Village named in suit over flooding

A Cass City couple has filed suit against the village of Cass City in an effort to recover nearly \$30,000 in damages caused by basement flooding last year.

Edward and Dorothy Knight, 4708 Huron St., recently filed the suit in Tuscola County Circuit Court. The couple's attorneys are demanding a jury trial in the case.

The suit stems from an incident that occurred between Feb. 27 and April 1, 2002. The couple stated they returned to their home April 1 to discover 27 inches of water in their basement.

According to the suit, the couple was informed by the village and other residents that the village had been replacing storm sewers on an adjoining street prior to April 1 due to the fact that the storm sewers had collapsed. The Knights also claim they were informed that the village had left a number of fire hydrants open for one to two weeks, causing water to run out of the hydrants and into the street.

They also claimed that prior to April 1, 2002, during heavy rain, the storm drain in the street adjacent to their home was overflowing and bubbling and the water that should have been going into the drain was running across the road into their driveway.

The suit alleges that the village's "sewage disposal system" caused the water backup into their basement; that the system was "improperly constructed, designed, maintained, operated or repaired"; and that village officials knew or should have known there were problems with the system.

Hittler, Nicol top Cass City citizens

A long and tireless record of public service, reaching back to 1986 when she joined the Cass City community, has earned Jane Hittler citizen of the year honors for 2003. The award, coupled with the junior citizen of the year award were announced Saturday during the Chamber of Commerce annual dinner held at Northwood Meadows.

The junior citizen for 2003 is Red Hawk senior Jessica Nicol, daughter of Gayle and John Nicol.

Hittler, who was born in Saginaw, has been active in a wide range of civic duties, but may be best known for her work with literacy programs. She is a founding member of the Cass City Literacy Council and currently serves as director of the Tuscola Literacy Council. She remains active in the State Literacy Program and has mentored several local individuals who have a need for a special one-on-one teaching.

Hittler, a graduate of Mercy College with a Bachelor of Science in Social Work, has also been active in the St. Pancratius Church and the American Association of University Women, holding office for 5 years in both organizations in addition to countless hours of volunteer service.

Hittler is also a current and charter member of the Knights of Columbus Auxiliary and has been a special project volunteer since 1990.

She has served as secretary, publicity chairman, and on a wide variety of community projects as a member of the Chamber of Commerce.

She has served as co-chairman of the July 4th Festival committee for 9 years. In addition, from 1986-1998, Hittler was a member of the Bach Festival board.

She and her husband, Dan, were married in 1957 and have raised 9 children.

In accepting the award, Hittler asked the past citizens of the year in attendance to stand and said that she was honored to be included in the

group.

Chamber President, Jim Luth, presented the junior citizen of the year award and said that, as is the case in most years, the competition among the 8 finalists was very close.

Nicol is one of Cass City's 5 valedictorians for 2003 and plans to attend Grand Valley State University after graduation. At GVSU, Nicol will study International Tourism Marketing and Management.

She has received honors for academic excellence in several subjects including computer literature, geometry,

life science, Spanish, English, biology and science.

While maintaining a perfect 4.0 grade point average, Nicol has participated in a wide range of activities including stints as Student Council treasurer and vice president, school prom committee chairman and homecoming parade committee chair.

She has also been an active member in the National Honor Society, Elementary Service Learning Project, homecoming election committee, Christmas dance committee, and debate.

Nicol's service record includes volunteer work with the Octagon Barn, Relay for Life, Adopt-a-Highway, Quiz

Bowl, and local blood drives and various fundraisers.

Currently employed with Thumb National Bank, Nicol has also been a member of the Sally Doerr Dance Studio and pom-pom squad.

O-G teacher laid off, 2 others take buy-outs

Owen-Gage School officials are continuing to take a hard look at ways to head off a projected \$300,000 budget deficit next year.

The board of education Monday laid off one high school instructor and authorized buyout incentive packages for 2 long-time elementary school teachers. A third instructor is also considering the incentive and will have until June to make a decision.

The board unanimously approved Supt. Dan McKenzie's recommendation to lay off Kathy Sutton, effective June 30, and to eliminate the computer systems and technology class Sutton taught at the junior-senior high school.

McKenzie estimated the decision will save the district roughly \$50,000.

The board also approved buyout incentive packages for first grade teacher Carol Wildman and kindergarten teacher Pat Enderle. The packages total about \$43,000 for each instructor, according to McKenzie, who said he hopes the staffing

decisions will eliminate the need for additional lay-offs.

