

## Soybeans, corn hit records

Corn and soybean production in Michigan and United States hit record levels in 1979, according to the Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

The state's corn production of nearly 238 million bushels is 22 percent above last year's crop and 20 percent above the 1977 record. The state average yield of 95 bushels per acre surpassed the old record by 10 bushels. Michigan has become the eighth largest producer of corn for grain in the country.

U.S. corn production was up 10 percent from last year's record as the nation's average yield increased by nearly 9 bushels per acre.

A large jump in acreage has brought a record soybean crop to Michigan. Total production in 1979 was 49 percent higher than the previous crop and 32 percent better than the 1977 record. U.S. soybean production was 21 percent higher than the record set last year.

Sugarbeet production fell by 11 percent this year as both harvested acreage and yields were down. Production declines in 14 of the 17 primary sugarbeet states caused U.S. production to drop by 14 percent.

Of the other Michigan crops included in the report. increases in production were posted by alfalfa, other hay and popcorn while red clover seed production de-


