Cass City fifth grade students will see a special school performance of the Nutcracker Ballet at 10 a.m. Dec. 17, at the Heritage Theater in Saginaw.

The performance will be danced by the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre under the artistic direction of Patrick Frantz.

Public school districts participating will be Saginaw City, Saginaw township, Carrollton, Cass City, Frankenmuth, Freeland, Hemlock, Swan Valley and Essexville-Hampton, plus six parochial schools. A total of 2,300 children will see the ballet.

The evening performance of the ballet is one of the regular season offerings of the Community Concert series.

## Regular meeting

### Cass City Village Council

The regular meeting of the Cass City Village Council was held Dec. 1, 1980 at 7:00 p.m. at the Municipal Building. All Trustees were present.

Representatives of the Chamber of Commerce 1981 July 4th Festival committee were present to request that the council re-evaluate their decision at last month's meeting concerning a Bingo tent to be allowed in the Village Park for the Festival. A motion was made by Trustee Hampshire and supported by Trustee McIntosh to grant permission for the Chamber of Commerce to operate a Bingo tent on a one-day permit for July 4, 1981 with the proceeds to be used for the deferral of the cost of the festival. Motion carried, 5 yeas, 1 nay.

The minutes for the regular October meeting were approved as presented.

The October financial statement was reviewed.

The Public Safety Committee reported that the Garfield Street Railroad crossing now has clear vision.

The Public Utilities Committee reported that the Wastewater Treatment Expansion Program is coming along as expected. The preliminary report on the Hydrogeologic Investigation of the Cass City Landfill has been forwarded to the Department of Natural Resources as required by our Schedule of Compliance. We are now awaiting DNR's reply.

The Personnel Committee recommended that Willard Morley be offered the position of Wastewater Treatment Superintendent at the starting salary of \$21,000.00. A motion was made by Trustee Helwig and supported by Trustee McIntosh to accept the Personnel Committee's recommendation. Motion carried 6 yeas, 0 nays.

A motion was made by Trustee Ware and supported by Trustee Rawson that we accept a resolution for annexation of the property of Mary Wilding described as Lot 11, A.H. Ale's Addition, Village of Cass City. Roll call vote: Rawson - yea,

Hampshire - yea, Stahlbaum - yea, Helwig - yea, Ware - yea, McIntosh - yea. Motion carried.

The Superintendent's report was reviewed. A letter was read from the State Dept. of Labor stating the results of the ballot count which took place on November 21, 1980 at the Michigan Employment Relations Commission indicating the desire of the four full time officers of the Cass City Police Dept. to be represented by the Fraternal Order of Police in bargaining for terms and conditions of employment. The tabulation of the election results were 4 yeas, 0 nays.

A letter from the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney was read to the council in regards to a complaint of Michael Eliason of the Cass City Chronicle concerning the open meetings act.

A motion was made by Trustee Rawson and supported by Trustee Stahlbaum that the regular bills be approved for payment. Motion carried 6 yeas, 0 nays.

Trustee Hampshire brought up the subject of Cable TV's charges and requested that Village Superintendent, Lou LaPonsie look into the matter.

A motion was made by Trustee Rawson and supported by Trustee Stahlbaum that the bills in the amounts of \$256,639.00 to H.C. Weber Construction and \$19,229.85 to Hubbell, Roth, and Clark be approved for payment. Motion carried 6 yeas, 0 nays.

The preliminary budget for 1981 was reviewed. A motion was made by Trustee Helwig and supported by Trustee McIntosh to establish a public hearing for the 1981 budget at the next regular meeting, Dec. 29, 1980 at 8:00 p.m. at the Municipal Building. Motion carried 6 yeas, 0 nays.

A motion was made by Trustee Hampshire and supported by Trustee McIntosh that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried 6 yeas, 0 nays.

## HEALTH TIPS Hazards exist at Christmas time

Glass Christmas tree ornaments definitely are not recommended for baby's diet this holiday season.

Absurd statement? Of course. But not as absurd as you might think.

A good many small tots will pop a shiny glass bulb or ornament into their mouths this Christmas season, as always.

Christmas is a time of bright little lights on a tree in the parlor, of shiny glass ornaments and decorations, of spun glass filaments, of toys that sometimes have sharp, rough edges, of lots of candy, nuts and other rich edibles.

These all are a part of Christmas, and no one is suggesting there's anything wrong about it. But the American Medical Association points out that there are safety hazards at the Christmas season that aren't usually encountered the rest of the year.

Check your old strings of tree lights and discard those that are worn or brittle. If there are very small children around, discard burnt bulbs with caution, making certain baby can't retrieve them from a waste basket.

Keep glass ornaments and filmy glass "angel hair" out of baby's reach. The ornaments crumble readily into sharp slivers.

Select toys with a minimum of sharp, rough edges, toys that won't burn quickly if flicked through a candle flame, toys that are large enough so that baby can't swallow them.

Electrical toys should be selected with safety in mind. Is the wiring intact and strong, or is it loose and flimsy?

Air rifles, sling shots, archery sets and other mis-

sle throwing toys are obviously dangerous if carelessly used. Set up target ranges and make certain the youngster is taught to use the toy properly and safely.

The list could be continued, but you can make your own. The prime objective of an article such as this one is to remind parents that in the bustle and excitement of Christmas accidents can happen.

Certainly no one wants to spoil a holiday with undue worry about safety. Make your plans for a safe Christmas, then enjoy it to the hilt.
