# Novesta electors say keep old town hall

Novesta township electors Saturday decided they wanted their township hall to remain right where it is. They voted 24-14 that the township should not purchase the old Novesta Church of Christ building on Cemetery Road, to instead keep the present building on Deckerville Road on the west edge of Deford.

Some of those present also indicated they didn't like the Cass City landfill and a proposed mobile home park in their township. The annual meeting drew about 40 persons, one of the largest turnouts ever. Dan Allen used the turnout as an example why. "We definitely don't have a need

for it (the church building)." Despite the large number of people at the meeting, he said, there was still plenty of room. The \$20,000 the church is asking for the building, he suggested, was only the tip of the iceberg, as there would be other expenses, plus there were other needs in the township.

Linda Yost questioned the lack of parking there and suggested the present township hall could be fixed up, possibly including installing an inside bathroom. A question was raised about heating the church building, to which Keith Little, the church board president, responded that the restrooms have a separate heater, that the rest of the building doesn't need heat when it isn't being used.

The church is now using its new building across the road from the old one for Sunday services. Little said later in the discussion that the old building had not been offered yet to anyone else, that church members wanted the township to have first choice to buy it.

Arguments used in favor of the purchase included its central location in the township, larger size kitchen and restrooms. Supervisor Bill O'Dell suggested the building would serve as a community center, and thereby be used much more than the present township hall.

It was Allen who made the motion to not buy the church. After the vote, O'Dell expressed the opinion the vote might be different if a public referendum were held on the question. He said some persons had called him to say they favored buying the church building but wouldn't be able to attend the meeting.

A petition drive, he suggested, could put the issue of buying the building on the ballot or it could come up at another township meeting.

### LANDFILL

A motion was approved by electors that the township board should explore alternatives to use of the present Cass City-owned landfill,

which is located in Novesta township. The 1980-81 budget, presented at the meeting, allocated \$5,000 for use of the landfill by township residents. (Townships pay Cass City \$3.75 per resident, which allows residents or trash collecting firms which serve them the right to use the landfill.)

The alternative discussed was contracting with a private waste disposal firm from Bad Axe, which would haul trash to its own landfill. According to O'Dell, the township would have to provide a one-acre fenced-in site for location of a large refuse box. Township residents would bring their trash there and the disposal firm would empty the container twice a month. That would cost the township half or less what it pays to Cass City, he said.

The supervisor said the landfill was "getting to be quite a monstrosity out there and it will continue to be," which led to discussion about its continued existence in the township.

One person suggested that if Novesta starts contracting with the private trash disposal firm, the loss of income to Cass City might eventually force the village to close its landfill.

### MOBILE HOME PARK

More opposition was expressed to a proposed mobile home park, to be located near the southwest corner of Severance and Cemetery Roads. Developer is Raymond Gould of Spencer Road, Cass City.

O'Dell had suggested it would be an asset to the township, as well as adding to the tax base, but those who spoke on the subject weren't agreeable.

Planned are 105 lots on 16 acres. "How can they get that many units on that small area and not bother anybody?" asked William Shaw of Severance Road.

"How can we stop this before it gets too far?" asked another man.

Township Clerk Nurse Kloc said the land is zoned residential agricultural and

would not need to be rezoned for the trailer park.

Gould is in the process of obtaining various permits from government agencies, O'Dell indicated, and to stop the project would first require a petition drive.

(Gould later told the Chronicle essentially the same thing, that he is learning all the requirements he must comply with, such as those of the Health Department and Department of Natural Resources, in order to obtain the needed permits.)

It was suggested there may be no legal means to stop the project, though one person commented that if the proposed project were taken to court by opponents, the developer might have to drop the idea because of the legal expense.

### BUDGET

Novesta township finished the 1979-80 fiscal year with a balance of \$27,386.

Major expenditures during the year included road construction, \$31,278; salaries, \$8,262; cemetery, \$6,340 (including replacement of a stolen tractor-mower); landfill, \$4,455, and ambulance subsidy, \$3,420.

The 1980-81 budget presented at the meeting projects total expenditures of \$64,379.

The largest single item is \$28,000 for road construction, which includes paving of one mile of Severance Road between Crawford and Englehart Roads. That will cost the township \$12,000 for crushed stone and \$10,000 for paving, O'Dell said, with the Road Commission picking up the rest of the cost.

The supervisor received a pay raise from \$3,000 to \$3,500 and treasurer and clerk, each from \$1,750 up to \$2,000. Pay for trustees remained the same at \$35 per meeting and for the ambulance board representative, \$25 per meeting.

Fire protection was budgeted at \$5,500; cemetery, \$2,000; ambulance subsidy, \$1,000; the Rawson Memorial Library, \$384, and Cass City recreation program, \$250.

# More money needed for roads, 2 townships slate millage votes

Voters in Elmwood and Grant townships will be asked to approve special millages later this year to finance road improvements, electors decided at their respective township annual meetings Saturday.

Road conditions took the spotlight at several annual meetings Saturday.

Discussed at the Greenleaf township meeting was the board's decision to pay \$10,000 per mile for paving of four miles of Germania Road. The Sanilac County Board of Commissioners is willing to put up \$10,000 more per mile, but the Road Commission has yet to decide whether it will put up an

equal share. Township board members received pay raises at several meetings. Highlights in area townships are as follows.

### TUSCOLA COUNTY

Ellington -- Of the general fund budget for 1980-81 of \$73,540, there is \$43,212 allocated for roads.

In addition, the three mills levied for the same purpose will contribute \$54,075 and the estimated \$6,000 in federal revenue sharing funds will be spent for roads.

A representative of a solid waste hauling firm from Clio will meet with the township

board in May to discuss contracting to provide the service within the township. The new budget allocates \$3,500 to Cass City for the right to use its landfill; the aim will be to see if the private firm can provide the service at less cost. Salaries will remain the same: Supervisor, \$2,420 annually, plus \$2,170 for assessing; clerk, \$2,541; treasurer, \$2,783, and trustees, \$290.

Nine persons attended plus board members. Elmwood -- It was decided that voters will be asked during the Aug. 5 primary election to approve a 3-mill levy for five years, with the

money to be spent on roads. Because the township will have to help pay for five drain projects this year, \$25,000 had to be allocated from the general fund for that purpose, and only \$5,000 for roads. Another \$6,000 in federal revenue sharing funds will be spent for roads. The general fund budget projects total expenditures of \$76,300 and revenues of \$80,560.