"This will not eliminate the projected deficit, but it will reduce it... by as much as \$200,000," he said. "It won't happen... all tonight. Tonight's efforts will move us in that direction."

In other personnel-related matters, the board approved McKenzie's recommendation of tenure for teachers Carol Sattler, Terry Falkenberg and Sharada Seuryneck, and second-year probation for teacher Shannon Doherty.

ATHLETIC POLICY

Turning to an updated athletic transportation policy, the board approved revised language after several weeks of discussion and debate.

The issue was sparked by a long-held practice of allowing varsity girls volleyball team members to secure their own transportation to weekend tournaments, in spite of a written policy requiring athletes to be transported by bus.

The revised policy states

that all athletes are expected to ride the bus to and from sporting events as a team. Parents and guardians may be allowed to take their student athletes home after a contest, provided a written and signed permission slip is approved by the administration and presented to the coach prior to the contest.

Board President Randy Howard noted the policy isn't "set in stone" and that some exceptions may be made depending on the circumstances.

"When it comes down to common sense, we'll take the common sense route," he said. "We just want the parents to know the district's expectation is for student athletes to ride to and from contests."

IN OTHER BUSINESS

In other business during the regular monthly meeting, the board:

Green, daughter of Robert and Marilyn Green, has been involved in National Honor Society and Youth For Christ. She has also been a member





Gardening

Regular readers may recall previous accounts of my feeble attempts at gardening, including what might have been a prize winning dandelion that reached a height of about 5 feet before I discovered that it was not something I should be nurturing. That may give you a clue as to my expertise in the green thumb category.

In spite of that, I decided to plant some seeds indoors in order to have something green, alive and growing to counteract the depressingly long, cold winter.

Surely anybody can buy seeds and stick them in some potting soil, can't they?

My first choice was some flower seeds. It was an exciting day when those little green sprouts first broke through the soil.

Encouraged by limited success, I moved on to tomato seeds and planted them in those little peat pots that come in their own container. Alas! There were 25 pots but only 20 seeds in the packet. Never one to waste anything, I had to find something to fill the remaining 5 pots, and decided on onions.

Unfortunately, the tomato seeds hadn't sprung up yet. I got confused about which peat pots were empty and ended up planting the onions with several of the tomato plants.

I doubt they're going to make it.

Anyway, it was delightful seeing all those little green things growing so profusely. Advice and experience tell me that they have to be thinned out in order to grow

properly, but it's still hard to bring myself to discard healthy looking plants. Such a waste!

It eventually became obvious that the tomatoes were outgrowing their peat pots and needed some deeper soil. So I bought a big bag of potting soil and a couple long narrow plant boxes.

The 50-lb. bag of soil was simple enough to get into the shopping cart, since it was on a shelf conveniently just above cart level. It was a little tougher getting it into the trunk of the car, but I managed, huffing and puffing.

Getting it out of the trunk was even more complicated, particularly since I'd fallen on the ice and banged up several vital body parts. But you could almost hear the plants begging for deeper soil.

After waiting a few days for someone strong and healthy to come along, I very gingerly made my way across the ice and frozen snow to the garage, and with a great deal of tugging, pushing and grunting, got the bag of soil into a trash bag and pulled it across the frozen yard.

We made it to the back steps before the bag gave way. Having hauled it that far, sheer determination got it up the steps and into the house.

The tomatoes eventually were transplanted. It remains to be seen whether anything will come of my efforts, but at least it kept me occupied till spring arrived.

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
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Rabbit Tracks


It pays to gamble. But only if you are running the games. Last year statewide ticket sales was \$1.68 billion, up 4.5 percent.

The back forty

This is an exciting time for gardeners. Everyone has been cooped up all winter, seed catalogs are arriving in the mail, and nurseries are stocking their shelves. It just seems natural to get outside and plant something.

We must not be fooled, however. Experienced gardeners know it's too early for some gardening activities, too late for others, and maybe we should just lie down here and think about this for a while.

Everything I read about gardening reminds me how much this activity has changed over the years. Folks used to buy a few seeds, plant them in a hotbed, and nurse those plants along for weeks.

Now, the majority of gardeners head straight for the nursery. Then, they grab a little, red wagon, fill it with bags of potting soil and some half-grown plants - and drop \$60 at the cash register on the way out.

That's not gardening. That's shopping! Whatever happened to the days when gardens helped a family save money?

