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Alcohol fuel workshop set

The production of alcohol as a renewable fuel will be the topic of a workshop during Farmers' Week at Michigan State University. It will start at 1 p.m. Wednesday, March 19, in B108 Wells Hall.

"The production of fuel alcohol may be advantageous for Michigan farmers, provided that it is cost effective and there is a liquid fuel gain," says Bill Stout, energy coordinator for the MSU College of Agriculture and Natural Resources and chairman of the program.

"Many farmers have expressed interest in distilling corn for fuel on their farms and feeding the distilled corn to their livestock. The use of alcohol in commercially sold gasoline also provides them with a new market for their corn."

Stout will open the program with a slide show by Paul Middaugh, a South Dakota State University microbiologist, who has converted several small and medium-sized creameries into alcohol plants. Middaugh will answer questions after the presentation over the telephone.

Harold Lietzke, president of Michigan Agri-Fuels, Inc., will explain his company's plans for building a large alcohol plant in St. Louis.

State Sen. Richard Allen of Ithaca will discuss legislation relating to alcohol production.

Use of alcohol fuels in spark ignition and diesel engines will be discussed by two Ford Motor Co. specialists. Serge Gratch, director of its Chemical Sciences Laboratory Research and Douglas McLean, manager of the Advanced Power Systems Design and Advanced Engineering Department for the Tractor Operations Division.

Loren Alpers of M and W Gear Co. will explain the company's Aquahol injection systems which enable

diesel engines to use alcohol. Demonstrations of a diesel engine running on alcohol will be conducted throughout the day in 107 Agricultural Engineering Building.

Crime statistics have ups, downs

Whether crime increased or decreased in Tuscola county in 1979, compared to the previous year, depends on which statistics one examines.

The annual report of Sheriff Hugh Marr shows the number of criminal calls received by the department to have increased from 1978, but the number of arrests made and charges brought decreased.

The sheriff's department does dispatching for most police units in the county.

The total number of calls received classified as criminal totaled 7,408, compared to 7,352 in the year before.

The greatest number, 2,452, involved traffic (reporting of accidents, drunk drivers, reckless driving, etc.), a decrease of 279 from the year before. There were 849 larcenies reported, up 82, and 712 reports of vandalism, down 19.

There were 16,959 calls received in all categories (criminal, emergency, service-miscellaneous and serving court papers), compared to 16,088 the previous year.

Deputies either arrested (took into custody) or brought charges against 536 persons in 1979, a dip from 774 the previous year.

Court sentences in sheriff's department cases totaled 242, down from 300.

There were 1,508 persons lodged in the county jail, brought in by all police departments, compared to 1,383 in 1978. Ninety-three of last year's inmates were women. Cass City police brought in 64 inmates; Gagetown, 3, and Kingston, 9.

The number of complaints serviced by deputies, that is, resulting in preparation of written reports, totaled 3,753, a sharp increase from the 2,987 of last year.

Deputies policed 1,038 accidents last year, an increase of 36. Of the total, 37 accidents were in Elkland township (not including Cass City), 33 in Ellington, 24 in Elmwood, 42 in Kingston township and 44 in Novesta.

They issued 3,230 traffic tickets (1,550 in 1978) and 3,516 appearance tickets (1,723 in 1978). The big reason for the large increases was the existence of the state funded special road patrol for the first time last year, which put more officers on the road.

The major violation last year was speeding, with

1,940 violators being caught, almost three times the 687 nabbed the year before. Patrol units traveled 437,575 miles last year and consumed 42,028 gallons of gasoline (10.4 miles per gallon).

For the services of the sheriff's department, taxpayers contributed \$745,125 for general operations. In addition, the driver's license bureau cost \$22,626; secondary road patrol, \$82,467 (all state funds); snowmobile safety unit, \$1,054, and marine safety unit, \$4,984.