Salaries remain the same except for supervisor, who receives a \$500 increase for assessing duties, bringing his total pay to \$5,000. Only one person attended in addition to board members.

Kingston -- A request was made by some township residents to be served by the Lamotte Township Fire Department as they are closer to that department's fire station than the one in Kingston. The request will be forwarded to the Kingston township department, which will discuss it with the township board.

Of \$82,880 budgeted in general fund expenditures, \$99,263 will be spent on roads, \$16,000 for drains (plus \$10,000 is being put aside for the purpose in 1981) and \$4,500 for fire protection.

Board members received an 8 percent pay increase, from \$4,000 to \$4,320 for the supervisor; clerk and treasurer, each from \$2,300 to \$2,485, and trustees, from \$25 per meeting to \$27. Twelve electors plus board members attended.

### SANILAC COUNTY

Evergreen -- With hopes of getting the Leslie and Arnold Road bridges over the Cass River replaced this year, \$8,000 is being appropriated from the general fund for that purpose. Present load limits on both bridges prohibit school buses from crossing them. Please turn to page 20.

## Elkland budget \$146,618

Elkland township will spend an estimated \$146,618 in 1980-81, according to the budget presented at the annual meeting Saturday.

Other than presentation of the budget and financial statement for the past fiscal year, most of the discussion concerned roads.

Township board members received pay increases, their first since 1978. The less than one hour session attracted 14 persons including board members.

Ed Hahn wanted to know whether anything could be done to repair the first mile of Elmwood Road, east of Cemetery Road, which he said was in terrible condition.

The road is the dividing line between Elkland and Novesta townships and that portion is Novesta's responsibility.

Hahn lives on the Elkland side. According to township Clerk Carol Ware, he said he had contacted Novesta officials but had yet to receive an answer, so wanted to know if his own township could do something.

He was told Elkland Supervisor Jack Gallagher may now ask Novesta officials to look into it. Please turn to page 20.

# DeLong lucky to be alive after farm accident

It will be a long recovery period for Francis DeLong, but according to his mother, Lucile DeLong, he is "very lucky" to be alive.

The dairy farmer suffered a broken back, leg and pelvis, plus internal injuries, when silage in a bunker silo fell on him, Tuesday, March 25.

He was removed from the intensive care unit at St. Luke's Hospital in Saginaw Tuesday of this week, his mother said, but will have to undergo surgery on his back in about a week and will probably be in the hospital about two months, according to the doctors.

Once he gets home, it will probably be another 10 months before he can go back to work.

DeLong of 3183 N. Englehart Road, is in partnership with his father Donald and brothers Duane and Richard on the family dairy farm in Novesta township.

According to Lucile DeLong, her son was using a front end loader to remove silage from the open bunker about 10 p.m. when the loader stopped running. He got out and was attempting to get it restarted when a section of silage broke loose and fell on him, burying him completely.

Duane was standing beside him, but fortunately wasn't caught in the silage. He uncovered his brother's face, then summoned his (Duane's) wife and other brother to help dig him out.

Francis was taken by ambulance to Hills and Dales General Hospital, then transferred to St. Luke's.

He has remained conscious throughout the ordeal. What helped save him, according to his mother, was he was wearing a hard helmet, which fell over his face, giving him an air pocket to breathe in, the

brief time he was buried.

What also saved him, of course, was the presence of his brother, Duane. "Someone was looking out for him," Lucile DeLong said, "for Duane was with him and he ordinarily isn't with him."

Francis and his wife, Sharon, have two children, Steve, 8, and Sharie, 6.

## Detroit woman killed

# Accidents send several persons to area hospitals

A Detroit woman was killed in an accident on M-53 early Wednesday, March 26, which left a Cass City woman seriously injured.

Pronounced dead moments after being brought to Huron Memorial Hospital, Bad Axe, was Rita Gold, 39. Reported in fair condition there Tuesday afternoon was Doris M. Lefler, 42, of 8254 Van Dyke Road, who was employed at the hospital as a diet checker and was on her way to work when the accident occurred. It took place at 5:50 a.m. Huron county deputies reported Mrs. Gold was southbound on M-53, north of Atwater Road, when she lost control of her car. It crossed the centerline and collided head-on with the northbound Lefler auto.

Officers reported the Lefler auto left 70 feet of skid marks. There were no visible skid marks left by the Gold auto.

Mrs. Gold was the fourth person to die in a Huron county traffic accident this year.

### THREE INJURED

A 10 a.m. accident Sunday at M-53 and M-81 sent three persons to the hospital. (See photograph, page 20.)

Richard Badgley, 36, of Sebawaing, was treated and released from Hills and Dales General Hospital after the mishap; however, his wife, Mitsuyo, 45, a passenger in the pickup he was driving, was admitted. She was reported in fair condition there Tuesday after-

noon. The other driver involved, Clarence Coupar, 78, of Marlette, was transferred from Hills and Dales to Saginaw General Hospital, where he was reported in fair condition Tuesday afternoon.

Sanilac county deputies reported Coupar was northbound on M-53 and started turning left onto M-81, into the path of Badgley's southbound pickup, and the two vehicles collided.

Coupar was not ticketed. Elkland township firemen were called to the scene to wash down the pavement after the mishap.