Whatever happened to the days when hotbeds were filled with loam and horse manure, rather than \$40 worth of potting soil? I'm afraid our modern gardeners have forgotten all about economics, and horse manure as well.

The best example of this lapse of memory is a woman who moved to the country and decided to buy a horse. She knew nothing about horses, but figured riding would be fun, and the manure would be great for her garden.

Her only problem was a lack of space; so she started looking for a farm that boards horses. She understood that farmers and ranchers can be suspicious of strangers, so she kept her mouth shut as much as possible.

The first stable she visited said they charged \$80 per month to board a horse. "Veterinary fees are extra, and we keep the manure," the horse wrangler told her.

"Oh, but I want the manure for my garden," she said. "Sorry Ma'am, that's not the way we do business," the horseman replied.

When she arrived at the second stable the owner said, "We charge \$75 per month, vet fees are extra, our farrier changes shoes every four months, and we get the manure."

"Oh, I hope the farrier changes the horse's shoes, too," she quipped, but nobody laughed.

By the time she got to the third stable this woman was better prepared. She knew that horses are expensive to feed, vet bills are likely, and the manure is apparently

quite valuable.

The third stable owner told her, "Our boarding fee is \$30 a month, you pay the vet bills, and shoeing costs are extra."

The new horse owner was so pleased with the low price that she almost forgot about the manure. Suddenly she remembered, "Oh, who gets the manure?" she asked.

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

Will it be tyranny or liberty?

"Sleep Out" to benefit homeless

Last year, Sanilac County put on a "Cardboard City Sleep Out," and they raised \$12,000 for homelessness awareness. Following their example, Future Youth Involvement (FYI) of the Tuscola County Community Foundation is planning a "Cardboard City Sleep Out" of their own. We will be sleeping outside all night to raise awareness.

Funds will be used to match a grant of \$8,800 from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority. Some of the total proceeds will pro-

vide mediation service for households at risk of becoming homeless due to delinquent mortgage or rental payments.

Later this year, a Community Summit will be held to address the issue of chronic homelessness.

Finally, a permanent endowed fund of \$5,000 will be established by the Tuscola County Community Foundation to fund homelessness prevention programs in the future.

FYI's sleep out will involve FYI members and National Honor Societies of local schools. We are also inviting other students to help us raise money. Everyone who participates in the sleep-out will receive a pledge sheet to

raise money and a \$20 minimum is required for participation. When a company makes a donation, we will "advertise" for them on our boxes.

Not only will we be taking money pledges, but we will also have a canned food drive. We will have people and boxes set up on corners in Caro so that people can drop off food. We will also be giving a "city" tour.

Our sleep-out will be on the Courthouse lawn in Caro, April 25. We will start at 6 p.m. and go to the 26th at 8 a.m.

During the 14-hour period, we will have games and activities set up to entertain the participants. We will also be selling food and giving

away food as prizes for the games.

Those who participate will have to supply their own box, a flashlight, and can bring a sleeping bag and one luxury item. Luxury items can be anything from a pillow to a television set. We are hoping to make this as fun as possible while keeping it realistic.

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



They've got heart

Campbell, Deford students raise \$11,000 for heart association

Cass City physical education teacher Betsy Dillon is quick to say her elementary students have a lot of heart.

But not even Dillon was prepared for the response when she challenged students at Campbell and Deford elementary schools to raise money for the American Heart Association by participating in the district's first-ever "Jump Rope for Heart" event.

Hundreds of students took part on several days over a 2-week period, raising a whopping \$11,000.

"They've been raising money since the week of March 3-7. This is just amazing, we've jumped up to \$11,000 and it will go up even more than that because the money's still coming in," Dillon said.

"It was more than I ever dreamed. It's been so exciting," she added. "My original goal was \$2,000, and they did \$11,000. So, yes, they way exceeded my goals."

The money will be used by the American Heart Association to help fight heart disease and stroke, the nation's number one and number 2 killers.

More than 450 Cass City students participated. "That includes Deford, and they raised over \$300, just their 2 classes," Dillon noted.

The classes took turns jumping rope one hour at a time in the school gymnasiums. The activity, co-sponsored by the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance, featured several different stations where the kids could jump alone or with a partner. The stations challenged students to try different things such as hula jumping. There was even a "learn something new" station.

"They have been so excited," said Dillon, who explained students collected pledges from family members and others. The kids brought in donations ranging "from \$1.50, which I thought was just precious, to over \$535," she added.

At the same time, the students were learning about heart disease and stroke and

the importance of a healthy lifestyle, including exercise.

