# VandenBurgury guilty of violation

William R. VandenBurgury, 18, of Roseville, pleaded guilty in Tuscola County Circuit Court Friday to a charge of violation of probation.

Judge Patrick R. Roslyn accepted his plea and remanded him to the county jail without bond to await sentencing Oct. 6.

VandenBurgury was placed on three years' pro-

bation in February of this year for larceny in a building, having pleaded guilty to the charge in connection with a November break-in of a house in Vassar.

The ex-Millington resident pleaded guilty to having violated probation by failing to pay court ordered obligations in April.

Scheduled "motion day" Monday before Judge Norman H. Baguley was

postponed due to the death of his wife.

## DISTRICT COURT

Judge Richard F. Kern Monday dismissed charges against two men, both having complied with provisions of their one year probation under Section 47 of the Controlled Substances Act. They were Andrew Murawski, 27, of 4064 Bay City-Forestville Road, Gagetown, who had pleaded guilty a year ago to use of marijuana, and Mark Thrall, 18, of 3385 River Street, Kingston, who had pleaded guilty in September, 1979, to possession of marijuana.

Charles Wilding, 23, of 4680 W. State Street, Gagetown, pleaded guilty Aug. 26 to a charge of disorderly person - creating a public disturbance.

His plea was accepted and he was fined \$33 and assessed \$22 court costs, which he has since paid.

He was one of three persons arrested in connection with a disturbance in Gagetown Aug. 16.

One of the other persons arrested, David F. Pinkoski, 24, of 6605 Gage Street, Gagetown, is scheduled to be tried by a jury Nov. 12 on a charge of assault and battery.

The third person arrested was a juvenile.

## Pay increased at consortium

Administrative employees of the Thumb Area Consortium received a minimum 10 percent pay increase when their new salaries were approved last Thursday by the consortium Administrative Board.

The increase for the 22 persons (plus two part-time positions) take effect Oct. 1, the start of the new fiscal year.

The consortium administers the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) program in the upper Thumb and all salaries are paid with money from Washington.

The proposed new salary schedule was prepared by a committee of board members, working with consortium Executive Director Frank Lenard.

The only objection raised at the board meeting was that of Margaret Wentla, county commissioner from Tuscola county, who thought Lenard's proposed salary of \$32,000, up from \$28,890 he is receiving this year, was too high.

No one would second her motion to set it at \$30,000.

That was followed by approval of the entire salary schedule.

The pay scale, Lenard explained, was based on an increase in the starting wages of 3 percent over what it was last year. After the six-month probationary

period, employees receive another 5 percent or \$500 minimum.

Most employees have been there longer than that and got pay raises of about 10 percent, less than the inflation rate, he pointed out, and some who have been there several years got more than 10 percent.

The board also renewed Lenard's one-year employment contract through Sept. 30 of next year.

The financial statement showed that as of Aug. 31, the consortium had spent \$6.18 million so far this fiscal year and had a balance of \$1.61 million.

Lenard projected that as of Sept. 30, the end of the fiscal year, it will have \$900,000 remaining. The consortium will have to fund its programs with that carry-over until Congress appropriates CETA funds for 1980-81.

He expects it will approve a continuing resolution, authorizing spending at the old levels until it gets around to passing the new legislation.

The board voted to accept reimbursement rates the same as those set by the state for employees who use their own cars for business.

The present rate is 20½ cents per mile and reportedly is going to 23 cents. Prior to July 1, it had been 18½ cents.

## Mary Jane Baguley dies at 47

Mary Jane Baguley, 47, of Lapeer, died Sunday at Grace Hospital in Detroit after a long illness.

She was born Jan. 30, 1933, in Bay City, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lessman. The family later moved to the Decker-Deford area.

In November, 1948, as a junior at Cass City High School, Mary Jane Lessman was crowned the first homecoming queen. She graduated in 1950.

She was married to Lapeer-Tuscola County Circuit Judge Norman H. Baguley.

She had been a member of the Lapeer County Board of Commissioners for several years and had served as its vice-chairman for the past two years. She was also active in various civic affairs and was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran church in Lapeer.

Mrs. Baguley is survived by her husband; one son, Paul Baguley, Lapeer; two daughters, Karen Baguley, East Lansing, and Laura Baguley, Lapeer; a sister, Luella Gibelyou, Bay City; one brother, Koert Lessman, Las Cruces, N.M., and her mother, Clara Lessman, Bay City.

Burial took place Wednesday at Mt. Hope Cemetery, Lapeer.

Memorial services will be at 2 p.m. Sunday at St. Paul's, Rev. Marvin Ramthun officiating.

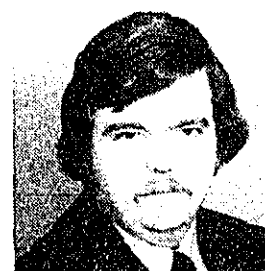