Geoffrey W. Gibor, 25, of 3040 E. Deckerville Road, Cass City, was reported in

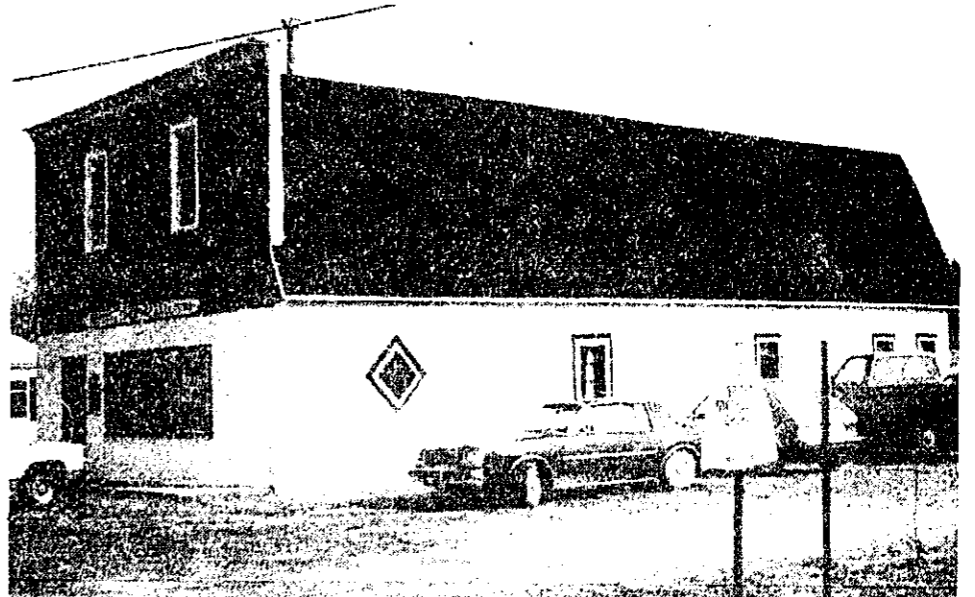

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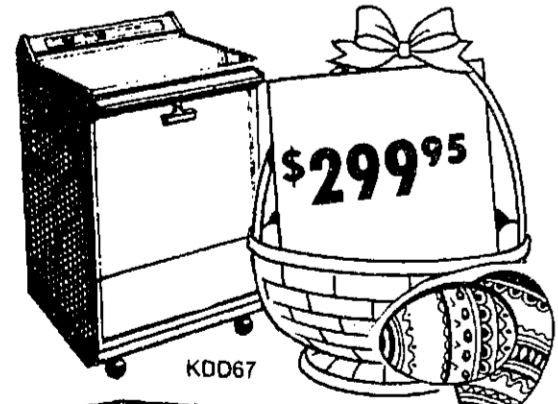

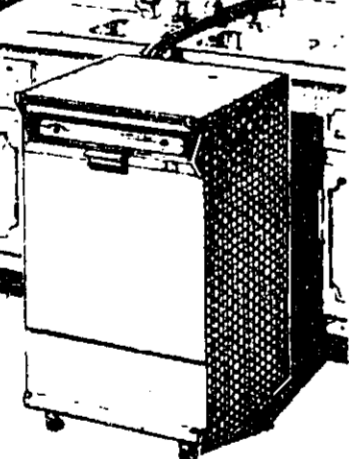

On week ends I like to forget all the crap and nonsense that marred the five previous days. I don't mean the crisis in Iran or the dismal prospect of Carter vs. Reagan. That's big stuff and I don't spend much time fretting about big stuff because there's not much one man can do, even on week-ends, about exchanging Reagan and Carter for the hostages.

What I like to forget on week ends is little stuff like a dented fender or a luncheon date with a woman who had a fungus named after her.

Last week end, things began in fine shape. My wife and I attended a musical — "Eubie" — at the Music Hall and then listened to Alex Karras' daughter sing. Mary Gutzi isn't really Karras' daughter, but she played the role on TV in "Jimmy B. and Andre" and

currently she is singing beautifully at Stephen's Blind Pig in downtown Detroit while John Williams plays splendid piano, as always. Thanks to all this marvelous diversion, my hedonistic heart was happy and I wasn't worrying about any of the things that mess up my mind on week days.

But then came Saturday afternoon and the old woman who fell in the doorway of the drugstore across the street from our home. She seemed to have fainted. I helped pick her up and seat her on a chair. The pharmacist was kind, urging the woman to rest as long as she wished. I offered her a ride home. She said it would be more trouble getting in and out of the car than it would be walking the short distance to her house. She assured me she would be all right. I left her sitting there.

And then I worried about her the rest of the week end. Did she get home OK? Does she live alone? How is she feeling today? Does anyone care what happens to her? Why the hell didn't I walk home with her?

I see old women like her everywhere, on the streets and in stores. Old men, too. They appear feeble and unsure and in need of help. I'm sure many of them need no help at all, and would scoff at the suggestion. I'm sure many of them have someone who cares what happens to them. But I'm also sure many of them don't. Those are the ones who, simply by showing up, can ruin my week end.

They can also make me realize what a jerk I am to be worrying about such unimportant things as a dumb TV show and the price of beer.

I know I should have walked home with that old woman.

## Those left out can still be counted

Feel left out, that you might not count, because you didn't get a census form in the mail?

Don't despair. You can still get one.

About 99 percent of the population received their U.S. census forms Friday. They were to be mailed back Tuesday.

There were two basic categories of persons who didn't get their census forms on time.

According to Cass City Postmaster Grant Glaspie, Census Bureau enumerators conducted surveys last summer to collect addresses, to find out who lived where.

At the end of February, the bureau sent out forms to post offices listing the addresses collected last summer. The post offices, Glas-

pie explained, then had to check the Census Bureau address lists against their own.

A card had to be filled out for each address the post office had that the Census Bureau didn't have, and then returned to the bureau.

According to Glaspie, it took the agency more time than anticipated to prepare the census forms for mailing to the addresses it missed in the summer survey, thus not all forms arrived in post boxes Friday.

Forms were dribbling in Saturday and Monday for delivery, he said.

A spokesman at the Census Bureau office in Saginaw

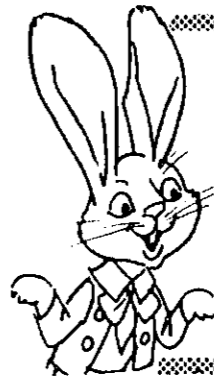
said Tuesday that all such forms should have been mailed by then.

The other category of persons who didn't get forms are those who were somehow missed in all the preliminary survey work.

Census forms, incidentally, had to be delivered to all places with sleeping quarters, according to Glaspie. That included motels and the hospital.

If, however, anyone still didn't get a form, according to the Census Bureau spokesman, he or she should call that office at the toll-free number -- 1-800-292-0615 -- and ask for one.

It will then take about two weeks before the forms are mailed, she said.

My alma mater, Lansing Eastern High School, is the state Class A champion in basketball.

Yea, Quakers! Sports teams got that name, by the way, because the school is located on Pennsylvania Ave.

I graduated in 1963. Among things I was not when I was there was an athlete. The most athletic things I ever did was walk a mile to school every day, wrestle my parents' 4000 pound Pontiac without power steering out of a very tight parking place after a basketball game and sit through a football game in a pouring rain.

Being a good boy, I went home after the game, took a hot shower and went to bed. I caught a cold but was able to go to school Monday. Those who didn't go home, but went to the dance instead, caught very bad colds and had to stay out of school two or three days. Boy, was I dumb.