"This has been a learning experience for them," Dillon said. "Not only are they learning to do something for the community, they are learning about heart disease and stroke. These kids can tell you about this and why they're doing it."

"They're learning a life-long skill - 10 minutes of jumping is equal to 30 minutes of jogging."

Students enjoyed several incentives, including prizes offered by the American Heart Association for various donation amounts. "We also did some extra things, like a pizza party for the class that collected the most," Dillon noted.

More importantly, she said, was that the students accepted her challenge to make the event a very personal experience.

"They dedicated this to someone they care about," she explained. "It would be anyone from a survivor, to someone who has heart disease, to someone who smokes or who wants to quit smoking. That has been really important to the kids."

The Cass City students' achievement hasn't gone unnoticed by American Heart Association officials, who praised Dillon's efforts.

"She did a fantastic job, I can tell you that. She did above and beyond what anyone expected," said Denise Henris, youth marketing director for the association.

"This is almost unheard of. I can't say enough. I'm absolutely thrilled with the outcome. She really put her heart and soul into this."

"The neat thing is the fact that there were some hurdles to overcome," Henris said, adding Dillon organized a presentation on the event for the board of education, which had been reluctant to approve the activity because of the district's "no-fundraising" policy.

The board gave its blessing, and Dillon took it from there.


"I think what she did was build passion into it," Henris said. "She was a little bit concerned (at first), and I said, 'the kids will pick up on your enthusiasm.'"

The local district's achievement stands out in the 11-county region Henris serves.

Two other schools have set goals of \$10,000 for upcoming Jump Rope for Heart events in the district, she said, but at this point Cass City Schools is the number one fundraising district in the region. "I'd say she (Dillon) has a very good chance of being my top school. She will definitely be one of the top 3 schools."

The success of the event is especially satisfying for Dillon, who has wanted to host the activity since she began teaching.

"The thing I've seen here is, I have encouraged jump roping every year, and I have never seen it take off like this year," she said. "I think having a purpose just made a big difference."



Men have an easier time reaching the holes, but the greens have enough curves and breaks so they are not always very easy to read. So the men don't always walk away from the women.

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
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

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Wildlife artist

Fritz wins 2 awards at state taxidermy competition

Arnie Fritz loves to hunt, so much so that when fall rolls around, he'll spend four or five hours in the woods. But when the season is over, the work is just beginning for the Owendale area native, who has combined his enjoyment of the outdoors and his skills as an artist to build a successful taxidermy business.

Fritz' ability was recently recognized by experts in the field in Grand Rapids, where he entered coyote and whitetailed deer head mounts in a competition sponsored by the Michigan Taxidermy Association. Fritz, one of 150 competitors, took third place in the medium mammal category for his coyote mount, and second place for his deer mount. The 5-day competition was Fritz' first.

"I pushed him into doing it. He didn't think he was good enough," commented Fritz' fiancé, Brandea. The competition featured 3 divisions - novice, professional and master - according to Fritz, who entered the professional division.

"The judges are all people who have won world titles," he said. "They have a (judging) sheet they go by, and they check each different part of the mount."

"The key is to make it look as real as possible," noted Brandea, who manages Fritz' taxidermy business.

Fritz agreed. "You have to make everything as anatomically and visually (correct) as possible. They check everything."

Fritz got his start in the business about 6 years ago.

"I just got some books and videos and started messing around with it a little bit," he recalled. "The stuff I did for myself looked alright, so my friends started bringing theirs over, and then it just kind of grew from there."

"I started out doing 2 or 3 deer heads. Now I'm doing 20 to 30 deer heads a year." Taxidermy was a natural choice for the avid outdoorsman. "I'll spend just about the whole season in the woods."

"He's obsessed," Brandea joked. "If he's not in the basement (working on mounts), or working for (Huron) Castings, he's out after some critter."

"I was always an artist in school. I used to draw deer heads in school all the time," added Fritz, a 1990 Owendale High School graduate. "I could never get my pictures to look as alive as I want to."

Taxidermy offered Fritz an opportunity to learn how to create mounts that appear to be alive - that's the key, he said. "You have to get that realism in the face and eyes. You've got to have a lot of reference photos."

"He's been hunting since he was a child, so he draws a lot

from memory," Brandea said.

Fritz orders a specially made form and eye inserts for each mount. He prepares the hides by salting them, a process that draws out the moisture and sets the hair. He also removes any excess flesh, and then tans the hides using a brine-type solution.

