Suit seeks \$300,000 in damages

Dr. Richard A. Hall, DO, and Hills and Dales General Hospital are defendants in a

law suit filed by Tammy Bruce of Cass City.

The plaintiff claims she suffered injury, pain and suffering, stemming from and involving the caesarean section birth of her child March 21, 1978, at the hospital.

The suit seeks \$100,000 in damages from each doctor and the hospital, a total of \$300,000, together with interest, costs and attorney fees.

A jury trial has been demanded. The suit was filed March 26 and has been assigned to Circuit Judge Patrick R. Joslyn.

Rites held Monday for Mrs. Martin

Funeral services were conducted Monday for Isabel Martin, 70, retired Uby school teacher, who died Friday at her home after an apparent heart attack.

Mrs. Martin's brother, Rt. Rev. Msgr. Jerome MacEachin, pastor emeritus of St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic church, East Lansing, and other priests officiated at services in St. John's Catholic church, Uby. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Mrs. Martin was born June 5, 1909, in Uby, daughter of John D. and Mary Jane MacEachin.

She and Walter T. Martin were married Sept. 25, 1937, in Owosso. Martin, an Uby rural mail carrier, died July 16, 1968.

Mrs. Martin graduated from Uby High School in 1926, where she set a school basketball record. She scored 63 points in a girls' basketball game that year, a record that still stands.

She attended Huron County Normal School in Bad Axe, Ypsilanti State Teachers College, and Central Michigan University, and received her bachelor's degree from Michigan State University in 1961.

Mrs. Martin taught school in Durand, Minden township, and for 16 years in the Uby Community Schools before retiring in 1969.

Mrs. Martin was a member of the Confraternity of Christian Mothers of St. John's Catholic church, the National Retired Teachers Association, and the National Rural Letter Carriers Auxiliary.

A leader in Uby High School alumni activities, she participated in all of the Alabama Jubilees staged in Uby and was active in volunteer work at Huron Memorial Hospital.

Surviving are two sons, John T. Martin, secretary of the Huron County Road Commission, of Bad Axe, and Paul Martin, New York, N.Y.; two grandchildren; three brothers, Msgr. MacEachin, East Lansing, Kenneth MacEachin, Dearborn Heights, and Angus H. MacEachin, Uby, and one sister, Mrs. Sally Morgan, Bad Axe.

Four brothers and one sister preceded her in death.

Complete sale of WKYO

The sale of Tuscola Broadcasting Company, licensee of radio stations WKYO and WIDL (FM) were completed Tuesday.

The Federal Communications Commission approved the sale to Gene Bardo, presently operations manager and chief engineer of the stations, and John Lawrence, president of Lawrence Insurance, Inc.

The new owners report that there are no plans to change staff or programming at the present time.

According to Lawrence and Bardo, John Tomlinson has been appointed manager of the stations. Tomlinson has been station sales manager.

WKYO was started in 1962 by Robert Benkelman and James McCoy. Benkelman later acquired McCoy's interest and McCoy later became owner of the TV 3 Cable Co.

WIDL (FM) went on the air in 1974. Both stations are fulltime facilities.

Benkelman has been president of the company for 18 years. His wife, Lorraine, was business manager for 12 years. Neither will be affiliated with the new owners in other than an advisory capacity. The Benkelmans have not announced plans for the future except that they expect to remain in the area.

Lenda seeks sheriff's post

Bernard Lenda of Caro has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Tuscola county sheriff in the Aug. 5 primary election.

He has been a special investigator for the prosecutor's office since 1976. Lenda, 54, was born and raised in the Owendale area. After World War II military service, he worked for Chrysler Corp. in the Detroit area until 1956, when he began employment with the Hamtramck Police Department. He retired from there 20 years later as a sergeant in the uniform division.

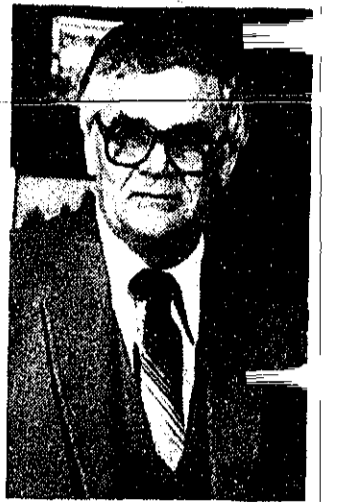
He became a property owner in Caro in 1968 and moved there permanently with his wife in 1978.

His academic studies have included two years at Wayne County Community College and a year at Wayne State University, the Southeastern Michigan Chiefs of Police School, homicide investigation under the Wayne County Medical Examiner, Michigan State Police criminal investigation school, Federal Bureau of Investigation fingerprint classification and advanced fingerprint schools and Michigan State University personnel management and industrial relations special training.

During his career with the Hamtramck police, Lenda received one departmental citation and five commendations for outstanding and meritorious service.

As investigator for the Tuscola county prosecutor's office, he has completed special seminars on negligent homicide and trial through the Michigan Prosecu-

tor's Association, a fraud investigation seminar at Lansing Community College and program requirements for an intensive criminal investigation seminar at Delta College.

Cass City Village Council

The regular meeting of the Cass City Village Council was held March 24, 1980 at the Municipal Building at 7 p.m. All Trustees were present except Trustee Helwig and Trustee Stahlbaum.

Two bids were opened on the 1977 Dodge Police Car as advertised. A motion was made by Trustee Hampshire and supported by Trustee Rawson to accept the bid of \$471.59 received from Joseph Howey, Kelly Rd., Cass City. Motion carried 4 years and 0 days.

The minutes of the Regular February meeting were approved as presented. A motion was made by Trustee McIntosh and supported by Trustee Ware that the 1980 Appointments and Committees (attached) recommended by the Village President be approved. Motion carried 4 years, 0 days.

The February 1980 Financial Statement was reviewed.

Discussion was held on the report of the assessor and the establishment of the 1980 millage. It was the consensus of the council members that they were present to defer any decision until the special meeting to be held April 7, 1980.

Budget and Finance committee presented the Agreement as to Audit for the 1980 year, received from Yeo & Yeo, C.P.A.'s (attached). A motion was made by Trustee Rawson and supported by Trustee Ware to accept the Agreement. Motion carried 4 years, 0 days.

The Village President requested that the record show that next year's Audit will be open to competing firms.

A letter was received from Paul Lefler, Administrator of Building Codes Division

for the County of Tuscola, informing us that a letter was sent to Mrs. McNeil from the Prosecuting Attorney regarding condemnation procedures on her property located at Houghton and Brooker Streets.

It was noted the demolition has started on Larry Peters' property located at Nestle and Main Streets and also at the old depot.

The Planning Commission recommended that the Council start condemnation procedures against Wickes Agriculture for their property located at Vulcan and Garfield Streets. A motion was made by Trustee Ware and supported by Trustee Rawson to authorize the Village Attorney to start condemnation procedures against Wickes Agriculture Motion carried 4 years, 0 days.

The receiving of bids on the Wastewater Treatment Expansion Program scheduled to be opened at 2:00 p.m. on March 27, was deferred until 2:00 p.m. April 3, 1980.

The Superintendent's report was reviewed.

A motion was made by Trustee Rawson and supported by Trustee Ware that the bills as examined be approved for payment. Motion carried 4 years, 0 days.

The President officially appointed Lynda McIntosh as chairperson for the 1980 Memorial Day Festivities.

There being no further business a motion was made by Trustee Hampshire and supported by Trustee McIntosh that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried 4 years, 0 days.