I do have some fond memories of the school, which was built in 1928.

One thing I liked about it was the fact that it was built in 1928. Schools built back then had character. There were stairs to climb, lots of dark wood paneling, wood floors and desks bolted to the floors.

I'm not too nostalgic about the desks. The seats consisted of two flat pieces of wood set at an angle to each other. The thought of shaping the wood to fit one's anatomy had never entered the manufacturer's mind. High school kids had to be tough in my day.

We also, for the most part, walked to school. Few students owned cars. Some did get rides with their parents and there were a couple of school buses for those living in an outlying portion of the district. (No high school kids would be caught dead or alive riding a bicycle in those days.)

Though my memory may be getting hazy, I do not recall there ever was a day classes were cancelled because of snow.

I suppose conditions have changed, but a high school with 2,000 students did not mean it was a blackboard jungle.

without fear of students being stabbed in the parking lot.

There are two teachers that especially stand out in my mind, Mrs. Johnson in 10th grade English and Mr. Brisbin for 12th grade social studies.

The names don't mean anything to you reading this, of course. I only mention them to point out something else about high school in the good old days. Teachers were strictly, Mr., Mrs. or Miss and to discover their first names was a major accomplishment.

As far as I know, teachers these days are still Mr., Mrs. Miss or maybe Ms. but I think the relation between teacher and student these days is much less formal. I never will get used to male teachers not wearing ties and (in all but hot weather) jackets.

Of course, everything is less formal now. Students can wear (almost) anything. In my day, it was a shirt with a collar and pants for the boys (I assume they can wear shorts these days) and girls had to wear skirts or dresses.

No one wore blue jeans in school and very few wore them outside school.

Call me old-fashioned.

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**Obscene calls also made in tri-cities**

The obscene telephone caller who has been bothering women in the Cass City area has been bothering other women as well.

Calls have been reported in the Saginaw, Bay City and Midland areas as well and at least some of those predate some made in this area.

The caller is a sophisticated sounding young man who claims he is a student at Delta College making a survey for its psychology department.

The man asks the women personal questions, mainly involving their sex lives. He

uses clinical terms, as opposed to obscene ones.

No one at the college, according to its college relations office, has been authorized to conduct any type of research that requires questioning persons by phone or door-to-door.

The Chronicle first reported about the calls March 6. At that time, Cass City Police Chief Gene Wilson knew of five women who had received the calls, one of which had been made six months earlier. He was not aware of any made outside this area.

At a meeting March 12, he met R. Daniel Dowis, director of the Delta College campus police, who informed him the calls had been reported in the Saginaw, Bay City and Midland areas. He expressed surprise, according to Wilson, that the calls had extended as far east as Cass City.

Locally, the police chief said the last report he received of such calls was March 7. At that time, the calls reported totaled 16, including three made within 10 minutes of each other.

The common link Wilson has discovered so far is that most women called had their phone numbers listed in the directory under their own names and have been young, about 20-30 years old.

He speculates that more than one man may be making the calls, but all are using the same list of questions. He feels the one who made the calls locally may live in this area.

His advice, which is the same as that of Dowis, is for women receiving the calls to hang up.

Publicity given to the obscene caller locally, with the result that many women now know about the charade, may be why there have not been any reports of the calls of late.

Any women who receive such calls can notify the chief by calling him at the village hall, 872-2911.

The telephone companies involved, General Telephone and Michigan Bell, are aiding police in the investigation.

**THE BLEEDING HEART**, by Marilyn French (fiction). The author of the best-selling novel, "The Women's Room," writes of an affair between Dolores Durr and Victor Morrissey, both middle-aged and both American—she a professor of literature doing a year's research in England and he a businessman on assignment in England for the same length of time. Their relationship is stormy, since both bring unhappy marital experiences into their affair, and they engage in a series of verbal confrontations over definitions of female and male roles and over how much responsibility individuals can or should assume for the actions of loved ones.

**THE MARRYING KIND**, by Elizabeth Cadel (fiction). A charming tale of two sisters whose contrasting life styles, in rural and city settings, are both upset by their father, a vagabond artist with a knack for discovering long lost paintings by the use of questionable methods. **Safety tips for kite flying**

With the kite-flying season comes danger to youngsters who either aren't taught some safety tips or forget them.

J.A. Albertson, manager of the Consumers Power Co. Bay City district, passes on the following tips for parents, teachers and area children:

- 1) Use only dry string, not wire or anything metallic.
- 2) Never use wire or metal in the construction of your kite, only wood, paper and plastic.
- 3) On rainy days, keep your kite indoors.
- 4) Stay away from busy streets and highways while flying your kite. Be careful not to run across a motorist's path.

- 5) Don't fly your kite near radio or television antennas.
- 6) Keep well away from any electric wires.
- 7) If your kite becomes snagged in a power line, don't try to pull on the string or climb the utility pole. It's better to lose a kite than your life.
- 8) If you see a kite tangled in electric lines, even if it isn't your own, call your power company and let them know the location.

## Crop target prices announced

State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee Chairman Vernon Kretzschmer has announced changes in the 1980 farm programs, including higher target prices for wheat and feed grains.

Producers who stay within their normal crop acreage (NCA) qualify for farm program benefits based upon the new announced target prices.

"President Carter signed the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1980 which raises the 1980 wheat target price to \$3.63 a bushel and the 1980 corn target price to \$2.35 a bushel," Kretzschmer said. "We are also setting the 1980 sorghum and barley target prices at \$2.50 and \$2.55 per bushel, respectively."

However, Kretzschmer said producers who want to receive the higher target prices must stay within their normal crop acreage.

"Those who exceed their NCA will receive benefits based upon the formula target in the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977," he said. This formula establishes 1980 target prices for wheat at \$3.08, corn at \$2.05, sorghum at \$2.45 and barley at \$2.29," Kretzschmer said.

The new act also extends the disaster payments program through the 1980 crop year for producers of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and rice.

Besides Ms. Vandemark's participation, representatives from the states of Missouri, Montana, California and five national organizations were in attendance to give testimony.

