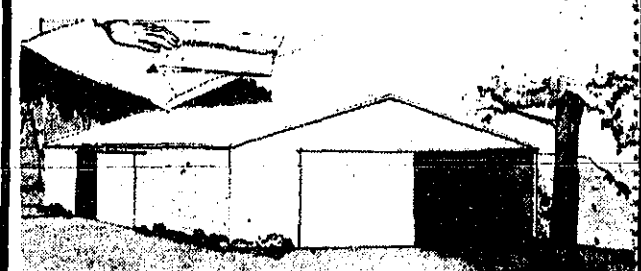
Dorcas group meets April 2
