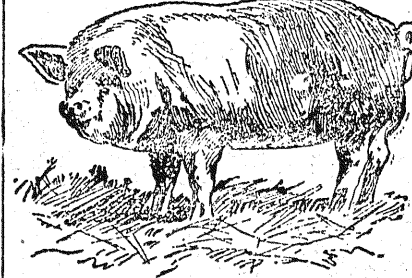

PIGS IN SIX MONTHS.

TAKING ADVANTAGE OF THE PERIOD OF GREATEST GROWTH. If pigs can be raised in six months and sold at a weight of about 200 pounds, they pay better than those kept much longer, says C. W. Jones in The American Cultivator. It is well known to all breeders that it is during the first six months that the animals gain the fastest and after that every pound of flesh or fat comes slower and at a greater outlay of food.



The pigs several months later does not always reward the owner. When the young pigs are old enough, they should be allowed the run of a pasture field where clover is pretty thick. Turn them loose in the field with the sow. If the field has plenty of good fresh running water in it and ample shade for the animals, they will do much better and not suffer drawbacks from the heat.