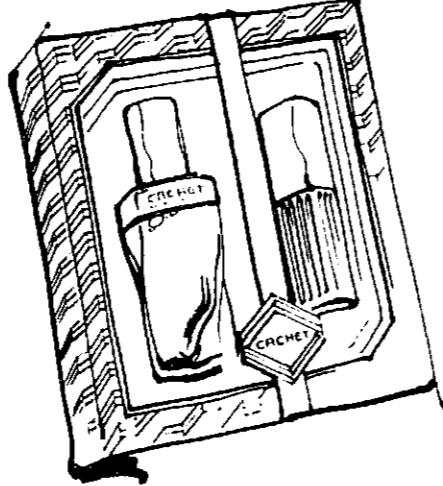

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## Your Neighbor says Imported oil tax will hurt economy

Oscar Haag doesn't think much of President Carter's proposed tax on imported crude oil, part of the President's anti-inflation program, which would increase the cost of gasoline at the pump by 10 cents a gallon. The aim is to reduce consumption and thus cut down on the amount of expensive oil imported into this country. "At the present time, we should try to hold it (the price on gasoline)," Haag said. "By pushing too hard, it would hurt the economy too much."

Sharp increases in the cost of gas, he feels, hurt those who drive older, less economical cars. It would be fairer to announce big price increases a year in advance so that when persons go to buy a new car, they would know they should buy an economical one. Haag considers Rep. Bob Traxler's bill now in Congress to limit the number of foreign cars sold in this country, initially by 35 percent, as unfortunately necessary.

He would prefer that Detroit make more economical cars to compete with the imports. "I feel badly that our country hasn't come up with a car that can compete with them, but when there's a 10 mile per gallon difference, it's hard to turn it (buying foreign

cars) down." But in order to save auto-workers' jobs, he feels a limit on the number of imported cars is necessary. "Some sacrifices we have to make to keep our country going."

As for whether there really is an energy shortage, Haag commented, "It's coming, but right now, I think the tanks are full." An employee of Acme Roll Forming in Sebawaing and a part-time farmer, Haag, his wife Esther, and son Alan, a senior at Owen-Gage High School, live on Shebeon Road between Sebawaing and Owendale.

Alfred Freeman, the only Negro who ever graduated from Cass City High School, played left field and was good.

### Rep. fights curb in term length

It would cut property taxes in half, and thus would similarly affect all county, township, village and city services, including fire and police protection. The state would have to reimburse units of government for the 50 percent property tax cut, which would amount to about \$2 billion.

No taxes could be levied by the state without the vote of the people for the money needed to reimburse the \$2 billion. And the state already is about a half billion dollars short today.

Thus it behooves all voters to become totally familiar with the Tisch proposal before making a final decision. Incidentally, the state does not get one red cent of any property tax dollars.

Headlee has raised his head again with a proposal to reduce the number of years, at all major levels that state elected officials may serve.

This is an issue that sounds great, but it would completely demolish the effectiveness of experienced legislators, and thus let bureaucracies thrive and relish with newcomers who

would never really get familiar with the system of how bureaucrats work. A maximum number of terms allowed for elected officials may have merit, but it seems that that decision should be left up to the voters.

### Controlling pesticides

By Don Kebler

Shortly after April 17, action at the federal level will be made that could affect all producers of farm commodities.

I am speaking of the petition submitted by a group called "Friends of the Earth."

This petition was sub-

mitted to the Environmental Protection Agency and the Federal Aviation Administration asking the following pesticide restriction and requirement be made.

The proposals would make it illegal for all aerial and ground sprayers to let pesticides be applied without written permission before spraying. This written permission would be from people living within 250 feet of an area to be ground sprayed and 1,000 feet from any aerial application area.

These requirements do not exempt governmental spraying on forests, etc. Also, it would require all pesticide labels to contain management guidelines.

I am sure it won't take long for you to form your own opinion, pro or con, to ramifications of this proposal if put into law. I have mine, but in all fairness of providing unbiased information, I will not expound.

However, if you want to inform the Environmental Protection Agency of your opinions for or against this proposal, you should do so now. Your letter should be in the hands of the EPA no later than April 17.

Because the EPA will be acting upon this proposal you should also send copies of your letter to your senators and representative in Washington. This will inform them of your feelings, so they can lend their assistance in support of your needs.

Leading the way will be Teresa Hewitt, the only Hawk girl to qualify for the state meet last year. She runs the hurdles.