From there, it's a matter of carefully fitting the hide over the form. "Pretty much all you need is a good sharp knife and lots of patience," he said. "It takes time to get everything in the right place. Being an artist helps."

Aside from deer heads, Fritz has expanded his work to include other game animals, including wild boar, bears and turkeys. His services include a wide range of antler mounts, European mounts, birds and several North American game mounts.

The time spent on each project varies, depending on the size and type of the mount, as well as any custom work requested by the customer.

"From start to finish, a deer head usually takes probably 12 hours," explained Fritz, whose customers typically wait 6 to 12 months to pick up their mounts due to the number of projects he tackles each year. Prices vary, as well, with a standard deer head mount running about \$300.

Fritz has customers from around the state, including the Thumb - Cass City, Deford, Caro, Harbor Beach. Brandea said he spends just about every free minute working to give each of them their money's worth.

"He puts in a good 40 hours a week in the basement," she added, noting customers have been very pleased with his work. "They love it when it comes out looking just like before they shot it."

"The neat thing is he does it for the hobby and the art of it, not just for the money," Brandea said. "It's not as easy as it looks. He puts a lot of his heart into each mount. You can see it in his work."

The Knights filed a damage claim with the village May 13, 2002, but say they have not been compensated for their losses.

The suit states the estimated 15,000 gallons of water in their basement resulted in more than \$29,000 in damages, including the loss of personal property and appliances.

Village Manager Frank Sheridan declined specific comments about the case, but acknowledged the claim the Knights filed with the village. The matter was turned over to the village's insurance company, which subsequently investigated and rejected the claim, he said.

Sheridan also said the only recent storm sewer replacement project in the village took place last year along Church Street, from Brooker to the Center B Drain. The drain was beginning to collapse due to age, he added, but remained functional prior to and during the replacement work.

Vets: vaccinate horses

Horses may be at greater risk of contracting the West Nile virus this year, so veterinarians are urging equine owners to vaccinate their animals and take other preventative measures before the mosquito season arrives.

After last year's threat of mosquito bites subsided with winter weather, 341 horses in Michigan had contracted the potentially fatal virus. The number of infections, however, may be 3 times that, warned Dr. Steve Halstead, Michigan Department of Agriculture veterinarian.

"A lot of horses may have been infected but didn't develop clinical signs," Halstead said. "Studies in other states show that non-clinical cases are at least three times the number of confirmed cases. (So) it's wise to vaccinate rather than expect your horse to remain healthy in spite of exposure."

Horses can be exposed to as many as 300 to 400 mosquito bites per night during peak summer mosquito season, according to Dr. Don Ryker, an Ortonville veterinarian who sits on the Michigan Farm Bureau Equine Advisory Committee and the American Farm Bureau Animal Health Advisory Committee.

"I'd vaccinate now if the horse has never had the shot and then get a booster 21 to 30 days later," said Ryker. "That should protect the horse for the mosquito season."

More booster shots are recommended for older horses or those under stress that may suppress the immune system, but the average horse would only require two shots given sometime this spring.

Administered by veterinarians, the West Nile virus vaccine is fully licensed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and is exclusive to the equine industry. No West Nile virus vaccine is available for humans and birds - the other two species that can contract the disease, which is spread by mosquitoes.

The first dose of vaccine primes the horse's immune system to respond more quickly to the booster. "Then after the boosters, the horse develops an immune system against the disease," said Halstead. "If you've never vaccinated before this year, you'll want to lead the mosquito season by six to 10 weeks."

The bottom line is farmers need to take all the precau-

tions they can against West Nile virus, including changing horse water every three days and paying attention to low or swampy areas that could be mosquito breeding grounds.

Ryker said mosquito repellent can be used on horses, but he recommends a patch test first to be sure the horse is not allergic to the repellent.

"Wet a rag with the repellent, rub it on the horse's neck, and come back in an hour," he said. "If there is a welt where the spray was, the

animal is allergic. If not, feel free to use the spray, but follow the directions on the label."

Added Ernie Birchmeier, Michigan Farm Bureau livestock and dairy specialist: "This disease is not going away, so it's time to take action to minimize risk from the disease. Horse owners need to be concerned, and the best thing to do is consult with your veterinarian about vaccination programs."

"Vaccination doesn't provide 100 percent protection, but it certainly minimizes

the risk. Also, do anything you can to keep potential mosquito breeding grounds away from your farm. Keep areas around the barn dry and get rid of old tires that hold water and are prime mosquito breeding habitat."

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
