Highway tax funds fall 11 percent

-State revenue for work on state highways, county roads and city and village streets fell by 11 percent in the July-September quarter of this year, compared to the same period in 1979, according to the Michigan Department of Transportation,

The result is that the Tuscola County Road Commison will receive \$412,834 for the period as its share of the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund, compared to \$461,554 -received for the same three months last year.

- The Huron Road Commission will get \$359,249, down from \$400,762, and Sanilac County Road Commission, \$386,903, versus \$432,039. Cass City will receive