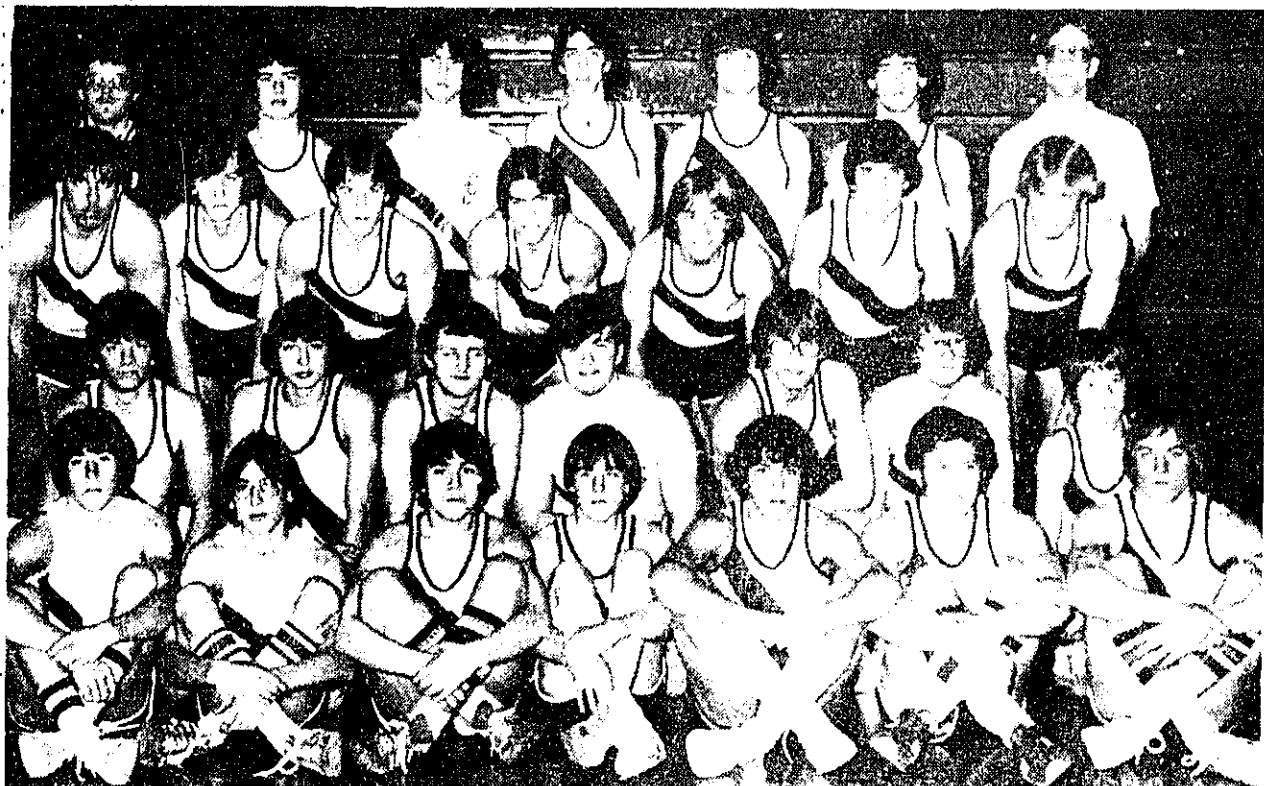

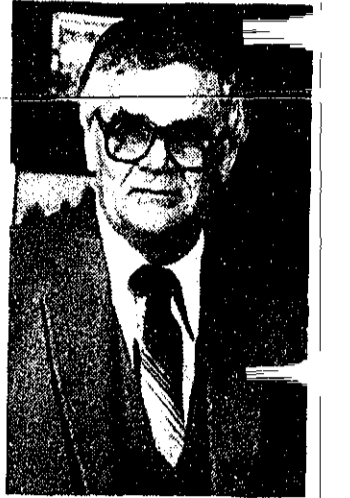
He became a property owner in Caro in 1968 and moved there permanently with his wife in 1978.

## Local Chest prexy questions county-wide United Fund

The president of the Elkland-Novesta United Way, Iris Tuckey, is withholding judgment on proposed organization of some type of county-wide United Way program.

Mrs. Tuckey hasn't been able to attend the two county meetings held so far to discuss the proposal because of schedule conflicts and as of Monday, hadn't had a chance to talk to board member Jerry Cleland, who went to the first meeting. She is planning to attend the next session, Thursday, April 10, in Caro.

After that, she said she will meet with the local United Way board to decide whether the local organization will join in any county-wide organization or effort. She predicted the board "won't be interested" if it means it will have to give up any funds raised locally beyond what it contributes already.

Most of the money raised locally is given to local organizations and causes, but the last time funds were distributed, a year ago, money also went to Big Brothers-Big Sisters, American Red Cross, Catholic Family Service, all of which directly serve the county -- and \$2,200 to Michigan United Way.

Had the local fund drive not exceeded its goal in 1978, Mrs. Tuckey said, the amount given to Michigan United Way could have been reduced. As part of a county-wide organization, she wondered if there still would be that option.

At present, there are only four United Way organizations in the county, in Cass City, Akron, Fairgrove and Vassar.

Efforts are underway in Caro to revive the organization there after a three year lapse, with the aid of the Caro Jaycees and concerned citizens.

After a meeting Feb. 25 in which C. DeWayne Dusk-in, field representative for United Way of Michigan, spoke to the Thumb Area Regional Interagency Coordinating Committee, an ad hoc committee was formed with representatives from participating agencies.

Purpose of the committee was to call together county

leaders and United Way organizations to look into the feasibility of forming a countywide program and ways to work cooperatively for the betterment of Tuscola county.

Serving on the committee are Dusk-in; David Bluem, Tuscola County Department of Social Services; Connie Gamet, Big Brothers-Big Sisters; Ted Hull, Caro Area Services to the Handicapped; Wendell R. Wood, Caro Regional Mental Health Center; Mary Hoerlein, American Red Cross, and Howard Hoskins, Human Development Com-

mission. A countywide United Way program, according to Dusk-in, would be beneficial for the following reasons:

1) Increased financial support and services by member agencies without losing individual community funding support or involvement.

2) Increased potential for financial support. In 1962-63, a countywide United Way program raised \$24,056. In 1979-80, separate campaigns raised a total of \$23,229 in Tuscola county.

Over 50 percent of the county is unreached by a United Way appeal, while

agencies provide services without needed financial assistance.

3) Reduced cost for agencies which now must make several budget presentations, to one presentation countywide, at the same time giving support to agencies with only one community interest.

4) Increased potential of getting designated pledges at places of work out of county back into the county and increased payroll deduction plans.

5) Reduced fund-raising efforts by individual agencies.

## Most kids happy with parents the way they are

If kids could change anything between them and their parents, most wouldn't.

That was one of the findings in a limited survey conducted by Ilene Soldan of Cass City Road, Unionville, for a high school completion psychology class project.

She arranged to have her survey form passed out by a teacher in a study hall at Cass City Intermediate School. Parents had to sign permission slips before their children could fill out the form.

Mrs. Soldan wanted to do a study of communications between parents and children. "I was going to interview parents, but too many parents are interviewed now (for such studies)." Then

she decided, "Why don't I ask the kids?"

There were 24 students who filled out the form, eight boys and 16 girls, ranging in age from 12-14.

Fifteen live on farms, the rest in town. Nineteen live with both parents, one with foster parents, one with their mother, one with their father and two with their mother and a stepfather.

All but one or two said they are usually able to get along with and talk to both parents.

Asked if they would change anything in the relationship between them and their parents, 20 said they would not, four said they would.

What would the four like changed? "The way they

spoil me," said one. "I would like to be raised not so closely guarded," responded another.

Sixteen of the respondents go to church or want to go; eight never go.

"Did you hug your mom or dad or both this morning?" None of the boys had, but half the girls did.

The boys may not have been huggers, but five of the eight said they can tell their parents, "I love you." Fifteen of the 16 girls said they could express that emotion to their parents.

Can their parents show to their children that they have feelings, such as fear, loneliness, love, getting upset or crying? Twenty of the respondents replied "yes."

## Annual meeting: Thumb Electric reviews year

The 43rd annual meeting of members of the Thumb Electric Cooperative was held at Ubyly High School Thursday, March 27.

Treasurer Michael Lasceski presented the financial statements for 1979.

His report showed receipts of \$5,099,332, of which \$5,031,677 was electrical operating revenues.

