Cops seize pot, guns, cash

Hills and Dales chief McKrow fires back

Hills and Dales General Hospital President and CEO Dee McKrow says the hospital has spent hundreds of hours and thousands of dollars dealing with anonymous complaints alleging code and other violations since April.

Not one of those complaints has resulted in a citation, according to McKrow, who says enough is enough.

"It really frustrates me. Do you know how much time we have wasted on inspections?" she said Monday, 5 days after a story published in the Chronicle detailed a lawsuit filed by a former Hill and Dales facility manager who alleges the hospital violated the Michigan Whistleblowers Act when they fired him.

"It is disturbing when an incompetent worker uses a federal regulation designed to protect patients and employees such as the Whistleblower Act, as a sword against a hospital," McKrow said. "We are all aware of the lim-

ited resources a rural hospital has and the state of Michigan has. Yet due to erroneous and baseless allegations, Hills and Dales General Hospital, the state of Michigan and the federal government have been required to spend

there should be some repercussions" against those who file bogus claims.

The recent lawsuit was filed in Tuscola County Circuit Court by attorneys representing Peter A. Schuster, who claims he was fired from his job at Hills and Dales after reporting what alleges were several safety and regulatory violations to various state and federal agencies since last spring.

Schuster's suit alleges problems with the hospital's TB isolation room, outpatient operation room, and failure to properly obtain building and other required permits. In the suit, Schuster claims he advised hospital officials that their safety and regulatory compliance was "severely lacking" in a number of areas, and he admits 19 filing actual reports to various state agencies regarding "suspected wrongdoing at the hospital."

McKrow said none of the claims have been proven. She also emphasized that "there has never been an employee terminated here because of trying to do the right thing."

According to McKrow, the hospital has undergone several inspections stemming from anonymous complaints filed with various agencies since April 30.

Those agencies include the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory

Occupational Safety and Health, and the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

In addition state officials recently conducted 4 unrelated inspections over a 2day period.

"I am so proud to say Hills and Dales General Hospital did not have any major citations whatsoever," McKrow pointed out. "In fact, the only suggestion we had was to add an eye wash in a sink and move an air vent to the roof from the side of the building. These are both extremely minor."

On the other hand, the inspections have been very costly, according to McKrow. Every time one of those (inspectors) walks in it takes me, usually the chief operating officer and at least 2 or 3 other directors, and that's all we do the whole day - stay with them," she explained, have ranged from one to 3 hearth failure outcomes.

Bust targets Snover home

Sanilac Drug Task Force officers seized more than a kilo of processed marijuana as well as guns and more than \$1,000 in cash during a raid on a Snover residence last week.

Officers executed a search warrant Thursday afternoon in the 3300 block of Washington, Street.

Several individuals were questioned at the scene and then released pending further investigation and the results of laboratory analysis of several items seized, according to drug task force Director William Gray.

The raid followed a lengthy investigation and surveillances in which drug purchases were monitored from the home, Gray said.

"Uniformed drug task officers and marked police vehicles from the sheriff's department executed the search warrant at 5 p.m.," he said. "During the search of the home, officers seized a total of 18 items of pre-packaged, processed marijuana. The packages were in a variety of different weights, including gram, eighth-ounce, quarter-ounce, half-ounce, three-quarter pound and one

pound "Officers also seized digital scales, hand scales, packaging materials, trafficking paraphernalia, 5 firearms and more than \$1,300 in cash suspected drug sale pro-

ceeds." Gray said several young adults who were present in the home when the search warrant was executed were questioned and released, and are not believed to be involved in drug trafficking activity that was taking place at the home.

"A 39-year-old Snover woman who lives at the

home was questioned and released pending a followup interview of her husband," he added. "The woman's husband, a 41-yearold Snover man, was not at

home when the warrant was executed but has talked with investigators via telephone."

Gray anticipates that the drug task force will request arrest warrants for one or more suspects on charges of possession with intent to deliver marijuana, possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony, possession of marijuana, and maintaining a drug house. Drug task force officers were

assisted by the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department Road Patrol and the Sandusky Police Department.

