be dated April 1, 1979 and shall be due and payable as follows: \$600,000.00 on May 1, 1980; \$600,000.00 on May 1, 1981, and not to exceed \$575,000.00 on

Discussion followed: BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all resolutions and parts of resolutions which are inconsistent with the foregoing are hereby rescinded.

# **Treatment** needed for lawn mold

When the snow finally melted, many Michigan homeowners found their lawns covered with dirty gray strands or round pinkish patches. The strange-looking stuff is snow mold, and it can kill large areas of

Michigan State University plant pathologist Joe Vargas advises homeowners with snow mold in their lawns to rake up the visible fungus and apply a small quantity of soluble nitrogen to stimulate the growth of new grass foliage.

Snow mold usually damages only the foliage of Kentucky bluegrass, which will soon be mowed off anyway, he points out. It can injure the grass crowns, however. Areas which do not green up when growth resumes have been killed and must be removed and the area reseeded.

The lawns most likely to have snow mold this spring are those that were fertilized last fall so they were still lush going into winter.

No fungicide treatment is recommended for home lawns. Fertilizing lightly now and stopping your lawn fertility program after late August or early September should help reduce the prob-