The major expenses for the year were the cost of purchased and generated power of \$3,187,692. Distribution operation and maintenance was \$324,548. The balance owed to REA and CFC for long-term mortgage was \$9,086,472. The cooperative showed a margin of \$335,999 for 1979.

The load growth for the cooperative during the last seven years was discussed. Demands have been reduced and kilowatt hour sales increased. This has reduced the rising trend of rate increases.

This has been accomplished through the load management program initiated by the cooperative in 1979 as well as milder weather in 1979-80.

The increase in wholesale power costs had averaged 18 percent per year from 1973 through 1978, and the increase in retail rates has averaged 13 percent per year during that period. Last year the wholesale power costs increased by 3.1 percent and the retail rates increased by 4.8 percent. This was far less than the 13 percent inflation rate in 1979.

A call service is now in use to accept emergency calls between 10:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m. on weekdays and 24 hours on Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. This was done to reduce the overall cost of emergency call service for members.

The cooperative's load management system is installed and completely operational.

There are nearly 1,500

remote water heater control units installed. It appears that there is a potential for 800 additional units that could be installed.

Anyone who has an electric water heater, but does not have a remote control unit installed is urged to call the cooperative for an appointment. There is no charge for installation or maintenance of the unit.

The load management system is fulfilling its purpose of reducing the system load during peak hours. The combination of a mild winter and peak load shaving has reduced peak load by almost 12 percent while the overall load has dropped only 5 percent in the first two months of this year.

The load management system will fully pay for itself by the end of this year through the savings in wholesale power costs.

The wholesale power supplier filed for a rate increase of 8.7 percent in November, 1979. Thumb Electric joined with two other cooperatives and three municipalities who also purchase wholesale power and negotiated a settlement in this case.

The settlement calls for a 5.6 percent increase in wholesale rates, which became effective April 1. The settlement also states that wholesale supplier cannot raise the rates before June 1, 1981.

In order to provide the lowest possible cost of service, the board is investigating three power cooperatives in Michigan and Indiana which purchase and generate power and sell it to the cooperatives which themselves own and operate the power cooperatives.

A new portable substation was completed this year, to be used to replace any of our permanent substations on a temporary basis to perform repairs or bypass equipment that has failed.

The board of directors recently signed a three-year contract with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 17. This union represents 25 employees of Thumb Electric.

Attendance was approximately 550. The result of the election was announced.

Elected directors to three-year terms were Michael Lasceski, Huron county; Leon Smith, Sanilac, and Louis Wenzlaff, Tuscola. All were incumbents and all unopposed.

At the board meeting that followed, officers elected were: Walter Cook, president; Elmer Rayl, secretary, and Michael Lasceski, treasurer.

### HEALTH TIPS

## Poison proof your medicine cabinet

Spring and spring cleaning are just around the corner. This year, help accidental poisonings by spring cleaning your medicine chest.

All outdated medications should be emptied into the toilet bowl and flushed. This will prevent little hands that play in the garbage from getting into these medications. Check to see if the medication is outdated by noting the expiration date on the prescription label, or check with your pharmacist.

Terry R. Ensign, president of the Michigan Pharmacists Association, warns that outdated medications can be very dangerous in two ways:

First, an outdated product has usually undergone a chemical or physical change. This new chemical can be harmful. Secondly, in the process of change the new chemical does not act in the same way that the original medication did and may not help you to become well. This can be life-threatening as in the case of nitroglycerine.

Nitroglycerine is very bitter and very easily destroyed by moisture, light and heat. Every month or two test your nitroglycerine by placing a tablet under your tongue. Do this even if the expiration date has not been reached. If it is not bitter throw it away and get a new prescription or refill.

Even if you do not have small children in your home regularly, it is important for you to reduce the potential for accidental poisoning. Remember that the vast majority of the medications and potential poisons DO NOT have an antidote. There are only a few antidotes available for a few poisons. If your medicine chest is cluttered, it is very easy to grab the wrong bottle or an outdated medication.

Your health is much too important to risk it by saving old medication. Your pharmacist will be glad to review your medications for you if you desire assistance. It is also very important to keep syrup of ipecac and activated charcoal in your medicine chest in case of accidental poisonings.

The number of the poison information control center should be near each phone in your home to save precious time. When calling the poison information center be sure to follow directions exactly and above all, remain calm.

# Elkland township 1980-81 budget totals \$146,618

A question was asked about brush removal and there was some general discussion about roads.

Except for a previous board decision to rebuild Krapf Road this year, it hasn't decided yet what roads need repair work this year. Gallagher and board members Art Randall and Al Merchant will soon be touring the township roads with a representative of the Road Commission to decide what needs to be done.

There is \$30,000 budgeted for road construction this year, \$32,606 for maintenance and \$1,000 for roadside brush and tree removal.

That is all money out of the general fund. In addition, \$12,465 is earmarked in federal revenue sharing funds for roads.

Of the remainder of the federal money, \$5,000 is budgeted for the sanitary landfill (owned by Cass City) and \$4,500 for Rawson Memorial Library.

Other large general fund expenditures include transfer of \$25,000 to the fire fund for final payment on the newest fire truck, transfer of \$7,945 for fire department operations, \$6,352 transferred to the cemetery fund and \$8,000 subsidy for the ambulance service.

Salary increases for board members were approved as follows: Supervisor, \$2,000 basic salary remains the same but salary as assessor increased from \$4,000 annually to \$4,500; clerk and treasurer, each from \$4,500 to \$5,000, and trustees, from \$600 each to \$720.

Estimated general fund income for the new fiscal year that started Tuesday is the same as expenditures, \$146,618.

That includes \$13,218 remaining from the last fiscal year; \$44,500 in property taxes; \$40,000 in state sales, income and intangible taxes and revenue sharing; \$12,000 in interest income, and \$25,000 in certificates of deposit to be cashed in for the fire truck payment.

# More money needed for roads, 2 townships slate millage votes

The hope is, according to Clerk Otis Dorland, that the county Board of Commissioners and Road Commission will each appropriate \$4,000 for each bridge, making the total cost \$12,000 per bridge.

If the \$8,000 is used for the bridges, no money will be available for roads.

General fund expenditures total \$37,575. The final payment on the Stoney Creek drain project, from the general fund, will cost the township \$12,325.

The library and recreation programs in Cass City will each receive \$250.

Salaries remain the same, with the supervisor receiving \$2,000 annually, clerk and treasurer, \$1,000 each, and trustees, \$20 per meeting.

