The Mechanical Code provides for the design, installation, maintenance, alteration and inspection of mechanical systems including heating systems, cooling systems, steam and hot water systems, process piping, boilers and pressure vessels, appliances utilizing gas, liquid or solid fuel,chimneys and vents, mechanical refrigeration systems, fireplaces, barbecues, incinerators, fire suppression systems, air pollution control systems and systems utilizing solar or geothermal energy as an energy source.

Permits must be obtained from the Tuscola County Department of Public Works, Building Codes Division located in the Courthouse Annex Building, 207 E. Grant St., Caro.

The money represents the amount of property taxes owed by Cass City School District property owners in Sanilac county as of March

Purchasers of the tax notes at an interest rate charged to the county of 9,8037 percent were Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith and the Sanilac County Bank.

The treasurer's office will now collect all delinquent taxes due in the county plus penalty fees and pay off the tax notes. The \$2.1 million will be

Census takers for the 1980 census are easy to identify, according to the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

They wear red, white, and blue cards with the U.S. Department of Commerce seal and "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" printed on them. Their cards the delinquent taxes due also have their signatures, certifying that they have sworn to keep confidential all information they collect for the census.

Census takers have started making their rounds, calling at residences from which householders have not mailed back their census questionnaires. They are using the tele-

phone to reach most householders who mailed back questionnaires inadequately filled out.

Anyone without this official identification card who Board Monday night dis- claims to be a census taker should be reported to the need graveling this year, police or to the district office. Dial information for the local census number to call.

Questionnaires were mailed to every household The board will then decide March 28 and most people were instructed to mail back a completed questionnaire April 1.

People not counted in the census will in effect be "invisible" when census statistics are used to reapportion seats in the House of Representatives and to guide the distribution of federal funds -- their tax dollars -- for programs in communities across the nation.

There is no penalty for a late return to the census questionnaire, but census answers should be given as of the April 1 date regarding births, deaths, changes of address and other facts.