Schuster sentenced to life

A Port Huron man has been sentenced to a mandatory term of life in prison without the possibility of parole in the deaths of his mother and stepfather last December in Sanilac County.

Judge Donald A. Teeple sentenced Thomas G. Schuster, 45, last week in Sanilac County Circuit Court.

Schuster had previously been convicted on 2 counts of first degree premeditated murder for the deaths of his 63-year-old mother, Ursula Kenny, and his stepfather, James Kenny, 74.

Croswell police discovered the couple's bodies inside their mobile home near Croswell July 3 while checking on the well-being of the Lexington Township couple. Investigators believe Schuster repeatedly stabbed the couple on Christmas Day.

During Schuster's trial, witnesses testified that the defendant had several items taken from the Kenny residence in his possession, and that he forged and passed several checks from the Kenny's checking account. Forensic scientists from the Michigan State Police testified that Schuster's DNA profile matched the DNA that was found on the murder weapons and in the victims' bedroom. Blood matching James Kenny's DNA profile was also found on Schuster's watch.

Owendale firemen to receive \$42,181

Five Michigan fire departments, including the Owendale Fire Department, have received a combined \$173,131 in grants from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

Each of the departments will use the money for fire operations, fire fighter safety and fire prevention programs, according to Democratic Michigan Senators Carl Levin and Debbie Stabenow, who announced the grants.

The Owendale Fire

Department's share of the grand funding is \$42,181, which will be used for fire operations and fire fighter safety.

"Our fire fighters go to work every day willing to risk their lives to protect our families and our property," Levin said. "This funding will help provide better training and equipment to these brave men and women, as well as provide fire prevention programs to the community."





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

My wife thinks I actually enjoy power outages. When our power goes off I grab a flashlight and light up some candles. Then, I stoke up the wood stove or fireplace - and go look for my camp stove. Now I can cook, read and stay warm for quite awhile if necessary. It doesn't take much foresight to store up some wood and drinking water, and we've got 500 gallons of water in the hot tub. I wouldn't want to drink it, but a bucket-full will flush the toilet and baths are still possible.

The old-timers could tell us what it was like before rural areas had electricity. Life wasn't easy, but they learned to cope with the inconvenience and the darkness.

My dad used to tell about a young man who lived near my grandfather's farm in the early 1900s. This fellow worked down the road a mile or so and often had to walk home in the dark. My grandfather would see the young fellow walking down the road each evening, carrying a coal oil lantern and whistling to take his mind off the darkness.

Grandpa always said the young man walked a little faster and whistled a little louder on the darkest nights. One night the young fellow's lantern quit on him, and he went by Grandpa's farm - running 12 miles an hour and whistling like a teakettle.

An old friend once told me about the time he and his dad got snowed in on their ranch.

His mother had gone to town, and the snow got so deep she couldn't get back home.





Local artists on air at "Bob's Back Porch"

The back room at Full Score Music in Cass City may be one of the best kept secrets in the Thumb.

Bob Douglas is hoping local songwriters will change all that.

Douglas, who has managed Full Score Music since the business opened 2 1/2 years ago, offers the usual music sales, repairs, rentals and lessons, but he also offers aspiring artists something they won't find anywhere else locally - the chance to have their work played on the radio, free of charge.

Douglas produces his own radio show, "Bob's Back Porch", which currently airs weekly, on Fridays at 2:15 p.m., on WLEW-AM 1340 in Bad Axe. The show is unique because it features the work of local songwriters only.

"I was sitting with a friend of mine and he said we should put together a radio show with all local talent," Douglas said of how the show originated.

"I've got a lot of people coming in and out of here, and I've been meeting song writers. I can't believe the talent that's around here. It's unbelievable.

"I love writing songs and I love song writers," Douglas added. "I'm not a good song writer. I found that out. But I really love working on other people's songs."

"Without song writers there's no hit songs," he said. "And there's some really good songs that are written in this area that nobody will hear."


Then again, Douglas acknowledged, it's always possible his small AM radio show could launch a career some day. "Wouldn't it be fabulous to have a hit song come out of this?"