Seventeen persons attended, including board members.

Greenleaf -- The Sanilac County Board of Commissioners March 26 voted to appropriate \$10,000 per mile for blacktopping 1 1/2 miles of roads, including four miles of Germania between Bay City-Forestville and Cass City Roads in Greenleaf township. (The other roads

were in Buel and Delaware townships.)

The county money, however, is contingent on the townships appropriating \$6,000 per mile, in addition to the \$4,000 previously appropriated, and the Road Commission paying the balance, expected to be \$10,000 per mile, for a total of \$30,000 per mile.

The Greenleaf Township Board, according to Clerk Clare Brown, has set aside \$50,000 in its 1980 budget for its share -- \$40,000 for the four miles mentioned, plus \$10,000, should it be decided elsewhere to also pave the mile of Germania south of Cass City Road.

Since the general fund budget totals only \$67,000, the \$50,000 for Germania, he said, "will cut it pretty thin."

As for whether the Road Commission board will appropriate its \$10,000 per mile, its engineer-manager, Jack Kineman, told the Chronicle Monday it will be making a decision in about two weeks.

If it does appropriate money for the purpose, he said, it will have to come from funds it otherwise will spend for bridges.

The Greenleaf budget also

includes \$100 for the Cass City recreation program and \$233 for the Rawson library.

Salaries remain the same as last year: Supervisor, \$2,110; clerk, \$1,500; treasurer, \$1,800, and trustees, \$25 per meeting.

Eight persons including board members attended. Lamotte -- Of the \$84,571 in general fund expenditures, \$12,000 is budgeted for road construction, \$4,800 for brining, \$6,000 for patching and \$14,000 for new bridges (Adams and Moriarty Roads).

Drains will claim \$14,000. Of the estimated \$12,000 in federal revenue sharing funds, \$4,000 will be spent for the fire department, \$1,000 for recreation and the rest for roads.

The supervisor received a pay raise from \$1,150 to \$1,400, plus \$300 for expenses and \$1,800 for assessing duties (up from \$1,500); clerk and treasurer, each from \$1,680 to \$2,000; deputy clerk and deputy treasurer, each from \$350 to \$420, and trustees, each from \$350 to \$500, plus an unchanged \$7 per meeting.

It was decided the township will try to establish an ordinance to control, but not ban, concerts attended by

more than 250 persons. Some rock concerts have been held in the past at a farm on Lamton Road.

Nine persons attended plus three board members.

### HURON COUNTY

Brookfield -- The poor condition of some roads and the need for patching and gravel were discussed.

Of the approximately \$100,000 the township is planning to spend this year, \$57,000 will be spent for roads.

The supervisor received a pay raise from \$3,000 to \$5,000, including assessing duties, and clerk and treasurer, from \$2,000 to \$2,500. Trustees will continue to receive \$30 per meeting.

Thirty attended, plus board members.

Grant -- Township residents will be asked during the May 20 presidential primary election to approve two millage proposals: One mill for five years for roads and one mill for three years

for fire and ambulance service.

One mill will raise about \$12,000.

The new budget allocates \$5,000 for standby fire fees to four departments (Elkland, Owendale, Elmwood and Oliver townships), two of which also charge for each fire run.

The township presently doesn't subsidize the ambulance services in Cass City or Elkton, which means Grant residents must use an ambulance who must pay more than those living in townships which subsidize the service.

If the millage passes, the township will give a subsidy to both ambulance services.

Of the \$49,000 budget, including federal revenue sharing funds, \$25,000 is budgeted for road maintenance.

Salaries remain the same: Supervisor, \$2,500 annually; clerk, \$2,000; treasurer, \$2,300, and trustees, \$22.50 per meeting.

Eight people plus board members attended.

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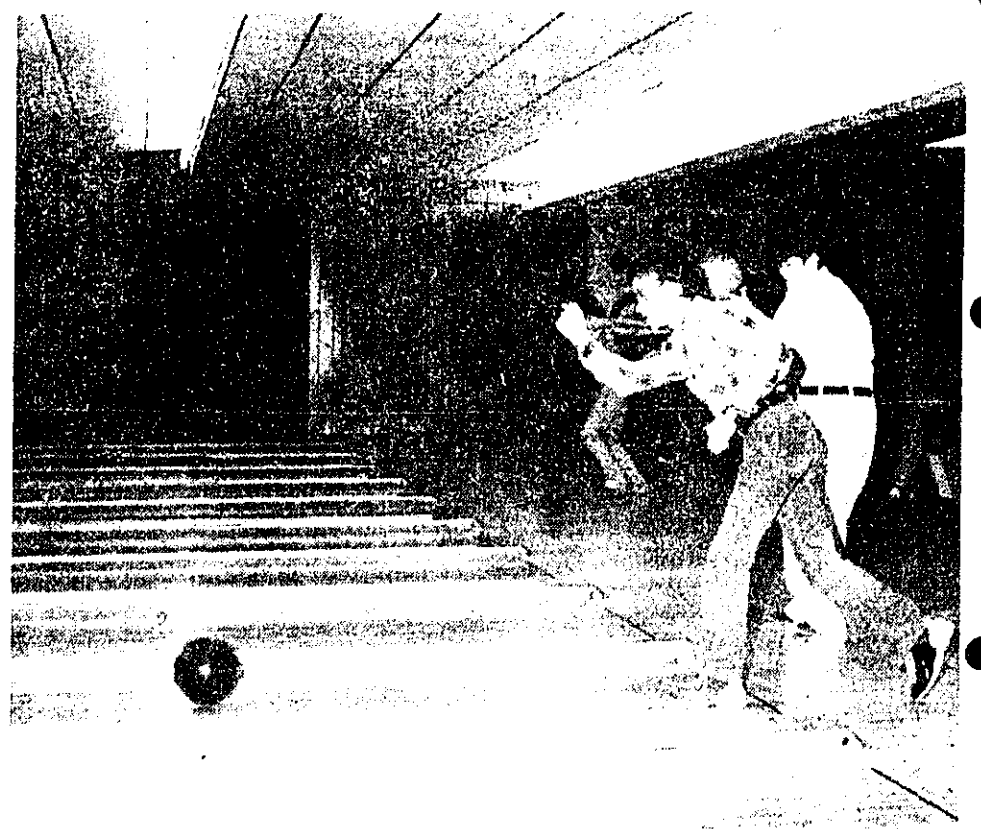
