Gov. Roosevelt certainly had the courage of his convictions when he removed Asa Bird Gardiner from his office of district attorney of New York on charges of malfeasance, misfeasance and misconduct in office. The fact that his term of office was expiring would have made the task easier for a weak man, but that probably made no difference to the Governor. The order of removal was served on Gardiner on Monday. He is succeeded by Edward A. Philbin, a gold democrat. Gardiner's staff will remain with Philbin as long as he desires. The removal of Col. Gardiner in the closing days of Gov. Roosevelt's term has been criticised in some quarters, but more generally applauded. Gardiner was a wonderfully indiscreet man to say the least. He is the fourth official Gov. Roosevelt has removed, the other three all having been Republicans.

It is just possible that the Sultan will not contract with the Cramps for that warship after all. It will be recalled that through this contract the American claim for Armenian indemnity was to be paid in a round-about fashion, at least, that was the supposition. It stirred other governments with claims against Turkey. England began to press for payment and now Germany is doing the same, though the Kaiser is doing some "knocking" as well. Germany protests against the awarding of a contract to the Cramps for the construction of a cruiser until the bill of the Krupp gun firm has been settled. This may mean the indefinite postponement of the payment of the American claims. It appears that the Sultan, during the visit of the American battleship Kentucky to Smyrna, gave earnest assurances to Mr. Griscom, the American Charge d'Affaires, and Capt. Chester, commanding the Kentucky, that the claims would be settled, and that it would be done under cover of a contract for a cruiser. He explained that this was necessary in order to prevent the establishment of a precedent which would be seized upon by Great Britain, Germany and other countries for enforcement of their claims also filed for damages done missionaries in Armenia. When Mr. Leishmann the new Minister, arrives in Constantinople, one of the first matters he will bring to the Sultan's attention will be the claims, and he will urge that no further delay occur in their settlement. The authorities do not anticipate that the Turkish government will have any objection to receiving Mr. Leishmann as an American Minister.

THE ONE HISTORIC WALL.
The Detroit Free Press last Monday contained an interesting sketch of the antique stone wall which is located east of Cass City. Only a few years ago the wall was discovered and at that time it caused a considerable stir in the community. The Free Press article says:
"Fernando Emanuel, living near Cass City, described it at considerable length in a letter to his cousin, Prof. Emanuel at Madrid. The university, which exists under the patronage of the Queen Regent, took the matter up and after investigation sent Prof. Emanuel to this country. Since arriving in Michigan last September he has kept the matter a secret."
Fernando Emanuel until about 15 years ago lived in the northeast corner of Greenleaf township. Since then he has dropped out of sight. At any rate the CHRONICLE reporter, after a thorough investigation, has found no one who knows of his whereabouts. With reference to Prof. Emanuel of the Queen Regent University of Madrid, we have learned that such a person really made an investigation

through the eastern part of Tuscola county. James Reil informs the CHRONICLE that he was in the gentleman's company for one day and assisted him in his discoveries.
Prof. Emanuel, in speaking of the wall; says in part: "I believe it to be the work of a great Toltec race and the scene of the last fierce battle between that prehistoric people and the flood of savage mound builders which devastated the country and later erected the earthen fortifications and burial mounds of the Ohio and Mississippi valleys. The gastly remains of that final hand-to-hand conflict still remain in scattered bones and skulls and weapons."
A PROSPEROUS INSURANCE COMPANY.
The secretary's office of the Tuscola County Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Co., is a pretty busy place these days. President Campbell and Secretary H. S. Meyers are preparing their report for the annual meeting which convenes at the Caro opera house on Wednesday, Jan. 9.
Mr. Meyers, who assumed the duties of secretary when Robt. Walmsley resigned a few weeks ago, is doing excellent work, and it is to be hoped he will be continued in the office. Our esteemed townsman, W. J. Campbell is the official president of the company and there is no doubt but that he will also be re-elected at the coming annual meeting.
The society is in excellent condition. The annual report will show that expenses have been curtailed and that there have not been so many losses by fire during the past year. There have also been 360 new members added to the list since the last annual meeting.

WASHINGTON LETTER
Senators who are known to enjoy the full confidence of the administration have begun to talk of the probability of an extra session of the next Congress on account of the failure of important legislation to get acted upon at this session. Inasmuch as the President and these same Senators were during the early days of the session urging upon their party associates to strain every point to avoid an extra session, the present talk is believed to be somewhat in the nature of a threat made for the purpose of lessening the opposition of a number of Senators to measures which it is desired to put through at this session. Although it is not believed that the President or any of his party wish an extra session, one may be made necessary if they insist upon passing some bills, principal among which is the Ship Subsidy measure, because opposition to those may result in hanging up some of the regular appropriation bills. Senator Pettigrew has publicly given notice that he and Senators Butler of N. C., and Allen of Nebraska, intend to oppose every bill brought up in the Senate as long as the Ship Subsidy bill is pushed. If these three Senators live up to that notice either the Ship Subsidy bill will have to be dropped or there will be an extra session, as under the Senate rules it is easily possible for three resolute men to block legislation indefinitely, and Senator Allen already holds the record for speaking against it in the Senate. Besides, they are not the only opponents of that bill in the Senate.

By an amendment to the Civil service rules made this week by the President, the soldiers, sailors and marines who served in the war with Spain, who may at any time have been in the civil service are given the same privilege enjoyed by soldiers of the civil war—the right to be reinstated at any time without an examination. The fact is not generally known that the Civil Service Commission gives all honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and marines, whose discharge was brought about by wounds or sickness contracted in the line of duty, an advantage of 5 per cent in examinations for the civil service. Civilians are required to make 70 per cent to get on the eligible list while the ex-soldier, sailor or marine is only required to make 65. A large number of young men who served during the war with Spain and since seem to have only lately discovered this advantage and are making use of it.
