Madelyn art show

Marilyn Rutkowski. Maurer Road, Ubly, was selected to participate in the "Michigan Artists 80-81" regional juried art exhibi-

tion. This exhibition was organized by the Detroit Institute of Arts in cooperation with 10 art institutions throughout Michigan, and promises to be one of the largest statewide art exhibitions ever held in this country.

It is actually a series of five exhibitions, four regional shows culminating in one all-state show at the Detroit Institute of Arts. A two-part selection system consisting of a slide jury and subsequent object jury was devised to facilitate handling the large number of entries. In selecting the work, the jurors looked for technical competency and originality of concept.

Approximately 15,000 slides and 3,000 objects will have been viewed for the entire series.

The central region exhibition, which includes Huron. Sanilac and Tuscola counties, will run through Oct. 17 at the following participating institutions:

Midland Center for the Arts - paintings, sculpture and crafts; Saginaw Art Museum - works on paper, and University Art Gallery, Central Michigan University photography and experimental media.

Mrs. Rutkowski's art works are being exhibited at the Midland Center for the Arts and consist of a painting and pencil drawing. The pencil drawing is of St. Mary's School, which stood in Parisville from the 1880s to 1903, and the painting is a fall landscape.

There were over 1,000 entries in the central region, of which 113 were selected for display.
