WASHINGTON LETTER.
Will there be an extra session of the
Fifty-seventh Congress? That is the
question of the hour in Washington.
Although there are still some doubt-
ers, the conditions all seem to point
toward an extra session, regardless of
the effort that is now being made to
force the Ship Subsidy bill through
the Senate. As a matter of fact, it is
doubtful whether that measure is a
factor either way. It is Philippine
and Cuban affairs that are seemingly
making an extra session inevitable.
The plea of the Philippine Commis-
sion for legislation authorizing a form
of civil government for the islands is
being supplemented by daily appeals
from great business interests, not
only in the islands but in this country
and in several European countries. In
addition to this, is the question of
dealing with Cuba. For several
months a Cuban convention has been
at work making a constitution and its
work is expected to be completed be-
fore the adjournment of this session
of Congress but there will be no time
for Congress to act on that Constitu-
tion, as it must do before it can be-
come effective. If the Cubans get
their constitution to Washington, say
the first of March, it would hardly be
fair to make them wait until the regu-
lar session of Congress next De-
cember, to find out whether it will be
acceptable to Congress. There are
other important matters, including
the Nicaraguan Canal, which ought to
be legislated upon by congress and
which have no show at this session.
All these things add to the probability
that a spring extra session will be
called.

ARE OUT OF DEBT.
The Cass City Driving Park Assoc-
iation has made the rifle and is now
out of debt. While the association
during its eleven years of existence
has never been embarrassed yet there
has always been a deficit until now,
and the share holders are accordingly
happy. "Treasurer Pinney now holds
a balance on hand of \$177.88. This
amount is the nucleus for an increas-
ing sum which, no doubt, will be held
in reserve for building purposes in the
future. Both the T. H. & S. fair as-
sociation and the driving park asso-
ciation are now on a paying basis, and
much can be expected from them in
