Debut of new carburetor highlights Althaver world tour

Lambert E. Althaver, president of Walbro Corp., recently returned to corporate headquarters at Cass City after a tour which took him to Walbro subsidiaries around the world.

Beginning at the multinational's Walbro GmbH in Stuttgart, West Germany, the tour included Walbro de Mexico in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico, then Walbro Far East Headquarters in Kawasaki City, Japan.

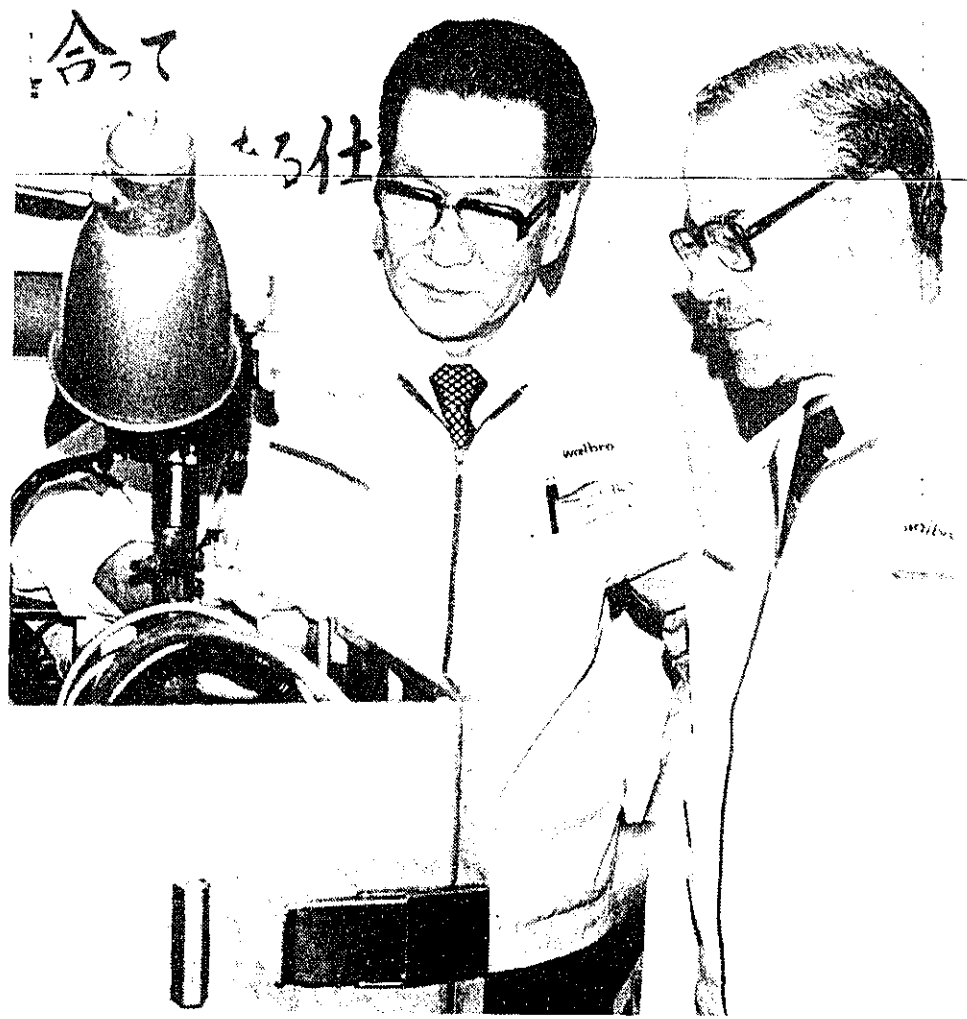
Walbro Far East includes a manufacturing and assembly plant in Miyagi Prefecture, Japan. The tour also included Walbro Singapore, where the Walbro line of diaphragm carburetors for small gasoline engines is produced for use on chain saws, brush cutters, and weed trimmers.

One of the highlights of Mr. Althaver's trip was a press conference held in Kawasaki City, with a group of Japanese financial, industrial and trade newspaper editors and publishers.

The news conference, hosted by Hirohito Kobayashi, president, and Tatsuya Mizutani, chief engineer of Walbro Far East, was held to announce final development and initial production of a new Walbro "WZ" Model carburetor. The new carburetor was developed specifically for the brush cutter industry, and will be manufactured and sold by Walbro Far East.

The trio also gave the press a general description of the structure and business of Walbro Corporation, including details concerning its subsidiaries in Japan, Singapore, Mexico and West Germany.

Althaver pointed out the origin of the new carburetor provides an excellent illustration of the many benefits of Walbro's multi-national sharing of resources and disciplines in fuel systems technology, since the new product was designed and developed by Walbro Far East. Thus, a product conceived and produced by Walbro's overseas subsidiary to meet a local need now promises to become a global best-seller.

The librarian reported 2,100 persons have been issued library cards to date. Circulation is at the usual rate for this time of the year.

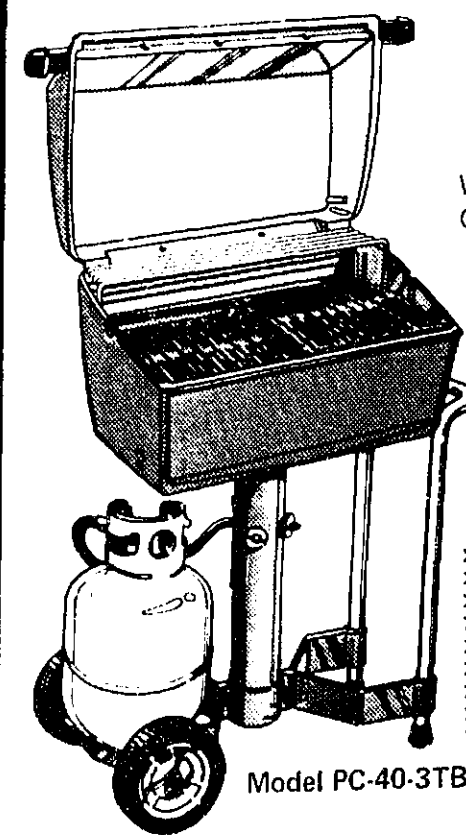
Some landscaping around the new part of the library is planned and Mrs. Tuckey will provide petunias for planting. The historical society will construct cupboards to store material for that organization.

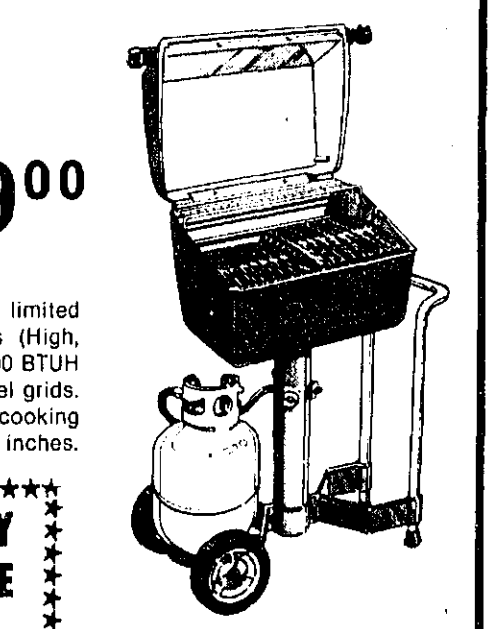
