Eighty-eight pints of blood were collected Friday at the Red Cross blood drive spon-sored by Hills and Dales General Hospital and the hospital auxiliary.


There were 95 persons who came to the St. Pancratius parish hall, with seven of them unable to donate because of high temperature,


